

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MP secures extra funds for childcare

Member for Maranoa David Littleproud has welcomed a significant increase in the rate of Child Care Subsidy (CCS) for Maranoa families with multiple children aged five or under in child care.

Mr Littleproud said the Australian Government had lifted the rate of CCS by 30 per cent for the second child aged five or under and any vounger children in child care, up to a maximum rate of 95 per cent.

The higher subsidy will boost support for working families and follows the removal of the annual CCS cap of \$10,655 for families earning over \$190,015 (in 2021-22 terms) from 10 December 2021 – and beyond.

These measures will ease the cost of child care for 740 Maranoa families, who on average will be around \$2,260 a year better off," Mr Littleproud said.

'For a family who are charged a typical fee and earns \$120,000 a year with two children in child care for five days per week, the saving will be \$144 per week compared to current set-

The Coalition Government fast-tracked the increased subsidy, bringing it forward from 1 July 2022 to being available now.

Mr Littleproud was today on the ground at Winton Council's Little Swaggies Child Care, one of the 74 Child Care Services in his electorate, to hear firsthand how the changes will

"Families do not have to do anything to receive the increased subsidy - it will flow to families automatically, with no need to apply to Services Australia," Mr Littleproud said.

"But families keen to know their benefits can go to the new StartingBlocks.gov.au website and use the simple family estimator.'

Mr Littleproud said the Australian Government measures would make a significant contribution to easing the pressure on the cost of living for many families with young children.

'For local families with more than one child aged five or under in child care, today's increase in the CCS, means more money in your pocket each week.

"This is good news for eligible families who will benefit from reduced out-of-pocket child care costs, which also provides an incentive to consider either returning to work or working additional hours.

"Local families know that the cost of child care, particularly for families with more than one child in care can be a barrier to pursuing employment or working additional hours.

"This is especially so for local mums who may be able to use this to get back into the workforce or to increase their hours in their current job.

Mr Littleproud said that currently about one million Australian families are being supported by record levels of child care funding in Maranoa, 5,500 children are being supported under CCS by almost \$35 million.

"Childcare changes lives - it removes barriers and provides opportunities to those who need it most. The Government's increased investment in childcare, around \$10.3 billion this financial year alone, means that around one million families will benefit.

"It's all about empowerment, not dependence. Unlike Labor's free childcare for millionaires, the Coalition Government is targeting our childcare spend to make sure carers, overwhelmingly women, get the choices and chances they expect and deserve."

Winton Mayor Gavin Baskett welcomed the funding saying it would be beneficial to working families across Australia, not just the west.

"This is very important, the last thing you want is people not being able to afford childcare when they're working which leads to the employment issue we're having," he said.

"We need people to be able to access affordable childcare."

Cr Baskett said it was always good to see the Member for Maranoa visit Winton.

"David's always been a great supporter of Winton and he's supported quite a lot of projects here," he said.

Winton roads set for a major upgrade

The Australian Government and Winton Shire Council will deliver a \$16.2 million major road upgrade of the Winton-Jundah Road, to increase road safety while supporting quicker and more reliable trips yearround for commuters and freight.

The project will be funded on an 80:20 split between the Australian Government, under its almost \$5 billion Roads of Strategic Importance (ROSI) initiative, and the Winton Shire Council.

Federal Member for Maranoa David Littleproud said the upgrade of around 37 kilometres of the Winton-Jundah Road complements other road safety upgrades currently underway in the region.

"Not only is this road key for local primary industries to get their produce and other goods to local and international markets, but it is a vital access point for visitors coming through and seeing what this part of Central Queensland has to offer," he said.

"This is yet another example of the Australian Government investing in the road infrastructure regional Queenslanders need and deserve to stay well-connected to each other and to opportunities such as jobs, for businesses to seamlessly get their goods to markets, and to keep all drivers safe on our roads.

"This project is coming to life thanks to the Australian Government's over \$1 billion commitment to upgrading key road corridors in Queensland under ROSI.

Assistant Minister for Road Safety and Freight Transport Scott Buchholz said the project would ensure the road is safer and more resilient to wet weather, reducing the need to take lengthy detours and putting valuable time back into motorists' days.

