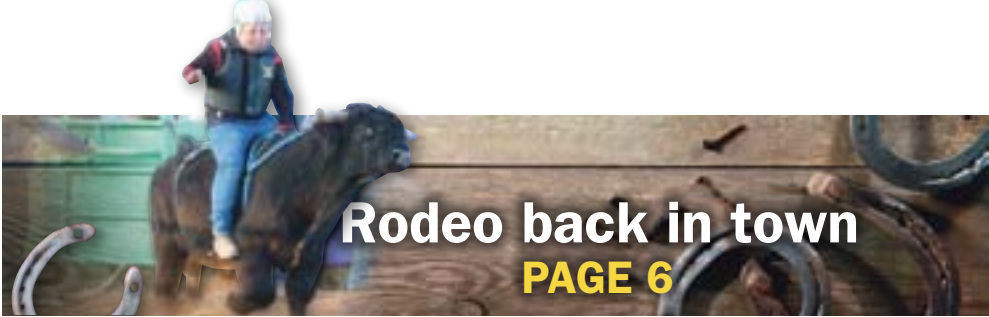

Mr Smith commended the retail outlets in town for their investments, which have allowed for greater capacity in handling tourist and local demand.

"We're poised to handle that [the larger volume of customers], there's a lot more capacity there," he said.

"I have to commend the bakery which kept the town alive through the pandemic.

"I think we'll see lines, but not lines like last year."

Despite the added challenge of finding workers, Mr Smith has managed to fill his ros-

ter for the coming season.

"We've been fortunate to have a strong reputation," he said.

"We actually had people who sent their CVs to us for driver/ host jobs.

"We did not have to advertise for the river cruise parts of our business.

"We had 30 applications for the driver/ host positions, but none for our HR position - so it depends."

Along with a strong team numbers-wise, Mr Smith has organised the team for the season with on-the-job training.

"We've never been more prepared for a tourist season," he said.

"We believe the customer experience will



benefit from the time we've put into our team, and with that, the Longreach economy."

Mr Smith said it was important to be realistic with expectations for the tourist season and seasons to come as borders begin to open up.

"People are returning to overseas travel," he said.

"The need for outback operators to get on one page and market and develop product for all of the regions is critical.

"We need to work together, and build a conference around Longreach - there is so much opportunity to extend the season.

"It's hard to justify a new attraction or motel, when the season is so short."

Local producers regenerating Rangelands

Exploring drought resilience through soil and pasture health, biodiversity, natural capital and emerging markets are all on the table at an event in Longreach on 20-21 April.

Organiser Jody Brown, Latrobe, Longreach said there were regenerative principles and practices that could help landscape managers to enhance the health of ecosystems and pastures under their care, in a manner that improved their resilience to drought.

"However, what's lacking is access to examples of where alternative management systems have been successful in the local area, particularly in the semi-arid to arid zone," Ms Brown said.

This is where a new project, the brainchild of a group of attendees at the Future Drought Fund funded rural leadership course in the Central West, will "fill the gaps".

"On Wednesday, 20 April we will have a free forum at the Longreach Civic Centre from 8am-5pm, with speakers including rangeland management and restoration expert Bruce Alchin, plus speakers on landscape rehydration on extensive pastoral runs, regenerative

agriculture, and improving natural capital; and, then on Thursday, 21 April we will be in the field at Latrobe, Longreach from 8.30am-3pm for a free field day where we can inspect a newly developed rehydration site, carry out soil profiling in an earth pit, learn about monitoring natural capital and more about dung beetles and pasture plants."

SQNNNSW Innovation Hub Longreach Node Manager Ally Murray said the entire project came about because of the leadership program, run by the Australian Rural Leadership Foundation, as attendees were given the chance to apply for funding for a project that would benefit the region.

"We know how important it is for people to see how this work is being applied in the rangelands, but not everyone will be able to make it to in-person events," Ms Murray said.

"So, in addition to the live events, we're creating a 'virtual tour' with a series of short, engaging, digital videos, so innovative graziers can see examples of where positive practice change is successfully regenerating land in their region."

Member for Maranoa David Littleproud encouraged locals to attend, as it has been funding under the Coalition Government's Future Drought Fund Drought Resilience Leadership Program.

"This is an opportunity to soak up knowledge from a dynamic range of presenters, engage in lively Q&A sessions and roll up your sleeves for some practical field day activities and demonstrations," Mr Littleproud said.

"Wednesday's program will host a stellar line-up of speakers who'll be digging into how soil health and landscape ecology interact with grazing management and livestock productivity, followed by a field day at Latrobe and Arlington Park on Thursday."

The forum and field day are free, but if you would like to attend the Wednesday night dinner on the Thomson River, tickets are \$81. Bookings are essential. Please visit

Forums raise local voices

Community forums have been held across the Longreach region, with a number of council's decisions being showcased, while local voices were given an opportunity to be heard.

Here are some of the major talking points from those meetings.

- Council has received a net surplus on its budget, "the best result since 2017."
- Only 21 per cent of its profits have come from rates and levies, council's assets have increased.
- Council noted the importance of the Isisford Weir as an achievement in the past year; after receiving \$40,000 from FRRR, council said the funding went straight to the project in its outer district.
- Major issues brought up at the meeting include an increase in dog attacks (both dog on dog and dog on human).

Council noted there had been 28 attacks in the past year, a marked increase on the yearly average.

- Council said there was a direct correlation between dog attacks and the mistreatment of private "overgrown" allotments which is allowing for feral dogs, cats, and mice to thrive.
- Council's approach to the dog issue going forward is three-pronged, education, compliance, and enforcement, with talk of the possibility of free dog training programs in future



- The position of CEO of the Longreach Regional Council is now currently being advertised.
- The Pastoral College is currently offered to the State Government, if turned down, there are other interests looking at the site.
- Council, along with other interests, has been looking into strategies that address the housing crisis. Mayor Tony Rayner said outback councils of the WQAC have been making good progress on the issue.
- Grants being looked at, currently include, an art mural on Swan St courtesy of the Arts and Culture Association.

