# Winton Covid zero

Locals of Winton have cause to celebrate – still cautiously – as they have managed to record zero active cases of Covid-19.

The news comes after the town suffered a large wave earlier this year shortly after Christmas.

Winton Shire Council Mayor Gavin Baskett said it was "fantastic" to be back at zero cases.

"We weren't doing very well for about a month there with the case numbers fluctuating up and down," he said.

"Then we had two cluster outbreaks in the same week which we were going up to about 28 positive cases.

"It put a bit of a scare through the community."

Cr Baskett said the council, himself, and the community really "hammered the messaging home" regarding Covid safe procedures such as the importance of masks, social distancing, and handwashing.

"That obviously resonated through the community," he said.

"For the next ten days, we really saw the

numbers start to drop – it went from 28 down to zero within seven days.

"It was fantastic to see the community nut it out and achieve this target."

Cr Baskett said there was a huge sense of relief in the community after achieving their goal of removing Covid from the community.

"Now that there is no cases in the community that we know of, locals can have the reassurance that they can go to the shops, go down the street, and they are very unlikely to catch Covid," he said.

"That's not saying, it's perfect – we do have

people who are positive but don't show any symptoms at all.

"We've still got to be very diligent and follow the directives of Queensland Health."

Cr Baskett this was a great outcome for the elderly and all locals.

"I'd just like to thank the community for just being diligent," he said.

"It was a bit scary there – it could have gone from 30 to 100 very quickly.

"Thank our local hospital and health workers who were under some pressure during that time."

People from all over the State brought their best on show, with a great turnout from the Barcy locals.

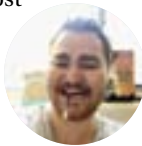
Turn over a few pages, and Aaron Skinn's brilliance in photography is on full display.

# All depends on rain

Meat Livestock Australia recently release a report claiming beef production would hit an all-time high in 2024 and due to demand, prices would remain strong through those years.

This would be extremely beneficial to all cattle graziers throughout Australia; however, to fully capitalise on this potential – the Central West, especially those living west of the divide, will need much more rain over the next two years.

Ashra Downs Grazer and AgForce North Regional Council Member Lisa Magoffin said that despite recent storm rains, the drought in Western Queensland is far from finished.

“There has been some good rain in patches, and the Channel Country has been experiencing some light flooding – but we need widespread rain,” she said.

“Despite what the media has shown, the rain has been very very patchy.

“In fact, some people in the Gulf country, they haven’t had enough rain to run their creeks or fill their dams.”

Ms Magoffin said wet seasons in the west more often operate off wet seasons from the north.

“We need monsoonal rains – we need back-to-back the traditional January to March wet seasons,” she said.

“It is up to 10 years for some people who

have missed out on the wet season.

“To the extend, for some people, on their own property, they have received different levels of rain – demonstrating how patchy the rain is.”

Ms Magoffin said for her family-run farm to consider building cattle numbers and ending agistment, much more rain is needed.

“The clock is ticking for us to get much-needed follow up rain,” she said.

“Desperately so.”

Nonetheless, Ms Magoffin is pleased to hear about the strong market, and strong market predictions for beef.

“In the short term, what it does is keep the market strong – and we need the market to remain strong,” she said.

“In 2011 and 2012, the whole of the Eastern board suffered drought – right through from North Queensland to Victoria.

“And in that period, we all suffered because there was no where to go with cattle for agistment and it began to impact on the feedlot market.”

Ms Magoffin said she doesn’t predict strong back-to-back seasons in the west that would be needed for the west to match the strong seasons south.

“We’re eight years into a ten-year diversification scheme for our income stream,” she said.

“Where we have been traditionally all cattle, we have introduced Australian Meat Sheep, which we are continuing to expand, and a goat operation.

“We will remain in the beef sector, but we are adding other income streams.”

Ms Magoffin said her team are also introducing a human-induced regeneration project and plans for an irrigation project.

“This is about building our resilience to the increasing impacts of longer-term drought event that we’re seeing,” she said.

“The droughts are lasting longer – where we used to see three good seasons, three average, and three bad seasons in a ten-year period – now we are seeing longer periods of much more intense drought.

“For us to remain in agriculture, we need to diversify.”

Ms Magoffin said despite the challenges she was optimistic about agriculture in the west.

“It’s a great time to be in agriculture, it’s great to see the prices so high,” she said.

“As a producer, it’s very hard to control the prices – we’re price takers not makers.

