Based in Marmor, Laura's efforts have been recognised with her receiving the Queensland's Rural Regional Remote Women's Network, Young Woman of the Year.

"I was actually in Sarina because I had the CQ SubChamber Showgirl finals, so mum and I were in a hotel room and participating via zoom," she said.

"There were two finalists in the young women's division with the other girl from Tambo. I remember rushing to turn my camera on when I heard my name called.

"Mum rushed to call dad, who is currently working FIFO in Western Australia; we were all

Laura didn't think she would be the winner of the Young Woman of the Year, saying, "there are a lot of young regional or remote women doing amazing things.

"I care about my community, so I like to put my hand up," she said.

"But there are women in every rural town who does this; I'm not special.

"They don't do it for the accolades, but we should find a way to recognise them and all they do."

Outside of her studies as a Bachelor of Physiotherapy student at CQUniversity, Laura is a volunteer firefighter and emergency services responder.

She is also kept busy as a passionate pole fitness instructor and currently does strapping and injuring management with the Capras.

"I also founded The Rural Conversation. a social media platform to advocate for rural and remote Australian businesses, education, telecommunications and health care.

"At university, I was told I was too smart and pretty to be from the bush, which is not how it works, so I thought if social media is where

Another grouping of people who said they had been strongly affected were low-income earners as Simstock Rural Agencies owneroperator Richard Simpson said.


"Going forward it will be a huge struggle for wage earners in the outback," he said

Doctors under the pump

Recent studies have shown general practices in patient numbers during the Covid pandemic from March 2019 to March 2022.

The stats showed: an 11.5 per cent increase in chronic disease management, a 10.6 per cent increase in mental health care, and a 4.8 per cent increase in health assessments.

This increase in services has taken place while GPs, ACCHOs and GP Respiratory Clinics administered more than 5.3 million doses of Covid-19 vaccines in Queensland from February 2021 to March 2022.

GPs. ACCHOs, and GP Respiratory Clinics continue to deliver Covid-19 vaccinations on a day-to-day basis, while also stepping up to deliver influenza vaccinations this winter.

Northern Queensland PHN (NQPHN) Chief Executive Officer Robin Whyte said GPs and practice staff, along with Indigenous health workers, have all played a critical role during the Covid-19 pandemic response.

"These latest figures acknowledge the leadacross Queensland have seen a notable increase ership role taken, and volume of activity delivered, by general practices and ACCHOs during the pandemic," Ms Whyte said. "GPs, and practice staff such as managers, nurses, and receptionists, as well as Indigenous health workers, have been nothing short of inspirational. "The way they have responded to the demands of the pandemic, doing their job in a really professional way, while also managing an increase in 'business as usual' services, has provided a pillar of strength for our communities."

> NOPHN Clinical Council Chair and General Practitioner Dr Konrad Kangru said that general practice had adapted during the pandemic to ensure continuity of service for its patients.

> "We've had to be agile and responsive to changes, managing increasing demand by opening after hours and on weekends and, when necessary, utilising telehealth where clinically appropriate and not just diverting resources," Dr Kangru said.

Support for mental health

"Often due to a lack of access to services, isolation, and mental health literacy many don't have the understanding of the challenges in mental health people have in outback communities," said Outback Futures CEO Brent Sweeney.

Outback Futures has been delivering mental health services to rural and remote communities for over 10 years, and while Governmental support has improved, Mr Sweeney believes there is still much to be achieved.

"We take an intergenerational approach to mental health and well-being," he said.

"We work with young people, particularly with the view of setting up their life for success and wellbeing in the long term.

"That's instead of waiting for people to be stuck with depression, anxiety, or other mental health challenges—we want to get on the front foot and help build community capacity to deal with those challenges.

"More specifically, Outback Futures often lobbies for infrastructural improvements for communities, such as roads; poor infrastructure can often lead to greater feelings of isolationism." Mr Sweeney said his team's work was centred around long-term solutions.

"Whilst we do mental health service deliveries - we have psychologists and counsellors and other allied health professionals such as speech therapists, occupational therapists - we noticed that to change the dial on these challenges, it will be a 10 or a 20-year project," he said.

"It's not just about having a reactive service.

"For it to work you need to have the support for the people now - counselling etc - but you've also got to have a plan to help families and communities to put these pieces in place so there will be fewer issues down the track."

Mr Sweeney said there had been large gains in the past decade, particularly in the bush where, he said, there has been a reluctance to seek help in the past.

"I think there is a willingness to have the conversation more now than before," he said.

"But there is still work to be done in that space—still some enormous challenges in building thriving communities in the bush."

He said governmental investment has been welcome, but often solutions can be very city-

"There is a failure to recognise that there can be a three-hour drive for someone to get to one of our centres," he said.

"That's just not going to be a reality for some people.

"There are some systemic and structural problems with the way it's funded and supported

"We always want to highlight there are some great people and great organisations out there doing some great work.

"But if you look at the big picture on how we want to tackle this in the long term, we need a change in government policy around who and how people can access that support."

While more has been done for people living in rural areas in terms of mental health, many new challenges have arisen of the past few years; Mr Sweeney noted the speed of life.