"Whether you are a truckie with a load of

spoilable goods, or en route to a nearby job opportunity, having a wider or sealed road that is more resilient to flooding will give road users greater peace of mind that they'll be able to safely pass through without disruptive detours," he said.

"We are delivering a record \$110 billion in infrastructure funding across the nation to deliver projects just like this, to get Australians home sooner and safer and underpin a stronger national economy."

Mayor of Winton Shire Council Gavin Baskett said the Winton-Jundah Road upgrade will improve access to the world-famous Dinosaur Stampede National Monument at Lark Quarry.

"The Winton-Jundah Road project will increase accessibility and safety during wet weather events and help ensure year-round connectivity for tourists, freight and locals alike," he said.

"Investing in road upgrades equals jobs, more cash flowing across local businesses, and a route that will better allow freight and tourist to come through and stop by our towns and attractions."

"If someone has an accident in Jundah, and then is driven here, and then is transported out - they need a discharge plan," he said.

"Or if they come to Longreach, we've got to understand we've got to get them home."

Minister Millar said the retaining of staff in the west was also an issue. "Especially in those outlying areas, I think

that's important," he said.
"I think there has to be an emphasis not only in keeping doctors here, but nurses and

allied health pracitioners here when it comes to providing health care plans to people."

Mr Millar said with an aging population in the west, looking into health care is vital to saving lives.

"More and more people are getting to the stage where they need health plans or advice," he said.

"We've got to make sure the people who live out here are able to get the same quality services out here.

"Sure if they need surgeries and high end surgeries, they will still need to go to Brisbane and Rockhampton, but we've got to make sure people out here, the services are continued."

Mr Millar commended the Central West Hospital and Health Service stating "they punch well above their weight".

Councils unveil a plan to tackle regional connectivity

Recent recommendations from the 2021 Regional Telecommunications Independent Review Committee have affirmed the position held by Western Queensland Councils.

The Western Queensland Alliance of Councils (WQAC) welcomed the findings which validates the key concerns and proposed solutions detailed in the WQAC's 2021 Digital Connectivity Blueprint.

The report directly references the WQAC submission which highlights a core issue for regional digital communications specifically that there's plenty of digital investment in the regions, but it continues to deliver a 'patch-

work quilt' of connectivity:

'[The] ongoing investment by all levels of government to bridge the digital gap. This activity, while with the best intentions, has taken place in an uncoordinated manner, resulting in what has become defined as a 'patchwork quilt' of connectivity in the region.'

Page 22 - 2021 Regional Telecommunications Review, Western Queensland Alliance of Councils submission.

The Alliance acknowledges all three levels of government have strived to improve the

connectivity within remote Australia.

Across Western Queensland, many grants, and initiatives (public and private) have incrementally bridged the digital gap.

While welcomed, these have created a 'patchwork quilt' of connectivity that now requires a refreshed approach.

The Committee's report and the WQAC Blueprint have identified a refreshed approach and we urge the Australian Government to grasp this opportunity to achieve its objective of Australia being a digital world leader by 2030. The WQAC stands ready to

be part of the solution and provide the future state model for regional Australia.

Cr Tony Rayner, Mayor of Longreach Regional Council and Chair of the Remote Area Planning and Development Board said:

"The Australian Government's Digital Economy Strategy 2030 seeks to make Australia a digital leader and has been welcomed by industry and community groups.

"For this to be achieved, closer collaboration across all levels of government and industry is vital to ensuring fair and equitable digital connectivity to every Australian."



"I am currently learning to be a better creative, I'm learning to do pottery, spinning, weaving.

"I am doing a course in Arts at Uni, which I may or may not finish – does it matter? Not really.

"And I love living in Longreach, the people are fabulous."

"There's no denying that," she said.

Now internationally recognised fashion designers, both sisters Jean-Barr Aulpunda Crombie and Joyce Anpanuwa Crombie started their lives in the desert channels before moving to Birdsville when they reached school age.

They are at the heart of the success of Red Ridge the Label.

Jean Barr still lives in Birdsville and Joyce now lives in Longreach.