“It’s exciting to see the opportunities in agriculture, I hope we in the west get the seasons to support us.

“So that we can take advantage of the prices, and invest back into infrastructure that help make the west more resilient.”

## Doc shortage runs deep

Mungindi, Augathella, Cunnamulla and Quilpie Hospitals have been left without doctor coverage for seventy days in the last four months.

Warrego MP Ann Leahy said this was an appalling record for the Palaszczuk Labor government “who have left the hard-working local nurses and on-call emergency retrieval teams to provide health care”.

“With the integrity crisis gripping the Palaszczuk Labor government they have lost focus on regional health service provision.

“The integrity issues were bubbling away whilst these doctor shortages have been occurring. This Labor government is consumed by itself rather than focused on providing doctors to regional communities, in a pandemic.”

Ms Leahy said edical emergencies don’t take a break just because there are no doctors available.

“It is now time for the Health Minister in Queensland to show some leadership and properly resource regional hospitals,” she said.

“This Labor Government are so out of touch they even caused the Doctor shortage at Mungindi by denying the border exemption.

“I thank the nurses who under the pressure of Covid and lack of doctors, have kept these hospitals running.

“I will continue to fight for better healthcare in regional Queensland at every opportunity.”

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# Vax rate among the best

The Central West Hospital and Health Service reported a total of 46 active cases.

This has brought the total cases since the first case on 23 December to over 300.

Central West Hospital and Health Service Chief Officer Anthony West reminded locals that the Covid-19 virus is circulating widely in our communities.

“As well as vaccination, we urge Central West residents to observe common-sense hygiene practices – especially when gathering in groups for social events,” he said.

“Please wear masks if you can’t socially distance – think three big steps – and good hygiene, including frequent washing of hands with sanitiser.

“And very importantly, stay home if you are sick – don’t go to work and think carefully about attending social gatherings.”

Mr West urged locals to get tested if they have symptoms, no matter how mild.

“We’ve seen an increase in testing numbers across our health service in recent days and I would like to commend community members for coming forward,” he said.

“Testing helps us quickly find as many cases in the community as possible and reduce the spread of Covid, so please come and be tested if you have any symptoms.

“Symptoms include: Fever, sore throat, runny nose, cough, shortness of breath, fatigue, diarrhoea, vomiting, nausea or lack of taste or smell.”

Mr West said the new national advice is that everyone aged 16 years and older will be considered “up to date” with their Covid-19 vaccinations only if they have received their booster dose, as well as their initial first and second doses.

“Everyone aged 16 years and older is eligible for the booster vaccination if it has been three months or more since the completion of their primary course of vaccine – both doses,” he said.

“To date, 4779 booster vaccinations have been delivered across the region, which represents 76.9 per cent of the eligible population aged 16 years and over.

“This is the highest percentage rate for boosters delivered in the state to date, and I would like to thank Central West residents for coming forward so readily.

“I also urge them to continue coming forward so that everyone who is eligible receives their booster dose for that added layer of protection and to ensure they are “up to date” with their vaccinations.”

Booster doses, and doses one and two, as well as child vaccinations, also are being delivered by the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

Mr West said CWHHS are also delivering vaccinations for children aged 5-11 years and have, to date, vaccinated nearly 45.4 per cent of children in that age group in the Central West.

“But we would like to see this percentage increase, so I urge Central West parents to please bring their children in for the vaccination,” he said.

“And remember, the child vaccine is being delivered in two doses about eight weeks apart so it’s vital you bring your child in for that second dose to ensure they are fully protected.

The sooner you bring your child in for that first dose, the sooner the second dose date will come around so your child can complete their course.”

Currently, 93.4 per cent of eligible Central West residents aged 12 years and older are now fully vaccinated with two doses of vaccine.

The Central West HHS is the second most highly vaccinated hospital and health service region in Queensland after the Wide Bay HHS region.

The rate of vaccination amongst our First Nations residents also is very high with 82.7 per cent of those aged 12 years and over fully vaccinated.

For 5-11 years, the call centre team will provide information on available appointments and parent/guardian consent requirements.

Both the Blackall and the Winton general practices also provide Covid-19 vaccinations for everyone aged 5 years and older.

Phone the Blackall General Practice on 4657 8200 during business hours to discuss your nurse-led vaccination appointment at Blackall or Tambo.

Phone the Winton Medical Practice on 4657 2755 during business hours.