"I'm a city person - I grew up rurally and live in the city - and the perception of the bush is that there's more time, people will stop and chat with their neighbours, it's more relaxed and people look out for each other," he said

"And that's true—particularly during times of crises; but the reality is now, people are run-

ning businesses, and they're working hard, they're doing big hours.

"I think that sense of connection and bush spirit can wane.

"I think those themes around mateship and community were more automatic historically, what worries me now, is that communities have to be much more intentional."

These effects have taken place due to a number of reasons according to Mr Sweeney.

"Where community bonding was once necessary for survival, it's not as prevalent as what it was 40 or 50 years ago," he said.

"Some of those things that drive a sense of community such as the sporting events, and there are still some of those things around.

"There's not the volume of it—some of them are almost non-existent.

"We genuinely believe that 80 per cent of mental health problems can be dealt with around connections and great relationships.

"There's still that need for therapy, but the connection to the community is also important."

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If you're sick, stay home

The Central West has experienced a spike in Covid-19 case numbers over the past week.

We believe the increase in numbers resulted from a number of public or social gatherings held across the region last week.

With Covid-19 still prevalent in the Central West and across Queensland, and the virus continuing to mutate, it is important people remain vigilant and responsive by staying home when sick, washing their hands regularly, keeping their distance from others where possible, and wearing a face mask when they can't.

These measures, combined with remaining up to date with your Covid-19 and influenza vaccinations, can minimise the spread of these viruses and reduce the risk of serious illness.

Seven new cases of Covid-19 have been reported in the Central West over the past 24 hours.

Allowing for cases discharged after completing isolation, the total number of active cases currently in the region is 47.

Two cases are currently hospitalised.

All remaining active cases are receiving care in the Virtual Ward.

No further details will be provided due to confidentiality.

To date, accounting for those who have been discharged from quarantine, the Central

West HHS has recorded 937 cases of COVID-19 since the first case on 22 December.

With our Covid-19 vaccination rates amongst the highest in the state and fewer people requiring vaccination, Central West Health is returning to business as usual from this week

As a result, our centralised Covid-19 vaccination booking call centre on 1800 953 703 is now no longer functioning and staff are returning to normal duties.

However, we are continuing to offer vaccinations to all who need them, and bookings can continue to be made through your local multipurpose health service or primary health

COVID-19 and influenza vaccinations also are being offered through the Blackall, Winton and Longreach general practices.

Following national recommendations, a third booster dose of Pfizer has now been approved for young people aged 12-15 years who are immuno-compromised, have disabilities with significant health needs or who have complex conditions that put them at severe risk of Covid.

The fourth dose of Covid-19 vaccine—either Pfizer or Moderna – already is recommended nationally to increase protection for adults aged 65 years and older, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people aged 50 years and older, residents of aged care or disability care facilities, and people aged 16 years and older who are severely immune-compromised or have complex medical conditions that put them at severe risk of Covid.

This also includes people who need medication to manage their diabetes and other chronic health conditions.

While our first and second dose Covid-19 vaccination rates are excellent, we also have a very high booster (third dose) rate of 72 per cent.

However, we are noticing a much slower turnout for the fourth dose for vulnerable groups. We urge people for whom the fourth dose is recommended to come and have it for maximal protection.

We are also keen to see far more people take up this year's seasonal influenza vaccination. Queensland's Chief Health Officer has warned that we should treat influenza-like Covid-19.

We, therefore, need our communities to turn out like they did for the Covid-19 vaccination and have their influenza vaccinations as soon as possible.

Influenza vaccination is recommended for all people aged six months or older.

Up to 3 July, the latest available statistics, the Central West has recorded 84 cases of laboratory-confirmed influenza and we have had eight people hospitalised to date.

Vaccination remains our best protection against both the Covid virus and the influenza virus

You need to be vaccinated every year to keep yourself protected because influenza strains change annually, and you will not be immune to these new strains which are covered in this year's vaccine.

It's just a few minutes of your time and it saves you from the risk of possibly becoming very sick if you catch the flu.

Old Aramac and Alpha hospital history preserved

Scale models of the old Aramac and Alpha hospitals and associated buildings will be built and made available for the local communities to access and view.

Central West Hospital and Health Service Chief Executive Chris Sullivan said the health service recognised the deep sense of connection and history the old health facilities brought to their communities.

"That's why we decided to commission these models to memorialise the old hospitals once it became evident that preserving the old buildings was impossible due to numerous structural issues identified by extensive independent and engineering reports," he said.

The old Aramac hospital was replaced by a new \$4.1 million primary health centre in April 2018, while the old Alpha Hospital was replaced by a new \$17.5 million multipurpose health service facility in June 2016.

"Although most of the old Alpha Hospital buildings were structurally beyond economical repair, we saved the former doctor's house, which is now the Director of Nursing accommodation," Mr Sullivan said.

"We were also able to donate the original outdoor skillion to the Alpha Community Jockey Club.

"At Aramac, and at the request of the community, a memorial pavilion was erected at the new Aramac PHC to commemorate former Matron Winifred Stamp.

"The health service also moved features of the old Aramac complex, including the Brolga sculpture and pavers, to the new site and features of the old Alpha complex, including the 'Aphrodite Greek Goddess' water fountain statue, to the new Alpha site.