Joyce said she took to art growing up in Birdsville as a youngster but didn't begin making her own fashion until 2000.

"We didn't start working with Red Ridge, either, until 2012," she said.

"We did sculpture up around the Diamantina, and our artworks are hanging up around Birdsville.".

Jean-Barr started getting involved shortly after Joyce, we've been working together ever since.

"This is when we started our project, "Two sisters talking" and working with Red Ridge," she said.

"We've been working together for quite a while now, we're still going strong."

The pair are not only known for their art and fashion work, but they have also authored children's books, and are working on an indigenous language dictionary.

Their children's books feature the language of their ancestors.

"It will have the meanings behind our language; they're just enjoyable bedtime stories with pictures and happy families," she said.

"We just want to share what knowledge with have with people.

"The younger generation, it's important for us to keep pushing it to them so they can learn."

Jean-Barr said she had always wanted to paint, and it wasn't until Joyce and a friend got her started that she mustered up the courage to do so.

"I've always wanted to put my designs on material – it was a dream for me to do so," she said.

"Doing it now, there's no looking back for

"We're just going to keep on doing what we're doing."

Jean-Barr said she loved the arts when she was in school.

"I didn't have the time to carry on with it, and I just left it when I got married and had kids," she said.

"Then Joyce started doing her stuff."

Joyce said art was inherent in her, but it wouldn't be until later in life that she realised it.

"It was more or less our mother, actually, that got in and pushed us to learn language as well as teaching us – so when my sister and I started this, we decided to take what she taught us and put it to art," she said.

"When it's just us out there doing all this, I find we need to get it out.

"For not only our kids, everyone."

Both Joyce and Jean-Barr said no one could guess how proud they are of their work.

"Even our family, even the kids having our paintings and keeping them at home – it makes us proud," Joyce said.

"Being with Red Ridge – Louise has pushed us to our limits.

"Helping us establish our, Canvas to Catwalk – and now its gone international, I'm really really pleased about this.

"It's something we were never taught we could achieve."

Red Ridge have been behind a number of project that help empower women, including the Women Walking in Harmony project.

Joyce is now out teaching other women how to paint and encouraging young women to chase their goals.

Winton secures monsoon funding

Two Winton projects have secured \$124,000 under this round of the Coalition Government's North Queensland Recovery and Resilience Grants (Stream 2) because of severe impacts from the 2019 Monsoon Trough.

Member for Maranoa David Littleproud said that three years after this catastrophic event it remains a priority for the Government to support the region and build resilience.

"As part of the North Queensland Recovery and Resilience Grants (Stream 2), \$124,000 in funding has been awarded to Winton projects for flood mitigation measures to stop run off on an applicant's and neighbouring properties and controlling invasive weeds to minimise spread into Werna and Wokingham Creeks," Mr Littleproud said.

"This funding will directly support locally led initiatives to improve land conditions through increased biodiversity, improve management of natural resources and ultimately increase the sustainability and viability of the region.

"Both projects are the result of extensive consultation with individuals, business owners, local government and the working groups established to support the implementation of the region's long-term recovery strategy." Round two (\$7.4 million) of the North Queensland Recovery and Resilience Grants (Stream 2) is now open with co-contribution grants of between \$10,000 and \$200,000 available on a competitive basis. Applications close on 29 April 2022.

and northern New South Wales are a timely reminder of the importance of Prevention, Planning, and Preparation in Disaster Management.

Our region is in good shape, and during the meeting, we adopted a number of revised subplans to help guide future responses.

I also attended the District Disaster Management Group, chaired by Inspector Julia Cook, and gave an update on developments at the local level.

Councillors had an initial meeting with senior staff last week to discuss the preparation of our 2022-23 Budget.

Budget oversight is a duty my colleagues and I take very seriously.

Fiscal responsibility is always a high prioriy for rural and remote local governments, and there will be many more of these meetings and workshops over the next several months as we work towards the adoption of the next Budget.

Financial sustainability will be high on the agenda when the Deputy Mayor, our Economic Development Officer, and I attend the Western Queensland Alliance of Councils Annual Assembly in Charleville this week.