Testing is available for free at all our facilities in the Central West through a combination of Rapid Antigen Tests (RATs) and Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) tests, depending on individual requirements.

You must quarantine until you have received your test result. If you test positive, our staff will provide information on isolating and next steps.

We are aware that some Central West residents may not be reporting positive results from Rapid Antigen Tests (RAT) administered at home.

It is vital we know who has tested positive so they can isolate and be managed appropriately to minimise their risk of transmitting the virus to others and so people receive the care they need.

Remember if your test is not registered, we don’t know about you and your positive result.

# Ancient crocodile remains

The Australian Age of Dinosaurs Museum has announced the discovery of *Confractosuchus sauroktonos*, a new genus and species of crocodile from western Queensland, Australia.

The fossilised bones were recovered from a sheep station located near the north-western margins of the Winton Formation, a geological deposit that is approximately 95 million years old.

The paper naming the new crocodile was published on Friday 11 February in *Gondwana Research*, the Official Journal of the International Association for Gondwana Research published by Science Direct:

The crocodile specimen was discovered on Elderslie Station, near Winton, and excavated by staff and volunteers from the Museum in 2010.

Preserved in a soft siltstone concretion, the fossil was partially crushed by a front-end loader during the removal of overburden from a sauropod dinosaur excavation site. Numerous small bones exposed within the fractured concretion revealed the partial skeleton of a small Cretaceous animal.

*Confractosuchus sauroktonos* (or the broken dinosaur killer) is the second crocodile to be named from the Winton Formation, while its last meal is the first skeletal remains of an ornithomimid from the Winton Formation and the first evidence of crocodile/dinosaur predation in Australia.

The discovery of a small juvenile ornithomimid in the gut contents of a Cretaceous-aged crocodile is extremely rare, as only a handful of examples of dinosaur predation are known globally.

Research on *Confractosuchus* was led by Australian Age of Dinosaurs Museum Research Associate Dr Matt White through the University of New England in collaboration with the Australian Nuclear Science and Technology Organisation (ANSTO).

The small densely packed and fragmented bones in the concretion were too fragile for rock to be removed from them by conventional mechanical preparation methods so, in order to identify the animal, the fragmented concretion was placed in the care of Dr Joseph Bevitt, Senior Instrument Scientist at ANSTO.

Dr Bevitt used neutron and synchrotron X-ray micro-CT scanning technologies to identify where bones were located within the concretion.

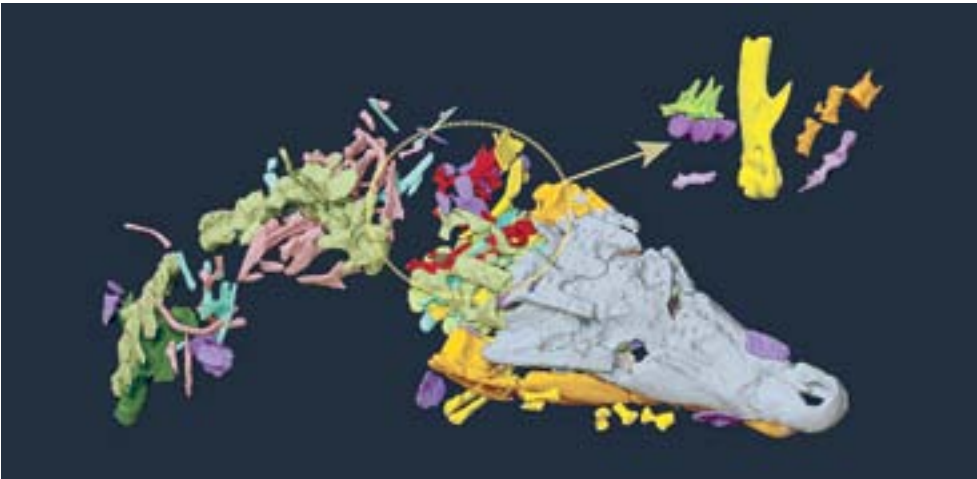
The scan data files were then used by Dr White to digitally prepare the specimen, a process that involved ten months of computer processing so that a 3D reconstruction of the bones could be made.

According to Dr White, the number of bones present in the concretion was staggering, with over 60% of the crocodile preserved. The skeleton of *Confractosuchus* includes a near-complete skull with dentition and semi-articulated postcranial skeleton, though its tail and hindlimbs are missing. "At the time of its death this freshwater crocodile was around 2.5m long and still growing," Dr White said.