"But we also promised both the Alpha and Aramac communities we would look at other ways of memorialising the old health facilities, which is what we are doing with the commissioning of scale models of each hospital."

Mr Sullivan said Central West Health had engaged architectural designer Momake Models to create diorama scale models of both the old Aramac and Alpha hospitals and buildings.

"Momake Models will use high-definition site images to create the scale models, which will then be made available for permanent display in each community," he said.

"We are also working closely with Barcaldine Regional Council to identify safe and practical locations for each display once the models are completed in the coming months.

"While display details are still to be finalised for the Alpha model, we have agreed the completed Aramac model will be installed at the Aramac Library (Ollie Landers Community Library).

"We expect the Aramac model will be the first to be finished in October this year, followed by Alpha sometime after."

The Aramac and Alpha communities will be advised when the models are completed and placed on display and opening ceremonies are arranged.

For background, a series of professional and independent surveys and reports that were received last year identified multiple defects in the old Aramac and Alpha hospital buildings, as well as the presence of very significant levels of asbestos and other hazardous materials.

The results of the reports were presented to community consultation sessions at Aramac and Alpha, which were attended by numerous stakeholders, including community members, advisory networks, and the Barcaldine Regional Council.

All options, including local government acquisition, repurposing, and moving were analysed and discussed during the community consultation sessions.

However, the financial costs to the health service and ongoing costs to the local community to retain and preserve the old hospital buildings were deemed too great and unsustainable. Stakeholders attending the consultation sessions at both Aramac and Alpha supported the scheduling of the safe demolition of the old buildings and removal of associated hazardous materials.

Q-Build is managing the safe demolition of the old health facility buildings and removal of hazardous materials at both Alpha and Aramac on behalf of Queensland Health, with contractual discussions with sub-contractors currently being finalised to allow work to start.

In the interim, the buildings are being managed and maintained in line with Queensland Government safety and security regulations.

Both the State and Federal Governments have committed to providing a further \$170 million to public infrastructure in Queensland to help "build back" after the 2021-22 disaster season.

Federal Minister for Emergency Management, Senator the Hon Murray Watt said the funding was made available through the jointly-funded Commonwealth-State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) and that councils from all over Queensland would benefit from stronger infrastructure.

"This \$170 million available in Betterment funding is the largest ever made available in a single disaster season in Queensland with \$150 million directly targeting local government areas seeking to build back better following the extraordinary flooding events of 2021-22," Minister Watt said

"From Cook in the north to Diamantina in the west, through to the Gold Coast in the south, natural disasters have impacted Queensland communities in all corners of the state in 2021-22 and now they have the opportunity to build damaged infrastructure back better," Minister Watt said.

"The Betterment Fund will increase the resilience of vulnerable assets, helping communities maintain their connectedness and reduce hardship during and after disaster events in the future.

"The funding will allow applicable councils and state agencies to improve key assets such as causeways, culverts, roads and bridges to better withstand the impacts of natural disasters."

Trade deal

Strong climate policy can help deliver Australian farmers a great trade deal with the EU, Farmers for Climate Action CEO Dr Fiona Davis said

"Australia's beef, lamb and dairy farmers will directly benefit from such a deal," she said.

"EU Trade Commissioner Valdis Dombrovskis has now clearly stated climate change targets will be part of any trade deal between Australia and the EU. The EU has much more ambitious climate targets than Australia—55 per cent below 1990 levels by 2030.

"The EU Trade Commissioner has also made it clear that Australia's farmers may face trade sanctions if Australia does not catch up on climate. The EU and other markets have warned of a carbon border tariff on Australia unless we catch up on climate and now this is becoming reality.

"Let's not miss the opportunity to seal a great trade deal for our farmers by pushing deep emissions reductions this decade. Strong climate policy creates strong regional economies and tens of thousands of regional jobs

"The farmers who grow our food do not deserve to be punished for the emissions of the energy and transport sectors.

"Farmers have been waiting for better access to the huge EU market for years. We want bigger quotas for our beef, lamb and dairy farmers."

Blackall-Tambo budget statement

Blackall-Tambo Regional councillors approved the budget for 2022-23 at a special meeting recently.

Mayor Andrew Martin, said council was pleased to present a balanced budget which would approve an expenditure of \$40.3 million over the 2022–23 period for operational, capital works and services throughout the region.

Council voted for an increase of four per cent in general rates and service charges including water, sewerage and cleansing.

Council has also approved the clearance

of all debts.

Council has provided for two discount periods upon issuing of relevant rate notices.

A 15 per cent discount applies if payment is received by council within 30 days after the issue of rates and a 7.5 per cent discount for the second discount period if payment is received within 45 days after the issue date.

The remission of general rates and services for eligible pensioners remains unchanged.

The capital works program of \$8 million

includes renewal and upgrade of community and economic infrastructure, town and rural road works and an internal plant replacement program.

Councillor Martin concluded by stating that the current Council will continue to manage assets, improve efficiencies, to continue to create a liveable community now and into the future, noting the strongest financial position for Blackall-Tambo Regional Council in more than a decade.

The budget documents will be published on Council's website.