Housing, digital connectivity, and road network planning are the other key strategic areas

There will also be a strong focus on the upcoming federal election, and we'll be hearing from both the major parties about what they have in store for local government if they win.

The 22 Councils of the Western Queensland Alliance share many challenges, and the assembly is recognised by state and federal governments as being a significant voice for rural and remote Australia.

I'm pleased to report that the weir that was damaged during the last run in the Thomson River has now been fully repaired.

Can I just say a big thank you to our engineers and crews who got in quickly and decisively to get the job done.

Cena brings peace, love, and laughs





The success of director James Gunn has been nothing short of powerful; his rise from a small-time film creator into one of Hollywood's most beloved directors was a joy to witness.

Last year saw Gunn release The Suicide Squad, a superhero phenomenon that would see many characters such as Peacemaker become loved by fans, resulting in this series of the same name which many are calling just as good if

James Gunn has always been a master of writing combative characters that still maintain a measure of humility and charm, with not only Peacemaker, but the rest of the cast being no different.

The cast is held together by a compelling story that may not hold together at the best of times but makes you root for their often over-bearing egos when it

Peacemaker takes a bit to get going, with the first few episodes dragging along as the lucrative number of jokes and expositions leaves little for viewers to become truly invested in, but by the time episode five comes around, that's when the show cranks it up another gear to become something unforgettable in all the right ways.

The best comedies mix amusing, ludicrous humour with earnest, substantial emotion, creating a wealth of character advancement which allows them to become people with actual character rather than uninteresting, tedious archetypes utilised in every bland piece of

Peacemaker is no different, blending the iconic wit that is James Gunn's writing with his equally as impressive vision for mawkish impassioned moments of emotion that all feel well-deserved because of the performances given by all

Many comic book adaptations rely on viewers being well-versed in the complete history of their characters, but Peacemaker manages to be genuinely funny, emotional, and interesting without any prior commitment to the prop-

The show may take a while to get going, but the ever-eccentric Gunn brings spunk to this series, as well as a poignant statement and ending which has left fans, such as myself, wanting more.

No one seems to want to be the first through.


The entire mob can simply stand and stare at the open gateway.

Keys to freedom

Wentworth standout
Danielle Cormack tells
Siobhan Duck about
Life on the Outside, the new
SBS documentary series
which asks the question:
would you let an ex-prisoner
stay in your home?

anielle Cormack is a big believer in second chances.
It's for this reason that Cormack – best known for playing Bea Smith in Foxtel's prison drama Wentworth – wouldn't hesitate to share her home with a former inmate to give them a better chance at a fresh start.

It may seem like an unorthodox idea, but Cormack says research shows the biggest reasons people reoffend is the lack of housing and support they receive once they're out.

Cormack wonders: could things be different if, upon release, instead of leaving jail for an unknown future, someone went to live with in a stable and loving home?

This groundbreaking approach to rehabilitation is explored in *Life on the Outside*. Cormack hosts this riveting three-part SBS series where released prisoners stay with Australian families for 100 days. The hope is the experience will better equip them to leave the prison system for good.

Long before Wentworth, Cormack had already spent years trying to better understand what causes people to offend and how to better support them.

"I was approached by the producers to do this because of the work I have been doing in New Zealand with an organisation that supports at risk youth and women who have been incarcerated and often the at-risk youth have also been part of the criminal justice system," Cormack explains.

"We work to help upskill them and educate them about communication and getting back into the workplace to help break those cycles that they or their families have been part of.


"It seemed to me that there was something very similar about the themes and the subject matter of this show that I felt comfortable aligning myself with because having been inside those workshops and talking to people who have been in the system its clear that something needs to change. And this is a show that highlights the potential to do things differently."

Of course, its not all smooth sailing. And Cormack understands that it's not an approach that works for all parolees.

But for participants like Sierra and Jeremy, whose struggles with addiction have led them to the commit crimes which have landed them in jail, this program could be a game-changer.

Yes, on paper, it may sound like a risky proposition. And Cormack assures all participants were vetted before taking part and they all have access to 24-hour case workers.