- Improvements to the bar and canteen at the showgrounds.
- New fans for the wool pavilion.
- A showgrounds viewing deck.
- Grants approved include:
 - Childcare extension
 - Improvements to showgrounds audio
 - Beautification of Eagle St
- The meeting concluded with former Mayor Ed Warren commending the current council on the amount of work being done in the region, "It's pleasing to drive around and see what's going on."



Prepare for a Covid-19 case rise over Easter holidays

Allowing for cases discharged after completing isolation, the total number of active cases currently in the region is 36.

There is currently one case being managed in the hospital, with the remainder receiving care in the Virtual Ward.

We are also aware of some cases across the region who have opted out of receiving healthcare as they are COVID-well or self-managing their symptoms.

No further details will be provided due to confidentiality.

To date, accounting for those who have been discharged from quarantine, the Central West HHS has recorded 495 cases of COVID-19 since the first case on 22 December.

Community transmission rates have risen in the Central West and will continue to rise in the coming days, so I urge residents not to be complacent.

People planning to travel over the Easter long weekend especially need to be vigilant.

Whether you are a local going away or a tourist to the Central West region, you must ensure you are fully prepared for a potential positive COVID-19 result in your group before you leave, including having enough

provisions and knowing where your destination's health facilities are.

If you have any symptoms, no matter how mild:

- do not continue travelling – get tested and wait for the result
- contact the nearest health facility to your current location to arrange a free test or phone 134 COVID for advice on what you should do
- if you are positive, adhere to health advice. It is essential that you immediately isolate for seven full days.
- Do not keep travelling and risk increased community transmission
- if you test positive with a RAT, you must (1) register your positive result at <https://www.qld.gov.au/rat-positive/rapid-anti-gen-test-registration>, and (2) go through the symptoms checker <https://www.qld.gov.au/health/conditions/health-alerts/coronavirus-covid-19/stay-informed/covid-care-self-checker>
- you may be able complete your isolation at your home if it is within safe travelling distance, but you must apply for an exemption.

Vaccination remains our best protection both against the COVID virus and the in-

fluenza virus, as we move into this year's flu season.

Talk to your GP about the influenza vaccine.

We encourage people to maintain good hygiene practices such as washing hands properly and often or using an alcohol-based sanitiser, staying at home when they are sick, and coughing or sneezing into their elbow.

- Tambo Primary Health Centre – 27 April
- Barcaldine P-12 State School – 28 April
- Both the Blackall and the Winton general practices are also providing COVID-19 vaccinations.

Flu vaccinations are not available at Central West Hospital and Health Service COVID-19 vaccinations clinics at shire halls and Primary Health Centres.

Please contact your local GP or pharmacy for information about the flu vaccination, and available appointments.

COVID-19 restrictions will ease further at 1am Thursday, 14 April, with the vaccine requirement to be removed from venues including: pubs, clubs, cafes and restaurants; theme parks, casinos and cinemas; weddings; showgrounds; and galleries, libraries, museums and stadiums.

The vaccine requirement will still apply to vulnerable settings including: hospitals (for visitors, staff, contractors, and volunteers); aged and disability care; and prisons; schools and early childhood centres.

Please note that anyone who requires health care can attend a hospital or health centre, regardless of their vaccination status.

Littleproud’s big promises

Winning the last election with over three-quarters of the vote (after preferences were taken into account) and another strong win in 2016, Maranoa has proven to be a safe seat for the Nationals Party and Minister David Littleproud.

Born and raised in Chinchilla, Minister Littleproud has, over the past 20 years, been a small business owner and active member of the Warwick community while raising his three boys.

“I’ve forged a career in agribusiness while living and working in towns such as Miles, Nanango, Charleville, St George, Stanthorpe, and Warwick,” Minister Littleproud said.

“This has provided me with an acute understanding of the important role small business and agriculture plays in creating jobs and promoting economic growth in Maranoa.

“I understand the importance of economic development as a means of building a prosperous future for younger generations and developing the capacity of health, education, agriculture, telecommunications, and small business sectors.”

Minister Littleproud said the three key issues in the campaign for Maranoa were communications infrastructure, helping families and small businesses, and roads and general infrastructure.

“[We need to develop] better and more equitable telecommunications to save lives,



grow small business, and support education,” he said.

“I’ve already secured 59 new mobile phone black spot towers across Maranoa including towers at Yaraka and on the Landsborough Highway, between Winton and Cloncurry.

“A Coalition Federal Government will also invest \$1.3 billion to increase regional mobile coverage for NBN Co to upgrade the entire fixed wireless network benefitting over 40,000 premises across Maranoa.”

He argued that the Coalition’s cuts to the fuel excise for six months will save 22 cents per litre on petrol to help the household budget.

“More than 53,000 people in Maranoa saved \$2745 thanks to tax cuts,” he said.

“Pensioners, welfare recipients, veterans and concession cardholders will receive a one-

off \$250 payment to help relieve costs.

“This government has also made significant changes to the Child Care Subsidy to help parents enter the workforce.”

Finally, Minister Littleproud said money the Coalition had spent building and upgrading road networks such as investments in the Outback Way, the Capricornia highway and Landsborough Highway will be critical in building a better Maranoa.

The Coalition have been criticised, in this election, by their opposition on a number of issues including housing, climate change, and health.

Minister Littleproud said the federal government had created a \$1 billion fund to partner with developers to help encourage the development of more housing stock despite it being the state governments’ responsibility.

“With respect to climate change the Coalition’s net-zero plan is sensible and achievable, protecting traditional jobs while creating new clean energy jobs,” he said.

“I’m proud as Agriculture Minister to have created a world-first Biodiversity Stewardship program that will pay farmers not just for carbon abatement but biodiversity.

“The budget introduced tax incentives for farmers to participate worth nearly \$100m that will go back to farmers and regional communities.

“The government has also introduced protections within this program so that productive agricultural land is not locked up to pro-

tect regional communities.”