"While *Confractosuchus* would not have specialised in eating dinosaurs, it would not have overlooked an easy meal, such as the young ornithomimid remains found in its stomach."

Given the condition of the partly digested ornithomimid and the limited comparable material in Australia, an exact classification hasn't been possible.

However, at the time of its death, the ornithomimid was only a juvenile, weighing up to 1.7kg.

As the small ornithomimid bones show evidence of fossil articulation, *Confractosuchus* either directly killed the animal or scavenged it quickly after its death.

While being eaten one of the ornithomimid's femurs was sheared in half and the other femur was bitten so hard that a tooth mark was left on the surface of the bone.

According to Dr White, this find suggests

dinosaurs were intrinsically part of the Cretaceous ecology as scavengers, predators, and prey.

"It is likely dinosaurs constituted an important resource in the Cretaceous ecological food web," Dr White said.

"Given the lack of comparable global specimens, this prehistoric crocodile and its last meal will continue to provide clues to the relationships and behaviours of animals that inhabited Australia millions of years ago."

*Confractosuchus sauroktonos* joins several significant specimens at the Australian Age of Dinosaurs Museum including *Australovenator wintonensis*, Australia's most-complete carnivorous dinosaur, *Ferrodraco lentoni*, Australia's

most-complete pterosaur, and bones from the large sauropod species *Savannasaurus elliottorum* and *Diamantinasaurus matildae*.

The Executive Chairman of the Museum, David Elliott OAM, describes the new discovery as one of the Museum's most exciting accessions.

"The Winton area has produced the majority of Australia's large dinosaur fossils so adding a crocodile that preyed on dinosaurs provides an extraordinary insight into the complex ecology that existed in Cretaceous Winton," he said.

The fossilised remains of *Confractosuchus* are now on display at the Museum, which is located 25km from Winton township in western Queensland.



# Radiographer bids farewell

Now retiring radiographer John Currie will be moving on to greener pastures as he makes his trip back home to Westbrook New Zealand.

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# Katter takes aim at ‘fit and proper’ rule

Traeger MP Robbie Katter has hit out against the State Government's war on licensed firearm owners stating that they compromise community safety.

Mr Katter said he and his fellow KAP colleague's offices had received an unprecedented number of complaints and pleas for assistance from the public following changes made in the definition of "Fit and Proper Person" in December.

The new criteria, spawn out of the Queensland Audit Office's review into the regulation of firearms in the state, now places greater scrutiny on an applicant's traffic history, health status, and ability to successfully participate in bureaucratic processes.

This includes broad and ambiguous questioning that can result in a rejected license if an applicant makes a mistake or accidentally omits personal information.

Mr Katter said while the Weapon's Licencing Branch was part of the Queensland Police Service, it was the Labor State Government who had to take responsibility for the system.

He said their political obsession with punishing those with a genuine need for a gun was risking community safety.

"I would challenge anyone to name a group that is more discriminated against than licensed firearm owners, and these laws are not

doing anything," he said.

"After looking at the evidence, the only thing being achieved by all this effort from the Government is people like me and farmers are writing more letters regarding the constraints around us.

"We are not the problem; it is the illegal gun owners that the Government should be focusing on."

Mr Katter said the decision-makers, including politicians and uniformed police from the Weapon's Licencing Branch, were too far removed from the day-to-day reality of most licensed gun-users.

"These decisions are being made from an office from Brisbane but they have very real consequences for the people on the ground - there are people who need to use these things as tools," he said.

"In most cases those deciding on applications do not even have a weapon's licence, so outside of being a uniformed police officer they do not have any real-life experience with how this all operates in practice.

"The focus should always be on community safety, but this needs to be in terms of the evidence of where firearms are genuinely needed".

The Traeger MP said the goalposts for weapon's licence applicants were constantly being changed and were now essentially limitless.

"It used to be that five years was the limit where a person applying had to reveal anything on their record; now it is indefinite," he said.

"A traffic offence from 20 years ago is now relevant and is counting against people.

"For those people who were getting their firearms licence, it is now either held up or they are just not getting it - all this thanks to a 20-year-old traffic offence that never counted before.

"It's mischievous because the authorities already have all of that information, but they force people applying into admitting it.

"If they forget or make a mistake, they can be forced into a corner that results in the immediate rejection of their application through no genuine fault of their own."

