All I want to say is "sucked in" to the three blues supporters in the Central West.

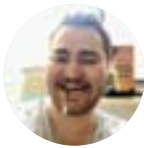
We all knew you would lose, and by what a margin!

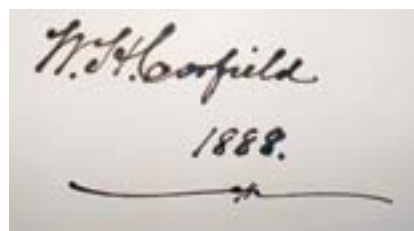

Major changes coming to Planning Scheme

There was an emphasis on the possibility of population growth at the second public consultation for the proposed major amendment to the Planning Scheme.

The communal response to the meetings was positive with local Jenny Deane stating Council's attitude was "one thousand times better than it had been 15 years ago".

Discussions around decisions made during the consultation were not final, Council asserted, but rather a way of teasing out new ideas from the community and allowing them to have their say on the future of the region.

The night was split into several "workshops" the first of which was on rural land supply and rural zone land.

Currently, in the Longreach Regional Council Planning scheme Rural Zone Land

over 5,000 acres can not be split up - this is preventing the region from taking advantage of the growth in the small acre housing market.

The Council is considering the possibility of "rural lifestyle lots".

Local Shannon Smith said she would like to see the change as she is looking for a home of that size.

Many were on board with the idea, however, some were concerned with issues surrounding the environment and water - not to mention much of the surrounding area of Longreach is in a flood plain.

Acting CEO Scott Mason was positive about the process.

"If a town like Blackwater were to have their time over again, after their population boomed, I believe they would have liked to have gone through a process like this," he said.

Lucky to have them

This is a typical boy meets girls story.

Well, actually a typical girl meets boy story - a typical girl meets boy meets town meets town's community groups - and of course - meets Barkers Newsagency story.

It would all start at a party in Bundaberg - Rob Luck was teaching at North Bundaberg State High School and would regularly visit Leanne who was working at his bank, Bank of NSW.

"The people she worked with just so happened to live next door to me and were having a party and I met Leanne there when I attended that party," Rob said.

It would be Leanne who would go on to make the initial move, "he had the car", she said, "he had the yellow Celica that I wanted."

"I had to find out who owned the car.

"It was a car that I couldn't quite afford."

It was her first-ever adult party as she was not allowed "out" until she was 18.

"I was 18 and three months and Rob was nearly 26," she said.

"We got married when I was 20 and he was nearly 28.

"First ever boyfriend and now we've been married for almost 40 years."

Rob would take Leanne on a date to see Neil Diamond and then the local show and they've worked together for nearly 27 years.

From Bundaberg, Rob would be promoted to "Subject Master of the " - a role similar to what is now called, Head of Department - and sent to Blackwater, where Rob would pick up a lot of his work-life skills and aspects of his personal philosophy.

Rob would be promoted to Deputy Principal leaving the couple in Blackwater for nine years, during a time when the population of the town was ballooning.

Both of their children were born during their time in Blackwater both Michael and Courtney were born in Bundaberg for health reasons leaving Rob a few minutes late of her birth, something he is often reminded of.

After you had children in those days, you would retire meaning Leanne would become a stay-at-home mum while Rob would build his career as a rural Principal.

However, Leanne was among the first bank



tellers to use computers in the State she often guide the first users of ATMs for Westpac, which had just changed its name from Bank of NSW.

"I would show people, this whole in the wall can give you money," she said.

"That was when they had us dressing like air hostesses."

The girls at Westpac had a "red biro" policy, where if they saw a handsome man, they'd ask another teller for a red biro - apparently, Rob was never marked for a red biro.

In Blackwater, she would begin doing work with the computer system changes.

But everything they did as a couple would have to do with Rob's promotions in education.

"Leanne was always a great support," she said.

By his mid-thirties, Rob had been moving upwardly through the ranks in the education system.

He would be acquitted to the Longreach State High School in 1992.

"Thirty-and-a-half years later and we're still here," he said.

