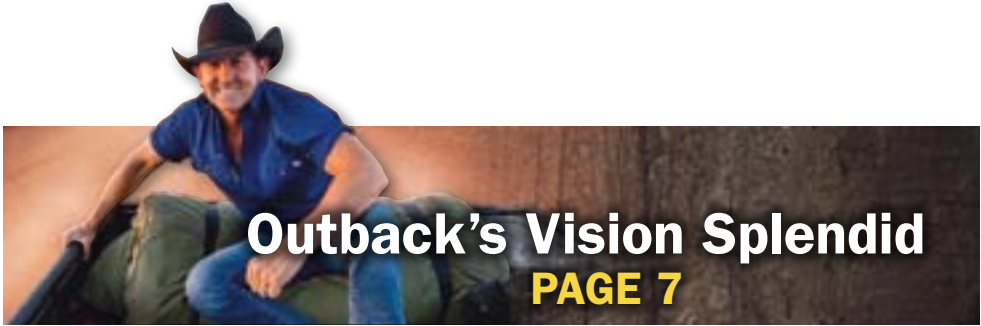

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Tower to be named after Pat Ogden

The soon-to-be-opened Globe Tower has been given an official name which commemorates the history of the building it extends from.

In a recent council meeting, the Barcaldine Regional Council voted to name the tower, the Pat Ogden tower—after a former council member, community legend and political stalwart.

Mr Ogden's daughter Patrice Horman said she and her family have been humbled by the decision, as would have her father been as well.

"Dad was in the pub for 41 years," she said.

"And his heart was always in Barcaldine and the community of Barcaldine.

"Being in the Globe [formerly a hotel] he had connections to a lot of people including political leaders, and he was able to help a lot of people keep their jobs that way."

Son-in-law Garry Bettiens said Pat Ogden was a community man through and through.

"He would do anything for the community, the Tree of Knowledge monument wouldn't be here without Pat and his connections," he said.

"He's influenced a lot of people, not only in the central west but the whole of the country.

"His following among political leaders was phenomenal—people we don't even know about."

Ms Horman said she and her family have loved the way council have handled the Globe Hotel and the tower.

"This extension has been blended quite well," she said.

"I think they've made a great effort to preserve the living history of the globe."

'Super smart' visit

Next week, some of Queensland's brightest minds will be travelling through the central west as a part of a free event 'The science of tiny things: bugs, bacteria and corals'. Coral researcher Abbigail Shaughnessy is one such mind, and she thinks this event will be a great way to get STEM subjects into the outback.

"It's suitable for everyone, and it's not just

targeted at children," she said.

"The program is provided by the office of the Queensland Chief Scientist—researchers from all over the state will be coming to speak about their research, what inspired them to study, and why students get involved to get involved with STEM.

"So we're coming to inspire children to get involved with STEM, but also for adults, to keep in touch with up-to-date research."

Ms Shaughnessy said she and her team wanted to address the lack of science-related events outside of southeast Queensland.

"It will go from 5.30pm to 6.30pm—we have three topics bugs, bacteria, and coral," she said.

"I will be talking about one of my favourite things which is coral.

"I think it will be interesting just to listen to people on what they are passionate about."

Tales of the flood times

Wild weather is a feature of outback living and with it comes tribulation and triumph.

It doesn't happen every year, but Winton has specifically, an extensive history of flooding.

These events don't often cause irreversible damage, in fact, flooding in the shire often means much-needed relief from the region's oppressive drought conditions.

Recently, the Shire Council has sought consultation from the community, asking them to share their stories in forums in the hopes of developing an installation to commemorate the town's history of floods.

For example the 2019 floods showcased the bittersweet nature of flooding in Winton, with the event bringing new life to the region but causing a ruckus of stock losses.

Winton Shire Council Mayor Gavin Baskett said that flood was the progenitor for the concept but talks quickly evolved to include a larger history of flooding in the region.

"[What we discussed] wasn't just about stock losses, but how people blended a hand and came from all different areas in the community to help," he said.

"Then it progressed on to how we've had a lot of flood disasters over the years from 2000 to 74 to 55,56 - so we thought to have the installation be a more wide-ranging one to recognise the community spirit around flood support.

"It's about locals just doing what's needed.

"There was a story about a woman having to come into town on a grader in '74 to deliver a baby."

Mayor Baskett said the installation would be about recognising community efforts through the big floods Winton has had over the years.

"We not sure yet how it's going to happen yet, but some of the stories and some of the one-liners may get tossed into the memorium," he said.

"It's just about getting the feel of the community and the way people think of floods - and that will help development going forward."

Royal outback welcomes

This year, Queen Elizabeth II became the first British monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee, marking 70 years of service.

The recent celebrations and tributes from all around the world for this momentous occasion reminded us of the Queen's two visits to Longreach.

Queen Elizabeth was the first, and to date, the only reigning British monarch to visit Australia.

Since her first visit in 1954, she has visited Australia fifteen more times.

It is remarkable to think that she has twice visited our small town of Longreach.

Her first visit was in 1970 and her second in 1988.

In 1970, the Queen was in Australia for the opening of the Sydney Opera House.

On 15 April 1970, she travelled to Longreach to help commemorate the 50th anniversary of Qantas.

It is said this visit gave the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh, Prince Philip, their first real glimpse of western Queensland.

It was reported in The Australian Women's Weekly that "About 4000 children will be brought to the town from neighbouring shires for the royal visit."

"Some of them will be flown in."

The town's population did indeed swell by quite a few thousand people.

Onlookers were given Union Jack flags to wave as the royal party made their way from the airport to Edkins Park.

The Longreach Town Band played the Queen's favourite tune, "Greensleeves", and got a nod of approval from Prince Philip.

Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip each planted a tree in Longreach that day.

The plaques that were placed at the foot of each tree are still there today although few people notice them.

The royal couple was then driven to Camden Park in a Rolls Royce to attend a meticulously planned buffet luncheon where the guest list was limited to 100.

Lady Vivienne Walker did most of the cooking herself for the lunch.

She was well used to entertaining and often catered for a hundred or more dinner guests at their Santa Gertrudis cattle sales.

It is reported that while sitting on the verandah at Camden Park, the Queen remarked, "where else in the world can you stand in a landscape and see 360 degrees right around and see nothing man-made?"