Mr Katter said while the current situation for licensed weapon-holders was dire, he'd had some preliminary and positive discussions with the State Government.

He said from these talks, there'd been an indication the Government was prepared to take action to restore some common sense to the system.

# AWI tackles flystrike pest

The Australian Wool Innovation (AWI) has announced a further \$550,000 in funding to combat flystrike through one-on-one training for growers.

AWI is calling for expressions of interest for 15 agriculture and vet sheep consultants across the nation to be trained and accredited to deliver the training to at least 600 woolgrowers across Australia.

The new "Moving to a Non-Mulesed Merino Enterprise" project is targeted at woolgrowers who are, or are planning to, manage flystrike without mulesing and aligns with the industry's Wool 2030 strategy and follows calls by many growers for more information about this option.

This five-year program adds to existing flystrike management workshops.

AWI Chairman Jock Laurie said AWI remains committed to supporting the rights of all growers to choose how they manage their flock.

"AWI recognises the critical importance of all flystrike prevention measures and continues to support all woolgrowers in their choices through the provision of a diversity of best practice information, designed to deliver the best outcomes for sheep, across a range of different climate and operating environments," he said.

AWI is responding to increasing requests for information and support from woolgrowers seeking assistance to specifically reduce their reliance on mulesing.

Winton Shire Council Mayor Gavin Baskett said Council believed it would not be the right time to host an event of that size in Winton.

## Simplicity shines in CODA

Formulaic endeavours sometimes come along which manage to surpass all perceived expectations, proving that any film can achieve greatness and prosper because of its simplicity rather than despite it.

Based on the French film, La Famille Belier, CODA follows Ruby (Emilia Jones), a high schooler on the cusp of graduating who is also the only hearing member of her deaf family and is forced to act as their translator.

When an opportunity opens for her to follow her passion for music, Ruby finds herself conflicted between following her dreams and abandoning her family - particularly when their fishing business is threatened.

On the surface, a film like this shouldn’t have worked due to its unrelenting corniness and all-to-familiar familial story arcs.

But, just like its characters, CODA tugs at the heartstrings in no short part thanks to the authentic performances given by all four family members.

Marlee Matlin and Daniel Durant do a wonderful job as Ruby’s mother and brother respectively, however, it’s Troy Kotsur as Ruby’s deaf father who delivers the film’s greatest performance. Kotsur expresses authentic, unrelenting emotion through his scarily realistic facials and the vexatious way he utilises sign language, allowing hearing and deaf audiences to easily understand the situations and arguments being translated, making the movie even more accessible than its wholesome concept already allows it to be.

CODA is far from a perfect movie, but in a weird way, is so close to being flawless; it’s a film that exudes genuine emotion and personality while also associating itself with foreseeable outcomes.

Kotsur and Jones shine as the premier stars, carrying much of the story with sincerity and charm, all while being led along by director Sian Heder to produce a near-perfect people-pleaser that hits all the right notes in the most silent of moments.

## JANUARY OPERATION

"The summary of operations for January issued by "Qantas" states that during the month route passengers, single stages, totalled 159; taxi passengers 12; freight (lbs.) 652; miles flown for month 10,283; total company mileage, all without injuries to personnel or passengers, 439,381.

### The report continues:

## "AIR TRANSPORT MILLENNIUM

"As the general interest in air transport grows, the query is being more frequently put as to whether a normal air service can be operated for any length of time efficiently, and at a profit, without the aid of a certain amount of Government assistance.

The theory that this can be done has been frequently put to the test, in many parts of the world, but in every instance with little or no success.

“Even when operating assisted by the most favourable conditions as in Western Queensland, a good deal, of progress has yet to be made before commercial aviation can be said to be self-supporting.

“When operating in districts where weather conditions are less favourable, and where other means of transport may have to be met in keen competition, the advance will be even slower and sacrifices of some magnitude will have to be made while awaiting the millennium.

“The attitude of this company towards the progress of aviation in Queensland is aptly and correctly put by Aircraft as follows:-

“The shareholder who does not look for an almost immediate profit on his investment is, alas! all too rare.

But he is not wholly extinct.

The shareholders in 'Qantas' have unanimously agreed to draw no dividend in respect of this last year's profit.

Their decision is to put the money towards the support of, any new form of the company's operations or any new aircraft venture which may seem likely to assist in the development of civil aviation in Queensland.

Here we see the true pioneer spirit in excelsis.

