Over-the-phone, the vet's gave Ms Louise-Knox the options of either cutting off Korky's facial skin and nose or to try to reattach the face.

Cutting off the animal's face would leave the dog disfigured for life – requiring life long intensive care.

Ms Louise-Knox chose the latter.

"One, because she doesn't belong to me," she said.

"Two, because she's ten years old and loved to death by my sister who is emotionally dependant on the dog.

"This dog was the last gift a now dead friend gave to her."

The vets asked \$1000 to begin the process of reattaching Korky's face, and there was no guarantee that it would be a successful process.

"I just asked them to 'please try to save her'," Ms Louise-Knox said.

"I was waiting to find out if the dog was alive or dead before I called my sister."

Including the multiple surgeries and cost of keeping the dog safely at the vet's, the procedure has costed Ms Louise-Knox over \$4000.

In the first operation, Korky's face didn't take and was still dying on one side.

**Compensation And Council** 

A week after the incident, Ms Louise-Knox said her sister had contacted her neighbour about the vet bills.

"They said that it was not their dog's fault," she said.

"They said that dog involved had been destroyed anyway and said, 'if it was mine, I would have just shot it.

"They have refused to help pay for it [the vet bills]." The neighbour refused to provide comment, but stated these accusations were false.

Ms Louise-Knox said she had warned the Barcaldine Regional Council previously about the potential her neighbour's dogs had for violence

"Prior to the incident, the council's Law Officer came around, I told him 'there are three pitbulls next-door, they're going to get in, they're going to hurt something," she said.

"How do I put in an official notice?

"He said, 'all good, word of mouth is fine'."

When Ms Louise-Knox went to make a complaint to council about the incident, she said they had told her they had already been notified mentioning one of the three dogs next door had been put-down.

"They came and looked at the fence where the dogs tried to pull Korky under," she said.

"They told me that they had been informed the dog responsible had been destroyed, and because I had not witnessed the event, I could not tell them which dog had done it.

"All three have been trying to get under my fence; all three are aggressive."

Ms Louise-Knox said she believes the other dogs have equal potential for harm

The Barcaldine Regional Council chose not to provide comment.

Ms Louise-Knox also commented on the

fantastic work done by the Longreach Vets.
"The Vets, Kate and Daniel, have done

amazing work," she said.

"Even if there was a vet here [Barcaldine], I'd go to the Longreach Vets.

"They are invaluable.

## Event to address local alcohol issues

Longreach Police are holding a Drink Rite event at the Birdcage Hotel on the 1 April at 5.30pm.

Longreach Local Police have seen a significant increase in alcohol-related offences in particular alcohol-fuelled violence and drink driving offences in the first part of this year.

In an effort to change the way people view their alcohol consumption police will be hosting a Drink Rite event.

Since the start of the year, Police have intercepted 11 drink drivers and detected 12 Public Nuisance offences that involve some form of disorderly conduct affecting mem-

bers of the public within the vicinity.

Eight of the 10 Public Nuisance offences resulted in \$827 infringement and included overly intoxicated persons.

Longreach Police have also increased their use of Initial Police Banning Notices which means the person it was issued to is unable to attend any licensed premise in Longreach for one month, which can be extended to three months if certain circumstances allow. Compared to last year when Police issued three Public Nuisance infringements and detected 9 drink driving offences.

No banning notices were issued last year.

With the significant increase in offences Police are concerned that these offences will continue and possibly intensify.

With a view to curb these behaviours, the Drink Rite event is held in an informal setting designed to convey information in a fun way. Drink Rite is designed to demonstrate the effects of alcohol on different people and the benefits of monitoring alcohol consumption. Drink Rite Also aims to encourage people to act responsibly and minimize the risk of harm to themselves and others.

Police invite anyone interested in the event to contact Constable Tom Patten or Senior Constable Kath Thomas at the Longreach Police Station or come down on the night.

Six to 10 participants will be chosen to actively take part in the drinking part of the event, but everyone can attend and benefit from the information provided.

