MP's blast

Gregory MP Lachlan Millar has lambasted the State Government's new budget stating it is a budget that has let down regional Queensland.

"This budget is about spin, smoke and mirrors," he said.

"It is how things look, not how they are.

"We have seen reannouncement after reannouncement; the only two new announcements for the outback in the seat of Gregory are: \$747,000 for a 50-kilowatt solar system for the Alpha Hospital and Multipurpose Hospital Service; and Diamantina Shire gets a measly \$410,666 to support Diamantina Shire to undertake job-creating maintenance works.

Mr Millar said he believes the seat of Gregory has been taken for granted by the State Government.

"If you look at the budget for outback Queensland—and it is a lovely, glossy brochure—there are a couple of things in there that were announced the last budget; for example, funding for the Longreach State High School for an upgrade to the skills, development and training facilities," he said.

"It was announced in the last budget; now you are going to announce it in this budget as well?

"The Longreach Hospital received \$500,000 out of \$4.8 million to spend on the rectification of structural issues, electrical, and mechanical services.

"What I am looking for is the promise at the 2020 election by the Labor Party for renal dialysis in Longreach.

"We still do not have it."

Winton notes

- Winton Shire Council is set to increase its side of the deal as part-contributors to the construction of the Jessamine Place Supported Aged Care Facility.
- The Winton Shire Council has moved to tender supply and delivery of \$849,240 worth of gravel to M&S Mitchell in order to widen and rehabilitate the Winton-Hughenden Road.
- Council has moved to develop a Reconciliation Action Plan to be undertaken over the next several years, stating relationships with local Aboriginal Communities will be to be built from the ground up.
- A proposal has been made to keep a donation box at the Winton Musical Fence.
- Council has moved to donate \$2,241 to the Winton Community Ball.
- The committee for the Winton Outback Fest have proposed a plinth be installed in celebration of the 50th year of the festival. Said proposal will be discussed in the July council meeting.

Council budget a 'responsible' move

Longreach Regional Council is forecasting a \$3m positive net result in its 2022-23 Budget, handed down on Wednesday.

Rates will be increased by less than inflation, with an average 4 per cent increase targeted.

Pensioners will be mostly spared from the rate increase, with a rating review resulting in little to no increase across that category.

Council has minimised the impact of the rate increase for pensioners with significant increases to pensioner concessions.

As part of the budget, Council will deliver over \$52m in operational services, and a capital works program worth \$18m.

Mayor Tony Rayner said the budget had been prepared with economic conditions in mind.

"There's been a lot of change in the last six months, and it looks like we'll continue to see things changing into the future" he explained.

"Inflation is rising, so are interest rates, and there are supply chain and labour market issues having wide-ranging impacts on the economy.

"We're not isolated from any of those impacts in our region, so we've tried in this budget to responsibly plot a course through what-

ever the next twelve months have in store."

Under the budget Council's cash position will remain strong with over \$20.1m projected to be in the bank at the end of the 2022/23 financial year.

Council stands to benefit from over \$11.1m in capital grants, plus over \$21.8m in non-capital grants and contributions.

Cr Rayner said Council relied on good relationships with government to secure funding.

"The support of state and federal governments is vital to low-rate-base councils like ours," he said.

"They have valued partners in almost everything we do, and it's been our focus in recent years to be better at securing grant opportunities.

"We work very hard to make sure that we offer good value to governments for their investment in our region."

He said Council was always looking for ways to improve its financial management.

"We've taken a number of steps to enhance our ability to manage our finances, including the appointment of our first-ever Chief Financial Officer at the start of this year.

"We've also been working hard on our asset management practices because we know how important that work is.

"We manage over \$325 million worth of community assets."

As part of its budget Council will spend \$9.7 Million maintaining Public Facilities like Cemeteries, Showgrounds, Parks and Gardens, Pools, Sporting Facilities, and Town Halls; \$8.9 Million maintaining and improving town streets, storm-water drainage and rural roads; \$6.7 Million providing water and sewerage services; \$1.1 Million managing pests, weeds, rural lands, stock routes, and reserves; \$975,000 supporting the regional visitor economy; and \$906,000 delivering Community Services such as Libraries, Events, and Sponsorship.

Mayor Rayner said the budget will support the work of incoming Chief Executive Officer, Dirk Dowling.

"I look forward to working with Dirk on this and other strategic matters," he said.

"This budget will support the work of Council under new leadership, and complement the development of new capabilities that will serve us well into whatever the next twelve months hold.

"It represents a responsible step into the future for our organisation and the community."

The full Longreach Regional Council Budget 2022-2023, including the Mayor's Budget Statement, will be available to download from Council's website in due course.

Funding tap turned on

Regional water infrastructure is set for a boon as round six of the Queensland Government's Building our Regions fund has taken off.

Almost \$8.3 million has been awarded to 23 local council, for 35 projects that will improve water supply and sewerage infrastructure.

Water Minister Glenn Butcher said the program was enormously successful and without it, councils would face funding and infrastructure challenges.

"This program makes a real difference to Queenslanders," he said.

"We heard from mayors and councillors across the board that it was difficult to find funding for these important projects, which aren't always obvious to ratepayers.