"It may not work for everyone but if you can help just one person well,

Wentworth has already gone some way to shifting misconceptions about inmates. With its OTT storylines and heightened drama Wentworth was certainly not intended as a realistic portrayal of prison life but it did spotlight some frightening home truths.

In fact, many former inmates and their families have contacted Cormack to say how grateful they were for the way that Wentworth humanised prisoner experiences. Cormack's character, Bea - loosely based on the iconic character portraved by Val Lehman in the 1970s series Prisoner - was a victim of domestic violence who snapped. While Wentworth's cast of prisoners has a huge fanbase who looked beyond the characters' crimes to the person themselves, that same empathy is not often afforded to those who are incarcerated in real life. It is Cormack's hope that the participants of Life on the Outside will (0) be met with similar understanding. "I imagine this could be quite polarising for people," she says. "But I'd like people to watch the show, rather than forming opinions about 'criminals' who are locked

The execution exceeds its premise as the film explores not only drinking culture, but astutely confronts existential themes. ***

Rainbow Frittata

Serves: 4

Prep time: 15 minutes **Cook time:** 25 minutes

1 serve per portion

• 6 0000

Ingredients:

- 6 eggs
- ½ cup milk, reduced fat
- 160g feta or parmesan cheese, crumbled
- 1 tablespoon flat leaf parsley, chopped
- Cracked black pepper
- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
- ½ medium onion, diced
- ½ red capsicum, diced
- ½ medium carrot, grated
- ½ medium zucchini, grated
- ½ cup canned sweet corn, drained
- 6 cherry tomatoes, sliced in half

Method:

- WHISK the eggs and milk together in a bowl. Add the cheese, parsley and pepper and stir to combine.
- HEAT oil in a frypan over medium heat. Lightly sauté onion and capsicum for 1-2 minutes, then add carrot, zucchini and corn and cook for 1 minute.
- REMOVE vegetables from pan and add to egg mixture. Stir until combined, then return to pan.
- DECORATE with cherry tomatoes and cook until set.





Red Salad

Serves: 6

Prep time: 15 minutes **Cook time:** 10 minutes

2 1/2 serve per portion

Ingredients

- 2 large potatoes, cut into 2cm chunks
- 1 medium sweet potato, cut into 2cm chunks
- 2 carrots, diced
- 1 cup frozen peas
- 1 egg, hardboiled
- 1 cup plain yoghurt, reduced fat
- ½ cup of fresh dill, sprigs only, roughly chopped
- Freshly cracked pepper
- 225g can beetroot, sliced
- 3 shallots, finely sliced

Method:

- COMBINE potatoes and carrots in a large saucepan. Fill the saucepan with enough cold water to cover the contents with water.
- BRING to a boil over high heat, then reduce to medium-low and cook until potatoes are easily pierced, about 5 to 6 minutes.
- ADD frozen peas in the last minute of cooking.
- DRAIN potato, carrots and peas and cool to room temperature.
- COOL and slice the hardboiled egg
- COMBINE the yoghurt, dill and pepper in a small bowl.
- ADD the cooked veggies, shallots, beetroot and hardboiled egg into a large bowl.
- STIR through the yoghurt dressing.

The time for Sweet Peas

Have you thought about planting a fragrant winter flowering wall of colour?

The Sweet Pea or Lathyrus odoratus could be the perfect plant.

Traditionally Sweet Peas should be planted around St. Patrick's Day but you can sow seed until Anzac Day and still be successful.

Locally, Sweet Peas have been grown in many Central Queensland gardens for more than 100 years.

Sweet Peas made excellent cut flowers as well as producing showy winter floral displays.

This plant could be used in a number of locations from covering a trellis or screens to being great for pots or hanging baskets.

These days there are a wide variety of flower colours for the gardener.

These colours range from white, blue, lavender, purple, and pink through to red.

If you are purchasing packets of Sweet Pea seed always check that the seed is Australian.

Sweet Peas are fairly hardy but a few handy hints for success should include Sweet Pea seed will rot in wet soil.

Ideally, it would be helpful if dolomite was added to the Sweet Pea garden last month.