"The competition can be fierce, so we were proud that John was accepted in the annual


Ms Stephens said this was a part of a larger process the Waltzing Matilda Centre is conducting to build pathways for young artists in

# Potential for tough flu season as Covid numbers drop

Allowing for Covid cases discharged after completing isolation, the total number of active cases currently in the region is 4.

To date, accounting for those who have been discharged from quarantine, the Central West Hospital and Health Service has recorded 419 cases of Covid-19 since the first case on 22 December.

Central West Hospital and Health Service Chief Executive Mr Christopher Sullivan said while case numbers appear to be stabilising in our region, we cannot afford to be compla-

"Vaccination remains our best protection against the virus," he said.

"As we approach April and May, Central West residents also should be aware that we are moving into the influenza season.

"Influenza has not figured highly in most people's minds over the past two years of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Mr Sullivan said influenza numbers have been lower than normal over the past two years – with no laboratory-confirmed cases in 2021 and only 11 in 2020.

"This was primarily due to the various pandemic social distancing, mask-wearing, and other hygiene measures," he said.

"The year before the pandemic, in 2019, the Central West recorded 192 laboratoryconfirmed cases of influenza.

"Laboratory confirmed cases are always only the tip of the iceberg for influenza cases, as many more cases occur who may not be so sick as to go to the doctor or may not be

Mr Sullivan said with pandemic measures largely no longer in place across the state, the potential for influenza to spread this year is much higher.

"So, as well as ensuring you are up to date with your Covid-19 vaccinations - first and

second doses for everyone aged five years and over and a booster dose for everyone aged 16 years and over - please remember to have your influenza vaccination when these become available," he said.

"We also encourage people to maintain good hygiene practices such as washing hands properly and often or using an alcohol-based sanitiser, staying at home when they are sick, and coughing or sneezing into

"As well as good hygiene practices, vulnerable people also should make sure they are vaccinated against Covid-19 and receive their booster dose as soon as they are eligible, and ensure they are vaccinated against influenza when the vaccine becomes available from late April or early May.'

# Pixar tackles puberty

Pixar is back with their latest feature film, this time tackling the difficulties that come with growing up and the life-altering changes which affect your body.

Although Disney and Pixar have both handled the subject of growing up differently, neither have handled puberty in such an overt and effective manner.

Set in 2002 Canada, Turning Red follows the life of 13-year-old Meilin (Rosalie Chiang) as she struggles with a new-found family secret being able to transform into a giant red panda whenever she gets too excited.

However, keeping this power proves to be more difficult than she could've imagined as her loving, over-protective mother, Ming (Sandra Oh), is never far away.

Turning Red has a high-octane energy to it that keeps the film at a steady pace, rarely slowing down or taking moments to step off



the "pizzaz" pedal.

Director and writer Domee Shi pours her heart and soul into this coming-of-age tale by introducing relatable situations and characters that any child can identify with, as well as utilising its 2002 setting with references to products of yesteryear such as Tamagotchis to tell a clear, concise story which can relate to children of past and present.

The four leading friends all work off one an-

While the film doesn't always have a consistent harmony, Turning Red more than makes up for it in passion.

Director Shi understands that not every animated movie has to be a comedic romp, opting to focus on the message behind the movie rather than providing jokes that don't always land.

If you're looking for an animated feature that anyone can relate to, Turning Red is high up on my list of recommendations and one that even made me tear up - yes, even me.

# **Tackling connections**

A newly blossoming business housed in the former Leader building on Magpie Lane is seeking to become the heart of Agtech in outback Queensland.

Outback Property Solutions (OPS), a business started up by a man locally born and raised Andrew Barton, has been making strong inroads across the west with clients reaching far south as Roma.

Yet, Longreach will remain its hub with plans to use local business as thoroughly as logistically possible.

"I grew up in Longreach, the family's been here almost 100 years now," Mr Barton said.

He was working in Brisbane at the time when the embers of what would become OPS began to flicker.

"I was called up by Keith Gordon in 2006 when I was working as an electrical engineer,"

"He had bought some sheep, and some wild dogs got into the sheep – he was a bit upset, and he said, 'can we develop a system that can detect wild dogs and shoot them?

"I thought it may be better to develop a system that scares them away, but that was the start of OPS."