In terms of health, Minister Littleproud said the Coalition had spent record amounts on improving health for rural Australians.

“[We] have higher bulk-billing rates than the last Rudd government – meaning people are seeing their GP for free – and dispensed more than 2.2 million free or subsidised medicines across Maranoa,” he said.

“This government has invested over \$6.5 billion for more services to support mental health.

“And, to attract more health professionals to work in and grow rural communities, we’ll reduce university debts for doctors and nurses who work in Maranoa.

“The federal government will also support Heart of Australia Service with another \$17 million to provide cardiac services in regional Australia.”

Going into the election, Minister Littleproud hopes to “secure more Country University Centres across Maranoa, which means school leavers don’t have to go to big cities to go to university.”

“Build on the over \$40m investment in tourism infrastructure in the Central west like the Waltzing Matilda Centre, Stockman’s Hall of Fame and QANTAS Founders Museum.

“And, Secure more of the record \$21 billion dollars announced for regional infrastructure in the budget to make living in Maranoa more attractive and to support our agricultural sector to be more efficient.”

Letter to the editor

Dear Maranoa residents & business owners,

My Name is Mike Kelly, I’m the One Nation Candidate for Maranoa.

Never have I seen a time in our country when there has been so much division, civil unrest, lack of trust in the government, and lack of confidence in our nation’s future with the direction in which the current government is steering us.

The constant sell-out of our sovereignty to foreign entities (like the United Nations, World Economic Forum, and World Health Organisation) is placing severe restrictions on our own people, our own country, and our own way of life.

As an example, I’ve struggled to comprehend why our current Agriculture Minister would vote against protecting Australian sovereignty in international trade agreements.

I believe this is a direct breach of their duty to promote Australian industry first and foremost (ironically, the Ag Minister is David Littleproud; our current federal member for Maranoa which I find even more disturbing).

I expect a much higher standard from our politicians than what I have personally witnessed these past years.

It annoys me (very much) to hear their personal attacks and character sledging on each other.

How can they possibly work together if they have such a low level of respect for each other?

If I expect a higher standard from them, I need to ensure I commit to a higher standard in my own conduct.

I have committed to avoid attacking the character of the person, however, I am very committed to holding all of them accountable for their conduct.

So if I mention their name, it is not to slander their character, but to simply identify and clarify that person’s conduct in their role as our community representative.

That lets you make up your own mind as to whether you agree with the way they have voted on your behalf.

After confirming how politicians vote on matters, it concerns me that since being elected in 2016, our current LNP member (David Littleproud) has not voted against the party on a single occasion.

The party promoted our current member

to be Minister within 17 months.

If he votes against the party, the party will take away his position (Ministers are required to vote with the government or resign from being a Minister).

That means he would lose his high salary and social status.

It simply won’t happen.

It’s quite evident from the verifiable voting history of our current member that he is representing the party; not the best interests of our electorate, communities, businesses, farms, and families.

We all deserve better.

That is not being a genuine representative for the electorate.

It’s unacceptable for the government to place the burden of solving the global warming and climate change agenda on our farmers.

In my opinion, the obligation should rest fairly and squarely on the polluters themselves (at the source of the problem).

The recent Biodiversity Stewardship Market Bill was introduced into Parliament on 9 February 2022 by David Littleproud (the current Agricultural Minister - Member for Maranoa).

This legislation genuinely concerns me.

This legislation is a blatant commitment to the NETT ZERO 2050 Agenda, and I believe is potentially dangerous to our rural community.

After reading the entire legislation, it appears to give the government a “backdoor” way (by stealth) to make our landowners comply with the ever-encroaching international requirements (at our expense) once the land owners “volunteer” to surrender their property rights under this proposed legislated program.

We need to vote for people who are prepared (like me) to defend and enhance our property rights; not sell them out to foreign entities or surrender them to other unelected international bodies.

We need transparency and trust with both our legislation and our political representatives.

The old National party and the old Country Party would have stood up and fought against this current LNP Coalition that has become “corporatized” by their big business donors and unruly bureaucrats.

Indeed, the original Nats and Country party were formed to address the very issue of fighting the governments of that era who were running their own agenda and ignoring the real needs of the rural communities.

I believe our grandparents would have advised us to vote against the current ver-

sion of the LNP.

The version of the party that represented our community back in 1943 changed into a completely different political machine in 2022.

I find I am asking myself, “what has happened to Australia? this is not the country I grew up in and not the country I want to leave for my kids.”

In researching the conduct of the government, the bureaucrats, and the current politicians, I am appalled at how disconnected they are from everyday Aussies who simply want to live and work freely in their own country.

“Last year’s bursary was awarded to Kellara Harney from Blackall, who is studying a Bachelor of Occupational Therapy (Honours) at the Central Queensland University.

Local project boosts to prompt bounceback from Covid

Nine projects have received funding in the Barcaldine region that will improve the quality of life for locals in all towns.

The funding comes in the name of porting local jobs, businesses, and the resilience of local economies - to help communities bounce back from the Covid-19 pandemic.

It was made possible under the third phase of the Coalition's \$3 billion Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) program, projects to be delivered include:

- \$610,000 for upgrades to showgrounds at Alpha, Jericho, Aramac, Barcaldine and Muttaborra
- \$50,000 for new air-conditioning at the Har-

ry Redford Centre in Aramac

- \$900,000 to seal 2.6km on Aramac-Jericho Road
- \$145,000 for swimming pool upgrades at Aramac and Muttaborra
- \$230,000 for upgrades to the Barcaldine Town Hall
- \$48,332 to gravel 1km of Drummond Slopes Road
- \$400,000 for a 1km bitumen seal and floodway works on Narethong Road
- \$100,000 for a rural addressing signage project
- \$100,000 for a Sculpture Trail rest area upgrade

Federal Member for Maranoa David Littleproud said the funding reflects Barcaldine Regional Council's top priorities and will ensure the needs of the local community are met.

"Strengthening facilities like showgrounds, swimming pools, halls and amenities blocks provides a vital boost for local communities and delivers lasting upgrades that will benefit residents and visitors for years to come," he said.