When preparing the seed soak the Sweet Pea seed in water overnight to soften the seed coat.

Always water the soil where the seed is to be planted then water the garden after planting the seed.

But then don't water again until the seed has sprouted.

Grandmother Caladiums

Do you remember as a child your Grandmothers Bush House?

I remember my Grandmothers Bush House very well with all of its Terracotta Pots filled with wonderful plant specimens.

And of all the plants in her Bush House it was here collection of Caladiums.

Some had foliage of dark green with white, pink, and red speckles; some with dark red centres with wide green borders then there was one large plant with pink with red veins and pinkspeckled green fringes on dark green foliage.

And my favourite Caladium with bright green foliage a creamy white centre with white veins

Caladiums are part of a group of plants known as Aroids.

Caladiums are clumping tuberous perennial plants grown for their long-lasting, colourful foliage.

Caladiums can be grown either as a potted plant or as a shade plant in the garden.

Foliage colours can range in various shades of red, pink, white, and green to yellow-greens.

There are two basic types of caladium cultivars: fancy and strap-leaved.

Fancy leaved varieties have large, heartshaped, or semi-heart-shaped leaves.

The strap varieties have smaller, narrower, elongated leaves giving the plants a more compact habit.

Strap-leaved caladiums produce more leaves per tuber than fancy-leaved caladiums.

Fancy leaved varieties range in height from 30 to 50cm while most strap leaved varieties are less than 30cm in height.

Caladiums grow best in the partial shade of open, high-branched trees.

They will need protection from full sun and also, they are not tolerant to both frost and drought conditions.



Some of the newer hybrids will tolerate exposure to full sun for a couple of hours a day.

Most pink-leaved caladiums can develop a brownish, scorched appearance when grown

They will perform quite well in full shade but the colour may not be as good.

In the garden, Caladiums will perform best in a well-drained position but must have ample moisture.

Caladiums are hungry plants and do require regular fertilising during the warmer months in order to produce good tubers for the next growing season.

Fertiliser containing slightly higher phos-



phorus and also with added potash should be applied every four to six weeks during the warmer months.

Never use high nitrogen fertiliser on Caladiums as it can cause the plant to produce more green leaves than the coloured ones.

Another important hint to know in growing Caladiums is not allowing the fertiliser to come in contact with the foliage.

It is always best to thoroughly water your Caladiums after applying the fertiliser to prevent fertiliser burn.

Caladiums are very worthy Bush House plants that could find a home in your Bush

Longreach's corner stores

For those of us who are old enough, the mention of the words "corner store" can bring back a flood of wonderful memories.

In the "olden days", most of the shopping was done close to home, even in a small town like Longreach.

Not everyone had a car, so people were less mobile back then.

There were a number of corner stores in Longreach, but they have now all but disappeared due mainly to the rise of the motor car and of supermarket chains such as Foodworks

In most cases, each corner store was run by the family who owned the store with the family members working long but rewarding hours.

In some instances, the family lived at the rear of the shop, often toiling behind closed doors to restock shelves.

In some cases the owner lived close by, which could be a distinct disadvantage, as folk would call on them for service, even though information had been displayed regarding the trading hours.

One corner store which no longer stands was Conaghan's on the corner of Swan and Ibis Streets, diagonally across from the State School.

Prior to becoming a store owner, Mrs Conaghan conducted the horse-carrying business of her late husband.

Due to the fact, motor lorries were replacing horses, Mrs Conaghan made the prudent move to open a store on the site where a pioneering ice-making factory had previously operated.

Conaghan's store was stocked with groceries, produce, stationery, and soft drinks.

Mrs Conaghan must have been a remarkable woman, for as well as running the store, she conducted piano lessons.

She later sold the store to Les and Lurl Frazer who in turn sold to Bill Affoo.

The store was closed in the 1960s but later reopened as a hairdressers, then later a signwriter conducted business from there.

Sadly the building was demolished and replaced by a residence.

Another former corner store with an interesting history is that of Mrs E. A. Hughes.

The store was situated in Crane Street, north Longreach.