From there Mr Barton began to realise the

importance of tackling the problems of modern outback graziers holistically.

Mr Barton had been working out of Campsie Station before moving into 124 Magpie Lane as they had outgrown their previous residence and to be closer to their other Agtech partners Centwest and Mercury Business Supplies.

Mr Barton said OPS differs from most Agtech vendors which are typically coastal or city-based.

city-based.
"We have a strong steering committee,

we're very close to the customers," he said.

"The customer's feedback into our systems

has been a vital part of our company's growth.

"This is very much our system – a lot of other Agtech systems come from New South Wales or Victoria, this is Queensland's system."

Slowly, OPS has worked to earn the trust of graziers across Queensland, convincing them that they understand the outback better.

"To form good relationships with graziers and customers out here, you can't just rock up and expect a good report," he said.

"We've been doing it for so many years, the systems are very good and just getting better. "We have had to build the trust, however."

OPS works closely with other Longreach businesses such as Centwest and Mercury Business Supplies to create their "smart products", such as with Centwest, which help with design and metalwork for a variety of products.

Mr Barton said that working with graziers in the outback is less simple as many properties don't have mobile coverage.

"Being a grazier in the modern-day, you need to be involved in some sense with Agtech; and when you have a large property, it is essential that you have an established data communications network," he said.

"Our solution will work outside of the mobile coverage and still put data up into the cloud.

"In doing that, and one of the key selling points with the OPS solution, we don't actually charge of data because we've developed the data solution.

"That dramatically reduces the total cost of the solution and with the OPS the data continually comes back."

Going forward, Mr Barton hopes to expand his business including looking for new members to the team.

"We're developing new products, there's 32-35 the steering committee have identified, and we're making our way through them," he said.

"Another way is expanding the area we cover, we will be focusing on the East Coast – Northern Territory, New South Wales, and Victoria."

### What is your favourite place in the Central West?



# Millar backs business watchdog

In parliament, Gregory MP Lachlan Millar argued for the Small Business Commisioner be instated with a permanent office.

He claimed this was an essential service to outback Queensland.

Small business is the backbone of every regional and rural community," he said.

Equally, the Small Business Commissioner needs to be unshackled from the bureaucrats of any government department and the games they seem to play.

"When small business owners seek help from the commissioner in resolving an issue with a state government department, they need to know that the Office of the Small Business Commissioner is truly independent and unshackled from both politics and the administrative elites of the day.

If the dispute is with a government department, they want an independent officer who has the rights and resources to access information from the department on their behalf. "

Mr Millar said he was aware of constituents in such situations.

"It is the local country newsagent being threatened by large suppliers into spending a small fortune to display that supplier's products in a certain way," he said.

"It is a small shop tenant being bullied by large out-of-town landlords.

"It is small suppliers and contractors being paid on unfair and extended terms by big business.

"They feel they cannot protest at the treatment or they will lose work."

Mr Millar gave an example.

"When we were building the Landsborough Highway north of Longreach about 30 kilometres to the Darr River, a small business—well, a medium business in Longreach—owned by a wellrespected family who had been there all their life was caught up in a dispute with a head contractor that was not from Longreach," he said.

"They went a long time without being paid properly.

"This is where I think governments do need to step in.

"Where the Department of Transport and Main Roads is releasing money to build roads, they have to make sure the contractor pays those smaller contractors on time."

Mr Millar said the Moore family had to put up with the Governmental neglect for two years.

"A well-respected family inLong-reach—had to endure trying to keep people on but they were not getting paid. There is a responsibility to make sure they get paid," he said.

"In order to prevent this from happening again, we need all of the things I have mentioned addressed: independence, a clear definition of the beneficiaries of the office and a clear definition of its duties to those beneficiaries. There also needs to be some muscle in the law to compel the release of information. Finally, it will need the staffing and funding to take this role on properly, including providing small business with clearly communicated advice.

"I truly welcome this bill—I truly do—but the test will be in the tasting, as they say. I do fear this legislation, while well-intentioned, is too vague and will not do the job that is necessary for our small businesses. I hope the powers that be do not use it to run protection for themselves, and I hope the minister will fight to reinforce the office and give it some true muscle. I commend this bill to the House."