Australia's bicentennial year in 1988 saw the Queen and Prince Philip return to Longreach for the opening of the Australian Stockman's Hall of Fame and Outback Heritage Centre on 29 April.

It was a whirlwind visit, lasting just over 80 minutes.

Dignitaries attending the Opening included Prime Minister Bob Hawke, Queensland Premier Mike Ahern, Sir James Walker and Dame Mary Durack-Miller.

For the Queen's 1988 visit, the Longreach Scouts, Guides, Cubs and Brownies were asked to undertake special duties and practised their protocols for months.

The Longreach Town Band had also rehearsed for months.

It was devastating when our fine, loyal band was replaced by an imported military band as the town band was deemed inadequate for the Queen.

The Longreach Leader reported that around 20,000 people attended the opening – more than five times the population of Longreach – many travelling from far and wide.

Longreach only had about 30 motel rooms

back then which were completely booked out.

Many visitors had to bring their swags and tents and camp out for the occasion.

After the visit, one local remarked that they had never seen so many hats raised to "God Save the Queen".

Of course, there were many differing opinions about the Queen's visits to the town.

All in all, though, each time Her Majesty visited Longreach, they were successful visits.

Her visits helped boost spirits, particularly in 1970 when the region was going through a terrible drought.

Most folks agreed that such visits were days to be a part of and days to be remembered.

"Even if I am the driver, I'm not the only one in the car—there's a whole community on this journey with me, and it's because of them that we get things done together.

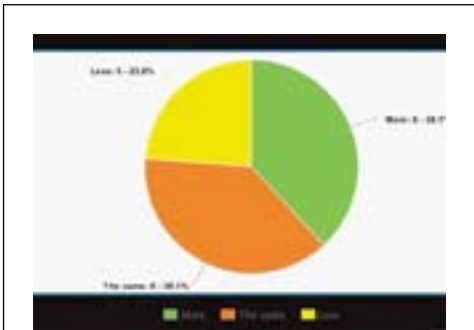
"I just love our communities, and maybe that shows in my work."

Spend is up

Despite increasing fuel and grocery costs, more than two-thirds of local vendors have claimed tourists have been more or quickly willing to spend in comparison to last year.

The overarching narrative has been that due to rain, the election, and the opening of international borders many tourists were "waiting and seeing" before making their trip to the central west.

However, over the past week, numbers have skyrocketed to match last year and unexpectedly, tourists have been spending more on more expensive items.

Many vendors stated this may be due to the perception that Covid was reaching its conclusion and consumer confidence was actually growing despite news of rising inflation.

Another perception was that there was a growing sense of nationalism toward spending, with many realising the importance of spending on Australian-made products.

Birdcage owner Gavin Ballard said tourists have been more than ever willing to support local businesses.

Commercial Hotel owner Matt Hunt said, "they're still spending on p*ss, so they're still spending".

Still, a large number of local vendors had teetered between the same and less spending—particularly vendors who sell groceries or low-cost items.

Winton stacks up best as top 'tiny town'

For its high-quality tourism products in the Age of Dinosaurs, Waltzing Matilda Centre, and a host of other exciting features, the Shire of Winton has won the award for Top Tiny Tourism Town at the Queensland Tourism Industry Council Awards.

Winton Shire Mayor Gavin Baskett said it was fantastic for Winton to win the award.

"It makes us stand out from the others in the category, and there are heaps of communities who could fit into that category," he said.

"It's a great honour—and a lot of work goes into the background of it, a lot of our team has to fill out the application and the processes.

"But the main people we need to thank are our locals, the tourist attraction operators, small businesses from hotels to cafes; they are the front line of the town and they are all over it."

Mr Baskett said he was proud of how the town puts in to ensure tourists leave with great memories, ensuring the momentum from this award keeps tourists coming to the town.

"People may look at this award and say, 'I wasn't sure where I wanted to go, let's give Winton a go,'" he said.

"And people who want to come to Winton have to pass through all those other towns, so it benefits all of our region, not just Winton."

Mr Baskett hopes the whole town of Winton are proud of their achievement.

"It's the welcoming nature of Winton that has made it what it is," he said.

"I was watching Queensland Weekender, and they were talking to a couple who have travelled all around Australia; they asked them, 'what's your favour destination?' and they said, 'Winton'.

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Dino centre wins award

Muttaborra's brand new Muttaborrasaurus Interpretation Centre has been recognised as the J W Wilson Award for Building of the Year Central Queensland.

A part of the world-class dinosaur trail, the centre was designed by Brain Hooper Archiect and recognised for its unique design.

It is an outdoor museum that showcases the history of one of the most significant fossilised dinosaur skeletons found in Australia—the Muttaborrasaurus, named after the town's sake.

According to judges, the centre is a self-guided facility that offers scientific and historical information about the dinosaur and its discovery to Central Queensland visitors.

“Striking gabion walls made from local stone create a dynamic relationship between

the building and the surrounding landscape.

“The roof is a lightweight, floating orb structure that invites natural daylight and ventilation into the space.

“The centrepiece of the tourist attraction is a striking replica of the Muttaborrasaurus, cutting a dramatic profile when the sun sets.”

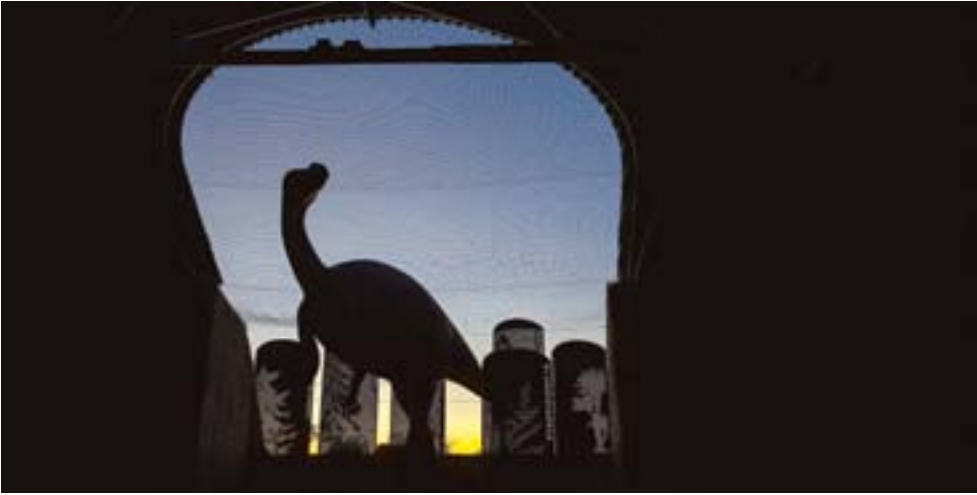
“This incredibly successful structure connects a prehistoric past and the desert landscape to the rural town setting,” the jury said.

