# **Tourists return after lull**

After a slow start to the tourist season, numbers have skyrocketed in recent weeks to match expectations set earlier in the year.

Due to a number of factors, floods, the opening of international borders, a Covid breakout, and an election, Autumn tourist numbers were down with a number of cancellations for tourist vendors, such as Outback Aussie Tours.

However, as the year has progressed the prophecy of "the best year for tourism seen" has begun to come to fruition.

Founder and owner of Outback Aussie Tours Alan Smith said the contrast in tourist numbers has been noticeable.

"At the start of the year, we had great booking numbers, and it's no secret the late wet season has knocked about the start of our year," he said.

"It puts our own block up when the news reports say we've got these mammoth storms coming and major flooding—and they do that for a reason, but they haven't come to effect.

"But that's over now, that's passed, it's been a great, and it's setting us up to having a beautiful landscape to share with visitors travelling by."

Mr Smith said now he's seeing a full boat every night with growing interest throughout the winter school holidays.

"The school holidays are the peak tourist season for western Queensland—June/ July is where we see the greatest numbers," he said.

"But going into the hotter months, the heat is chasing people away less these days as more people have air conditioners.

"We can expect things to be good these days until September."

Mr Smith said the late wet season only built up demand for outback experiences, from which, economically, our towns are currently benefitting.

"The more we work together and market tourism with our fellow operators in outback Queensland, and the more we start telling of the points of differences between the towns, we still start to build new markets for people who want to come out," he said.

"I still meet people who said they chose us over Bali or Tasmania or anywhere else; even though things have opened up, we're still seeing a pent-up demand.



Allan Curtis said the outback was better than Brisbane and liked that he did not have to get on a plane.

"There's a big push to increase international tourism into Queensland; now is a great time to invest in outback tourism, but we do need to weary of outside forces."

Mr Smith said numbers are likely to remain strong through the year.

"Will the party end? no—but it will change," he said.

"What's the new normal? we won't know until we look back at our figures."

Mr Smith said he is thankful for the support from locals.

### New health precinct underway for Windorah

#### By Central West Hospital and Health Service

Construction of a new primary health centre in the remote community of Windorah in the Central West is now underway, with completion expected by the end of the year.

Assistant Minister for Health and Regional Health Infrastructure Julieanne Gilbert today broke ground on the new \$12.4 million facilities on the corner of Maryborough and Cecil streets.

She said the new Windorah PHC would be built in a prefabricated modular style, like the new Boulia Primary Health Centre and Wellbeing Centre.

"The new Windorah PHC will be a singlelevel, 19-module, interlinked building designed in Queensland style with a pitched roof," she said.

"The staff accommodation features wide verandahs, while there is ample ramp access to the primary health centre building.

"This modular build process reduces construction time and makes it easier to add additional structural components in the future as needs require, thereby future-proofing the new Windorah health centre."

The site is part of an area identified for future health and emergency services facilities within the Barcoo Shire Council town plan for Windorah.

"I'd like to thank the shire council for making this site available to secure the future of health services in the local community," Mrs Gilbert said.

"Building on this new site will ensure that

health services can continue to be delivered uninterrupted from the current Windorah Primary Health Centre on Victoria St, behind the Western Star Hotel, while the new facility is being built."

The Windorah project will be delivered by AUSCO Modular.

AUSCO Modular also partnered with St Hilliers Property Pty Ltd to deliver the \$7.24 million Boulia Primary Health Centre and Wellbeing Centre in November 2019.

Health Minister Yvette D'Ath said the Windorah PHC replacement works would create about 35 full-time equivalent jobs over the life of the project.

Ms D'Ath said the new Windorah PHC would include:

• Four consultation rooms, two more than the existing PHC and both telehealth-enabled, an ambulance bay, emergency treatment area, reception and waiting area.

• A two-bedroom, two-bathroom staff accommodation unit with a full kitchen and lounge space also forms part of the design.

"The new primary health centre will deliver a state-of-the-art health facility for the Windorah and surrounding community," Ms D'Ath said.

"It will allow for the fullest use of the latest technology, as well as allowing for future technological developments.

"Telehealth, for instance, has already revolutionised the delivery of health services to rural and remote communities throughout Queensland.

"It's opening a whole new world for health care in remote areas by providing specialist care without the need to travel long distances.

"The new Windorah PHC will be fitted with all the connections and the capacity to participate fully in this digital world.

"The project also will provide opportunities for local businesses to participate directly in the project's construction and/or commissioning phase."