# Teen star a class act

Evie Macdonald, the star of ABC high school drama *First Day*, is wise beyond her years. **Siobhan Duck** speaks with the actress about the show's impact

t just 16, Evie Macdonald has a self-assurance, maturity and poise which belies her age. In many ways it's understandable because, when someone spends their formative years fighting simply to be themselves, they are forced to grow up pretty fast.

Although always outgoing, the teenager (who was assigned male at birth) says her self-confidence has only grown since transitioning several years ago.

Macdonald didn't agonise over her gender identity. Just as she understood that her eyes were blue, Macdonald knew, and never questioned, that she is a girl. It was just others who proved harder to convince.

"There wasn't a point in my life where I was like: 'I'm a girl'," she says.

"I always knew. I had grown up knowing it my entire life. My subconscious was always Evie. I have always been here. I was just dressed differently and called by different names.

"So, when I got to transition, people would ask my parents if they noticed any changes or if I was a different person. But they just said I was the exact same kid, only happier."

The teenager stars in the acclaimed ABC drama *First Day*. The series, which is aimed at children, tweens and teens, follows a shy trans girl named Hannah (Macdonald) as she navigates all the usual high school dramas.

Now in its second season, Macdonald hopes the series will continue to demystify what it is like to be a trans person, building greater understanding and empathy.

While the bubbly and extroverted Macdonald's personality is very different to her character's reserved nature, the actress can identify with some of her struggles.

"I mean, some of the rules that Hannah had were very similar to me," she explains.

"Things like, no sleepovers when no one knows you are trans. I was okay with that growing up, because it meant that I wasn't going to be put into a bad position.

"So [it brings up] some of those old memories with my parents as they were trying to help me transition."

Although they have always been hugely supportive of their daughter, Macdonald's parents were initially resistant to her transitioning.

"I fought with my parents for years about it," she says.

"They didn't understand what it was. There was no information. There was no research. There was barely anything for them to look at. Back then, when you searched up the word transgender it came up with drag queens and that's not what it was."



Her parents have come a long way since their initial reactions. In fact, it was Macdonald's mum who saw the casting call for *First Day* and encouraged her to audition.

Although she realised that putting herself out there in such a public role could open her up to trolling, Macdonald felt the opportunity to be a role model for other trans kids outweighed any potential backlash.

"There's always going to be negativity in the world, but I think if I impacted one person's life in a positive way then it's worth it," she says

"I've actually had countless messages [about the show].

"It's been really overwhelming. I have had a great deal of support and it's been really amazing."

Like many trans kids struggling with their identity, Macdonald faced playground bullying. Most of it, she says, borne out of ignorance.

"At the end of the day, what does their opinion matter?" she says.

"I am happy, and knowledge is power. And if I ever speak to anyone who is against others being gay or trans, I explain it to them in detail of what it is like, and they often come out realising that what they have been saying is really unkind."

Even now, as an out and proud trans person Macdonald still has to stare down bullies who hide behind fake social media profiles.

"A lot of men have a really big problem seeing me as a real girl," she says with a sigh.

"And I always say to them:
'OK, define what a real woman is
then.' They'll usually say stuff like:
'Oh you can't have babies; you don't
get a period and your boobs are
fake.' 'Let's go through this', I will
say to them: 'Not all women can
reproduce. Some people can't get
their period because they have
issues with their menstrual cycle.
Does that make them any less

McDonald believes her own journey would have been far easier had she grown up seeing people like herself on the TV.

"There were no shows or movies about being trans and I think the thing that fascinated me most was probably *The Little Mermaid* because she went through that change," she reflects.

"I was just drawn to so many things about [Ariel]."

Certainly, there have been big inroads made in trans representation in entertainment in recent years including Laverne Cox's star-making turn in *Orange is the New Black*, the compelling drama *Pose*, which followed the evolution of ball culture in New York and Hunter Schafer's poignant portrayal of the trans teen Jules in Foxtel's teen drama *Euphoria*.

Closer to home, trans advocate and actress Georgie Stone made history when she joined the cast of *Neighbours*.