It is the only spirit in which the millennium of an unsubsidized air transport service—possibly ten, or even five years hence—may be anticipated.”

Despite the business depression which the drought has caused to descend on Western Queensland, a number of useful trip's are being carried out each month.

In each case, there is a definite service rendered, the days of "sporting" and "stunt" trips having passed.

Angie Kent is a contestant on the news series *Dancing with the Stars: All Stars*. She tells **Danielle McGrane** why she's decided to return to the dancefloor.

**A**ngie Kent doesn't shy away from a challenge, that's why she's taking part in *Dancing with the Stars: All Stars*, despite the tough competition.

"When I first saw the line-up I just thought 'Oh my God, Courtney Act,' she's just everything," Kent said.

"Who can go up against Courtney Act? That's royalty right there."

Kent will be taking part in the show alongside Act and a host of celebrities who have come back for another chance at glory, including Cameron Daddo, Bridie Carter, Kylie Gillies and Grant Denyer, to name a few.

"My favourite style would probably have to be the cha cha or the tango," she said.

"I feel like you can show off your personality more when you've got a cha cha or a tango number whereas the other slower ones are all about technique and emotion which can be quite hard when you're not a professional and you're a bag of nerves."

Kent is a darling of the reality TV world. She was first introduced

After that, she took part in *I'm a Celebrity... Get Me out of Here!* before becoming the Bachelorette. Reality TV has kept Kent very busy, but she also realises it probably took its toll on her when she first took part in *Dancing with the Stars*.

"I wanted to come back and do this show again because the first time I did it Yvie and I had just got off *Gogglebox*, then we got thrown into the African jungle, then I was the Bachelorette and then I was offered *Dancing with the Stars* and I was so exhausted," she said.

"I kind of felt like I had to do *Dancing* because I was on this roll, but I just wasn't myself."

At the time, Kent had just finished being on *The Bachelorette*.

"I had a new relationship in the public eye," she said.

"I was so tired and I just didn't get to give it my all."

But now, the timing felt right for a return to *Dancing with the Stars*.

"So I thought 'two years have passed, I'm in such a better headspace. I'm going to go back this time and I'm going to have fun and not feel like I have to do it, but instead I want to do it,'" she said.

The luxury lifestyle is very often free to those who can afford it, and very expensive to those who can't. But in 2013, one woman challenged that notion, pretending to be a German heiress and stealing the hearts – and money – of Manhattan's social elite.

Living as Instagram-famous socialite Anna Delvey, rumoured to have a fortune of more than US\$60 million, the young woman conned wealthy New Yorkers, banks and hotels out of tens of thousands over a four-year period – she was even on the verge of a deal worth tens of millions at the time of her 2017 arrest.

This glamorous, lavish series from production powerhouse Shonda Rhimes (*Grey's Anatomy*, *Scandal*, *Bridgerton*) goes inside exactly how Anna Sorokin (Julia Garner), a 20-something Russian-born conwoman, managed to pull off her daring fraud.

The 10-episode "semi-fictional" account of this implausible true-crime story charts the efforts of *New York Magazine* journalist Vivian Kent (*Veep*'s Anna Chlumsky) – a reporter working to salvage her career – to get to know the *real* Anna. However, the harder she tries, the more attached she becomes, with Sorokin's simultaneously charming and contemptuous allure plain to see.

*Ozark* star Garner spent time with the real Sorokin, visiting her in prison to try and understand the enigmatic grifter and perfect her distinctive, hard-to-place accent, a move which pays off in spades. Garner's Anna is confident, aloof and incredibly entertaining as she runs rings around a who's who of New York.

# Wild dog tracking efforts see rewards

By National Wild Dog Action Plan

Recent tracking efforts in far west New South Wales have revealed how wild dogs and feral pigs tend to use semi-arid landscapes.

The landholder-driven Western Tracks collaring project is a collaborative research project aimed at optimising management activities to control wild dogs in flood and associated country of the Paroo, Cuttaburra, Warrego, and Darling River systems.

NSW Farmers' Association Wild Dog Coordinator Bruce Duncan is collaborating with Western Local Land Services, NSW Department Primary Industries, and NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service on the project.

He said 37 feral pigs and seven wild dogs have been trapped, assessed, fitted with tracking collars, and released at the point of capture.

Data generated will provide information on wild dog movements, how wild dogs use the landscape at different times of the year, how control of wild dogs could be better targeted to avoid bait uptake by feral pigs, and the effectiveness of routine control programs.