"Building our Regions provides vital support to regional local governments' projects and it means their communities benefit from improved infrastructure."

Health a priority, ladies

To celebrate its 10th birthday this year, Jean Hailes Women's Health Week is inspiring women in regional Queensland and Far North Queensland to put their health first.

The timing couldn't be more important – for many women, regular health checks and screenings have taken a backseat during the pandemic years. Our tourism industry has benefited from over \$20m in new product development over the last five years.

Longreach is very lucky to have a variety of local operators all continuously investing in new products to keep our visitor economy the envy of every other town in Western Queensland.

I've recently returned from Canberra, where I attended the National General Assembly of the Australian Local Government Association.

It was a very successful visit, and while there I was one of six Queensland mayors invited to meet with Prime Minister Albanese, which was a great outcome for our region.

I was also able to meet with a number of new cabinet ministers, including Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, Murray Watt;

Minister for Regional Development, Local Government and Territories, Kristy McBain; and the Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government, Catherine King. Good relationships with government are essential to council, because we rely so heavily on external funding.

That was a point illustrated on Wednesday when Council met to hand down its Budget for 2022-23. As always, it's been a big job for Councillors and staff, one that takes many months of deliberations. There are a lot of changes happening in the national economy right now.

The budget will try to strike a balance, preparing Council for economic headwinds while shielding our community from the worst of any shocks to come.

That's something we had in mind when we decided to limit any rate increases to a value lower than inflation. The average increase of 4 per cent is lower than some of our neighbours and will not apply to most pensioners.

There's plenty to be proud of in the budget—we'll deliver over \$52m in operational services, plus an \$18m capital improvements program.

More details will be released in the full bud-

get booklet, to be posted on our website soon.

At its June meeting, Council made the decision to first invite expressions of interest from anyone interested in purchasing the Ilfracombe Post Office.

As we said at the time this will allow us to test the market and fully understand the nature of any proposed developments before proceeding any further.

Staff will now go away and draft up the necessary EOI documents.

This could take some time, but once the necessary documentation is ready we'll declare the process open and advertise the opportunity to the public.

At the conclusion of the EOI process, submissions will be evaluated and a report presented to Council before any further action is taken.