"There is definitely still a way to go but having that trans representation on TV is so important because it's showing people that we are just normal people," she says.

"We deserve to be in TV series and not be just based around: 'Oh my god, she's the trans girl!' and all that.

"It needs to be shown that we're normal people because that's what we are. I don't go around my day, every day to everyone pointing it [her gender] out. Because at the end of the day, all my classmates, my friends, they know I am just me."

Sticking to the original plot of the 1987 sci-fi classic, this remake sees Joel Kinnaman (pictured) as policeman Alex Murphy, who is transformed into RoboCop after an accident. 1 serve per portion

### **Ingredients:**

- 1 cup cooked porridge, cooled
- ½ cup natural yoghurt, reduced fat
- 2 cups of assorted fruit (e.g. strawberries, sliced banana, blueberries, raspberries, cherries, rockmelon)

# Softer sales in week at wool market

A very mixed sentiment selling week at the Australian wool auctions saw prices hover around established levels once more, although some weak indicators became apparent on the final day.

Merino types are generally held in Eastern markets but in WA those levels deteriorated by 15 to 20ac on the final day.

Additionally, the small rally that had appeared the past few weeks on the crossbred wool descriptions appeared to hit a roadblock for the time being and prices had fallen by 20ac by the conclusion of the selling week.

Passed in rates remained similar but trending towards higher retention by sellers figure.

Around 88 per cent of all wool offered was cleared to the trade nationally although that rate dropped significantly in Fremantle whereby just 78.2 per cent of wool offered met the grower seller expectations.

Another stand-out figure was that 23.5 per cent of crossbred wool types offered in Sydney failed to sell.

The Eastern Market Indicator (EMI) dropped 5ac (-0.4 per cent) this week to settle at 1408 ac/clean kg.

The Western Market Indicator (WMI) fared comparatively worse as that selling centre sold last when the AUD was at its strongest point for the week.

The WMI subsequently fell away 11ac to 1446 ac/clean kg.

In USD terms the EMI fell 4usc to a closing basis of 1030 usc/clean kg.

Despite the much-reported logistics issues plaguing all industry supply chains globally and the negative effects emerging from Covid lockdowns in China once again,

the Merino wool markets are resolutely holding on.

This is indicative of reasonable to good demand at least.

Those Merino types are very much being helped by consistent purchasing emanating from European and Indian interests, particularly on the FNF (1 per cent vm average) types.

What is not helping though is the staggeringly long steam time for delivery to those non-China destinations which some report as being up to four months from the time of booking contracts to delivery processed.

This is almost double the duration of what the "normal" supply chain for wool textiles used to operate just a few years back.

48,000 bales have been rostered to sell next week with Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday auctions over those three days.

## Industry bodies discuss key markers of sustainability

More than 30 representatives of State Farming Organisations, Research & Development Corporations, and the Australian Beef Sustainability Framework (ABSF) Sustainability Steering Group (SSG) met in Canberra this week to discuss the indicators used to track industry's sustainability, at the annual ABSF Industry Forum.

The Australian Beef Sustainability Framework (ABSF) was established in 2017 to define sustainable beef production within the unique Australian context.

To reflect this definition, ABSF comprises four themes – animal welfare, economic resilience, environmental stewardship, and people and community, with 24 identified priority areas

For each priority, key indicators are used

to track progress.

Red Meat Advisory Council (RMAC) CEO, Alastair James, said this week's review of indicators built on discussions undertaken last month by the ABSF's Consultative Committee, which serves as a reference group to provide insights and perspectives from Australian and international stakeholders, external to the red meat industry.

Those involved in that group include retailers, banks, investors, environment, and welfare non-government organisations, agribusinesses, researchers, government policy organisations, and industry groups.

"The ABSF is a powerful tool for demonstrating our industry's sustainability credentials, providing demonstrated evidence, with verified data, in support for the work we do

on-farm and in-business," Mr James said.

"Not only does this help to focus investment within the industry but, importantly, it gives us a data-backed platform from which we can communicate with and engage external stakeholders, including special interest groups, media, customers, and the broader community on our industry's sustainability."