"With the challenges presented by COVID-19, bushfires, floods and other events, the past couple of years have been tough for communities, businesses and local councils.

"That's why we have moved quickly to approve funding for these projects, paving the way for shovels to hit the dirt to make them a reality."

Mr Littleproud said newly increased funding of \$500 million for the extension to Phase 3 will flow through the LRCI Program to local councils across Australia, building on the \$1.7 billion already approved to deliver more than 7,400 projects nationwide under the first three phases of the program.

"The \$500 million Phase 3 Extension will deliver more jobs, more economic stimulus, and more of the local priority projects that communities need and deserve."

Skilled up for life on land

LEADag, a training course for ag students in Central Queensland and the Central West, has wrapped up and the students are looking for work.

Ten students were chosen from almost 70 applicants to participate in the initiative designed to deliver hands-on, practical training to prepare them for the workforce.

The program was developed by CHRRUP, a community-owned, central Queensland-based profit-for-purpose organisation dedicated to thriving, connected rural communities.

CHRRUP CEO Simone Parker said she was proud of the event her organisation was able to offer.

"Our staff, mentors and students have all made this event a success and I can confidently say the students left with new skills that will make them really employable in the ag industries," she said.

"Not only that, I think many of them have a renewed sense of passion for the industry because we have been able to showcase lots

of really exciting jobs that they could pursue."

The LEADag program was packed with sessions run by CHRRUP staff, local trainers and industry mentors on a range of topics, including farm safety, first aid, fencing, pasture management, biosecurity and cropping production as well as livestock handling and husbandry.

Students were also taken on a tour of a commercial feedlot and the Fairbairn Dam.

Seventeen-year-old LEADag participant Amber Mohammed travelled from far north Queensland to attend the training and hopes to one day have a career in the beef industry.

Amber says her favourite part of LEADag was learning fencing from local industry mentors.

"I like getting my hands dirty and actually doing the work I'm trying to learn about so it was awesome to be out in the paddock," she said.

"I found it really good to have the mentors right there showing us how to do it but also letting us have a go on the tools."

While only 10 students could complete this round of LEADag training, Simone Parker says the fact almost 70 applied from across New South Wales and Queensland means there is certainly interest in future events.

"CHRRUP really wants to fill that gap and offer more training so we are getting back to the drawing board to figure out how we can continue to offer these opportunities to students," she said.

"Any one interested in attending the next LEADag event should follow CHRRUP's social media channels and keep an ear out because there is more to come!"

The LEADag pilot course was funded by the Queensland Agricultural Workforce Network an initiative of the Queensland Department of Agriculture and Fisheries.

The event has been designed and facilitated by CHRRUP, an Emerald-based organisation that engages with a broad range of sectors, identifies gaps, and takes an active role in furthering rural communities through partnerships and delivering a mix of products, services, and programs.

Parthenium a sticky issue

Parthenium was first discovered back in the 1950s, however, it is not known where the plant originated from, as fodder was being sourced from all over the world at the time.

This plant is not discriminative on where it will grow, it can be found in heavily timbered areas, improved pastures, and areas where soil has been disturbed.

Parthenium can not only affect animals, but it can also cause health problems in humans.

Sticky florestina is a short-lived plant accidentally introduced into Australia in the 1960s.

Like parthenium, this plant is toxic to stock and can invade native pastures and timber areas.

Because of the small white flowers, sticky florestina can be confused with parthenium.

Unlike the rosette leaf growth of the parthenium, the leaf of the sticky florestina is a smooth-edged leaf.