Mrs Hughes was another enterprising lady. She was the first female to be elected to the Longreach Shire Council (as it was then known), the Longreach Fire Brigade Board, and the Longreach Hospital Board.

She was also a staunch member of the Australian Labor Party, the Q.C.W.A., and the School of Arts.

The late Wally Crust ran the store for several vears until its closure.

Unfortunately, both the shop and the house next door were burned down, and a new house

For a number of years, the northern part of Longreach was also served by a corner store which was combined with a butcher's shop

and a fish and chip shop.

Mr Len Pullinger owned a store in Falcon Street and the family lived in a house at the rear of the shop.

When Mr Pullinger passed away, the store was carried on under the management of Mrs D. Fraser.

There was a store on the corner of Quail and Falcon Streets which eventually became the Town Band Hall but at the present time is unused.

A popular shop owned by W and V Clarke was situated at 97 Cassowary Street.

Even though it wasn't actually on a corner, it was always referred to as a "corner" store.

This store sold almost everything and served the eastern and northern part of the town for many years.

It was built in the early 1950s and sold in the 1960s and pulled down.

Mr Jack Hurkett was another early storekeeper and built up a solid business on the corner of Crane and Duck Streets.

He sold groceries, confectionery, and all classes of electrical goods.

He also conducted a car hire business from his store, operated a Texaco petrol bowser and was the agent for Radiola and Tasma Wireless Receivers.

The store and the dwelling next door were destroyed by fire on Christmas Eve, 1935.

One of the unique occurrences among these corner stores was their unwritten policy

where they borrowed items from each other.

If one store was short of potatoes, they would borrow from another store and pay them back when their own supplies arrived.

The present Foodworks has a long and interesting past.

The original building was moved from Galah Street where it was a paint shop.

It was moved by the bullock team and set up as a grocery store.

As the town expanded, so did the store.

Mr Louie Hong Hoc and family conducted the business until it was taken over by Mr Har-

Harold's son David and his wife Pam eventually sold out and it became Foodworks.

Today it is a flourishing enterprise, giving employment to many people and offering great service to town and country folk.

The owners and their staff work long hours, which has always been the case with such businesses.

Bulloo blitzing dog divide

A unique program aimed at bridging the divide between council and landholders around wild dog management is winning kudos in local government circles for Bulloo Shire.

The LGA has taken a proactive nil-tenure approach to wild dog management with a dedicated team of three staff travelling thousands of kilometres to meet remote landholders face-to-face to help resolve issues.

A finalist in the Local Government Excellence Awards, Bulloo's Rural Services staff notched up 8000km last financial year talking to landholders about baiting coordination and training, chemical certificates/training, exclusion fencing, drought support, water agreement facilitation, invasive animal and plant management and providing wellbeing support.

Although wild dogs are front and centre for many of the landholders, the team has also facilitated training programs in property mapping, bovine pregnancy testing, creek repairs, farm safety and livestock supplementation.

Team members draw on resources from PestSmart, Feralscan, AgForce, Southern Queensland Landscapes and Department of Agriculture and Fisheries.

Rural Services manager Donna Hobbs developed the program from the ground up following a suggestion from Bulloo Mayor John Ferguson the disconnect between Council and landholders needed to be resolved.

"Council wanted to provide valuable services to the landholders," Ms Hobbs said.

"Our Rural Lands Officer now has a liaison focus so he is not just spraying weeds or helping someone set a dog trap but is talking to landholders about their issues.

"We held wild dog trapping workshops and included mental health and wellbeing with Oueensland Feral Pest Initiative funding.

The funding has enabled a coordinated strategic aerial 1080 baiting program covering 795,557ha and wild dog trapping and monitoring assistance for three properties covering

Two coordinated aerial 1080 baiting programs in November 2020 and May 2021 result-

ed in 11 wild dogs trapped, two shot, 34 scalps received, and 8962kg of bait meat distributed.

Council provides subsidised meat baits to encourage landholder participation in wild dog management.

Ms Hobbs said Rural Services works collaboratively with NSW Local Land Services, and neighbouring Quilpie and Paroo Shires on simultaneous and coordinated baiting cam-

She paid tribute to the groundwork undertaken by the Western Queensland DogWatch Committee funded by AgForce and Australian Wool Innovation.