“Muttaborrasaurus Interpretation Centre adds a layer of community pride to Muttaborra and is an important addition to the Queensland Dinosaur Trail.”

The building also received commendations for Public Architecture and Sustainable Architecture.

Green thumb grants

Community-based tree planting across the central west received a series of grants this week from the office of Maranoa MP David Littleproud.

The Aramac State School will use their \$5,250 grant to plant an avenue of 22 large shade trees for students, while the Barcaldine Aged Care Residential Village will plant an avenue of trees along Bauhinia Street, with their \$5,000 grant.

Meanwhile, the Longreach Show Society received a \$10,000 grant for their Avenue of Honour for Her Majesty project.

The Show Society will plant an avenue of

trees along the eastern driveway and entrance of the Longreach Showgrounds, and then mark the occasion with a community commemorative event.

Mr Littleproud said that in total, almost \$100,000 will be shared across the Maranoa electorate to mark the Jubilee (70 years of service) of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II.

"During Her 70 years of service, The Queen has visited Australia on 16 occasions, often planting trees at community events and ceremonies as a long-lasting reminder of the special occasion for the people in those communities," Mr Littleproud said.

"The Planting Trees for The Queen's Jubilee program creates a tree planting legacy across the nation for Australians to enjoy and increases the area of tree canopy in our communities, in celebration of Her Majesty's Jubilee."

The Queen is said to have planted 1500 trees throughout Her reign.

Ten projects in the Maranoa electorate received funding to plant trees which will help to beautify townships, provide shade for locals and visitors, and improve liveability in the region, with grants ranging from \$5,000 to \$20,000.

Study cash

The State Government has announced it will be looking to grant a boost to students in remote Queensland with Education Minister Grace Grace announcing an increase in IT hardware funding for geographically isolated students.

Minister Grace announced the change to the Distance Education ICT Subsidy Scheme, which will see a rate increase from \$250 per student per year to \$400 per student per year, at the Isolated Children's Parents Association (ICPA) State Conference in Blackall.

"I'm pleased to announce that the ICT subsidy for geographically and medically isolated students will increase to \$400 per student per year from the start of the 2022/23 financial year," Ms Grace said.

"I would like to thank the ICPA for their delegations on this issue.

"The government acknowledges the increased reliance on technology in students' learning in recent years, and we acknowledge this reliance intensified during the Covid-19 pandemic.

"This increase in the subsidy will support our geographically and medically isolated students to maintain and replace their IT hardware as needed.

"Nearly 2,800 students accessed this subsidy during the 2021/22 financial year, so this increase will benefit a significant number of students and their families.

"This is a permanent increase, with any CPI increases added to the new \$400 baseline subsidy moving forwards."

Support still strong as more feel the price pinch

Another local vendor to be hit by recent increases in prices has been Foodworks Longreach.

Foodworks part-owner Rose Leggett said she has been grateful for the support of the community thus far.

"Prices are rising, but the flip side is many products are still maintaining their prices," she said.

"It's a little bit give and take."

Lettuce prices are the talk on everyone's lips due to their unheard-of prices—as a result of the floods, many lettuce farmers had been forced to let their crops rot.

Prices are unlikely to return to normal until a new set of crops can be harvested.

"If we [as a community] stop buying the lettuces at this time, we actually hurt the farmer," Ms Leggett said.

"He's now lost his product, he's got no income from this crop, he's now got to plant another crop—so he's getting hit a few times.

"So, he's got to get the rotten ones out and the new ones in as quickly as he

can; so if we can support him just a little through this, he'll be better for it.

"If you can hang in there a little bit for him, what it will do is help him get back on his feet."

Ms Leggett said recently freight has been hurting her business more so than in the past.

"Fuel prices are inevitable; we spend a lot of time looking for cheaper options that are still good," she said.

"One thing we don't step back on is the 100 per cent good quality we have with our fruit and veg.

"That's paramount, and we try really hard to get good quality meat."

Foodworks puts a lot of its profits back into the community—and not just Longreach but into smaller surrounding communities such as Stonehenge.

"The more shops you have in the town, the better the town does—provides more jobs," Ms Leggett said.

"A little family business like this means 100 per cent of the profits are spent here.

"We try to support as many local community groups as we can."

Freshest still best choice

It is no small secret that the price of living has gone up in recent weeks.

Particularly in towns such as Longreach where freight prices are put on top of the already sizeable grocery prices, many food items are becoming either too expensive to justify stocking or have exorbitant prices.

Longreach Fruit Barn owner Sam Tweedale said he couldn't justify selling one or two items at the price of freight, having to throw out the rest of a carton.

"It is one of those things where I have looked for alternatives, I've gotten other lettuces available," he said.

"But even there, with supply and demand, they start to become difficult to get a hold of as well."

Mr Tweedale said during these times, it was important to continue to support local businesses.

"We are engaged in the community, and we put money back into the community," he said.

"It is something that I think is needed—we can't always compete with prices with the bigger supermarket chains; but with freshness and quality, I think we can. "

According to Mr Tweedale, tourists in town have spent less on local products than in previous years, but he has seen a small improvement in recent weeks.

"It's been slow to start—we are starting to see some caravans and people coming through," he said.

"The train and bus side of tourism is strong, but we have had people come in, comparing prices back to the coast—and you can't compete with that; we are far from southeast Queensland."

Mr Tweedale said it was important to continue to support local businesses, to try and always support locals.

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Floss fiction: Good reason behind the gentle reminder

If your dentist reminds you every six months to floss your teeth, there must be a good reason for it.

Flossing will help clean and dislodge food, reducing the amount of bacteria and plaque in your mouth.

Plaque contributes to tooth decay and gum disease. Food can get caught between your teeth any time you eat.

Ideally, we'd all floss after eating, to give the food and plaque less time to thrive.