#### Land resources grants to resume

The Palaszczuk Government is looking to revamp the land resource grants program which they said, aims to maximise jobs, investment and sustainable productivity.

Resources Minister Scott Stewart said registration of interest had opened for the revamped Natural Resource Recovery Program

"Queensland's natural land resources are a significant contributor to our agricultural, resources and tourism industries. We want to ensure our natural resources are nurtured for sustainable industry growth now and into the future. This new program will maximise both investment, and outcomes for our regions," Mr Stewart said.

Building on the success of the former Natural Resources Investment Program, the Natural Resource Recovery Program will support sustainable productivity, and jobs, from Queensland's land resources.

#### **Doctor issues dire mental health** warning

A doctor is warning that the younger population is headed towards a mental health crisis, as recent data from a leading telehealth service reveals Australians aged 18-35-years-old are overrepresented in consultations and prescriptions for depression and anxiety in the last two years, and numbers are continuing to grow.

Dr Andrew Thompson is the Medical Director at InstantScripts, an award-winning telehealth service which has helped more than 400,000 Australians access prescriptions and doctor consultations online.

He says the data raises serious concerns for young Australians and points to a dire need for awareness and expansion of services that address mental health problems. InstantScripts analysed its patient data and uncovered that from January to end-May this year, 18-35-yearolds were responsible for 59 per cent of consultations for depression and anxiety.

Dr Thompson anticipates that by the end of the year, this number will soar above 2021 levels, which saw 65 per cent of 18-35-yearolds representing mental health consultations last year, and 49 per cent in 2020. The younger population has also accounted for 59 per cent of prescriptions for depression and anxiety as of end of May this year, which is already up from 58 per cent in 2021 and 49 per cent in 2020

#### Video to tackle vaping habits

Moreton police today launched a series of videos designed to urge children to "think twice' before vaping.

In Caboolture, Member for Morayfield and Minister for Police Mark Ryan and Health Minister Yvette D'Ath joined Superintendent John Hallam to launch the awareness campaign, which educates school-aged children about the health implications of vaping. The twopart video series also includes information about the legislation affecting vaping, as well as health messaging supported by Queensland Health and the Lung Foundation.

Superintendent Hallam said police had an important role to play in addressing vaping among young people and highlighted the effects it could have on the broader community.

"As police, we have the responsibility of educating our community and enforcing Queensland's laws, including laws that impact underage vaping," Supt Hallam said.

"We need to learn to write the way we speak—to capture that voice.


"I believe we're all natural storytellers."



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# Gunna's big clean sweep

#### **By Boulia Camel Races**

Camel 'Gunna' lumbered home to continue his clean sweep of the camel racing circuit, taking out the most prestigious win in Australia's camel racing on Sunday, Boulia's 1500m Cup.

Boulia Camel Races, Australia's richest camel race, touted the 'Melbourne Cup of Camel Races' was witnessed by 3,000 travellers in Outback Queensland on the edge of the Simpson Desert.

This year is a special year for local Boulia camel Gunna to take home the win as it marks the 25th Anniversary of the Boulia Camel Races, which was first held in 1997.

"To win this Cup is amazing, every jockey will tell you it's the main one they want to win," beamed winning Jockey Kyrraley Woodhouse.

Woodhouse Camels Racing Team's 'Gunna' is onto a winning streak through Outback Queensland, taking out the Cup win at Bedourie Camel Races the weekend before, then following up in Boulia with a clean sweep taking out both the 400m Toby Harris Memorial Quarter Mile Flyer followed by the big one, the 1,500m Tourism & Events Qld Cup Final.

The 1,500m Cup is the longest and most prestigious win on Australia's camel racing circuit.

"It was a hard race, he had the best start, Mal is an excellent handler and he knew when to let go and he held me get Gunna out with his little raaahs as well," said winning jockey Kyralley, who crossed the line to the cheers of husband, camel trainer Tom Woodhouse and as a team effort with camel handler Mal Buttle from Victoria.

"He led from the start, I could see Tex out the corner of my eye the whole way and Rachel that jockey (racing for Chris Hill of Uluru's team) made we work hard for the win.

"When we came down that home straight I saw they were a fair way behind but I wasn't stopping, I rode him all the way home.

"He went to sit down about 10 metres out from the starting barriers and we're like, no, not this time, but he stayed up and he was great.

"That's how you know he's ready to race, he sits down... he's just grumpy," she says with a laugh.