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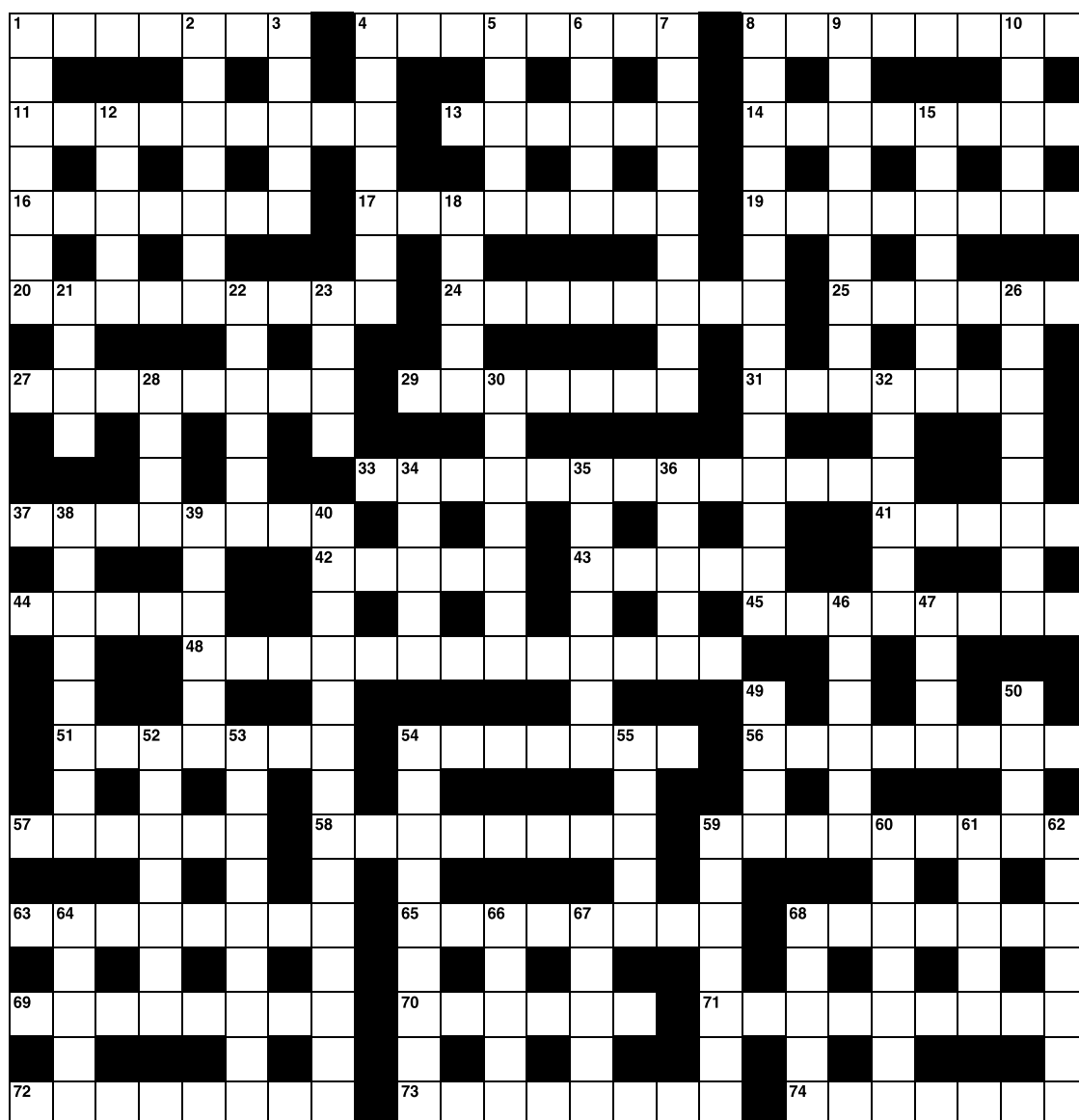
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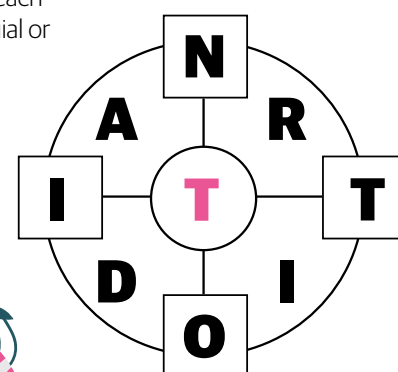
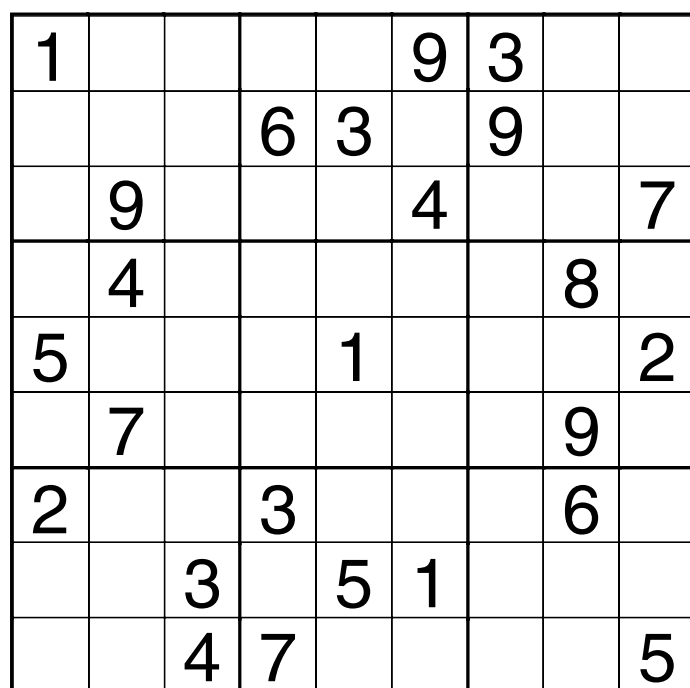

Safe and sound

A new season of *The Voice* means a fresh chance for coach Jessica Mauboy to help contestants discover their own talent. The singer tells **Siobhan Duck** what the reality competition means to her

It takes one to know one. Just ask Jessica Mauboy! Sure, *The Voice* coaches around the world all have had varying degrees of fame, fortune and talent. Where Mauboy has most of them beaten is she understands just how it feels to be where the contestants are standing.

After all, Mauboy (like her fellow *Voice* coach Guy Sebastian) first became a household name on *Australian Idol*. Sebastian won the very first season of *Idol* in 2003 while Mauboy placed second to Irish singer Damien Leith three years later.

"I think a lot of things that we picked up on a show like *Idol* really gave us an understanding of what the artist coming on and baring their soul was going to endure and how they were going to be able to handle that on stage," she explains.

"We went through those steps that those artists are going through and that does bring back a lot of memories. It really helps in how I am going to deliver what I thought about them to be able to help them move forward."

Mauboy was only a teenager when she wowed viewers with her sunny personality and impressive vocal range on *Idol*. It was also at this vulnerable age that she found her weight and appearance being criticised by judge Kyle Sandilands.

Times have changed and these days, Mauboy – an outspoken campaigner against bullying and racism – reflects, a TV judge wouldn't get away with the things that were said back in *Idol*'s heyday.

Luckily, Mauboy had enough self-confidence, even as a teenager, to shrug off Sandilands' hurtful words, but she is mindful that not everyone would be as resilient.

"We are living in a different time and there is a lot more sensitivity about how things are said," she says.

"Having come from a show like *Idol*, I understand what it means

when you are being judged. In this case, I think about how that is going to make that person feel and [if they] are going to be able to handle it because most people can't handle criticism.

"Sometimes that can really push them over to the edge of not wanting to sing anymore. So, my way of coaching is to encourage them to be better and to choose my words carefully so that it doesn't break them."

While Mauboy and her fellow coaches – Rita Ora, Keith Urban and Sebastian – look for ways (even in rejection) to build artists up rather than tear them down, the singer says contestants still often contend with internet trolls.

To combat that, Mauboy advocates for her contestants to focus on finding their own voice rather than listening to the opinions of strangers online.

"Let alone being on a stage and performing to millions of people, they also have the underlayer of social media and that platform [to deal with], so I think it's about teaching the artists the tools around who they are and identifying what kind of artist they want to be," she says.