"A teach from Blackwater had come here and married a policeman, she called us up and said, 'we need a Principal here - apply'," said Leanne.

"And I said 'ohh look, we'll go for two years'".

With Rob's portfolio - having been a part of the build of the now-famous Blackwater schooling model - they could have gone to nearly any school in the State, but they didn't want to go to the city, they were country folk.

"We very quickly realised it was great to have young kids grow up out here," Rob said.

"You could sense that it was a true country town; when we first came here, the house we were given was so run down, Leanne said 'that furniture truck is not unpacking, we are turning around and going back'.



"I had to ring up the regional director and say, 'this is disgraceful, this house has windows falling out' which lead to them upgrading our house."

Nonetheless, the Lucks would stay and become greatly involved - mostly due to their school-aged children - in the community.

Rob would go on to apply the models he learnt in Blackwater which encouraged students to take up STEM subjects in place of a mining job in Longreach; but as higher-ups in the education system continued to push him to new schools, he would become fed-up and look to start a new career - Barker's Newsagency.

"Leanne used to ask me, 'what would you do if you weren't teaching?', and I used to say, 'I don't know own a bloody newsagency or something'," he said.

"Rob used to live at school," Leanne said, "he used to do all these hours, and I said, 'why don't you do it for yourself?'".

"Kids from small areas - you just don't know how far they can go.

"Those values people take away from the country as kids, always stay with you.

"People can always identify a country kid."

Mr Luck said he didn't necessarily care whether Michael made it to a top level of tennis, but was glad he helped him create that opportunity.

"By being here in business at Barkers', we were able to do that," he said.

"And both of our children have benefited from that - our daughter owns a business in Bulimba in Brisbane."

Rob and Leanne would see their children sent off to boarding school as they pursued their dreams.

"We always had the belief that if the kids had the desire to do something, we'd always try to give them the best opportunity," Rob said.

"Michael was 16, Courtney was 14, and they had to leave to do what they wanted," Leanne said.

"That's hard on parents.

"We never saw them at boarding school, only at holiday time."

But there were positives, Michael and Courtney grew up around fairs, fetes, cake stalls, scouts groups, netball, and different sporting events.

"It's a wonderful town, but the sports are only two minutes away so your kids are in everything," Leanne joked.

"And we got involved ourselves."

Rob said he could never understand why people wouldn't want to come to Longreach to enjoy that country style of living.

"It just has so much to offer," he said.

"So many young kids go on to do great things down south," Leanne said.

"It's an amazing town for giving."

Rob said when he and Leanne first took on the job at Barkers', their whole dedication was to a good business that suited the country and would have what anyone would need when they came into buy.

Nutrien Chinchilla Auctioneer Terry Ryan said the new complex worked very well.

“It’s been very carefully thought out, we went back to selling cattle in the ring we offered 900 cattle in that situation,” he said.

“The yards worked well, the council have done a great job in building this facility.”

Mr Ryan said he was impressed with the quality of the cattle despite their having been trucked big distances and saw this facility as a place that would continue to grow Longreach as a hub for the outback cattle industry.

“Longreach has always been a great selling centre in western Queensland for the local cattle, but also a good stopping place for cattle further out in the Territory,” he said.

“They [NT graziers] can pull up here and save themselves on freight, and it’s always a good selling centre.

“And now with the new facilities, I think the sales will increase here, and the yarding numbers will increase.”

Mr Ryan said it was a great opportunity for locals to have a look at the new facility and the added bonus was the use of online bidding.

“That was why we saw those cattle through the ring,” he said.

“We sold all those young cattle and the on-line bidding certainly helped the market.

“I don’t think those people would have driven here to sell, but they could buy online.”

Local Nutrien representatives Boyd Curran and Andrew Holt had played a major part in running the sale so successfully.

“It was certainly a new style of selling, and we took the opportunity and we’ve had a great day for dividends,” Mr Ryan said.

“We’ve had a great sale, the top of our preg tested cows got up to \$1750, our steers made consistently \$7-8 consistently.


“All in all we had a very successful day and the vendors were happy too, I’m sure this will lead to more sales.”