"But then he just motors on home, he's a pretty special camel."

Kyralley recounted the race, "it's a hard race and it makes it a hell of a lot easier when you've got a good camel that just knows their job.

"He went fast and I was like, pace yourself, pace yourself, then I saw Tex out the corner of my eye and Gunna started trotting and I said not today."







his first ever race he busted one of the running rails here at the Boulia racetrack, he went over it and threw Kyrraley who was the jockey and kicked her in the chest.

She was breastfeeding at the time and the

Race caller Andrew Saunders who has been calling the races in Boulia since the first one in 1997 said of the weekend, "It's the 25th Anni-







"The army had camels back then and she was a good camel, but if you think they are slowly coming down the straight now you should have been here 25 years ago, it was awful how slow they were," Andrew recalled. Boulia is where camel racing is Australia's first turned professional, rather than just a tourist exhibition, with the introductions of longer races, drug testing and legal bookmakers who had a busy time in Boulia over the weekend.

Kyrraley explains" the big 1,500m race is a fully mental race for both the camel and your-self.

Some people sing to the jockeys, some people yell a bit, but I stay quiet and then every 50 or 100 metres I give a raaah and that does the trick."

Local Boulia camel team, Woodhouse Camels has a long history of racing in Boulia, having first competed in 1999.

Winning camel 'Gunna' was wild caught and his first appearance at Boulia Camel Races was as a two-year-old camel in the Boulia Camel Races challenging and hilarious camel tagging competition.

Tom Woodhouse recalled, "he was actually one of my father's camels, he was one of the last ones my father broke in."

Tom explained that their champion camel wasn't always in top racing form recalling "in

poor kid had to go onto formula for a week, he laughed.

"After dad retired I took Gunna and actually swapped a side-by-side (buggy) for him.

"I think I got the better end of the deal," Tom chuckled.

Camel 'Tex' two raced for trainer Chris Hill of Alice Springs crossed the line second in Boulia's Cup Final, followed by 'Dolly' riding for Anna Bay, New South Wales camel trainer Rod Sandom in third.

3,000 travellers gathered on the edge of the Simpson Desert to witness the iconic race which was first held in 1997 and this year marked its 25th Anniversary.

The inundation of tourists balloons the population of Boulia 10-fold, from 300 residents to 3,000 for the event.

The five teams of competing travel teams camel from across Australia and took home a

versary and everything has run smoothly, it's been amazing on the track.

We've had little incidents which have been great, I think it adds a bit of colour and fun when a camel breaks."

"The quality every year improves, we see 'Gunna' who is a very good camel and 'Tex', when you get stables travelling from all over Australia the racing is top shelf," said Andrew.

"It's way different to the early days of racing 25 years ago, it was very amateurish, there were two racing colours, the jockeys just wore a t-shirt and they just pulled the camels out of the backyard and raced them.

"But now they spend months training the camels, they wear proper racing silks, everything is serious.

"It's very different to the first one in 1997, which was won by camel 'Jessie' who was an army camel. Surrounding the racing and bookies action in Boulia was a full program of live music, novelty races, helicopter rides and the Great Australian Ride-on Lawn Mower Race.

No reports have yet come in of travellers spotting Boulia's Min Min Lights on their journey to Boulia, the mysterious phenomenon that continues to be sighted by travellers on Boulia's remote Outback roads each year, continuing the legend and intrigue.

The Boulia Camel Races is supported by the Queensland Government, through Tourism and Events Queensland, and features on the It's Live! in Queensland events calendar.

# **Protection a process**

The threat of a disease incursion into Australia's environment should not be underestimated.

Nor should it be a cause for panic.

Responsible steps can be taken that will en-

sure Australia maintains its disease-free status. We need to be careful to follow government advice around which times to declare and present for inspection when returning to Australia.

We also need to be mindful we don't provide the strategy or goal for the weaponisation of the virus.

This can even occur through the threat of its arrival and the subsequent impact on commodity prices as local producers disengage from the buying market. Australia today is exactly the same as Australia has always been, free of Foot and Mouth and Lumpy Skin Disease.

Is it possible that this may change in the future, well yes it is, but it hasn't yet.

We should prevent alarm from sinking in and change the rhetoric to ensure it doesn't



arrive, rather than focus purely on the alleged inevitability that it will and the consequences. On-farm Biosecurity is an important cog in the protection process.

Maintaining a visitor log - where appropriate - and management of feral pests are a continual process that we should all be undertaking.