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Fees waived for rescuers

The Rockhampton Regional Council has reimbursed more than \$166,000 in landing fees for the Royal Flying Doctor Service and RACQ Capricorn Helicopter Rescue Service.

Rockhampton Region Mayor Tony Williams and Deputy Mayor Neil Fisher, chair of the Rockhampton Airport, dropped into the RFDS hangar on Aviation Drive on Wednesday, 29 June to present cheques for \$123,269.24 to the RFDS and \$43,525.75 to RACQ CapRescue

Cr Fisher described the donations as "our small gift to two wonderful services".

"For 20 years now it's been a tradition for the council to reduce landing fees for both groups," he said.

"These organisations provide a great assistance to all of Central Queensland, not just the Rockhampton region but our friends and families in the west."

Cr Fisher said he challenged other regional airports to "come to the party" and do the same thing.

"It's not a big effort in the scheme of things, but it's something that supports regional Queensland and something we take quite a lot of pride in doing.'

In the past year, RFDS landed 1726 times at Rockhampton Airport, transported a total of 2720 patients and flew more than 1,5 million kilometres.

In the same period, RACQ CapRescue has conducted 462 rescues, transferred 340 patients and flew 674 hours.

Roval Flying Doctor Service nurse manager Claire Hilder said the contribution helped the RFDS provide essential services in Oueensland.

'We're getting busier every year and and just having the support of council to waive those fees is a huge benefit."

RACQ CapRescue executive director Mark Fewtrell said the introduction of the more advanced AW139 helicopter last year had increased their capabilities - which meant an

increase in costs.

"Our rate of tasking has increased by just short of 25 per cent in 12 months and is predicted to keep on increasing," he said.

"Forty per cent of our funding comes from the community, but donations of a significant nature like this are really hard to come by and are most appreciated."

Young mum grateful for the life-saving RFDS

Jessica Allen-Armstrong says she and her daughter Amanii wouldn't be alive today without the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

RFDS crews have come to Jessica's rescue twice - a Rockhampton crew in 2019 while she was pregnant with Amanii and a Brisbane-based crew in 2021 after she went into cardiac arrest in Gladstone.

"In 2019 they found I had a leaky valve and an irregular heartbeat. My heart was dilated by 58 per cent and I had fainted and had a bit of a seizure, so they flew me to the Royal Brisbane Hospital," she said.

"Last year in August I had a cardiac arrest on the side of the rugby field and they flew me from Gladstone to the Prince Charles Hospital in Brisbane."

While she was put into an induced coma before her flight in 2021, Jessica says she remembers everything about her trip

"I was actually on the same flight with my neighbour - it's a small world," she re-

"It was like any other plane ride but awkward at first because you're laying down instead of sitting in a seat.

"There was no nausea at all, the flight nurses constantly kept you calm, you felt very very safe with them there."

Jessica said it was an amazing experience to tour the RFDS hangar in Rockhampton and met the pilots and flight crew members who had helped her.

"The world would be a "completely different place" with the work of the Royal Flying Doctor Service. I can tell you now both me and my daughter wouldn't be here if it wasn't for them," she said.

"We're so lucky to have this facility in such a small town like Rockhampton, the work these guys do is just phenomenal.

CATALOGUES GETTING WET?



Lady Louka won the Cup

History what a wonderful thing to have to cherish, to love or to fear or hate, but it is a record of time and place of previous events.

Rockhampton Racing public records have been made available, and with it, the history of Callaghan Park Racing for the past 125 years beautifully researched documents from each year are available at the Rockhampton Jockey

100 years ago on Monday, 19 June 1922, a mare from central west Queensland came to Rockhampton after winning the Foy Cup in Aramac, she carried 11 stone two pounds as a grass eater in April and then on full feed went on to win the Rockhampton Cup as an outsider at name your own price.

Her name was Lady Louka owned by Mr William McIver of Widgeman (Aboriginal Name "Good Man") and lived on a property near Lake Dunn north of Aramac about 120 miles and Jericho 140 miles.

She was bred by McIver when he mated Louka with Flying Machine who was doing stud duties at Bexley Station, Longreach.

She was trained in Barcaldine by Mr George H. Leyburn. The 1922 Rockhampton Cup Race for the first time was valued at 1000 pounds - a huge sum - and was linked to the Victorian Tattersall Sweep with the Rockhampton Cup being the decider.

So after scratchings, the race had 13 starters for the 144-mile race on the sand track.

Betrayer started favourite at 2 to 1, there was a rope start and there was one false start, and after a little delay, the field of 13 horses was sent away.

Jockeys riding in the race were acknowledged as among the best with one from Victoria and three from New South Wales.

Humphrey Clinker took charge and opened up a nice break down the back straight with Lady Louka close up.

She gradually worked to the lead and stayed in front and won by 34 of a lengthwell ridden—by Lindsay Marshall a 13-year-old lad at the lightweight of four stone seven pounds.

The Whalan, 2nd, just beat Humprey Clinker, 3rd, and the favourite, Betrayer finished some distance behind them. The time for the race was two minutes 9 /4 seconds.

Mr William McIver threw in for a good win on the mare he bred and this prompted a rule change to be made after the race to a minimum weight of 7 stone for jockeys!