Littleproud will represent

New Nationals party leader and member for Maranoa, David Littleproud said he will continue to fight for Maranoa and the regions, even if it is now from the opposition.

“It will be harder to get funding for Maranoa and regional areas, but I’ve had a constructive with the new Prime Minister about garnering his appreciation of what we’ve been able to achieve for the regions,” he said.

“The investments that have been made into electorates like Maranoa, nearly \$6.97 million, and not one of charity, but one that has economic merit to it - our economic output [people who live in the regions] per person far outweighs most who live in capital cities.

“And our conversations [with Prime Minister Albanese] have been about making sure

that our investments in infrastructure, whether it be roads, telecommunications, and about empowering the community through our own local solutions.”

“Local solutions” was a motif of Minister Littleproud’s time as Minister for Northern Australia in the previous cabinet and one he hopes will be taken up by the current Labor Government.

“[Mr Albanese] has given me a chance to listen and try and understand and, I’ve given him a commitment to work constructively, but we will hold him to account to make sure Maranoa and regional Australia - more broadly as Nationals leader - is getting their fair share,” he said. “We’re currently taking them at face value, but the proof will be in the pudding.”

Another round of Building Better Regions

funding will be still accessible of over \$250 million which Minister Littleproud hopes Labor will commit to a long with a budgeted \$21 billion infrastructure expenditure that could go towards much-needed repairs for roads, weirs and the like.

“We would hope the new government would live up to that as it would show they really are committed to rural and regional Australia,” he said.

“The only thing they are committing at the moment, \$500 million - as part of a \$15 billion manufacturing program - which is loose change compared to what we committed to regional rural Australia.

Another part of Minister Littleproud’s legacy has been the \$5 billion drought resilience fund; Minister Littleproud parried calls from

now Agricultural Minister that he had taken too long to spend said fund, stating that it was Labor had stalled efforts in parliament.

“We do hope they continue with that fund as it is now legislated and they now have control over it,” he said.

“They could potentially tear that fund down as well as the emergency fund, I think that’s less likely.

“I do hope the drought fund maintains its independence.”

Minister Littleproud said he hopes through collaboration and consultation the work his team have made over the past nine years for rural Australia is not undone.

“My job will be to demonstrate to this government the opportunities that are in regional Australia,” he said.

I’ve looked at clouds ... and the changing arc of sky

I have a fascination for clouds.

They bring moisture and, eventually, rain - the lifeblood of the land.

We had a glorious gathering of storm clouds last night, with rain falling to the east and west of us, and hopefully, somewhere on us, though not, sadly at the house.

The sky was so filled with clouds that I could capture only a fraction with my camera, even with the widest lens.

And then, in the morning, all gone, off to bring hope elsewhere.

It’s a curious thing about clouds.

The day can begin cloudless, brilliant and blue, but then, seemingly out of thin air, clouds start to form.

So a day that begins with no hint, no promise of moisture, can end in a downpour.

That is the beauty of a wet season in the outback.

We may not get rain and, in truth, it seems to have passed us by more often than not this year, but clouds always make me feel hope-

ful, for if not us, somewhere else is receiving a gift from above.

I wrote that before Christmas, but it’s been gathering dust in my files.

I thought I’d take it out, since the dust has been washed away for the moment, and make an addendum.

Of course, the clouds have finally fulfilled their promise, dropping beautiful, life-giving rain over Arundel.

We have had another inch, which fell over three days last weekend.

Which is still welcome, after such a prolonged stretch of dry.

Hope, at long last, fulfilled.

Every time I go outside, I see green.

It’s still a novelty, as surreal as the volcano-induced skies a couple of months back.

'First' sheep show hits 60 and Margie's seen 'em all

Margie Webb has seen it all when it comes to show time in Muttaborra.

Each iteration, the changing markets for wool, involved in some sense since its inception in 1962 as the The Landsborough Flock Ewe Show Society - the first flock ewe show in Queensland. She said the event was a wonderful boon for the community.

"This year was just wonderful, there was just something for everybody the whole time," she said.

"Sixty years is such a great achievement for the committee.