As this generally isn't realistic, we can focus on choosing the right times to floss.

Most commonly, this is before bed, to minimise the damage bacteria can do overnight.

For some people, your dentist may recommend piksters or an interdental brush to aid in removing the plaque between your teeth.

Your oral health is connected to many other health conditions.

Taking care of your teeth, including flossing, can minimise the risks and consequences of health problems.

If this isn't enough, the food stuck between your teeth is a big contributor to bad breath.

Use this as a friendly reminder to keep up the flossing, and make you and your dentist's life a little easier.

With the overcast conditions we've been having, the temperature dipped below 20 one evening toward the end of May and my better half announced, 'Winter is Coming'.

(One of the rare occasions you might hear the 'b-word' from a Canuck.)

I walked into the kitchen the other day and saw my breath in the air.

I checked the thermometer, but it was still 13 degrees Celsius.

I always reckoned the temperature had to be below 10 degrees to observe that particular phenomenon, but I guess temperature is a relative thing.

Or the thermometer might not work properly when it dips that low.

It also means beanies, gloves and parkas make an appearance, and days get measured in layers.

The colder it gets, the more layers the better half dons each morning.

Some days start out with four layers.

I think, after waking up on the weekend to frost on the windscreen and donning four layers, we can safely say, 'Winter has arrived'.

One new case of Covid-19 has been reported in the Central West over the past 24 hours.

Allowing for cases discharged after completing isolation, the total number of active cases currently in the region is 18. All active cases are receiving care in the Virtual Ward.

There are currently no Covid-19-related hospitalisations.

No further details will be provided due to confidentiality.

To date, accounting for those who have been discharged from quarantine, the Central West HHS has recorded 854 cases of Covid-19 since the first case on 22 December.

Remember, the Covid-19 vaccination does not protect you against the flu.

You need to have the separate seasonal influenza vaccination as well.

The big boat that could

"It's been very very emotional for me the whole thing, you know.

"When we just pulled her out of the water, and who should go past but her sister boat, the Emmylou.

"She blew her horn, and I thought to myself 'that's the last time she's going to see her sister'.

"Just to see her leaving her home was sad, but she's going to ride another couple of chapters in the Longreach waterhole."

The Pride of the Murray, built-in 1924 in Echuca, has been operating as a tourist boat since 1977 on the river of its namesake, the Murray.

However recently, it has been purchased by entrepreneur and Outback Pioneers owner and founder Richard Kinnon who was in need of a larger vessel as tourist numbers have ballooned in Longreach.

"We didn't have seats for them on the Starlight's river cruise that we do on the Thomson River," Mr Kinnon said.

"It was worrying me that we were sending people off disappointed that they were unable to get onto the river cruise."

Mr Kinnon and his team toyed with building a new boat for the Thomson, an act which he said would have been much easier.

"We were just starting to order the materials for a new boat—but it just didn't sit right with me because all of our tourism is all about storytelling," Mr Kinnon said.

"We immerse them in the experience where they can taste and feel and see it.

"I decided to go for a look and see if we could find something that could suit."

Mr Kinnon said he chose the "Pride..." as a sidewheeler, a type of boat he is fond of because of its history.

"The story of the sidewheeler is very unique to Australia," he said.

"There's not one paddle wheeler that's the same.

"It is an amazing world when you look into it—with Longreach as a wool town, and they regarded central Queensland as the wool capital of the world, a lot of our wool would have gone south and would have been taken down the Murray on a paddle wheeler.

"It just made a lot of sense—I have no doubt that I can make the "Pride..." work."

It has been a long journey for the Pride of the Murray - over 1700 kilometres along the Mitchell Highway - but Mr Kinnon said it was mostly smooth sailing.

"Once we got over the border and onto those outback roads, we started really making miles," he said.

"The last three weeks have been an incredible eye-opener for me; that here, in Longreach—it's become a storytellin' centre of Queensland, if not Australia.

"As you know, Longreach is where Qantas started, we have the Stockman's Hall of Fame, we have the dinosaurs just down the road.

"It's so much storytellin'."

Echuca is a straight line to Longreach, Mr Kinnon and his team trekked through much of outback Victoria, New South Wales, and Queensland.

"Every community welcomed us with open arms," Mr Kinnon said.

"They were in the hundreds; in little com-



munities, and station people came out to their front gates to wave us past.

"The support and connection that the "Pride..." has created have been absolutely mind-blowing."

Mr Kinnon said he sees the movement of the "Pride..." as a part of a larger growing body of tourist attractions in the central west.

"We have been approached by American and Japanese travel agencies already," he said.

"This has taken Outback Pioneers to a whole new level—a level I never dreamed possible."

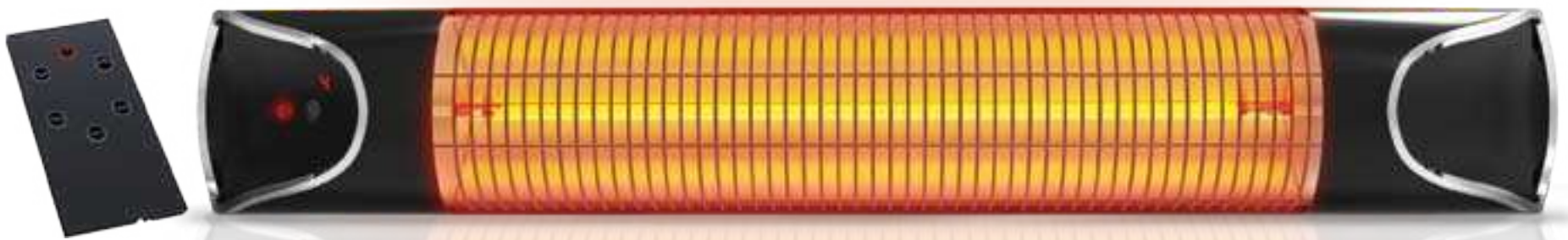
When Outback Pioneers won gold at the National Tourism Awards, Mr Kinnon said "the sleeping giant of tourism in Australia was about to wake up."

"I can't believe how prophetic that came to be," he said.