Mr William McIver is remembered by his descendants for travelling to Sydney sales and buying horses and putting the stallions over his station marks.

They would come by rail to Jericho and be unloaded and released on the common reserve until it was time to walk them home to Widgeman Station.

Curly Anderson is remembered as the man to walk them home.

After the win of the Rockhampton Cup Lady Louka was unloaded at Jericho and set loose on the common until the next lot of McIver's horses were ready to make the trip home.

She was mated a few times but never got in foal. The Barcaldine trainer George Leyburn was born in Bathurst and was always handy with horses and his hands and chased work in sawmills.

He joined the circus in Leyburn to attend to the horses and the staff named him George from Leyburn later shortened to George Leyburn and his trainer's license was issued as Leyburn

His name was in fact, George Henry Rose.

When he arrived in Barcaldine, he met his future wife Lotti Kuder who worked at Kuder's Union Hotel, and where he started training horses in stables behind the Union Hotel.

They married and had four children, three boys and one girl, and these memories were handed down and recalled along with reports from The Morning Bulletin's records.

Sadly, George Rose died in 1925 from a kidney disorder aged 38 years and is buried in the Barcaldine cemetery.

He died leaving behind a young wife and four children—what a battle it must have been to survive for his wife Lotti and children.

Another generous slice of local Ilfracombe life

Since I started writing Ilfracombe Inklings, I've tried to provide little slice-of-life snippets from where I live - which is part of the old Ilfracombe Shire - so I felt a column about our post office and illustrious postmistresses would be in order.

An important slice of our lives over the years has been our interaction with the post office

We have had several dedicated postmistresses (they've pretty much been female in my time), including our current one.

The Ilfracombe Post Office is one of the twin hearts of our community, including the Wellshot pub, which has recently won a much-deserved reward; though I'll save the pub for another day.

My first contact with the post office was via Ruth, the postmistress when the better half and I were corresponding during our courtship and in the months we were separated, early in our marriage.

She followed our story with interest and was delighted to finally welcome me in person when I arrived in Australia.

Another fond memory is of the public library part of the post office, where my children enjoyed many happy hours in early childhood, looking through picture books and playing with the toys that used to be there.

When the local playgroup borrowed toys from the Longreach group, they would stay at the library for all to use in non-playgroup times

It was a far less taxing trip for toddlers than the 150 km round trip to Longreach and provided a lovely break for all three of

Over the years the role of the post office expanded to include offering the only free Wi-Fi connection in town, banking facilities and a local shop—the latter role being particularly welcomed after the general store burned to the ground.

But it's providing mail service that makes it vital, especially for those who live out of town or who are unable to make their way to Longreach easily.

Many times a delivery company has had





difficulty finding us out here, but when we ask them to simply post a parcel to Ilfracombe it would always find us. Every time.

It's hard to get lost in the shuffle of bureaucracy in a small community, where everyone knows everyone else.

And of course, it's a historically significant site... part of the first motorised mail

It's also part of our family history, with an uncle serving as a postman for many years.

I suspect it's part of the family history of

I can't speak highly enough of the services offered at the Ilfracombe Post Office.

Our current postmistress goes far beyond the call of duty and enhances both the reputation of Australia Post and the town with her efforts.

It is an investment in the community which is deeply appreciated.

If you're going past, I suggest you drop in and say g'day and maybe offer some thanks for the services.

I know I'm going to, the next time I head to town.

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How did you end up in Winton?

I started training to be a teacher a little later than most after working around the state, including station work at Quilpie and Sarina. As I had grown up in Taroom and enjoyed country life, I applied for Winton on graduation and was posted here in the late 1970s and early 1980s. I met Bente here and we purchased a house and have never really left. We are hoping to celebrate a 50-year association with Winton in a couple of years.

What is the best advice you've ever received?

The best advice I have ever received is 'think before you speak". Not that it always happens mind you but I wish it did.

What is something you do in your spare

I enjoy leather work including repairing whips and writing.

What is your favourite place in the Central West?

Winton has to be our favourite place in the Central West. Why? The people are terrific and there is a very strong sense of community. There is always something going on. We have very interesting people visit our town.

What would you consider your greatest achievement?

I know it is not my achievement alone but having a wonderfully full life with Bente has been a great thing to do.

Certainly, Lasance's latest series The Secrets She Keeps proves you can never judge a person's life from the outside, particularly in those heavily filtered Instagram posts.

Lasance steps into the role of Jack, a character who was previously played by Michael Dorman. While the first season was based on the page-turning thriller written by Michael Robotham, this latest one covers entirely new terrain.

And when the show returns, Jack is a man still holding on to some serious secrets while dealing with fallout of having his baby kidnapped by the disturbed and jealous Agatha (Downton Abbey's Laura Carmichael).

Taking on a character previously portrayed by another actor presented Lasance with a challenge he had never yet encountered in his career. He spent weeks deliberating whether he should watch Dorman's performance in order to give the character some continuity going into season two or avoid it altogether and approach the role his own way.

"I couldn't decide what I wanted to do," he shrugs

"First of all, it's terrifying stepping into someone else's role, particularly on a show that's been really successful and given that Michael is a fantastic actor.