Communicating with friends and family who may be visiting a foreign country where FMD is endemic (there are others, Indonesia is just the most recent) the need to be mindful when re-entering Australia is just as important as a government detection scheme.

Like any security, all good Biosecurity

begins at home.

Barcaldine Regional Council will be distributing information in the coming weeks highlighting this critical responsibility that all travellers have and assisting those returning from at-risk countries where they seek such assistance.

Other local governments are undertaking similar steps.

In recent weeks our Council area has seen the commencement of a full-time waste collection service contract with JJ Richards.

This process will take a number of months to fully bed down, including the new schedule for collection.

Substantial benefits will be received by council and the community over the duration of the contract and we look forward to offering a 50 per cent rebate for the cost of replacing bins that may be damaged this year.

This was announced as part of our budget process and will assist homeowners and businesses who are all clearly impacted by cost of living pressures to maintain a safe working bin.

Homelessness is often assumed to be an urban problem because homeless people are more numerous, more geographically concentrated, and more visible in urban areas.

Families, women, the elderly, men, and young people for a range of reasons, including poverty, losing employment, financial crisis, domestic violence, relationship breakdown, or due to a lack of affordable housing experience housing stress and/or homelessness.

To assist in addressing this growing issue of homelessness in our region Anglicare Central Queensland has newly appointed Colin Tidswell as a Homelessness Case Manager.

Colin comes with a wealth of experience in the housing, homelessness and community development sectors working with marginalised peoples and communities.

The position, based in Longreach, will work with some of the most disadvantaged in our community by providing emergency relief such as food vouchers, tenancy support, financial budgeting, crisis accommodation and support to those experiencing homelessness to find safe suitable long-term housing.







### **Mediterranean Chicken Bowl**

#### Serves: 4

Prep time: 15 minutes Cook time: 25 minutes

#### 2 ½ serves per portion

#### Ingredients:

- 1 zucchini, diced, 1cm
- 1 red capsicum, diced, 1cm
- 1 eggplant, diced, 1cm
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 300g chicken breast, diced, 1cm

#### Method:

- PREHEAT oven to 180°C.
- ADD zucchini, capsicum and eggplant to large roasting pan and drizzle with a tablespoon of olive oil. Roast in oven for 20 minutes.
- HEAT another tablespoon of oil over medium heat in a large frypan. Add chicken slices, half the garlic, cumin and oregano, stirring until chicken is cooked through. Remove from pan.
- ADD remaining oil over medium heat in pan. Add onions and sauté

- 2 cloves garlic, crushed
- 2 teaspoons ground cumin
- 2 teaspoons dried oregano
- 1 medium onion, diced 1 cup pearl couscous
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup feta, reduced fat

#### Tzatziki:

- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cucumber, finely chopped
- 1 cup natural yoghurt, reduced fat
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

for 2 minutes. Add in couscous and 1/2 cup of water. Reduce heat and cook for 5 minutes until water is absorbed. Use fork to fluff up couscous.

- SQUEEZE juice from cucumber with hands.
- ADD yoghurt, splash of oil, lemon juice and remaining garlic in small bowl and mix through cucumber.
- LAYER couscous, vegetables and chicken in bowl. Drizzle tzatziki dressing and garnish with feta.

### **Moroccan Lamb Soup**

Serves: 6 Prep time: 10 minutes Cook time: 2 ½ hours

#### 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> serves per portion

#### Ingredients:

- 2 teaspoons extra virgin olive oil
- 2 lamb shanks, fat trimmed
- 1 brown onion, finely chopped
- 1 carrot, finely chopped
- 2 celery sticks, finely chopped

#### **Method**:

- HEAT oil in large saucepan over medium-high heat. Add lamb and cook, turning occasionally, for 5 minutes or until browned. Transfer to a plate.
- ADD onion, carrot, celery and garlic to the pan. Cook, stirring, for 5 minutes or until onion softens. Add the Moroccan seasoning and stir for 1 minute or until fragrant.
- RETURN lamb to pan and add tomato, stock and barley. Bring to the boil.