Even with carefully chosen words and encouragement, Mauboy admits it's hard to have to watch contestants' dreams of winning the show dashed.

Last year was particularly personal for Mauboy as her niece Saraya was on Ora's team but didn't reach the finals.

"I always knew Saraya had a passion for music but when I turned around and saw her on stage I just thought: 'I am so proud of you,'" she says.

"There was never a time when she asked me for help, she just did it all herself."

Saraya's appearance on *The Voice* followed Sebastian's brother Chris, who won the series in 2020. So, does this mean we might see one of Ora or Urban's relatives hit the stage in 2022?

"That would be amazing," Mauboy enthuses with a trademark peal of laughter.

"Every year, being with the coaches, I feel like I've gotten to know them a lot more and understand them just as individual humans."

"Just seeing their family come around and be a part of the show on most days, was

really beautiful. It did feel like a family and we're all passionately into the show, so that makes it even more exciting."

Talking about her rapport with her fellow judges, Mauboy says Ora is unapologetic in her opinions but also a "sincere and genuine" person who has become a good friend. Sebastian, she giggles, likes to talk. A lot.

"He can chew your ear off," she explains.

While country crooner Urban surprised Mauboy with a laidback sense of humour that had everyone in stitches.

"He likes to tell jokes – they were more dad jokes – and some of them I didn't quite get but I laughed anyway," she smiles.

Last year, *The Voice* was one of the few ways Australians could enjoy watching singers on stage as artists such as Mauboy found themselves sidelined from touring by the pandemic.

With her enforced hiatus over, Mauboy is delighted to be back on stage with her Boss Lady tour.

"It has been an overwhelming feeling, to be able to walk outside the door, ready to perform and see an audience in front of you," she says.

"I performed at a festival at Tumbarumba [in New South Wales] and there was literally about 5000 people there from all ages."

"It was quite emotional because I just thought: 'Wow, it's been a while since I have done this.' It was raining and people still stuck around, and it just showed that despite everything that is going on in the world, people are really ready for live music."

Now heading into her second season on *The Voice*, Mauboy is even more confident about her tactics for getting the best team.

She says the rivalry – although friendly – is genuine and every coach wanted to secure the best team for themselves.

"It's really hard to not be passionate," she enthuses.

"Particularly when there are so many incredible artists that are coming through this year."

"I mean, how could we not be competitive and fight?"

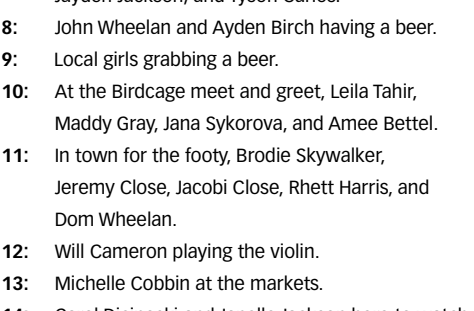
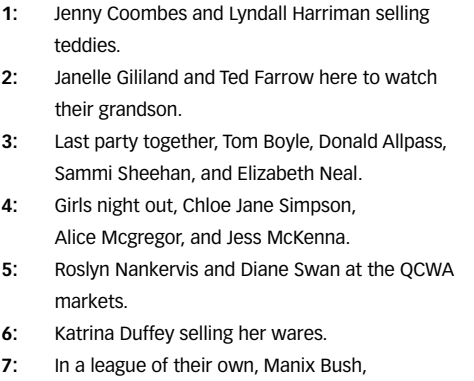

Next generation of judges

In the lead-up to the Muttaborra Stock Show, students were given the opportunity to learn how to judge merino sheep, with the hopes the adolescents would go on to become the next generation of wool producers in the region.

The lesson was the brainchild of the late Beverley Rea, who unfortunately passed before witnessing her vision come to fruition.

However, the wool and sheep judging has been named in her honour, a sign of her commitment to the wool culture in the west.

Her survived husband, Ralph Rea said after meeting at the Brisbane exhibition they bought a place in Muttaborra.

They came to Muttaborra when the effects of the wool market crash were in full swing.

"We learned to judge when we were kids," he said.

"Now we want to help the next generation."

Elders sheep and wool specialist Duncan Ferguson said the event was "an absolute credit to the Muttaborra Stock and Sheep Show".

"The Fish family and the committee to get this started for the first time - I would like to applaud them in organising this," he said.

"Also to Ralph Rea and his late wife Beverley in her involvement."

Mr Ferguson said it was a great initiative and that it was invigorating to see the young ones.

After teaching the junior sheep judging, Mr Ferguson said his aims were to give the young people a better appreciation of sheep.

"It's about getting the better points and the lesser points in the sheep," he said.

"How to handle the sheep, put their hands on the sheep, and appreciate the sheep.

"Then we had a junior judging school as such."

Mr Ferguson said he was amazed with the



speed in which the students learned.

"It's good to see the young blood coming through," he said.

"It gives me hope for the future.

"It's a great idea to get these people started so they can go to the other shows, the Muttaborra Stock Show, Isisford, Longreach, and the Barcaldine - and maybe even the state sheep shows in Cunnamulla this year, and maybe on further."

Sub-committee member Sarah Fish said Ms Rea's vision was to "fill a gap" in the wool industry in the west.

"The cattle industry had junior judging workshops, and the wool industry didn't have any at that stage," she said.

"We thought as a committee, we'd trial running one here."

Another committee member, Kate Webb said the event had been a lot of interest from children of varying ages.

"It was ranging from eight to 21 at the oldest," she said.

"If there's enough interest next year, we'd like to run it next year."



Wool Market Report

By Australian Wool Innovation

Erratic price behaviour featured this week at the Australian wool auctions.

The week's daily price movements on Merino fleece wools acted in complete juxtaposition to last week by being significantly dearer on the first day and then significantly cheaper on the final day.

Despite this volatility, values by the close of selling finished within 10ac above or below the established levels.

All other wool types on offer traded barely firm then trended downward to be 5 to 15ac cheaper, with crossbred wools the main casualty.