"So, I wanted to do his performance justice, but on the flip side, you don't want to be influenced by previous choices of the other actor."

At the urging of producers, Lasance ultimately decided not to watch Dorman's performance.

"They sat me down and said: 'You're here because of the choices you brought to the role. We don't want you to be Michael, we want this to be your version'.

"So. I watched one of the episodes and then decided to fully focus my research on the book."

The book, like season one, ended with Agatha safely behind bars and baby Rory back in his parents' arms. Given all the loose ends had been tied up so neatly, Lasance understands that fans may well be asking themselves where on Earth the writers could take the story now.

Without wanting to give too much away, this season sets up a compelling new mystery that will make you rethink who is the victim in this tale. Lasance says the beauty of The Secrets She Keeps is nothing has ever been black and white. Even the character of Agatha, who is a manipulative, lying kidnapper isn't a total villain. Instead, she is a woman haunted by her past.

'That's also the reality of people. We are all flawed," he says.

"And we're also more flawed in particular situations. You have to remember that people under pressure can make decisions that, in another more levelheaded headspace, they wouldn't necessarily make.

"Making flawed characters is also why it's so exciting to bring these guys to life. And everyone [of the characters] is flawed. That's the other brilliant element of this writing and why it was so nice to be part of a production that is just so classy and so intelligent."

Lasance says the mystery at the centre of this drama kept him intrigued right up until he was sent the very last script. And he believes viewers will be equally captivated, promising: "I think they've done a sensational job seamlessly carrying on the series but then also having this complete shift in approach to the antagonists (and in particular Agatha) and the changes to the power dynamics."



A winter rainforest cactus

The shorter days and longer nights of July act as a trigger to flower for many plants.

The best-known plant would be the Zygo-cactus.

The blooms of this cascading plant can brighten even the dullest winter day.

The Zygocactus, or as it should be correctly known as Schlumbergera, has been a popular bush house plant in Central Queensland for more than 50 years.

A visit to any of our regional shows this year revealed many healthy flowering specimens in the horticultural pavilions.

The Zygocactus is also known by the common names, Christmas Cactus or Crab Cactus

When it comes to flowering, Zygocactuses are available in just about every shade imaginable, from the traditional pale lilacs and pinks to bright shades of oranges and reds, and just about every colour in between, including bicoloured varieties.

Many of the new hybrid varieties now available will flower all year round.

Just after these plants stop flowering, there is a resting period for a few weeks where it is extremely important that the plant does not receive too much water. By the time spring arrives, the plant will start to regrow, and this is the best time to fertilise and repot.

During summer, they should be watered regularly and protected from direct sunlight.

At the end of summer, the plant should be positioned in an area of good light to guarantee plenty of well-shaped blooms during the winter season.

For plants in hanging baskets, it is also important to occasionally turn the baskets around to enable even growth around the basket.

The Zygocactus originates from Brazil, where they grow as epiphytes (the horticultural equivalent of an animal tick) on many of the rainforest trees or even on stony ledges found in an area of the Organ Mountains, surrounding Rio De Janiero.

First commercially cultivated in Europe, their winter flowering gave them one of their common names.

That name was the Christmas Cactus, due to their heavy flowering during the Christmas season. The other common name of Crab Cactus refers to the flattened, jointed stems that resemble a crabs claw.

Zygocactus are generally easy to grow and make an ideal basket plant, with its arching pendent stems cascading over the edge of the hanging basket and a multitude of flowers, each appearing on the ends of the stems.

Many enthusiasts will suggest that the more root-bound the plant is, the better the flower-

ing, but it is also important to ensure the roots don't block any of the drainage holes in the container as this will cause the pot to fill up with water and drowning the plant.

A tell-tale sign is the plant appearing limp and discoloured.

Transplanting shrubs during winter

Winter is the best time to move any shrubs or small trees that are not doing as well as they should in their present position.

Added to this is the wonderful rain that we have had over the last week gives an even better opportunity for success in transplanting.

Ailing evergreens, especially Ixora, often grow a whole lot better after they have been transplanted from a spot where they have not

been doing well. Fortunately, Ixora doesn't have deep root systems, but they do have a wide surface root system.

Lift the plants by first using the shovel to dig a line around the drip-line of the plant, making as clean a cut in the ground as possible, then working the spade deeper and under the root structure.

Once the root ball can be lifted out, make a similar-sized hole in the new position to take the plant.

It will need to be a fraction wider than the root ball so that plenty of good soil can be worked in, around and below the old roots.

Soak liberally once the plant has been shifted to the new hole, but do not feed any fertil-

iser at this stage.

Other evergreens, such as Bougainvillea, that might need to be moved should be pruned back well, even if they are in bud.

This applies particularly to large plants, where it is necessary to reduce the root system. As a general rule, top growth should be reduced to a similar proportion to the root

By the time we start getting warmer spring weather, the transplanted shrubs should be in a good position to start producing masses of new growth foliage, and extending their root

This would be the time to use a good organic fertiliser.

Plan to decarbonise

Feed that can reduce methane from livestock, and a greener approach to fertiliser are among the measures Queensland is investigating to reduce emissions in agriculture.

As part of a state-wide commitment to netzero emissions by 2050, a draft roadmap has been released outlining how the industry can reach its targets.