- 2 garlic cloves, crushed
- 1 tablespoon Moroccan seasoning
- 400g can diced tomatoes
- 1L chicken stock, reduced salt
- 180g barley
- 50g brown rice
- 1 cup frozen broad beans, thawed
- 400g can chickpeas, drained and rinsed
- Black pepper, to taste
- Fresh coriander, to serve
- REDUCE heat to low and cook, covered, stirring occasionally, for 2 hours or until lamb is falling off the bone.
- TRANSFER lamb to heatproof bowl. Add rice to the soup.
- Cook, uncovered, for 10 minutes. • SHRED the lamb using two forks,
- discarding the bones. ADD lamb, broad beans and chickpeas to the soup. Cook for 2 minutes or until heated through. Add pepper to taste.
- SERVE with coriander.

# **Wool market wrap**

#### **By Australian Wool Innovation**

The result of the Australian wool auctions saw reduced values across almost all types and descriptions on offer.

The abnormally large volumes available this and the past few weeks provided buyers plenty of choice and price opportunity.

This allowed the market to go in the buyer's favour as sellers showed a willingness to accept the lowering prices on offer.

By the end of the selling week, 86.4 per cent of all wool offered had been cleared through to the trade which was a notable achievement as most pre-sale forecasts were suggesting much lower clearance rates.

Exporters were expecting lower prices from the outset, but all were aware of the new business that was available predominantly in China but at speculative (lower than current market) levels.


On top of forward sales that needed completion, this seemingly gave sufficient confidence for full buyer participation at auction, albeit cautious

The subsequent sale room activity saw prices stepping down throughout selling rather than free falling which was indicative of the reasonable demand taking advantage of the large supply.

The expansive buying of Australia's largest trading house continued throughout this week.

Similar competition from China's big two top makers was evident, but indent buyers operating on behalf of other Chinese-based manufacturers, commission top makers and traders stepped up to enable the absorption of the quantity.

Away from the very small offering of best top-making and spinners types, European interest was almost non-existent and Indian

The FNF (less than 1%vm) sale lots were less affected due to the small selection.

Many clips are carrying more vegetable matter (vm) than normal due to the good season.

The standard top price China contracts generally require an average of 1.0% vm, but many mills have reverted to the LB (light burr) contracts which allow for a 2%vm average at a discount.

Crossbred wool types, cardings and oddments sold firm unchanged +/- 10ac throughout.

Australian wool auctions are now in recess for three weeks.

Auctions will resume on Tuesday 11th August 2022.

## **Flocks** grow

#### By Meat & Livestock Australia

Favourable seasonal conditions have supported above average lambing percentages and a larger breeding ewe flock, which continue to drive the national sheep flock's growth, according to the latest Sheep Industry Projections update from Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA).

A strong start to Western Australia's season coupled with above-average rainfall patterns for most sheep regions of New South Wales and Victoria will see the national flock rise by 7.2 per cent or 5.1m in 2022, to 76m head.

On the back of this growth, lamb production is forecast to reach record levels at 549,000 tonnes in 2022, with higher carcase weights driving the increase.

International demand for Australian sheepmeat continues to rise, with export markets outperforming year-to-date levels.

The large 2021 lamb cohort, heavier carcase weights and firm slaughter rates in mutton are delivering favourable supply to several key markets.

Strong export growth in emerging markets such as Malaysia, Japan and South Korea demonstrates the diverse range of countries Australian lamb and mutton can go, according to Ripley Atkinson, Senior Market Information Analyst at MLA.

"On top of booming markets in Asia, the United States has quickly emerged as Australia's number one destination for lamb exports," Mr Atkinson said.

The United States imported 35,053 tonnes of sheepmeat from January to May, which was 3 per cent higher than at the same point in 2021.

Nearly 87 per cent of exports to the US were lamb, which was an increase of 13 per cent.

"With sheepmeat production in plentiful volumes and international demand for Australian products remaining robust across key established and emerging markets, the outlook for the Australian sheepmeat industry is bright," Mr Atkinson said.

"It is evident in both production and export terms that the national flock has recovered from the rebuilding and CO-VID-19 events.

#### National flock growth and slaughter

Due to strong seasons across the country, MLA has revised the sheep flock higher by 2.2 per cent compared to the February release.

This will mean that the flock is expected to grow by 7.2 per cent to 76m head this year.

By 2023, MLA expects further growth to 78.75m, which is 23 per cent or 14.75m head higher than the 100-year low recorded in 2020.

While for 2022 lamb slaughter, MLA has revised figures higher by 2 per cent or 400,000 on its February projections to reach 22m head.

This is due to its strong production fundamentals driving a second large lamb cohort delivering increased supply. Carcase weights

### World-first sustainability framework lands

The first Annual Report of the Sheep Sustainability Framework (SSF) will today be released at the Australian Sheep and Wool Show in Bendigo delivering on the worldfirst commitment of the Australian sheep and wool industry to create a data-driven vearly snapshot of sustainability performance.