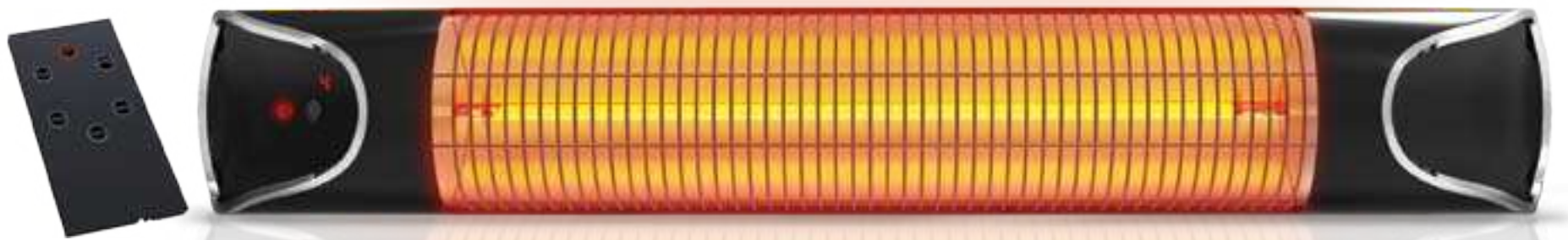


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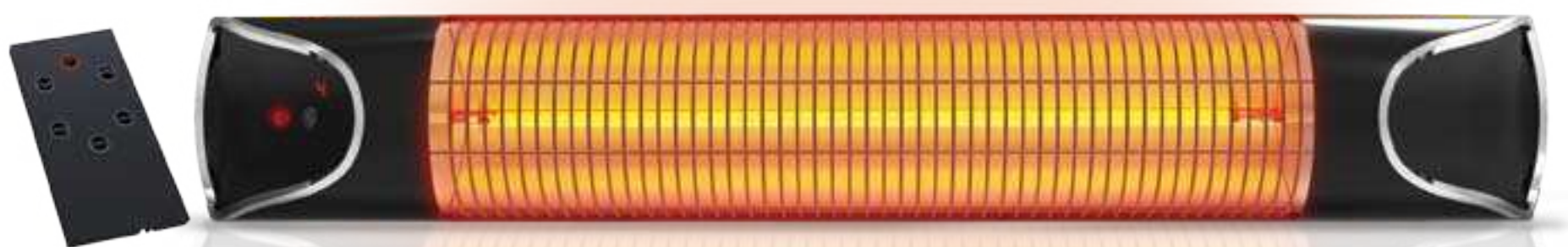
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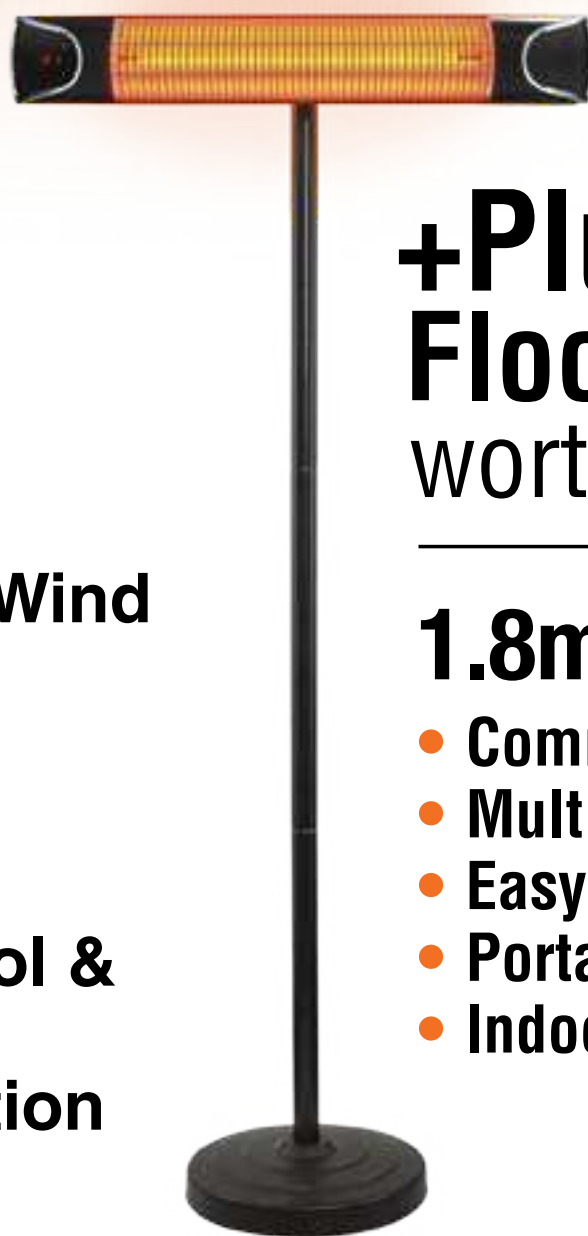
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Boat launch

"In a sense, I'm pleased it's all happened," he said.

"We can now get down to business and do what we do best which is giving people an immersive experience.

"I'm very passionate about giving our guests an immersive experience."

Mr Kinnon said The Pride of the Murray fits

in with the Kinnon & Co portfolio well.

"She has the story, she's got 98 years of stories—what a beautiful thing," he said.

No place like home

Julia Zemiro's *Home Delivery* goes for one last spin around the block with a fitting finale focusing on the host herself, writes **Siobhan Duck**

AFTER nine years, 76 celebrity guests and thousands of kilometres, it's the end of the road for Julia Zemiro's *Home Delivery*.

While it wasn't Zemiro's decision to put the brakes on the much-loved chat show, she respects the ABC's decision, shrugging: "everything has to end at some time."

In the final season, Zemiro talks to journalist Ray Martin, legendary singer Marcia Hines and choreographer/director Stephen Page about their formative years before four guest interviewers take the helm to lead Zemiro on her own trip down memory lane.

"I didn't go there willingly but, of course I was always going to do it," she says of filming her own story for the final episode.

"Over the years, people would often say to me: 'And Julia where would we take you if we did your *Home Delivery*?' I was dreading going back to my childhood home because my dad had recently died, and I knew I'd get upset and I did. But that's fine."

Zemiro suspects that the pandemic, coupled with the ABC's desire to chase a younger audience, was ultimately behind the decision to pull the pin.

Covid restrictions had made the travel component of the series increasingly challenging. Where once Zemiro was able to journey to England or Singapore to do whirlwind home tours with the likes of Bill Oddie and Lee Lin Chin, border closures could now make touring a neighbouring state – let alone another country – a logistical nightmare for the production.

"When we were filming the second last series, we normally do 10 episodes, but when we got to our eighth episode... Covid hit," she explains.

"So, we had to cancel the last two. Then there was this big break [in production due to the pandemic]."

"Many organisations started going: 'OK what's next?' So, maybe it was a circuit breaker [for the ABC]. You know, they always look at the shows that they've got and go: 'Do we have too many interview shows? Do we do something different? Do we want a younger audience?'"

"You know, I am 55 and this will be the ninth season. I do understand that at some point we need to give other people a go. You can't fight change. And luckily I have other jobs to go to."

Luck has nothing to do with it. Smart, funny and talented, Zemiro has carved out a niche for herself in the Australian entertainment industry.

It's also why her good friend Kitty Flanagan wrote the part of lawyer Roz Gruber in her hit comedy *Fisk* especially for Zemiro.

The acclaimed series about a

recently divorced lawyer (Flanagan) dealing with the dry minutia of the wills and probate law in a claustrophobic Melbourne practice has featured a stellar line-up of talent that includes Marty Sheargold, Denise Scott and, of course, Zemiro.

Although Zemiro has plenty of acting experience, she hadn't stretched those muscles since her French-speaking role in director Rachel Ward's 2013 movie *The Accidental Soldier*.

"I was quite nervous that I wouldn't be able to do it but she [Flanagan] is a very good director, and the scripts are hilarious and once I got the hang of it I was on my way," she says. "I'm really thrilled to be part of that show."