A key function of the ABSF is the development of its Annual Update to report back on progress made against the indicators identified as most important for measuring and demonstrating the industry's continuous sustainability improvement.

These indicators are consistently reviewed and refined to ensure they remain relevant to the evolving local and global sustainability discussion.

"The Annual Update is a critical resource supporting industry in communicating our sustainability credentials and it is important the indicators we use to measure performance are legitimate and meaningful markers of our successes, opportunities for improvement and progression," Mr James said.

"That is why ongoing consultation with industry, including this week's Industry Forum, the Consultative Committee, surveys, and the continual work of the SSG is imperative to the evolution of the indicators and ensuring the ABSF is responsive, contemporary, and relevant."

This year's ABSF Annual Update is scheduled for launch in June.

# CQ's most unusual fruits

Have you ever seen this plant or know what it

The plant in question is known as a Dragon Fruit or Hylocereus undatus and is best described as an epiphytic cactus.

The Dragon Fruit or Hylocereus undatus is an epiphytic cactus, which is a plant with fleshy stems that can grow up into the canopy of trees like a creeper.

Dragon Fruit is grown in tropical regions around the world for its interesting fruit, and you may have seen the fruit in your local supermarket.

The fruit is often maroon coloured, about the size of a Paw Paw, and has a scaly appear-

The fruit is a great addition to fruit salad, it has a sweet taste like Watermelon and like many of the melons, and it tastes great cold.

Yet now this fantastic tasting fruit has been successfully grown in Central Queensland.

In fact, Dragon Fruit is now being grown in gardens in both eastern and western parts of

Then earlier last month I spoke with Ilfracombe gardeners George and Jacqui Woodfield about growing Dragon Fruit in the Outback. They have been growing the Dragon Fruit for about three years from a cutting of a plant in a family member's garden in Rockhampton.

Their Dragon Fruit is planted on the southern side of their garden, but it is protected from the hot afternoon western sun, as it dehydrates it and burns it.

George said that they had tried a few locations within their garden before deciding that the southern side of their garden was the best location for their Dragon Fruit.

When asked about any other tips for successfully growing Dragon Fruit in Central Queensland, George recommended watering the Dragon Fruit with a small spray, to assist in creating humidity.

Plus George said, "the one thing we have learnt is that ants are the Dragon Fruit's friend, so don't try to get rid of all the ants off them". Like most epiphytes, the Dragon Fruit will need organic-rich soil to grow in with reasonable drainage.

For the best results, the garden soil pH should range between is 6.5 to 7.

The recent rain that Ilfracombe has received has seen their Dragon Fruit just starting to fruit again. Dragon Fruit thrive on the rain and humidity.

While the fruit of this plant is a good reason to have one in the garden. I think the best feature of the plant is the flower.

It buds up like a waterlily, and when it opens it produces that unique dragon-like flower.

It blooms only at night and like many waterlilies, the flower will only last that night.

The plant needs nighttime insects for pollination so a planted position that has natural night light is best for the plant to set fruit. Hairy problem

At the moment many Eucalyptus varieties growing throughout Central Queensland are infested with hairy caterpillars or itchy grubs. Most people would not even notice this pest, but with the strong winds we have received this last week, I have had numerous enquires about what has caused people to have large welts that

were extremely itchy while out in the yard. The caterpillar of the Euproctis family

builds large paper-like sacks, usually in forks of branches, containing hundreds of the caterpillars. It is the fine hairs of the caterpillar that fall from the nests that can cause extremely uncomfortable skin irritation.

With the strong winds that occurred this week, the trees containing these caterpillars can be up to a hundred metres away.

You should avoid handling hairy caterpillars or material, which they have been in contact with. Most hairy caterpillar infestations are usually short-lived and should be left undisturbed unless they are causing a problem.



If you do need to remove these insects from trees in your own yard I would recommend using a reputable pest control officer, if you do it yourself always where suitable protective clothing, including eyewear and gloves.

I have found the most successful insecticide to spray and kill these caterpillars is Pvrethrum, as it is the only chemical that seems to penetrate through the hairy caterpillar's fine

Note: I have always found a product called Stop Itch to be the best cream for stopping the