"The show has followed the vagueries of the wool industry and the seasons, and some years have been a bit tough - but its kept going."

Ms Webb said she remembers the event in '71.

"Things were so desperately dry and wool prices were terrible and hadn't rained for nearly seven years," she said.

"Other challenging years included the 50th anniversary which was washed out and of course 2020 there was Covid."

Ms Webb said she has great admiration for the show's founders the two jackaroos Rob Archer and Jeremy King.

"In the '50s there were good seasons and good wool prices," she said.

"By the '60s there was a good cohort of young married people in the district, and the young graziers were keen to improve their wool production and animal husbandry.

"They saw a future in the industry and they just wanted to do it better."

Mr Archer and King were jackarooing near Hay and they had seen first-hand a flock ewe show there.

"They could see how helpful it was for the local graziers because it was a competition," Ms Webb said.

"They could see who was doing was better and why and they could see how bloodlines worked.

"When they came back to Muttaborra and saw the cohort of young men eager to do better, they thought this flock show would be very helpful."

Mr Archer sent out a letter to meet at the Muttaborra RSL on 10 March, and the rest is history.

Ms Webb said the '60s were fabulous for the Central West.

"So many people out here, so many young people," she said.

"They got up to 198 fleeces and up to 78 or 80 pens of sheep, which is a lot when you

consider they had to be manually held per person.

"And these are flock sheep so they weren't used to being held - they'd often escape which meant a lot of fun and games.

"There was a lot of great passion back in those days."

Initially, the show was to be just about flock sheep, graziers even would invite lecturers on the topic to the event.

"It had style, beautiful trophies," she said.

"The women weren't initially involved, but they would eventually display woollen

garments and the War Widows Guild would knit things in wool.

"Along the way that really took off and everyone loves a fashion parade."

But over time other elements would be added to the show as the market and environment changed.

Now there are cattle, a shopping pavilion, and various more 'touristy' events.

Ms Webb said she is so proud of the people who have kept it going over the years as it "has been a great gift to the district and the wider community".

Pair still house proud

Appearing on *Big Brother* was a once in a lifetime experience for former housemates Tully Smyth and Dave Graham. The pair tell **Siobhan Duck** why they both jumped at the chance to return for a new season

For Tully Smyth and Dave Graham – aka “Farmer Dave” – returning to *Big Brother* has felt like a homecoming.

“It’s funny, it’s not the same house,” Smyth says.

“It’s not in the same city. It’s definitely not the same game of *Big Brother*. And it’s not even the same *Big Brother* voice but yet, the whole thing feels oddly familiar and oddly comforting.

“I often say that it feels like my first-time round was both 100 years ago and also yesterday.”

Smyth and Graham are among the all-star housemates who have returned this year to compete against a bunch of newcomers.

Big Brother fans will remember the duo, who each made headlines in their respective seasons. Graham in 2006 for famously coming out on screen and Smyth, seven years later, for hooking up with another housemate, Anthony Drew, despite having a girlfriend waiting at home.

Now they’re back and – to Smyth’s mild irritation – so too is her ex-boyfriend, Drew.

“We’re on good terms in real life, but I’m a bit confused as to why he would come back,” she says.

“He’s always shied away from the show and said he’d never do it again. And I’m kind of like: ‘Couldn’t you have just let me have my moment in the sun? Did you have to come in and ruin it for me a second time?’”

This time around, there is no chance of Smyth and Drew rekindling their romance. Drew has sparked up a relationship with one of the newcomers, while Smyth is in a very happy relationship.

Given the backlash that Smyth copped after her first stint on *Big Brother*, you would think she might have some reservations about doing it again.

But she laughs: “I didn’t really need to think about it, I was like: ‘Sign me up.’”

“I don’t know why wouldn’t have gone back. It is meant to be a once in a lifetime opportunity that you only get to do once. You know, a bucket list item? And to have a chance to go back and do it again for a second time and possibly win the money, why would I say no?”