The Eastern Market Indicator (EMI) finished the week at 1369 ac/clean kg, a fall of 0.4 per cent.

In USD terms the EMI went the other way to be 8usc higher at 1037 usc/clean kg which was a forex forced to increase.

The Fremantle selling centre produced the best results.

3ac was added to the Western Market Indicator (WMI) to move positively to 1421 ac/clean kg.

Nationally, just 86.1 per cent of all wool eventually offered flowed to the trade on top of the 6 per cent withdrawn by growers prior to sale.

The bullish commencement to the sell-

ing week came about due to uncertainty surrounding the potential consequences of a foot and mouth outbreak in South Africa (RSA).

The temporary break of supply from that nation led to some purchasing pressure transfer to Australia.

The RSA industry decided to eliminate risk for the time being by postponing its auction sales for this week.

Robust biosecurity protocols and risk-mitigating measures in that country should enable a quick return to normal trade.

Foreign exchange rates were the primary factor that depressed wool prices on the final day of selling.

The Australian dollar strengthened remarkably swiftly.

The Euro, in particular, moved almost 4 per cent lower from the end of last week.

The AUD is at the strongest level against the Euro since April 2017, highlighting the economic impacts being felt in Europe by the Ukraine conflict.

This forced the cost of wool for those buying in Euro 3.3 per cent higher.

In contrast, the AUD was at today's equivalent rates against the USD and CNY just 10 months ago.

Next week's Australian auctions will be operating over two days Tuesday and Wednesday.

Currently, just over 48,000 bales are available for the trade.

SRS genetics meeting the challenge of shortage

Merino sheep with superior skin and wool traits have been mooted by SRS woolgrowers as a solution to one of the biggest crises in the history of the wool industry.

A national shearer shortage is creating headaches across the country as growers struggle to find shearers and shed staff to shear a clip worth \$3.2 billion to the economy.

SRS Genetics chairman, stud breeder and sheep classer Norm Smith said sheep with Soft Rolling Skins (SRS), plainer body, a moderate frame and docility offered a genetic solution to the issue with the SRS sheep being easy to shear and manage.

"Shearing is the hardest manual job left in Australia and I take my hat off to any shearer - it's not something on young people's radar anymore," Mr Smith said.

"As an industry we are slow to move even though there has been a lot of shearer training - the facilities and sheep type should have changed by now and we shouldn't be talking about this in 2022.

"Loose and pliable skins are an outcome of selecting for density and length using vi-

sual indicators identified by the late Dr Jim Watts including a deep, bold crimp, lustre and small bundles of highly aligned fibre giving the flexibility of shearing more often.

"The SRS sheep is highly profitable as it cuts an increased amount of high-quality wool, is easy care and highly fertile. Compared to the Australian Merino average of 80 per cent weaning, SRS growers are achieving over 120 per cent weaning."

Central western NSW shearing contractor Rod Mackander said the financial and physical benefits accrued for shearers in SRS sheds.

"Shearers in my crew will make from \$700-\$1000 per day shearing SRS sheep. The result is they want to keep coming back," Mr Mackander said.

"Shearers want to go to SRS sheds because the sheep are easier to shear, the shearers have better tallies, and the shearing is easier because the plain bodies allow for cleaner blows.

"SRS sheep are great for learners as they have less wrinkle and learners can place their blows more accurately in this style of sheep."

Visit a nursery for Easter

How is your garden looking at the moment?

With our gardens starting to recover from the ravages of Summer, this long weekend each year usually provides most gardeners with the green light to start the preparation for the spring displays.

So, this weekend is a great time to get into the garden! The preparation of garden beds, whether flowers, vegetables, or roses, is now recommended.

However, if you are not using fresh garden soil you may need to open and aerate the soil, as the soil tends to harden up and compact after a little rain and following hot dry weather.

It is also time to lift, divide, propagate and replant herbaceous perennials.

The weather is ideal for planting sweet peas, strawberry runners, most flower and vegetable seedlings, bulbs, and just about every variety of trees and shrubs.

Many flowering shrubs, such as Adenium, Bougainvilleas, Hibiscus, Ixora, Jasminum, and Plumbago, are looking great now and all of these can be planted now as well.

Many creepers are also recommended for planting like Pandorea, Petrea, Quisqualis, Podranea, and other members of the Bignonia Family.

A visit to any of our nurseries will reveal there are many new varieties of plants that have recently come onto the market and many are quite water-wise.

One of the new varieties available in local Nurseries is Polygala Little Poly. This is a true dwarf Polygala with attractive grey-green foliage. Eye-catching purple pea-shaped flowers will occur throughout the year.

Polygala Little Poly is suited for either border planting or growing in pots.

It is tolerant to mild frosts and will cope with dry conditions once established.

Another shrub that is a little different than I found at a Nookies Nursery in Winton was Eremophila mackinlayi or Desert Pride.

It is an upright shrub with soft silver foliage that can contrast well with other plants in the garden. Deep lilac-coloured to purple Fuchsia-like flowers will occur from May to October.

Eremophila mackinlayi is drought-hardy, tolerant of moderate frost but will not tolerate humidity.

Eremophila mackinlayi will grow in full sun or part shade in well-drained soils.

At Barcaldine Irrigation & Garden Centre there was a collection of Cordyline.

Cordylines in the last few years there have been many new varieties released, with vibrant red, pink, or cream leaves that can provide huge splashes of colour.

Hybrid varieties include Baby Thai, with green and red leaves, Red Picotee, with new growth of cream leaves with red edges which change to green with red edging as the leaves age, and Cardinal Stripe, with pinkish-red stripes changing to a reddish-green with age.

If you are looking for a different maybe Cuphea Tiny Mice might tick the visit.

It is an evergreen, low-growing shrub providing something different for the garden with masses of small mice-like flowers produced during the warmer months.

It is excellent as a specimen plant and is

ideal for growing in pots for patios, BBQ areas, or for a protected partly shaded position.

What about planting some pots of Pentas?