Comedies can be very risky propositions. And for every great success story, there are a good many more shows that fell flat with audiences.

"You never know what's going to work, right?" she says.

"So, every station has to kind of take a leap of faith."

"But, how much of a leap of faith is it with Kitty Flanagan? She's at the top of her game."

She's hilarious. She's a popular

stand-up comedian. She's been on all the shows. What I will say I've found fascinating is to be at my local pub with a group of men in their 60s and 50s who come from different kinds of walks of life all quoting lines back at me. And women are finding it funny, too. You don't know what's going to connect with people, but I am glad it has."

Home Delivery is also one of those shows which struck a particular chord with its audience. While there is no shortage of celebrity chat shows available on both free-to-air TV and the various streaming services, *Home Delivery*'s blend of nostalgia and travel offers a novel take on the genre.

The unique format could prove to be both a blessing and a curse for locking in guests. For starters, guests had to be of a certain age. Taking a

20-year-old back to the childhood home that they likely only just moved out of, doesn't exactly make for compelling television. Secondly, filming over long distances required a big commitment from guests.

"At the beginning of every season we would write down a kind of wish-list [of guests]," Zemiro says.

"We would approach them all and, look, sometimes people would write back themselves (or via their agent) saying: 'We love the show, but we're just not prepared to do it' because they didn't want to talk about it [their past] and you totally understand. You'd rather not have that person [who feels uncomfortable] anyway. Sometimes the ABC would suggest people and I would say 'no' because I knew I wasn't going to click with that

person...or maybe it was because I didn't like them because I had met them before."

Although sometimes people surprised her. Sport is the subject Zemiro is least interested in yet her interviews with Cathy Freeman, Raelene Boyle and Shane Gould were among those she found most inspiring. "I wanted to spend all weekend with those women," she laughs. "They were incredible."

From comedians to cooks and politicians to pop stars, Zemiro has had guests from all walks of life on her series. But there are three stars who eluded her.

"I would have liked to have done Russell Crowe and Cate Blanchett," she says. "But my impossible dream would have been the Icelandic singer Björk. If you're talking about place, I would have loved to have taken view through the incredible landscape that is Iceland, which is reflected in her songs. It's also a very female-forward country. She was a bit of a child star as well. I would have absolutely loved that."

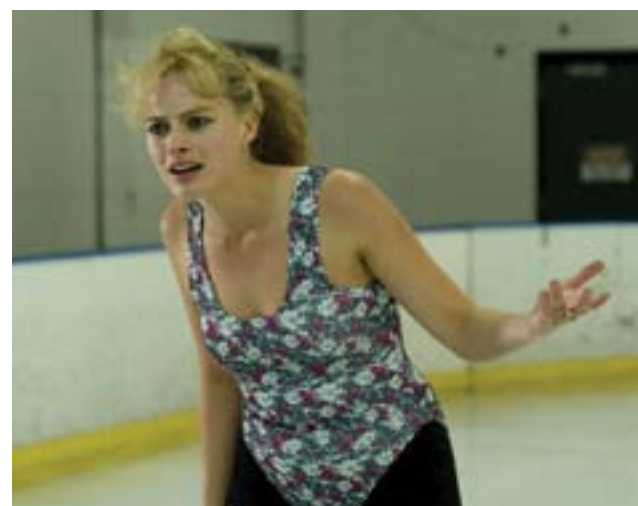
MURIEL'S WEDDING

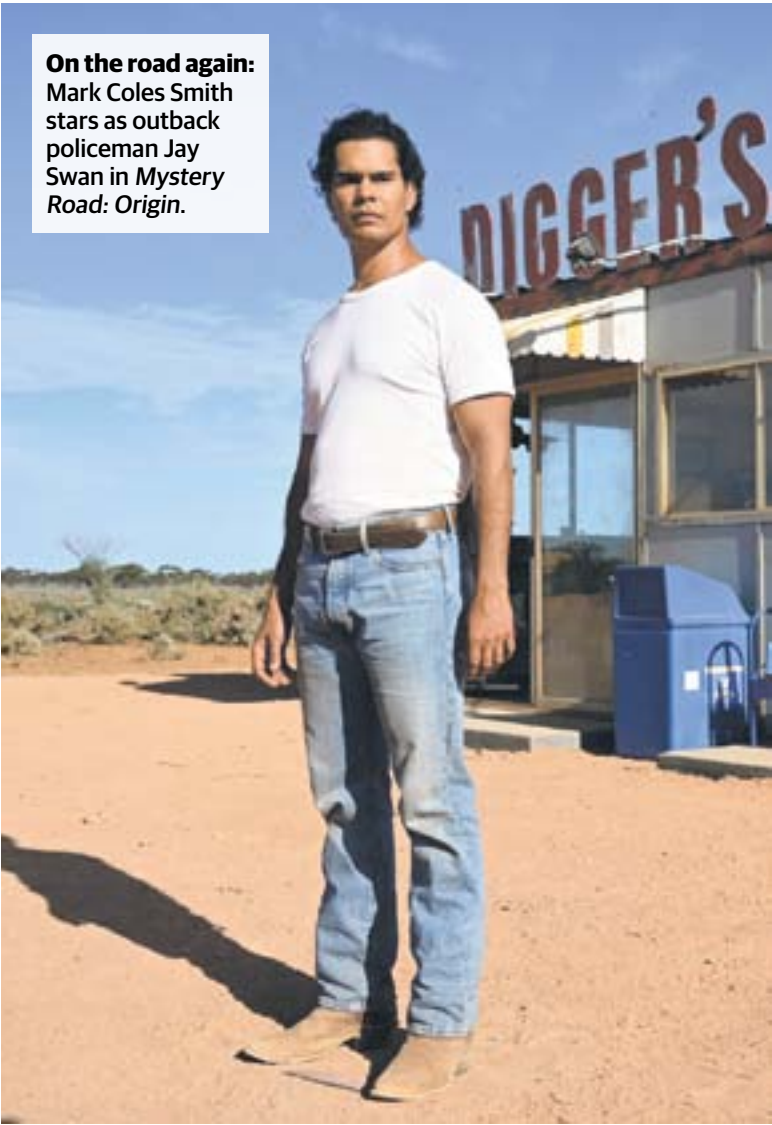
CELIA PACQUOLA: LET ME KNOW HOW IT ALL WORKS OUT