With just one of the seven collared wild dogs still alive, the project team is assessing how many were successfully targeted in the recent wild dog baiting program.

The Western Tracks project team is now monitoring traps, looking for tell-tale signs of wild dogs and collaring more wild dogs in the project area.

Western Local Lands Services Biosecurity Team Leader Tim Wall said the information would be collated and made available to local landholders and stakeholders.

"We want to see how the animals use the landscape in the Western Division – the Paroo has been in flood a couple of times and that will show us if the wild dogs go through the flood water or stay on the side," Mr Wall said.

"We are also mapping ground and aerial baiting to determine if collared wild dogs travel up the bait lines or not.

"We are working on making maps of movement and we are expecting the data to be available soon after all the collars have been collected during 2022."

Mr Wall said the Paroo was predominantly cattle and sheep country with landholders actively managing wild dogs.

"We have a lot of landholders on board and they are interested in having a look at this information when it comes out," he said.

"Our aim was always to have 30 wild dogs fitted with collars – dog numbers were reduced by the drought but they are starting to rebuild with the good seasonal conditions."

NSW DPI principal research scientist Peter Fleming said the GPS data from collars was fundamental to providing valuable scientific

guidance into future planning for pest animal management.

"The landholder-driven project will give a clear picture of the scale at which control was required," Dr Fleming said.

"The data will show where wild dogs move across land tenure boundaries, helping people focus on where control programs are needed and the resources which will be required.

"We want to know how the floodwater affected wild dog movements – do they maintain the same home range regardless of the floodwater?"

The Western Tracks program is interested in how wild dogs and feral pigs interact.

Dr Fleming said feral pigs consume many wild dog baits.

"If we can work out places in the landscape where wild dogs go and feral pigs don't, we can potentially make the baiting programs more efficient," he said.

"The collars are timed to last six to 12 months before automatically disengaging.

"If a collared wild dog is controlled by trapping, shooting or poisoning, the collar is recovered and can be reused on another wild dog."

The NSW Government has funded the Western Tracks project and two NSW DPI Vertebrate Pest Research Unit (VPRU) research staff have been appointed to collate the data for the Western Tracks program.

NSW DPI senior research scientist and leader of the VPRU Western Tracks project Paul Meek said the department had created two new positions and appointed research staff to carry out field research.

"A problem with relying on only local observations of wild dogs is that people only see dogs where they have spent time, whereas the GPS collars are logging their position constantly," Dr Meek said.

"Local knowledge gives us invaluable information, but the GPS collar gives us additional and more detailed information.

"Over the next few months, the team will be setting camera traps in the landscape to monitor effectiveness of control.

"What is really pleasing is private and public land managers, Bruce Duncan, pest animal management groups, Western Local Land Services, NSW NPWS and NSW DPI are all working together to deliver the project."

## Farmers back bill

The National Farmer's Federation has applauded Maranoa MP David Littleproud for introducing the Agriculture Biodiversity Conservation Bill, recently.

NFF President Fiona Simson said the NFF supported the Bill, as an important next step in valuing the contribution agriculture makes to the environment.

"Everyday Australian farmers manage more than half of the nation's landmass, on behalf of all Australians," she said.

"This Bill sets in motion a process for framework legislation which, if enacted, will allow protocols to be developed to allow natural capital values, starting with biodiversity, to be formally traded.

"Importantly the Bill focuses on valuing biodiversity on land that is sub-optimal for food and fibre production."

The voluntary scheme will allow farmers to trade their biodiversity values and create a pathway to both reliably measuring and reporting biodiversity and to use that knowledge to participate in emerging markets.

These so-called 'new commodities' will support greater diversity of income; lead to more resilient farm businesses in the face of challenges such as drought and empower Australian agriculture to further demonstrate its sustainability credentials."

Under the framework, biodiversity, unlike traditional farm commodities which are delivered to a buyer, will need to be maintained and/or established within the farm boundaries, much like carbon sequestration in vegetation and soil. There will be an ongoing relationship between the supplier (farmer) and purchaser to manage and report the status.

Ms Simson said the Bill represented a transformational change for Australian agriculture, providing a carrot rather than a stick to farmers to positively manage their farm environment.

"It gives farmers another string to their bow. Each season, farmers make choices about crop plantings and livestock numbers," she said.

"The opportunity to trade their biodiversity values provides a further and longer term choice that they can draw upon when it suits their farm business.