"By 2032 we expect the agriculture, fisheries and forestry supply chains will be well on the way to lower emissions production, with the ultimate goal of a net-zero emissions economy by 2050 well in sight," Agriculture Minister Mark Furner said on Wednesday.

In 2018, emissions from the sector contributed 21.2 million tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalent, or 12 per cent of Queensland's total emissions, according to a State of the Environment report released in September last year.

They increased by one per cent between 2005 and 2018, mainly due to emissions associated with beef cattle.

Queensland's agribusiness and food sector is expected to add about \$23.54 billion to the state's economy in 2021/22, the roadmap says.

It employs more than 365,000 people across the supply chain, and accounts for more than 13 per cent of Queensland's exports.

To achieve the required reductions, the roadmap points to advancements in livestock feed and fertiliser for crops.

It flags investment in feed and supplements that reduce methane produced by animals in the meat and dairy industries, and the development of green ammonia for fertiliser.

The roadmap also seeks to engage with Australia's Clean Energy Regulator to increase carbon farming options for the state's produc-

The risk of carbon farming can be managed with the government providing greater regulatory certainty, it says.

More training will be needed so landholders can access advice on the merits of selling or retaining carbon credit units.

"The roadmap's priorities are to ensure food security and the economic stability of our food and fibre producing regions while actively transitioning to low emissions agriculture," Mr Furner said.

Feedback on the draft will be open until 10

First sheep sustainability report card

The first annual report of the Sheep Sustainability Framework (SSF) will be released at the Australian Sheep and Wool Show in Bendigo on 15 July, to deliver a transparent and data-driven snapshot of the sustainability performance of the nation's sheep and wool industry.

Launched in April 2021, the SSF is the world's first framework of its type for sheep and wool and was developed to clearly define sustainable production, prioritise industry issues and measure industry performance against relevant ethical, environmental, social and economic measures

SSF Sustainability Steering Group (SSG) Chair and respected livestock veterinarian, Dr Scott Williams, said the Annual Report would help the industry better to understand its opportunities, challenges, successes, and impacts while allowing it to demonstrate its commitment to sustainable production and continual improvement.

"Australia has taken a globally significant leadership role in sustainable sheep and wool

production by developing the first framework of this type," Dr Williams said.

"The SSF will help industry capture a thorough, data-driven understanding of how we are performing, and we are excited to share the first Annual Report with our consumers, customers and value chains.

"This is an important moment for Australian sheep and wool businesses and one that will help to inform and support future priorities and investment to deliver on our vision of sustainably producing the world's best sheep meat and wool, now and into the future."

The SSF is underwritten by 41 indicators spanning the four key themes of "caring for our sheep", "enhancing the environment and climate", "looking after our people, our customers and the community", and "ensuring a financially resilient industry".

Over the past 12 months, data has been collected to inform the Annual Report through projects including a national animal husbandry survey, lifecycle analysis and the development of a sheep grazing seasonal

groundcover model using satellite data.

Dr Williams said it was fitting the first Annual Report be presented at the Australian Sheep and Wool Show - the largest event of its type in the world.

"In addition to presenting the Annual Report, our launch event will include an address from Chair of the Sheep Sustainability Framework Board and well-known industry leader, Lucinda Corrigan," Dr Williams said.

"There will also be a panel discussion on the interconnectivity between climate change, biosecurity, and market access with commentary from Professor Richard Eckard (University of Melbourne), Dr Andrew Whale (Australian Veterinary Association), Laura Timmins (Department of Agriculture, Water and Environment), Bonnie Skinner (Sheep Producers Australia) and Jo Hall (WoolProducers Australia).

"Of course, we'll also serve a lunch of premium and sustainably produced Australian lamb."

Wool market's back on the decline

This week marked the final sale of the 2021/22 wool selling season and after three weeks of consecutive rises, the Australian wool market has been unable to continue its upward path, instead of recording an overall loss, driven by falls in the merino fleece types.

After a non-sale week in the previous series, Fremantle returned to the selling roster, pushing the national offering up to 43,055 bales.

At the conclusion of the series, the total amount of wool put through the auction system totalled 1,861,928 bales, this was 122,766 more bales than the previous season, an increase of 7.1 per cent.

Across the country, the individual merino

Micron Price Guides (MPGs) across the country fell by between 5 and 125 cents.

The result of these falls was a 44 cent drop in the AWEX Eastern Market

Indicator (EMI) for the week, this was the largest weekly fall in the EMI since August

Interestingly, the drop is within one cent of the 45 cent fall in the EMI at the final sale of last season.

The EMI closed the week and the season at

1,430 cents. Over the past 12 months, the EMI has risen

by 7 cents, a small 0.5 per cent increase.

This is compared to the 313 cent rise in the EMI over the 2020/21 season.

The total dollar amount sold for the 2021/22 season finished well above the previous year.

This season the total value of wool sold was \$2,619.57 million, compared to \$2,246.72 million last season, an increase of \$372.85 million.

Next week is the first sale of the 2022/23 wool selling season, this sale is traditionally one of the largest of the year, as sellers wanting to offer in the new financial year take the first

This year is no different and currently, there are expected to be 52,182 bales on offer in Sydney, Melbourne and Fremantle.