From shows such as *Redfern Now* and *Total Control*, to the inaugural First Nations’ journalists of the late ‘80s and ‘90s, to children’s show *MessageStick*, the power of storytelling is celebrated.

It's one thing to have a hit true-crime podcast – the intrigue, the adulation, the feeling that the answer could be just one piece of evidence away – but as Charles (Steve Martin) says in the new season of this playful crime-comedy, "You know it's very rare for a true-crime podcast to do a sequel. They usually move on to a new case that never hits like the original."

Hummingbirds wanderers

No matter where you live in Central Queensland there are a couple of spectacular flowering creepers that are just starting to become noticeable.

Places like the Jericho Drive-In or beside Foodworks in Tambo will have a very colourful display starting.

A few years ago during one of the joint military exercises at Shoalwater Bay, I received a very unusual phone call, from a US serviceman about a number of flowering plants seen around.

He had spent a good deal of his life in San Diego where a couple of our most spectacular flowering Creepers are also used to brighten the winter garden.

San Diego has a very similar climate to this region and most of the plants grown there are the same as here.

In fact, about a quarter of plant species found in San Diego nurseries is Australian native plants.

The two Creepers that had caught his eye as he called them were the Prince's Vine and the Flame Vine.

These Creepers are a favourite to San Diego's children as they attract the beautiful little Hummingbirds to the garden.

He told me that the number one requirement for a hummingbird garden is moving water, then rich nectar plants like the Prince's Vine or the Flame Vine and finally a viewing spot to watch these little birds hover and dart from flower to flower sipping nectar.

He told me the classic hummingbird flowers are trumpet-shaped blossoms as Hummingbirds have long tongues that can easily reach nectar that is too deep for other animals to reach.

The Prince's Vine or Ipomoea horsfalliae is sold in local nurseries under the same name but most gardeners would know this Creeper by the common name of the Cardinal Creeper.

The Flame Vine is sold as Pyrostegia venusta in San Diego, here in Queensland it is known as Pyrostegia ignea, or the Golden Trumpet Vine.

The Ipomoea horsfalliae or Cardinal Creeper is a Creeper that deserves to be planted in more Central Queensland gardens.

The Ipomoea is a fast-growing tropical Creeper for pergolas, growing along fences or walls or even as a trellis feature.

The dense lush tropical foliage of the Ipomoea forms a visible contrast to the Creeper's trumpet flowers.

This winter bloomer will become submerged in ruby red to magenta-violet flowers.

This native to Jamaica in the western Caribbean requires a protected well drain position.

The Ipomoea has proven to tolerate small periods of dry weather but it will suffer in frosty conditions.

Ipomoea horsfalliae was introduced to the US by the Hawaiian prince Prince Kuhio and that is why the common name for the Ipomoea horsfalliae in the US is the Prince's Vine.

In its natural environment, the Ipomoea needs the Hummingbirds to fertilise the seeds and this poses a problem here in Central Queensland.

All Ipomoea horsfalliae grown here are propagated by cuttings.

Also making a stunning display at the moment is the Pyrostegia ignea is one of the fastest-growing evergreen vines available to local gardeners and yet is far more manageable than many other slower-growing creepers available in the local nurseries.

With spectacular clusters of orange tubular flowers and its dense tropical green foliage, the Pyrostegia is perfect to add colour to a dull winter garden.

The Pyrostegia is a native of Southern Brazil, Northern Argentina and Paraguay and can be cultivated in most soil types, from heavy clays to sandy loam.

It requires minimal watering and can be correctly described as one of the better water-wise choices available.

I would always recommend pruning after flowering, as this will encourage more branching and even more flowers next year.

If you are growing this plant in a particularly frosty area, you will need to protect it from the frost, for example by positioning the plant along a protected fence area or wall.

In the last 20 years the Gerbera bauerii Noble Flora has almost disappeared from our gardens.