Smyth confesses she has been watching the series since she was a little girl and would sneak out of bed to watch “up late” footage of the first season housemates. She’s such an ardent *Big Brother* fan that she couldn’t contain her delight at finding herself sharing a house with former winners Reggie Bird and Trevor Butler this year.

Even the fallout of her own tumultuous *Big Brother* experience couldn’t dampen her affection for the show and, if anything, it

has ultimately prepared her for her 2022 tilt at the prize.

That’s probably because, Smyth says, she has done a lot of work on herself since the first experience so that she now feels far more confident in who she is.

Plus, she adds, wryly: “It could not possibly go any worse than last time.”

“I was just someone who made a mistake, and I don’t think I got the villain edit at all [the first time around],” she explains.

“But the feedback about what happened and the aftermath at the time was something that weighed heavily on my mind.

“To be honest, there’s not really anything you can say to me now online that I haven’t heard before. Like, I have read some of the most disgusting comments and death threats.”

It wasn’t just the liaison with Drew that attracted haters. She was labelled “crazy”, a “cry baby” and “typhoon Tully” for her so-called emotional outbursts.

“It really stuck with me, and it really weighed heavily on me,” she reflects of the negative commentary.

“You know, I’m 34 years old now. I’m older and wiser, and as I went in, I thought: ‘I am who I am and showing emotions and vulnerability is not a weakness. It’s a strength’.

“I was wondering whether social media would have grown alongside me or whether it would be the same... and so far, the commentary has been worlds apart.”

Graham has also felt a sizeable and long-overdue social shift since he first entered the *Big Brother* house determined to start a conversation about equality and tolerance for all people regardless of their sexuality.

Since then, same sex marriage has finally been legalised in Australia and there is far more representation for the LGBTQIA+ community on screen

“The past is a foreign country, and me doing what I did back then was extremely political,” Graham says.

“And it was groundbreaking. It’s a real honour to be part of the changes in the social fabric of Australia.

“I did have to come out in the house several times [this season too], to the people who didn’t know who I was.

“But that was a very different experience. It was just like: ‘Oh, yeah. Cool. Next question.’ Whereas back then, it was a massive deal.”

Just like his first stay, this stint has also been politically motivated.

This time, he’s in the house to highlight the work he does with vulnerable youth through his organisation Rough Track.

He also wanted to challenge himself.

“I’m a middle-aged man and I’ve had a very rough life,” he says.

“I had a parachuting accident, broke almost all my bones. I have had many car accidents. I’ve had a lot of falls off horses while out droving. I haven’t been kind to my body.

“So, you know, these [physical] challenges that are expected [now in *Big Brother*], I was very afraid of doing.

“But I teach kids every day that you’ve got to feel the fear and do it anyway.

“I teach them that when an opportunity comes knocking, open up the door.”

Sami and van Beek have a tremendous comic chemistry and there are many laughs to be had along the way. It also features Australia's Celia Pacquola in her first film role. ★★★★★

Flowering shrubs dazzle

It is one of the biggest problems encountered by owners of established gardens is finding plants that will tolerate shade from the canopy of the established taller trees and shrubs.

In many cases, gardeners are left in a quandary as to what they could plant in this position.

Last week I received a call for help to suggest some shrubs that would grow along a fence line in a newly created garden under the high canopy of the neighbours Peltophorum trees.

The trees are along the western boundary of the property so it has some advantages in shielding the plants from the hot summer sun. The garden has been built up 300mm with sandy loam that has a soil pH of 6.

The garden will be mulched to a depth of 50mm and has a sprinkler installed.

And most important the plants need to flower to attract birds and butterflies.

With a little careful selection, there are quite a number of plants that flourish in these part shade conditions.

Adhatoda Vasica or Adulsa is a dense, evergreen shrub with large lance-shaped leaves.

White tubular flowers are formed on short spikes that are attractive to Butterflies and Birds in the garden.

Most parts of this plant have bio-medical values.

Adhatoda Vasica grows in a variety of conditions from sunny to part-shades positions including Western gardens.

Calliandra haematocephala Alba or The White Pom Pom is a large spreading shrub, growing to three metres if left unpruned.