We aim to reduce ad hoc baiting and achieve a blanket approach from St George at the border to the north of the state," she said.

"Three years ago, we did have quite a large wild dog problem but since everyone has been committed to the aerial and ground baiting and trapping programs the dog numbers have steadied up in the last 12 months.

"People are putting that down to continued effort but if we take our foot off the pedal it will creep back quickly.'

Mark and Tay Luckraft operate an earth-moving business and also help run the familyowned Yakara Station at Thargomindah.

They have received property visits from the Rural Services staff and attended training workshops

Tay said isolated landholders appreciated the contact, especially to discuss their needs around drought support or mental well-being.

The couple take part in the aerial and ground baiting programs each May and November but concede it can be a struggle when absentee landholders do not bait.

"We have exclusion fencing with a neighbour and we also connect to the wild dog barrier fence on our boundary - on our sheep country we run two plain electric wires on a six wire fence," Tay said.

She said the exclusion fencing and coordinated baiting programs resulted in a lamb marking of 110 per cent in their Dorper flock

Tay paid tribute to former wild dog coordinator Skyela Kruger for her assistance to the region's landholders and organising trapping training workshops.

Large volumes and exchange rates impact wool market

Large volumes and foreign exchange rates conspired against wool prices this week at the Australian wool auctions.

Increases in wool value in all currencies were recorded, except for the most important for Australian woolgrowers - the AUD

The most significant forex appreciation was seen on the Euro v AUD, as an almost three per cent gain on forex alone had the active European operators revaluing their buying levels. The one-millionth Australian bale of the season was sold this week compared to that figure being reached week 38 last season

In the dominant USD and CNY trading rates, a 1.5 per cent gain on both against the AUD saw opportunities for local gains evaporate. In all instances, if rates of exchange had remained similar, the market would have seen AUD levels better, indicative of the stronger demand that exporters are reporting.

As a result, the Eastern Market Indicator (EMI) finished 14ac lower this week to close selling at 1407ac/clean kg.

A higher passed in rate revealed the preparedness of grower sellers to hold if price expectations were not met.

The Western Market Indicator (WMI) dropped 15ac to 1444ac/clean kg and just 84.7 per cent cleared to the trade.

In USD terms the EMI gained 4usc or 0.4 per cent to round out the week at 1027 usc/

Logistics issues continue to hamper the "normal" trading of wool with shipping delays and hence payment delays obstructing full operations of all participants each week.

In a positive, many key buyer exporters are commenting of how well the market has held on in their opinion, given those abnormal problems and the relentless 50,000 bale

Over in South Africa, due to similar logistical problems, the wool industry decided to halt auction sales for a week back in mid February in an attempt to help recoup exporter finances and assist shipments, allowing auctions to be given some chance of shaking off those outside shipping and financial influences. 8,000 bales was due to be sold that week.

There is over 52,000 bales rostered to sell again next week with Wednesday and Thursday two days of auctions.

Beef industry figureheads celebrate role of women

"Diversity, including female representation, is critical to bringing new ideas and a balanced perspective to the beef supply chain, and to ensure our industry has the right structure in place to meet the needs of our environment, animals, communities, and customers for generations to come.

"Women have a great capacity to connect

The ABSF was established in 2017 to help industry showcase its sustainability credentials and identify areas of improvement.

Recognising an opportunity for growth, industry selected "Diversity in the workplace", including the representation of women, as one of the priorities used to track sustainability

Data collected by the Framework in 2020 showed 39.6 per cent of the workforce on farms and in feedlots was female, while women made up 25.7 per cent in the processing sector.

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

I, like Stuart Magill, lived in Warne's shadow.

Bowling offspin Brisbane, my teammates would say, "why don't you bowl leggies like Warney?", and as an opening batsman who liked pace on the ball, I would have to face over after over of kids trying to replicate the great spinner.

So I would like to end by saying thank you to both Marsh and Warne for leaving their legacy behind, for as I am down at the nets with Lloydy Jr just starting his wicketkeeping and spin bowling career, I could think of no two better role models