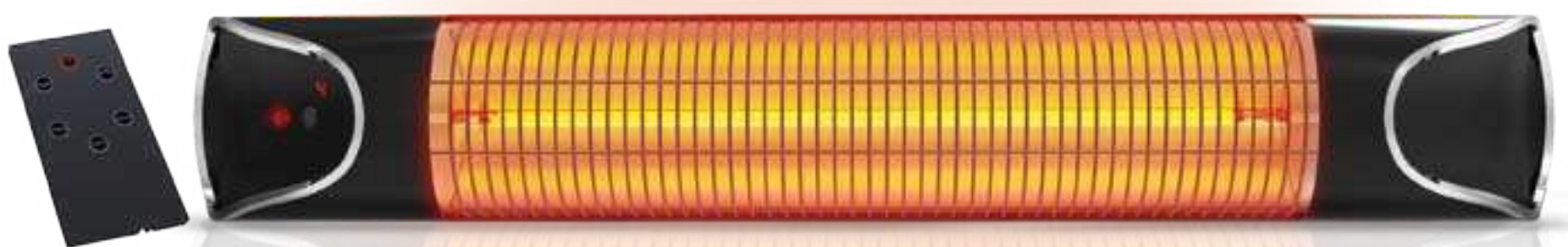

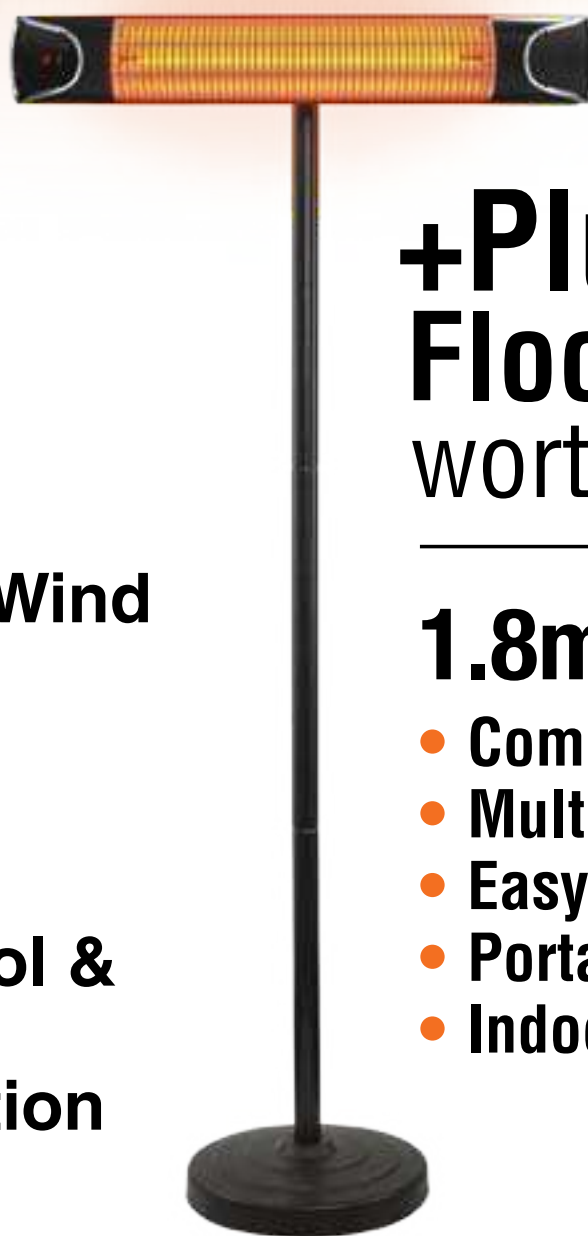
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Myf Warhurst finds out if her
love of music runs in the family
on **Who Do You Think You Are?**

Hidden history found

In a new series of *Who Do You Think You Are?*, Myf Warhurst looks into her family tree for the first time. The famed music journalist and TV presenter tells **Siobhan Duck** what she learned in the process

Nature or nurture? It's the age-old question. But thanks to the latest season of *Who Do You Think You Are?* Myf Warhurst now has pretty strong evidence that her love of music is in the genes.

For a long time, Warhurst had assumed that her passion for pop, punk and all the parts in between was a result of an idyllic childhood spent in rural Victoria.

There, Warhurst grew up surrounded by music thanks to three older brothers who had a vast collection of records for her to rifle through by stealth. Sunday nights, she laughs, were spent watching *Countdown* rather than *60 Minutes*. And her earliest memory is creeping into the lounge to lip synch and dance to ABBA when no one was watching.

But when the *Spicks and Specks* panellist was able to properly examine her family tree for the first time with the help of the expert *Who Do You Think You Are?* historians and genealogists, she discovered she hails from a long line of music lovers and performers that includes a Gold Rush vaudevillian and 1960s popstar April Byron.

"Look, I'm no scientist, but I reckon there might be something in the blood, because it's a pretty strong line that's come from both sides of the family and it's still making itself known to this day," she laughs.

"I've always adored the show, because family histories are so fascinating, and there were a lot of things that our family didn't know about our ancestors. Mostly because the stories were buried, considered shameful at the time. Thankfully times have changed, and I feel honoured and privileged to give my ancestors a voice, when they were denied theirs."

Warhurst's grandmother, Ruby, was adopted and so, the presenter knew very little about her biological family's history before *WDYTIA?*. In examining old records and documents, the historians pieced together the heartbreaking story of her great-grandmother Maud, an impoverished young woman forced to give up several children.

Although, as a long-time fan of the series, she has seen other celebrities embark on this journey, Warhurst wasn't prepared for the "emotional impact" of hearing about the hardships of her own forebears.

"I really was surprised, and probably overwhelmed, because I wasn't expecting my great-grandmother's story to be such a difficult one," Warhurst says.

"I had no idea of the trauma that she must have experienced,

being sent into a life of servitude at such a young age, as her story was not known in our family given my grandmother was adopted on the basis of a handshake."

Warhurst is looking forward to sharing some of what she learned on the show with her parents and brothers when her episode airs, although she's warned them that it "won't be an easy ride."

She's excited too that investigating her history has opened doors to new relatives in the present day as well. Through the program, she made contact with Byron's US-based family and she is eager to help them tell the singer's remarkable story.

"So many women's stories in Australian music have been ignored, and April's was pretty incredible,"

she says of the chart-topping singer and onetime star of *The Go Show!*.