It is able to be kept trimmed into small hedges without a lot of effort.

Showy white pom-pom flowers appear most of the year, though heaviest during July and August.

Cestrum nocturnum or Night Scented Jasmine is an evergreen medium-to-tall shrub that will withstand periods of dryness and will tolerate a light frost.

The sweetly scented greenish-yellow tubular flowers can appear from early August.

It prefers a well-drained position with full or part sun.

Many gardeners believe that the Night Scented Jasminum is a very good insect repellent, especially for mosquitoes.

Hibiscus Psyche is probably one of the toughest Hibiscus on the market.

It produces one of the hardiest red fringed flowerings that blooms all year round.

Hibiscus Psyche is regarded as one of the best hedging Hibiscus available to home gardeners.

Hibiscus Psyche can grow to two metres high in most soil conditions.

Jasminum Sambac or Arabian Jasmine is a rambling shrub with glossy foliage and highly

fragrant white flowers which will bloom over an extended period of time.

It is best planted close to the house so you can enjoy the fragrance in the evening and also protect this shrub from frost.

In the right location, Jasminum Sambac can grow to three metres high and two metres across.

Loropetalum chinense or Pink Fringe Flower is a tall-growing evergreen dense shrub with oval soft green leaves and bronze-pink colour new growth.

During the warm months of the year tassellike sprays of vibrant pink flowers, Loropetalum is easy to grow with the plant reaching a height of two metres in full sun or part shade position.

Ideal for hedges and massed planting and can be pruned and shaped.

Malvaviscus arboreus or Turk's Cap is a weeping red flowering shrub that is great under trees where you want some colour but will also take hot afternoon sun.

This shrub looks much like a hibiscus whose flowers are ready to open.

In fact, the flowers never open much, hence the common name 'Sleepy Hibiscus'.

The Turk's Cap is drought resistant and adaptable to clay, sand, sun, or shade and may take some frost.

Rondeletia leucophylla Sweet Caprice is an attractive compact shrub with thin leaves that often has a bronze tinge.

Throughout the year clusters of hot pink gently scented flowers engulf this shrub that will attract birds and butterflies to the garden. Sweet Caprice will grow up to one and a half metres in a well-drained position in full sun and part shade.

It will require regular pruning to provide the best flowering appearance.

You should remember that your shady area in winter might get more sun because of the

different angles of the sunrays in different seasons.

Shade-loving plants may be able to handle some weak winter sun but not the fierce summer solar rays.

Be observant of not only the time of year of shade but also the time of day.

Shade-loving plants may still be able to handle some early morning or late afternoon sunshine.

Energy crisis: Support is clearly required

A broad coalition of peak bodies has called on the Wednesday crisis meeting of Australia's energy ministers to work together both on immediate responses to calm the chaos and on longer-term measures to moderate energy prices and cut emissions by improving supply and lifting demand-side efficiency, energy management and fuel switching.

The coalition represents businesses of all sizes, consumer advocates, the community sector, environmental advocates, farmers, investors, the property sector, professional bodies, researchers and Australia's energy and energy management sectors.

Wholesale electricity and gas prices and futures are soaring to unprecedented levels that threaten intense and lasting pain for households and businesses. This rapid rise is also causing chaos among smaller energy retailers, adding to immediate risks.

Recently announced increases to the electricity Default Market Offer are just the start of the energy price rises facing households. Meanwhile, those businesses unable to pass on their costs fear mounting cost pressures will threaten their viability, and some with immediate exposure have already been forced to temporarily shut down operations as prices spike.

There are some short term causes at play, including the unavailability of ageing and unreliable coal generators and the onset of winter peak demand for heating. However, high international prices for coal and gas are the biggest factor and they are likely to be sustained for years to come.

We are encouraged by national Climate Change and Energy Minister Chris Bowen's early push to bring his State and Territory

counterparts together this week. The response they forge jointly should be collaborative, balanced and staged.

A collaborative response between the Commonwealth, States and energy stakeholders is needed because no one player holds all the powers, resources and information to resolve this crisis.