Pentas lanceolata or Egyptian Star Flower is a very colourful compact garden shrub.

While Pentas lanceolata flowers are commonly a rosy-mauve, other colours include white, blue/mauve, red, pink, and even orange. Pentas lanceolata will grow to approximately 60cm high for a part shade to sunny position in a frost-free climate.

It prefers well-drained, sandy soils and regular pruning. Finally, you might like to plant an old favourite like the Clerodendrum thomsoniae or Bleeding Heart Vine.

This is a vigorous semi-deciduous climber

that has large, heart-shaped leaves.

The Bleeding Heart Vine is relatively easy to grow and is best to keep moist but not wet and fertilise regularly.

During the warm months of the year clusters of bell-shaped white flowers with blood-red tips cover the plant.

This sun-loving plant can be grown in the ground or in a large pot in full sun.

Indoor plants may need to be around the house now so that they get better light, especially those which are in rooms facing south or south-east, where they are getting good light all through summer.

In the Ladies Championship Singles, we had reigning champ Michelle McKewen up against Gail Butt.

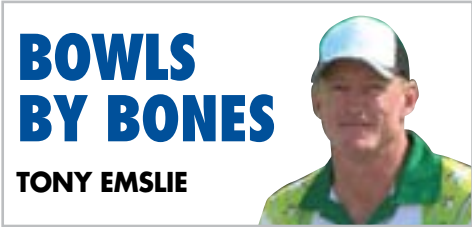
Michelle is playing fantastic bowls at the moment and proved it with a sound win over Gail.

Barcaldine trainer triumphs

The April 2022 Birdsville Races – the ‘Melbourne Cup of the Outback’ – culminated in blistering fashion today, as Barcaldine trainer Todd Austin comfortably won the iconic 1600m TAB Birdsville Cup with thoroughbred Echo Point, ridden by female jockey Brooke Richardson.

Austin nabbed his third Birdsville Cup career win, following his victory with Primed back in 2013, and French Hussler in 2019.

This makes Austin the most successful Birdsville Cup trainer since 2000, having won three of the last eight Birdsville Cups.

Owned by a syndicate including Todd Austin's wife, Toni Austin, Echo Point was the punters' pick going into the Cup and did not disappoint.

Toppling a quality seven-horse field, the connections of Echo Point nabbed the winner's portion of a record \$42,000 – the largest prize purse in the race's prestigious 139-year history.

The only two female Jockeys in the Cup rode to first and second place, with runner-up Jade Doolan racing upon the John Manzelman trained Shiranda.

Part owner Toni Austin said Echo Point just ran well in Longreach, so we had high hopes for him.

“Brooke had a magic ride, it's been a magic day,” she said.

“She stayed patient and Echo Point was comfortable.

“We couldn't have asked for more.

Ms Austin thanked the other owners at the cup.

“We hope to be back out here in September to do it all over again,” she said.

“What a day and what a win.”

Winning jockey Brooke Richardson said Echo Point had lots in the tank.

“He's got a lovely gentle temperament and did so well in tough conditions out here,” she said.

“Cheers to the Birdsville Race Club for putting on such a great day, and to the Austins for giving me the ride.”

Birdsville Race Club Vice President, Gary Brook said the Austins have a strong connection with the Birdsville Races.

“They've now won three Cups,” he said.

“It's been another great day with good crowds and we look forward to doing it all over again in just five months' time.”

Todd Austin has attended more than 25 Birdsville Races as both a jockey and a trainer since he was a young boy, while his wife, Toni Austin, has been attending the Birdsville Races for 20 years.

The final day of Outback Queensland's richest two-day race-meet saw close to 3,000 revelers converge on the tiny town of Birdsville to party and punt across a stacked seven-race card, with cornflower blue skies and striking desert terrain further heating up the bumper action.

The previous day's scorching 38-degree heat soared further, making way for gruelling race conditions, as thousands of trackside punters dressed to the nines for seven back-to-back races and an array of Outback entertainment and activities.

Outside of the race action, Fashion on the Fields was a final day highlight, with classic, contemporary, and novelty divisions for men, women, couples, and families

Much-loved television personality and 2022 Birdsville Races ambassador, Sammie O'Brien, co-judged each division with an ever-discerning eye.

As in previous years, entertainment and trackside hospitality were also key drawcards, while live music, pub festivities, and Fred Brophy's famous Boxing troupe kept crowds bustling in the township of Birdsville itself.

Outback icon, Fred Brophy, has been taking his legendary boxing troupe to the Birdsville Races since 1978 and will do so again when the next edition of the Races kicks off this September. Showman Brophy operates Australia's only boxing tent and is one of the last remaining travelling boxing tents in the world.

Returning for the first time since 2019, this week's Birdsville Races were held as a history-making one-off in April, in replacement of the postponed September 2021 event. The April



edition fielded 84 entries across a 13-race program, with horses, trainers, and jockeys travelling from as far afield as Mackay, Strathalbyn, Blackall, and Darwin.

The April 2022 Birdsville Races offered a record combined prize-purse of \$262,500 across the two days of racing, as well as offering what is believed to be the single biggest trainer bonus in the history of Country racing in Queensland.

The bonuses offered to trainers across both editions of the April and September 2022 Birdsville Races are also expected to be the biggest in the history of Country racing in Queensland.

If a trainer wins both the April and September 2022 TAB Birdsville Cup races, they will receive up to \$15,000 in bonuses.

Punters across Australia were once again able to experience all action from the Birdsville Races from the comfort of their own homes, thanks to a renewed national telecast deal between the Races and Sky Racing.

The partnership saw the full 13-race line-up televised into homes nationally via Sky Racing.

The Birdsville Races are supported by the Queensland Government through Tourism and Events Queensland and feature on the It's Live! in Queensland events calendar.

The Birdsville Race Club follows Racing Queensland's COVID safe requirements, mandating that all racegoers be double vaccinated to attend race meets in Queensland.

The Birdsville Races will return to Outback Queensland this 2 September.

Tickets will go on sale this May.