Aside from unearthing new relatives, another perk of filming *Who Do You Think You Are?* for Warhurst was that it enabled her to briefly escape from Melbourne's gruelling lockdowns.

Like many Melburnians, Warhurst found all sorts of novel ways to cope with being locked up in the house 24/7 for weeks on end.

"I went through so many phases," she explains.

"First lockdown, I cooked and ate and drank. Second long-long-lockdown, I baked sourdough but gave up the booze and started exercising. There was enough lockdown to try whatever you could. I was also very fortunate to be able to film this episode of

WDYTIA? (TV was considered essential work) which meant I was able to travel through Victoria (obeying lockdown rules of course) and do this. It made the experience even more special."

Of course, now that the lockdowns are over and the borders have reopened, Warhurst has been free to roam much further afield, jetting off to Italy to fulfil her Eurovision hosting duties.

"It was absolutely brilliant to fly on a plane, to earth myself on the other side of the world, to eat pasta in Italy and to remember how much travel opens the mind and inspires new ideas," she enthuses.

"And Eurovision came with such a feeling of excitement and renewed enthusiasm too. I couldn't help but be swept away with the joy of it all."

Warhurst and comedian Joel Creasey have been hosting Eurovision coverage for five years now. She loves every second of the glitzy and slightly daggy affair, apart from being constantly asked why Australia is in it.

"It's been many years now, just enjoy it!" she exclaims with mock frustration, before adding that she'd love to see Casey Donovan or Kylie Minogue representing the nation in 2023.

Now back on home soil, Warhurst's next big performance is getting the band back together for another season of *Spicks and Specks*.

Any initial nerves she had about whether people would embrace the reboot as they had done the original have now been allayed and she can just enjoy doing what she does best: showcasing her remarkable knowledge of anything and everything to do with music.

She's also squeezing in time to pen her memoirs, but admits her memory is pretty terrible and that she has begun to wish she'd kept a diary.

If she had, that would certainly make it easier for her ancestors to one day find out more about who Warhurst really was for any future episodes of *Who Do You Think You Are?*

Unfortunately, Warhurst confesses her social media accounts don't give too much away either apart from the odd post about work. So, when asked what she'd want her legacy to be, she smiles:

"Oooh, that's a hard one," she muses.

"I hope that I've made the path a little easier for the young women or the disadvantaged who come after me. My ancestors had so many barriers to success, or even to living a fair life, that I owe them to make sure I used my position wisely, and forge new ground to help those who come after. And to give people a lot of joy along the way. If I can share some joy, then the job's done, isn't it?"

When Susan is killed on an investigation, McCall springs to action – quickly deducing it was a targeted attack and that he is next in line. With a crew of highly trained assassins in hot pursuit, McCall exacts his trademark form of unflinching vengeance in a flash of bloody excitement. The first sequel ever made by either Fuqua or Washington raises the stakes considerably and will thrill any fans of the genre. ★★★★★

If you thought they'd made enough Tarzan movies, think again. This is the story of the jungle boy, but not as you know it. That doesn't last long, as he's lured back to the Congo on a trade mission. It goes pear shaped when up-to-no-good Christoph Waltz gets involved, putting Jane in peril, and giving Tarzan a reason to get his kit off. ★★★★★



MAMMA MIA! HERE WE GO AGAIN

A huge hit in 2008, *Mamma Mia!* raked in \$615 million at the box office, cementing its popularity after becoming the longest-running Broadway jukebox musical. The follow-up movie is both a prequel and a sequel, following a younger version of Meryl Streep's character Donna (Lily James, pictured) in 1979 and catching up in the present day with Donna's daughter, Sophie (Amanda Seyfried). Kate Winslet (pictured) is in fine form here as Tilly, a complicated woman who returns to her rural home in Outback Australia after years honing her dressmaking craft in Europe. Turning up with her sewing machine and a lifetime's worth of baggage, Tilly has a subtle plan for revenge as she sets about bringing down her ugly hometown with her beautiful outfits. Her reappearance is not given the warmest of welcomes. With fine performances and finer costumes, *The Dressmaker* is a cut above. ★★★★★



HACKSAW RIDGE
7mate, Monday, 8.30pm, MA15+ (2016)

Andrew Garfield (pictured) leads this World War II true story of Desmond T. Doss, who won the Congressional Medal of Honor despite refusing to bear arms. Doss was drafted and ostracised by fellow soldiers for his pacifist stance, but went on to earn respect and adoration for his bravery, selflessness and compassion after he risked his life to save 75 men in the Battle of Okinawa – without carrying a gun. This well-crafted, emotional tale carries a powerful message about pacifism. ★★★★★



THE LIGHT BETWEEN OCEANS
SBS World Movies, Tuesday, 9.30pm, M (2016)

Stanley, Tasmania, doubles for an island off the coast of Western Australia in this romantic period melodrama directed by Derek Cianfrance. War-weary Tom Sherbourne (Michael Fassbender), hoping for a quiet life, takes a job as a lighthouse keeper. It's not long before he falls for local girl Isabel (Alicia Vikander, pictured with Fassbender) and the two start a life together. However, the couple are unable to conceive. Outback-loving blossoms

Isn't it sad when you have to watch American-made garden shows to see Australian plants being promoted for their water-wise capabilities?

Last week, I came across a very interesting gardening program on pay-TV, which originated from Arizona in the United States.

In the program, they designed theme gardens in various locations, and the theme of this particular show was to create a garden and entertainment area that was watered solely from recycled bathtub water.

Your first thought would be that there was no hope for a prize-winning garden on a 700 square metre block of land only with leftover water used to shower and bath an average family.

However, as was stated on the show, bathing and showering consumes an average of 270 to 280 litres of water per day per household in America, and this is more than enough to water a garden.

In the big picture, this equates to 100 000 litres of water or 100 kilolitres per year, which is quite a substantial amount.

The show then went on to recommend the top dozen plants that American gardeners should be planting to achieve this waterwise concept.

Out of the dozen plants they recommended, all but two will grow well in Central Queensland, with six of them being Australian native plants.

The plant that they gave the biggest wrap to was a plant they said Australians don't know much about, and this was the Eremophila or Australian Native Fuschia or Emu Bush.

At this point, he was quite correct.

If you were to visit a nursery this weekend, at best you may find no more than three or four varieties of this plant; yet, nearly two dozen different varieties were rattled off on this show.