NWDAP sets goals

By National Wild Dog Action Plan

The National Wild Dog Action Plan Coordination Committee met in Canberra on June 15-16 to review the progress and provide strategic direction for the plan post-June 2022.

This industry-led committee has strong producer representation and includes members involved in research, extension and government policy.

Most of Australia's peak livestock industry councils are represented and have a dual role in overseeing the Plan as well as the Centre for Invasive Species National Wild Dog Coordination Project.

The daily operations, overseen by Australian Wool Innovation, are focused on supporting National Wild Dog Management Coordinator Greg Mifsud in his role to promote best-practice wild dog management.

The Coordination role promotes best practice management, increases awareness of risk assessment, and supports community-led activities initiating control programs or community group development in emerging areas without any processes in place.

Mr Mifsud told the committee the role had been successful due to the network and relationships developed across a landscape scale from ground level to regulators.

"A key outcome of this project is that angst, animosity, and frustration at a landholder level is taken out of the situation in most cases as people are much more informed and actively

involved in the decision-making at local, regional and state level," he said.

"The project itself intersects across a range of the Centre for Invasive Species Solutions (CISS) programs covering national best practice, and collaborative pathways to accelerate adoption."

As the longest-serving national feral animal coordinator, Mr Mifsud has provided support supervision and mentoring for the national feral pig, feral fox and cat, and deer coordinators.

National Feral Pig Action Plan Coordinator Dr Heather Channon and National Feral Cat and Fox Management Coordinator Gillian Basnett will join Mr Mifsud to speak with landholders, organisations and agencies on multi-species predator management at the Australian Sheep and Wool Show, Bendigo, on July 15-17.

"Stakeholders tell me there is a significant role for the Plan to provide the conduit between research, adaptive management and policy direction," Mr Mifsud said.

"The goals of the Plan are leadership within the community, tools and methods for best practice and increasing awareness and understanding about wild dogs, their impacts and management, and increasing adoption of best practice.

"The Plan does not control wild dogs but is a strategic document providing the basis for and supporting the management on-ground whilst having influence in terms of ongoing funding leading to wild dog management.

"A lot of focus in the last 10-15 years has been in the sheep and wool industry due to the immediate impact of dogs so moving forward there are opportunities to work on the impacts on the cattle industry and agriculture more broadly with demonstrations sites evaluating integrated multiple species management."

National Wild Dog Action Plan Coordination Committee member Scott Pickering called for support from Meat and Livestock Australia (MLA) for adoption programs of wild dog best practice management.

"We have best practice extension material, but we need people in the field able to talk and work with growers to deliver on-ground programs," Mr Pickering said.

"This should be achievable through producer demonstration sites and be a key target for MLA through their adoption program.

"The National Wild Dog Management Coordinator has been pivotal in achieving on-ground management in the rangelands, but further support will be required inside the agricultural areas where wild dogs are present and programs aren't well established."

Mr Pickering said the National Wild Dog Management Coordinator had generated significant benefits to livestock producers around the country, but wild dogs were becoming prevalent in new and emerging areas.

"That ongoing support through the National Wild Dog Action Plan of the Coordinator is still required."

Stop ‘hand to mouth’

A long-term, sustainable biosecurity funding pipeline to help protect agriculture, communities, the economy and the environment must be a top priority for the new Federal Government.

This was the message delivered by the NFF to the new Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry Minister, Senator Murray Watt at the first industry Ministerial roundtable in Canberra.

"Biosecurity isn't a catchy word, but it's an issue all Australians have a vested interest in," said NFF Vice President Daivd Jochinke.

"Significant incursions will not just impact agricultural value chains and market access but will have an impact across the whole economy.

"Right now, Australia's livestock and support sectors are working hard to prevent the possible incursion of Foot and Mouth Disease and/or Lumpy Skin Disease, with both diseases detected in Indonesian cattle.

"Government and industry are supporting our regional neighbours in the containment of both diseases and in the safeguarding our sector should there be an incursion on home soil.

"There has been a significant effort, both now and over the many years prior, to develop preparedness plans and programs. Just today, industry and Government met to progress the LSD National Action Plan. However, adequate investment is needed to bring these plans to life."

Mr Jochinke said the current threats were just the latest in a long line to bring into sharp focus how volatile Australia's \$80 billion agriculture sector was to potentially disastrous biosecurity outbreaks.

"Recently, grain growers shuddered as Khapra Beetle, a significant threat to stored grain, was detected in white goods packaging at a Canberra retail store," he said.

"A near miss that could have been avoided.

"While nothing is zero-risk, additional resources must be provided to ensure our biosecurity system is best placed to respond to changing risk profiles.

"We need to do better than tackling problems at the point of crisis. We must finalise the National Biosecurity Strategy, and deliver the investment required to strengthen our system.

"It's not just animals and crops at risk from biosecurity incursions but native flora and fauna.

"Australia is free from many exotic pests and diseases, that if allowed to infiltrate, could decimate our most precious natural environments.

"Our landscape is already under pressure from out-of-control populations of introduced animals like deer, pigs and foxes, which can also act as vectors for many dangerous diseases."