Industry and community leaders can bring expertise, urgency and goodwill to the table and we ask energy ministers to work with us. Working together and being transparent will give us all the best chance of success.

A balanced response will address both the supply and the demand sides of this crisis.

Energy supply is essential, including behind-the-meter solar and storage accessible to all.

But final energy costs depend not just on the price of energy, but on how much energy households and businesses have to use to meet their needs.

A long-standing lack of investment in energy efficiency, energy management and fuel switching has left Australians more vulnerable both to high prices and to extreme weather.

Demand-side investments don't just pay off through lower individual bills.

They deliver improved health and higher energy productivity, reduce the need for new supply-side investment, and help us reach our emissions goals.

A staged response is essential because this crisis includes both acute price pain and the likelihood of chronic high prices thereafter. Only a handful of measures are likely to help in the short term and they are unlikely to be sustainable.

Accelerating our clean energy transition in

a fair and inclusive way will ultimately deliver durable help, but while that requires immediate action it will largely impact the medium term.

A faster buildout of large-scale renewables and transmission makes all the sense in the world, as does a speedier move from natural gas to alternatives from electrification (like efficient reverse cycle air conditioning in households) to biogas (like captured landfill gas running brick kilns) to hydrogen (like green hydrogen for essential chemical products) as appropriate in different contexts.

Actually making this acceleration work will be complex, requiring reforms and coordination across multiple jurisdictions and both public and private investments.

While all short term options should be evaluated, financial support to the most vulnerable energy users appears essential. Priority should be given to:

Low-income households, including through increasing income support payments and more adequate and responsive energy concessions; and those businesses who are coming out of contract or exposed to spot energy prices; unable to pass increased costs on; and sufficiently energy-intensive for these cost increases to threaten business continuity.

Broader reforms such as a lift in income support payments would reduce the need for emergency energy support payments.

Without urgent action, this winter will be a difficult one for energy users and the next few years may not be much easier.

We are confident, however, that Australia's governments can alleviate this pain and build a stronger, more affordable and clean future if they work together and draw on the expertise and goodwill around them.

Climate to 'sharpen'

A Monash University professor has claimed the effects of La Nina and El Nino will sharpen over the next decades due to climate change.

Associate Professor Shayne McGregor, School of Earth, Atmosphere and Environment said the current La Nina has stayed with us since June 2020 and is considered a major driver of the extreme rainfall and flooding occurring over Australia's east coast.

"Both El Nino and La Nina events have huge climatic impacts, including the increased incidence of drought, heavy rainfall and floods.

"New simulations of climatic impacts under a future with high emissions (2081-2100) suggest that an amplification of the current weather extremes (1950-2014) related to El Nino and La Nina events will occur in many regions.

"We found that the extremity of these weather changes increases in parallel with projected warming levels.

"For example, higher warming leads to larger climatic impacts of El Nino and La Nina events.

"This is a concerning proposition when you consider the role that ENSO has played in the floods this year and the dryness prior to the 2019-2020 bushfire season.

"This study provides yet another reason to reduce warming to ensure these impacts are minimised."

Shepherd's Pie

Serves: 4

Prep time: 20 minutes

Cook time: 40 minutes

4 serves per portion

Ingredients:

- 4 medium potatoes, diced
- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
- 1 small onion, diced
- ¼ capsicum, diced
- ½ teaspoon ginger, minced
- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 500g lean lamb mince
- 1 carrot, diced
- 1 zucchini, diced
- 8 broccoli florets, diced
- ½ cup peas
- 1 small can of corn kernels, drained
- 1 tomato, diced
- ½ teaspoon turmeric powder
- 1 tablespoon tomato paste
- ¼ cup milk, reduced fat
- 1 teaspoon butter
- 1/3 cup cheese, reduced fat, grated

Method:

- **PREHEAT** oven to 180°C.
- **BRING** a pot of water to the boil and cook the potatoes until tender. Drain and set aside.
- **HEAT** oil in frypan over medium heat. Sauté the onion, capsicum, ginger and garlic until vegetables are softened, around 5 minutes.
- **ADD** the mince, stirring to break up any lumps. Heat until cooked through, around 10 minutes.
- **ADD** the other vegetables (except potatoes), tomatoes and turmeric and a little bit of water if needed. Cook, covered, for a further 5 minutes.
- **STIR** through the tomato paste and simmer, covered, for a further 5 minutes until everything is tender.
- **MASH** the potatoes with milk and butter until smooth.
- **SPOON** the meat mixture into a large oven-proof dish (or 4 small dishes) and spread over the mashed potato. Sprinkle with cheese and bake in oven for 10-15 minutes or until the cheese is melted and the top is golden brown.