The name Eremophila actually means 'desert lover'.

This plant has around 180 species found naturally in Australia, and there are probably at least that many again of hybrids around the world, with plants ranging from groundcovers to screen plants of 4-5 metres high.

Eremophilas are found in just about every state in Australia, and locally can be found growing native throughout Central Queensland.

There are probably at least thirty different varieties of this plant than can be successfully grown in Central Queensland, as long as people who want to grow them don't commit the cardinal sin of killing them with kindness—any more than a litre of water per week is too much.

Much of the credit for the development and

trialing of many of these plants can be given to a group of dedicated ladies from the Springsure area, ably led by the late Beverley O'Keefe.

During the 80s and 90s, Beverley compiled one of the most comprehensive trials of Eremophila in her home garden on a property near Springsure, detailing the success and failure of every plant.

Eremophilas to look for

Eremophila Fairy Floss is a very attractive medium-sized shrub 2m x 1.5m in size with bright green foliage.

From late Autumn to Spring an attractive orange-cream buds open to candy-pink fuschia-like flowers with fine white hairs.

Eremophila Fairy Floss grows best in well-drained light to medium soils, including gravelly clay in an open sunny or lightly shaded area.

Eremophila glabra Burgundy is a commercial hybrid of the Australian Native Fuchsia or Emu Bush that will grow to approximately one and a half metres square. With its attractive silvery-grey foliage and sticking burgundy fuchsia-like flowers, it forms a highlight in any dryland garden.

Eremophila glabra Kalbarri Carpet has attractive silvery-grey foliage and striking yellow fuschia-like flowers that will attract birds and other nectar feeders.

With the main flowering being spring and summer, with spot flowers in winter and autumn.

This groundcover will grow to approxi-

Profuse white flowers will cover the plant from early spring to late summer.

Grows best in a sunny open position in will tolerate most soil types.

This plant is frost and drought tolerant and responds well to pruning.

Eremophila Yanna Road is a bushy silver foliated compact shrub growing suitable for most exposed positions.

During spring showy sprays of pale pink flowers, with an attractive red spotting in the throat of the flower can be found throughout the centre of the shrub. Eremophila Yanna Road will grow to just over one metre high.

Selective buyers

By Australian Wool Network

The Australian wool market heads into the final month of the 2021/22 wool selling season with the second week of overall losses, although there were selected pockets in the market that recorded price rises.

There was also a noticeable increase in buyer sentiment toward the end of the series.

The national offering fell by 10,545 bales to 34,514 bales.

With only four selling weeks left for the season, the total amount offered continues to track well above the previous season.

Year to date there have been 1,719,102 bales put through the auction system, 130,644 more than the corresponding sale of the previous

season, an increase of 8.2 per cent.

Across the county the individual Micron Price Guides (MPGs) ranged between +24 and -50 cents, interestingly both of these movements occurred in Melbourne in the 17.0 and 16.5-micron MPGs respectively.

These price movements combined with losses in all other sectors of the market had the net effect of a 6 cent fall in the AWEX Eastern Market Indicator (EMI), the EMI closed the seek at 1,414 cents.

In a similar pattern to the previous week, a further strengthening of the Australian dollar (the AUD climbed by 0.63 cents since last week) when viewed in US dollar terms the market recorded an overall increase.

The EMI added 5 US cents for the series, closing at 1,013 cents.

After being the strongest performing sector in the previous series, lack of buyer support resulted in the oddments suffering the largest falls this week.

General losses in locks, stains and crutching of between 45 and 60 cents pushed the three Merino Carding (MC) indicators down by an average of just over 50 cents.

Next week the national offering decreases, due in part to it being a non-sale week in Fremantle.

Currently, there is expected to be 33,095 bales on offer with only Sydney and Melbourne in operation.

National herd set for rebuild

The national cattle herd rebuild will proceed as a result of lower slaughter volumes and the continuation of strong seasons in most cattle regions across the country, according to the latest Cattle Industry Projections update from Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA).

Significant challenges around processor capacity and throughput have impacted the full potential for production which has resulted in revised slaughter numbers to 6.15m head, down from 6.7m head.

MLA's Market Information Manager, Stephen Bignell, said despite recent challenges, the industry has demonstrated resilience in processor capacity domestically and global demand for Australian beef remained high.

"Supply and demand for Australian beef are forecasted to increase as we strengthen our position in emerging international markets such as Indonesia and Thailand," Mr Bignell said.

"An increasingly efficient and dynamic export market and resilient supply chain will mean that the Australian beef industry is well placed to capture opportunities as slaughter and production ramps up.

As favourable seasonal conditions remain through 2022 and the herd rebuild continues, the national herd is expected to grow by 6 per cent to reach 27.6 million head.

By 2024, the herd is expected to grow a further 4.6 per cent by 2024.

"Southern Australia will continue to drive the national herd growth with persistent, substantial rainfall in the southern cattle regions of Queensland, NSW and Victoria," Mr Bignell said.

"For northern Australia, they will require an above-average wet season in order to turbocharge their rebuild following a disappointing 2021-22 wet season."

In addition, as the herd matures from rebuilding, many young females are expected to come into calf for their first or second joining. With favourable reproductive conditions and higher than average joining and branding percentages, the national increase of the herd is expected to continue.

"Southern Australia are driving the higher prices in the market and the strong demand for young heifers. Meanwhile, the northern systems have seen a lower-than-average wet season, with mustering starting earlier than usual."

Carcase weights

Carcase weights are forecast to continue to reach records moving through 2022.

Carcase weights in the first quarter of this year have reached a national average of 324.4kg per head – 10.8kg higher than the average in 2021 – due to good seasonal conditions across Australia.

"After an easing of slaughter rates, carcass weights have subsequently increased.

"This enables production to be maintained at a high rate.

"In addition, large volumes of cattle in feedlots are driving the higher carcass weights along with higher prices, which are incentivising producers to increase weights before selling," Mr Bignell said.

In 2024, carcass weights are forecast to remain high with large numbers of cattle on feed and prices remaining high.

Strong seasonal conditions are allowing feed to remain abundant but increasing grain prices could put pressure on feedlot systems.

Record exports conceal 'cost' of efforts

The latest Government figures show agricultural exports reaching a record \$64.9 billion in 2022-23, but National Farmers' Federation President Fiona Simson says these positive numbers conceal the "cost of farming" crunch impacting farmers and consumers.