"The NFF's 2030 Roadmap includes a goal for, by 2030, 5% of farmers income to come from ecosystem services payments."

Ms Simson said the NFF had made it clear the Bill must not limit the scope of activity to new biodiversity works or projects, but must also recognise and value existing habitat that farmers have voluntarily and responsibly maintained.

The NFF is, with Government support, also well advanced in developing an Agriculture Sustainability Framework, to address emerging demands for evidence of Australia's agriculture's sustainability credentials for investment and trade purposes.

As part of this NFF will develop linkages to national scale data sets to provide greater robustness to the sustainability criteria through a new partnership with the Macdoch Foundation. NFF Member, Agforce is also developing the AgCarE program to better understand agriculture's sustainability status.

Ms Simson said the NFF would now thoroughly review the Bill and provide further advice to Government as necessary.

## Farming families encouraged to apply

## Frivolous Frangipanis

No matter where you travel in Central Queensland you cannot help but notice the beauty of the Frangipani or Plumeria at the moment. This well-known tree with its long, thick, pointed leaves and stout, fleshy stems has sweetly-scented, waxy flowers with overlapping petals in a kaleidoscope of colours including shades of white, cream, yellow, apricot, pink, and red.

In most local gardens, you could expect these plants to grow at least three metres high and in cases, these plants can reach eight metres high.

Frangipani's can be extremely resilient to any Central Queensland weather.

In the Gemfields town of Rubyvale, there is one of the largest collections of Frangipanis in Central Queensland.

Frangipani enthusiast Michelle Jarvis has over the last six years built up a collection of 62 different Frangipani on her one-acre property.

What makes Michelle's collection so unique is that just about all her Frangipani were grown by seed.

Michelle either purchasing Frangipani seed mixture packs on eBay or collecting seeds from Frangipani's that Michelle notices growing in gardens growing around Central Queensland.

When I asked Michelle if she can share any propagation tips?

Michelle was only too happy to oblige.

Michelle said, "I plant the seed upright with the wing out of the Potting Mix blended from commercial Potting Mix with a little more sand mixed through the mix".

"Importantly never over water the Frangipani seedlings," she said.

"Usually, the Frangipani seedlings will shoot in less than 2 weeks. I have found the Frangipani seedlings take better if placed in filtered light and not full sun until leaves appear."

Frangipani's grown from seed can take about five years to flower then it could be a further couple of seasons before you get the true colour of the flower.

Michelle has found every seed grown Frangipani will be different, you cannot be guaranteed the same colour as the parent plant so it's a surprise when they start to flower.

Michelle also has grown Frangipani from cuttings.

Frangipani's can also be grown readily from cuttings of any size.

It is recommended to remove all lower leaves and allow the Frangipani cuttings to thoroughly dry before striking.

Insert Frangipani cuttings in a sand or sand/peat moss mixture and keep moist.

For best results, you can place a clear plastic cover over the top of the Frangipani cuttings.

Once the roots are formed, it is advisable to transplant them as soon as possible.

Did you know that the first Frangipani plants in Central Queensland were cultivated in the gardens of Mount Morgan during the

1890's, and from there they gained a reputation of being one of the hardiest and most tolerant flowering trees of its day for the harsh Central Queensland environment?

Frangipani is a tree that is not as popular now as it used to be, but it is still widely planted throughout the whole of Central Queensland and is a tree that is steeped in tradition and intrigue.

Frangipani's are a native of Central America and were cultivated throughout the Asian-Pacific region.

It is believed that Spanish traders were responsible for this spread.

Many countries now claim the tree as their own.

For centuries, Buddhists have regarded the plant as a symbol of immortality; in the West Indies it is called the West Indian jasmine.

In Sri Lanka it is known as the Tree of Life, due to its ability to survive in the harshest of conditions and still produce clusters of richly perfumed flowers.

It has even had the unfortunate common name of the Graveyard tree because, in many Pacific islands, it has been planted around the local cemeteries.

Plumeria was named after Charles Plumier,



a French botanical writer of the seventeenth century.

When I asked Michelle why she decided to grow Frangipani?

She told me that she loved the shape of the Frangipani and of course the flowers.

Michelle's favourite Frangipani colours are the shades of pink and red.

All of the pictures shown in this column are Michelle's seed-grown Frangipanis.

The success of Michelle's seed-grown Frangipanis in her Rubyvale garden raises a really good idea for many other gardeners across Central Queensland.