- ¼ teaspoon ground cinnamon

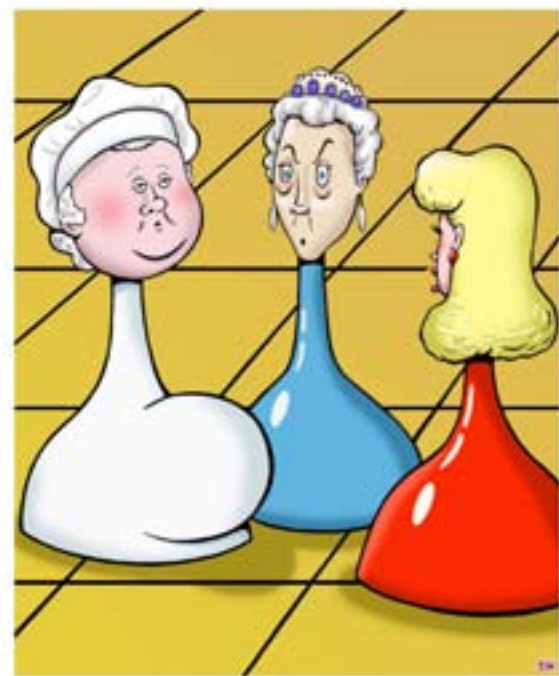
Method:

Capras crash into top four

The Rockhampton Leagues Club Central Queensland Capras have continued their quest for the Hostplus Cup after earning a huge come-back victory over Wynnum Manly Seagulls.

One successful Max Plath conversion made the score 12-10 which is what it remained at the break.

After the half-time period a gruelling 14 minutes followed before Hope broke the Capras defence again, handing the Seagulls their first lead of the contest.

Trailing 16-10 the Capras needed a spark but it looked like they were out of answers when Sam Scarlett crossed four minutes later.

The home side still led 22-12 with just nine minutes on the clock before Central Queensland finally broke their dry streak.

Roberts once again crossed, earning his second of the contest, and bringing huge hope to the side.

Again a missed conversion kept the Capras to just 22-18 despite having scored the same amount of tries as their opposition.

But Roberts' try was the momentum boost the Central Queensland squad needed.

Captain Jack Madden drove straight to the line and put Nixon Putt through a massive gap, leaving the second rower in open pasture.

Putt threw a huge dummy to his left to beat the Seagulls' fullback and scored to give the Capras a chance at levelling the contest.

Blake Moore slotted home the Capras' first conversion of the afternoon, bringing the travellers to a 22-22 draw.

But our lads weren't settling for a draw. As the Seagulls attacked Moore telegraphed a pass and ran 60 metres before having the ball stripped in the tackle.

That could have been the death blow for the Capras if it hadn't been for Curtis Dansey-Smaller getting another intercept in the same passage of play.



Trey Browne's kick was enough to win Central Queensland the game in the dying embers.

Dansey-Smaller passed the ball to his winger Jedidiah Simbiken who was then tackled and held down purposely, giving the Capras a chance at a penalty goal.

With the way the Capras had been kicking off the tee there were certainly no guarantees but the experience of Browne was enough to

deal with the pressure, giving the Capras a 24-22 win.

Incredibly, one of the touch judges waved the conversion off, however the referee overruled him to give the Capras a hard-fought victory.

The huge win pushed Central Queensland back up to third on the ladder, keeping them embedded in the top eight.

The CQ side returns home to Browne Park this weekend to take on the Townsville Blackhawks in what is shaping up to be a classic match.

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