Numerous reviews have outlined areas where further investment is needed to strengthen Australia's biosecurity system. While previous Governments of all colours, have directed significant, yet ad hoc, investments to the problem, none have implemented a sustainable, long-term funding pipeline. Mr Jochinke said the NFF welcomed Labor's election commitment to address the problem and felt reassured the Minister understood the importance of biosecurity following his address at today's roundtable.

"Biosecurity must be a shared commonwealth-state priority," he said.

"States territories must also do their bit, through bolstered funding to secure monitoring and surveillance and on-the-ground strategies."

At the roundtable, the NFF also raised the priorities of sustainability, agriculture's role in a reduced emissions future and the farm sector's workforce crisis.

Wool Market reports a strong season

The Australian wool market has continued to strengthen, recording an overall increase for the third consecutive series.

The national offering was reduced, due in part to Fremantle having a non-sale week.

There were 29,807 bales on offer in Sydney and Melbourne, 5,550 fewer bales than in the previous week.

With only one sale remaining for the season, the total amount of wool offered this year is tracking well above the previous season.

Compared to the corresponding sale of the 2020/21 season there have been 109,889 more bales offered through the auction sys-

tem, an increase of 6.4 per cent. The strongest demand was in the medium to broad merino fleece types, and this was where the largest increases were felt.

The individual Micron Price Guides (MPGs) in Sydney and Melbourne for 19.5 to 22.0 micron increased by 10 to 63 cents for the series.

Falls in some of the finer MPGs combined with minimal movements in the skirting, crossbred and oddment sectors resulted in a 7-cent rise in the AWEX Eastern Market Indicator (EMI).

The EMI closed the week at 1,474 cents.

The EMI has risen for the previous three weeks, adding a total of 60 cents over this period, a 4.2 per cent rise.

The EMI is now at its highest point since March 2020.

With the larger volumes and higher prices seen this year the total dollar amount of wool sold is also tracking well above the previous season.

At the conclusion of this series, the total dollar amount of wool sold for the season was \$2,556.7 million, compared to \$2,189.1 million for the same time last season, an increase of \$377.6 million.

Next week is the final sale of the 2021/22 season. Fremantle returns to the selling roster, bolstering the national offering.

Currently, there is expected to be 45,003 bales on offer with all three centres in operation.

Continued investment in water welcomed

The Queensland Farmers' Federation (QFF) and its members have welcomed the Queensland Government's ongoing commitment to prioritising water security for the state, with \$510 million announced for water infrastructure and planning, which will allow growth and jobs in regional communities.

Of the \$510 million, \$447 million will be set aside for water security projects ranging from the Toowoomba to Warwick Pipeline project, the Cairns Water Security program, the rebuilding of Paradise Dam; and the Flinders Shire Council's Hughenden Water Bank project (a 7000 megalitre, off-stream water storage and distribution system), to support the future sustainability of irrigated agriculture, regional economies, and communities.

QFF also welcomes funding for further work to be undertaken in the Rural Water Fu-

tures program, which has allowed irrigators to provide valuable input into the sustainable management of water through innovative technological applications.

Prioritising water security sets a strong message to the agricultural sector, that the state government is ready to get serious about climate change and assess what these changes will mean for the future of our farmers.

Water and food security need to be front and centre of any decisions going forward in Queensland.

QFF CEO Jo Sheppard said, "water security is an essential factor for Queensland's agriculture sector to continue growing world-class food, fibre and foliage and unlocking new opportunities into the future."

"We have farmers producing world-class food who have endured intense drought and flood events over the past ten years, and we

need to focus on prioritising future water security to underpin the future of farming across the state.

"Water is our most precious commodity, and continual investment in water efficiency programs, innovative farm technologies, critical infrastructure, and prioritising water security in regional Queensland is required to enable our agricultural sector to continue to supply our local and export markets and drive economic growth in Queensland.

"The Budget announcements have also included an additional \$10 million to be invested over two years as part of the Queensland Microgrid Pilot Fund with a view to enabling energy independence and building capacity in regional and remote communities.

"QFF supports initiatives that work closely with industry and community to develop energy security, affordability and a continued focus on driving on-farm energy efficiency."

Never been a better time to ‘beef up’

Pumpkin and Chickpea Coconut Curry

Serves: 6

Prep time: 10 minutes

Cook time: 20 minutes

3 serves per portion

Ingredients:

- 2 tablespoons sunflower oil
- 1 large brown onion, chopped
- 4cm knob of ginger, grated
- 4 garlic cloves, crushed

Method:

- HEAT oil in large pan over medium heat.
- ADD onion, ginger, garlic and curry paste. Stir until aromatic, around 2 minutes.

- 2 tablespoons yellow curry paste
- 2 x 400g cans chickpeas, drained and rinsed
- 400mL can coconut milk
- 2 cups cooked pumpkin, mashed
- 1 cup vegetable stock, salt reduced
- 2 limes, juiced
- ¾ cup fresh coriander leaves, chopped

- STIR in chickpeas, coconut milk, pumpkin and vegetable stock. Do not allow to boil, just slow simmer until heated through.
- ADD lime juice to taste and serve with sprinkle of coriander.