Lowering methane

Lowering methane emissions through the use of Asparagopsis seaweed as a feed supplement has become a reality, following its first commercial sale earlier this month, according to Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA) and FutureFeed.

The first commercial sale of Asparagopsis feed supplement in Australia by ČH4 Global is a significant step forward for the industry. This comes following the discovery that adding a small amount of Asparagopsis seaweed to a ruminant's existing feed can reduce their methane emissions by over 80 per cent.

The importance of this discovery toward carbon neutrality by 2030 (CN30) has resulted in industry participants working tirelessly to make the product available to producers.

FutureFeed was formed in August 2020 to commercialise the technology developed by Australia's national science agency CSIRO, together with MLA and James Cook University.

FutureFeed the company, is supported by an impressive group of investors comprising of GrainCorp, Harvest Road Group; Woolworths Group; AGP Sustainable Real Assets; Sparklabs and Cultiv8 Joint Venture.

FutureFeed has issued licenses to seaweed growers which enables the supply of Asparagopsis to the livestock market.

There are currently three licensees in Australia: CH4 Global, Sea Forest and SeaStock.

Beyond licenses, FutureFeed has been busy establishing the foundations for a successful industry.

This includes furthering the foundational science through research, development and trials subjected to rigorous peer review to further support the discovery. Certification standards and a trademark are under development to ensure the robustness and credibility of the value chain.

Cassandra Kelly, Senior Advisor to FutureFeed, said the first commercial sales in Australia completed by CH4 Global was "another significant milestone" in the Asparagopsis journey.

"It's both inspiring and humbling to reflect on how the industry has managed to engage the brains trust, community and investment support in just under four years to make a product launch like this a reality," Ms Kelly said.

"Just a few years ago, Asparagopsis was a largely unknown seaweed that was not cultivated in commercial quantities and had very few applications outside of niche cosmetics and as a condiment in

"Now we are seeing a new industry with the capability to support local communities and the creation of jobs whilst working together to make a meaningful impact on methane emissions from livestock.'

CSIRO Chief Executive Dr Larry Marshall said the first commercial sale of FutureFeed was an exciting turning point for translating breakthrough science into solutions.

"CSIRO is proud to have been part of the FutureFeed journey, including going through our revolutionary ON program to accelerate the idea from benchtop to business," Dr Marshall said.

MLA Managing Director, Jason Strong, said emissions avoidance was a critical component of the red meat industry achieving carbon neutrality by 2030.

"MLA is continuing to work on a range of tools and technologies for producers to cost-effectively reduce emissions and increase productivity by demonstrating environmental stewardship credentials to customers, consumers and the community," Mr Strong said.

"We are proud to be working alongside FutureFeed in rolling out Asparagopsis to a range of commercial partners. Asparagopsis is one of many exciting tools the industry can embrace in working towards our goal of carbon neutrality at the end of the decade," Mr Strong said.

Apricot Chicken

Serves: 6

Prep time: 15 minutes
Cook time: 30 minutes

2 serves per portion

Ingredients

- 1 ½ cups brown rice
- 500g chicken, chopped into chunks
- 3 cloves garlic, chopped
- 1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil
- 1 red capsicum, de-seeded and sliced
- 1 medium carrot, diced
- 1 medium zucchini, sliced into rings
- 400g can apricots, drained
- 1 packet French onion soup
- 450ml apricot nectar

Method:

- COOK rice according to instructions on packet.
- PREHEAT oven to 170°C.
- HEAT oil in frypan over medium heat adding chicken and garlic, brown all sides. Remove and sit in oven-proof baking dish.
- ADD capsicum, carrots, zucchini and apricots to the baking dish, stirring through the chicken and garlic.
- BLEND soup mix with ½ cup apricot nectar to form a smooth paste, then mix in remaining apricot nectar. Pour over chicken and vegetables.
- COOK in oven for 30-40 minutes until chicken is cooked.

Serves: 6

Prep time: 20 minutes **Cook time:** 35 minutes

2 1/2 serves per portion

Ingredients:

- 900g potatoes, parboiled and cooled
- 150g feta cheese, crumbled
- 40g cheddar cheese

Method:

- PREHEAT oven to 170°C. Line pie dish with baking paper.
- CUT parboiled and cooled potatoes into slices and lay half over the base of the pie dish.
- COMBINE half of the feta cheese with cheddar cheese and sprinkle over potatoes.
- SEASON with pepper and place the remaining sliced potatoes over base layer.
- MIX sour cream, egg, milk, sriracha

- Cracked black pepper
- 3 tablespoons sour cream, reduced fat
- 1 egg
- 3 tablespoons milk, reduced fat
- 1 teaspoon sriracha (hot chilli sauce)
- 1 large bunch of silverbeet, blanched and cooled
- 5 sheets filo pastry, reduced fat
 - and remaining feta together in a bowl and pour over potato.
- CUT silverbeet leaves roughly in large pieces and lay over the potatoes.
- SCRUNCH each sheet of filo into a loose ball and place on top of the pie.
- BAKE in preheated oven for 35 minutes or until top is golden and crisp.
- SERVE warm with a side salad.