ABARES' latest Agricultural Commodities Report predicts the industry's gross value will tip past \$80 billion for a second consecutive year on the back of favourable weather conditions and "very high" world food prices, but Ms Simson said these figures don't paint the full picture.

Ms Simson warned that despite the bumper season, many farmers were feeling the pain of eye-watering production costs.

"Prices for fertiliser, fuel, and power are on a rocket ride to the moon," Ms Simson said.

"As ABARES points out, producers are dealing with the highest fertiliser prices since 2008, as the global energy crisis takes its toll.

"Of course, all this is compounded by the ongoing worker shortage putting the handbrake on production, an issue that will only worsen later in the year during the crucial harvest period."

Ms Simson was on-farm in regional Queensland today, hosting the new Minister for Agriculture Murray Watt as he spoke first-hand to farmers and agricultural businesses.

She said while not all these issues were within the Government's control, it was criti-

cal the Albanese Government worked closely with industry to limit the impact of the cost crunch.

"We raised these issues with Minister Watt today and discussed how we can work together on cost-of-farming issues, as we look to mitigate the flow-on impacts to everyday Australians."

Ms Simson acknowledged that despite the challenges, today's figures showed the farm sector was tracking well towards its target of \$100 billion in farm gate output by 2030.

"Another \$80 billion year means we are well on the way to achieving our goal to be a \$100 billion industry by 2030, but now is the time to ensure we're ready for when seasons and markets inevitably turn," Ms Simson said.

Wool harvesting is a major research priority

By Australian Wool Innovation

Woolgrower-owned Australian Wool Innovation (AWI) is rolling out a series of measures to better tackle the many challenges of wool harvesting.

AWI chairman Jock Laurie says this multi-pronged approach covers everything from further research into biological defleecing, shearing innovations, and increased training including for high school students.

"There is no single solution or technological breakthrough that will improve getting the wool off sheep," he said.

As an industry, we have to work on this from many angles."

Biological defleecing has real potential to be a game-changer.

We have joined with the University of Adelaide on a three-year project to work out the

ideal dose of a feed that generates a weakened zone of wool that would allow easy mechanical harvesting.

The project continues years of collaboration with the University of Adelaide on this type of development stretching back almost 20 years.

Naturally, we want to know the impact of the effects on wool growth, wool quality, wool strength, body growth, behaviour and the general health of the sheep.

But that isn't the only area.

Our recent wool harvesting open day at the Falkiner Memorial Research Station in southern NSW shows there are plenty of growers wanting to update their sheds or try different systems to reduce the catch and drag.

We will continue to support them with the most up-to-date information.

There is even more training planned in the year ahead with 2,200 days planned over the next year.

900 in shed training days including for wool handlers, 800 days of novice schools and 500 days for improver schools.

We will also include specific training for upright shearing and will continue to work closely with shearing contractors and state governments to deliver the best possible training all over Australia.

This is about creating a more defined pathway into the industry, a more structured and accountable training model with the intention to have a sustainable wool harvesting workforce."

AWI's funding of biological defleecing is up to \$1.4 million over three years, enhanced wool harvesting training is \$10.5 million over three years as well.

Stuffed Eggplant

Serves: 4

Prep time: 20 minutes

Cook time: 1 ½ hours

5 serves per portion

Ingredients:

- 2 small eggplants, halved lengthways
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 4 large onions, diced
- 500g lean pork mince
- 1 tomato, peeled and chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, chopped
- Black pepper, to taste
- 3 eggs
- ½ cup cheddar cheese, grated
- 4 medium potatoes, peeled, cut into quarters
- 4 pieces pumpkin, diced
- 2 large tomatoes, diced
- 6 garlic cloves, crushed
- Mix of fresh chopped herbs (parsley, mint, oregano, basil)
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 cup water
- 2 tablespoons tomato paste

Method:

- PREHEAT oven to 200°C.
- SCOOP out the flesh from each eggplant half, leaving a little around the inside to get a boat shape. Roughly chop the scooped flesh and set aside.
- HEAT oil in a frypan over medium heat. Sauté half of the onions for 5 minutes until soft but not browned.
- ADD the pork mince and stir for about 7 minutes or until mince has changed colour.
- ADD chopped eggplant flesh, tomato, garlic and pepper, cooking until eggplant is soft. Switch off heat, add eggs and stir to combine. Leave to cool.
- PLACE remaining onion, potatoes, pumpkin, tomatoes, garlic and herbs in a large baking dish. Drizzle with the oil and mix to coat.
- MIX half the cheese with the mince mixture and stuff into the four eggplant pieces, placing each one in the prepared dish around the vegetables.
- POUR the water down the sides and then spoon the tomato paste over vegetables and stuffed



eggplant. Sprinkle remaining cheese over dish.

- COVER dish with foil and bake in oven for around 1 hour, or until vegetables are tender. Remove foil

20 minutes before finishing and add more water if too dry.

Prep time: 15 minutes

Cook time: 15 minutes

3 serves per portion

Ingredients:

- 1 leek, sliced finely
- 1 bunch broccolini, roughly chopped

Capras creep up on Coast

The Central Queensland Capras have continued their roll on with another monumental win on the weekend.

After knocking off the Townsville Blackhawks at Browne Park on Saturday, the Capras have all but cemented their place as one of the teams to beat this season.

It wasn't easy for the Capras who went behind after an incredibly athletic effort from Kalifa Faifai-Loa opened the scoring.

But in the 16th minute Brandon Roberts cracked the Townsville defence after picking up a pass that hit the deck and steaming through a gap.

Trey Browne's successful conversion gave the Capras a 6-4 lead which would be extended 11 minutes later.

A double-pump from fullback Blake Moore put Nixon Putt into some open space and despite the defence getting close to the second rower, he was too strong and helped give the Capras a 12-4 lead.

Browne threw a bullet out to our right-winger who had nothing to do but fall over the line untouched, giving the Capras a 22-16 lead.

That is how the match remained with the Central Queenslanders holding out the Blackhawks and maintaining their position as third on the table.

That victory also helped the Capras close the gap on the Sunshine Coast Falcons after they were knocked off by the table-topping Burleigh Bears on Saturday.