Lamb Souvlaki with Cucumber Salad

Serves: 4

Prep time: 30 minutes + 20 chill time

Cook time: 15 minutes

2 serves per portion

Ingredients:

- 500g lamb mince
- 1 small onion, very finely chopped
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- Handful of flatleaf parsley and mint, finely chopped
- Cracked black pepper
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 4 medium pita breads
- ½ head iceberg lettuce, shredded
- 2 tomatoes, diced
- 2 tablespoons fresh dill, chopped

Cucumber Salad:

- Juice of half a lemon
- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
- ½ cup Greek yoghurt
- 2 small Lebanese cucumbers, diced
- 2 tablespoons feta, crumbled

Method:

- SOAK 8 wooden skewers in cold water for 30 minutes. Meanwhile, mix the lamb, onion, garlic, herbs and pepper in a large bowl. Using wet hands, shape the lamb mixture around the soaked skewers and sit them in the fridge for 20 minutes.
- PREPARE the cucumber salad by combining the lemon juice, olive oil and yoghurt in a small bowl. Stir in the cucumber and crumbled feta. Set aside.
- HEAT a frying pan over medium heat and add a drizzle of olive oil once hot.
- FRY the lamb souvlaki in two batches, for about 3-4 minutes each side, until cooked through and slightly charred.
- WIPE down the pan then lightly toast the pita breads.
- SPREAD some of the feta yoghurt and cucumber salad onto each pita then top with the lettuce, lamb and tomato and garnish with dill.

Alpha lived up to hopes

The Alpha Jockey Club Alpha Community Cup Race Day certainly lived up to its name on Saturday with some 3,000 patrons flocking onto the beautifully prepared grounds for a great seven-event program.

This race meeting has grown in stature since the rebirth of the Alpha Jockey Club and is one of the jewels in the crown of country racing, particularly for young people who flock to the course for the overnight entertainment as well as the race day.

The amount of volunteer work that goes into presenting the day is a credit to the Alpha community and was well rewarded on Saturday with such a huge attendance.

The Alpha Cup - worth a total of \$30,000 - did not let the big crowd down, when favourite Burden, trained by Clinton Austin and ridden by Robbie Faehr, basically led the whole journey to complete a strong win by a length over the fast-finishing No Innuendo, with some four lengths back in third place going to Past Tense—which at one point would have been close to 25 lengths off the leader in the back straight.

The track had played fairly heavy for the first three metres from the rail to three-out-on-the-track during most of the day, and a lot of jockeys were looking for outside running to get the better going, but Faehr - from barrier one - adopted the tactic of pushing forward to the lead, a role Burden has not played in previous starts.

From the get-go, Burden and Louie the Legend paired off as they entered the back straight with 1200 metres to run; this pair established a good clip in front, and Burden continued to maintain the pressure up front and maintain the lead as they went down the back straight, as No Innuendo that was travelling well back in the field, yet Past Tense had tailed right off—not enjoying the conditions.

As they came to the home straight, Burden had shaken off Louie the Legend, and Robbie Faehr - desperate to produce an all-the-way win with the favourite - rode strongly through the line as No Innuendo challenged equally strong in the straight.

Burden came off a strong win in Longreach last Sunday, and this galloper, that ran a placing at the placing in the Longreach Cup in September last year, is well on the way to a strong performance again for the cup races in the remainder of the year.

The day belonged to trainer Boy Forster and jockey Tim Brummell who scored a treble on the day.

They commenced proceedings with a race-to-race double, firstly with Prized Artist taking the QTIS Maiden Plate over 1200 metres—when Prized Artist positioned well on the pace was able to skip clear from Typhoon Talayah coming into the straight and Kukinta making ground from back in the field.

Prized Artist and Typhoon Talayah settled down to fight out the finish with only a nose separating the two, and Prized Artist grabbed the win right on the line on the outside from Typhoon Talayah and Kukinta taking third place.

In the following race the Class B Handicap, Bittersweet Pluck - who had only just won its maiden race start in Barcaldine - gave the combination jockey-trainer a race-to-race double.

Bittersweet Pluck had moved up strongly in the back of the straight at the 800-metre mark to tackle for the lead and was able to keep going in the home straight after being challenged by Nitt Whitt for David Rewald and Patrick O'Toole and favourite Star Twinkle was in a good position approaching the home turn with Red Zorro also challenging.

Bittersweet Pluck proved too strong in the run to the line, almost winning by two lengths over Red Zorro with Nitt Whitt holding on for third position.

The third winner for that combination - and the third win resulting in Tim Brummell and Boy Forster winning both the jockey and trainer of the day prizes - came when Asbury Park took in the Class 3 Handicap over 1000 metres.

Asbury Park is known for launching from the gates and likes to lead in its races and that strategy was no different on Saturday, with the galloper showing a wing on every hoof and leading clearly into the home straight, and Tim Brummell was looking confidently over his shoulder to see where the opposition was.

Eventually, Asbury Park ran out a strong winner over Curic by a length-and-a-quarter, with a length-and-a-half back to King Coni in third place.

Asbury Park has produced several strong wins of late and is in career-best form for the Boy Forster team.