Led by Sheep Producers Australia (SPA) and WoolProducers Australia (WPA), the SSF is underwritten by four themes: caring for our sheep; enhancing the environment and climate; looking after our people, our customers and the community; and ensuring a financially resilient industry.

Within those themes are nine focus areas and 21 priorities-monitored and measured by 58 data-driven indicators.

SSF Sustainability Steering Group (SSG) Chair and respected livestock veterinarian, Dr Scott Williams, said the Annual Report creates an important foundation for the sheep and wool value chain and its stakeholders.

"This is a major milestone for the Australian sheep and wool industry," Dr Williams said.

"We are the largest producer and exporter of premium quality fine wool and the largest exporter of sheep meat in the world.

"We are now one of the most transparent sheep and wool industries as well.

"From reducing greenhouse gas emissions and climate change adaptation to animal husbandry practices and onfarm safety, the Annual Report is a documented baseline on how we as an industry are performing."

CSIRO research last year found the Australian sheep meat industry was already climate neutral and the latest Annual Report shows the sheep meat and wool industry has held steady on net emissions (9.13 million tonnes CO2e in 2019).

In further good news, Life Cycle Assessment (LCA) data reveals that productivity gains have driven the emissions intensity of raising sheep (6.8kg CO2e/kg liveweight) and greasy wool (24.4kg CO2e/kg greasy wool) down nine per cent between 2005 and 2020.

Rates of ground cover have improved with 63.4pc of sheep-grazing land achieving over 50pc ground cover since summer 2019—a 13pc increase on the previous vear.

The industry also continues to invest in seeking new and innovative ways to assist the red meat industry meet its target of carbon neutrality by 2030 (CN30) and helping Australia reduce its overall greenhouse gas emissions.

Worms and breech flystrike are among the most important health challenges for the industry and genetic improvement is a means to prevent disease, with a key measure of success being the change in Australian Sheep Breeding Value (ASBV) over time—specifically Worm Egg Count (WEC) and Early Breech Wrinkle (EBWR).

A reduction of 10pc in WEC ASBV and 15pc in EBW ASBV in the latest reporting period indicates that flock resistance to worms and breech flystrike is increasing.

The industry is also trending away from mulesing, with a directional increase in

"Australia remains one of less than 70 OIE member countries recognised as free from FMD and we must keep it that way," Ms Simson said.

"I've seen firsthand in Jakarta what farmers are going through. FMD affects the livelihoods of farmers and every business and worker all the stops to make sure FMD doesn't reach our shores.

"While we welcome today's announcement, we still want every single traveller returning from Indonesia screened and for constant review of all settings in our line of defence, including shoe sanitising stations.

"We urge every traveller to be vigilant by avoiding farms in Indonesia, thoroughly cleaning their clothes and shoes-or even better supporting our #ThrowYourThongs campaign.

"It's also critical that people follow biosecurity directions and not attempt to bring prohibited products such as meat back into Australia illegally.

"This is vet another reminder of our need for a long-term, sustainable funding pipeline for biosecurity, a call Australian farmers will not relent on.'

# **Dividing those beauties**

With their spectacular flowering displays during the summer, the Agapanthus and Hippeastrum have been a favourite for generations of gardeners.

When plants become too crowded they should be divided.

Now is one of the best times of the year to do this.

Start by digging up the plant clump.

Then divide the plant up in any one of three ways.

First by carefully teasing the roots apart or cutting the plant apart using an old pruning saw or fishing knife.

The last method is if Agapanthus or Hippeastrum clumps really tight chop the plant into pieces with an axe or spade.

From a single established Agapanthus or Hippeastrum clump, you might get more than a dozen new plants but it depends on the Agapanthus or Hippeastrum species being divided.

With the divisions made, place the plants in a bucket or plastic bag then dampen the roots with a bit of water to keep roots moist.

After that, I would pot up the divisions to grow on.

When replanting the Agapanthus or Hippeastrum try to get the soil in around the roots as closely as possible and place the crowns of the new plants no more than 50mm below ground level.

Hippeastrums have been grown in our gardens for over the last 100 years, and I still believe, that tucked away in many rural gardens, there are still some of the best flowering varieties grown.

These plants could have been handed down over many generations and Agapanthus is easy to grow in just about every part of Central Queensland, having the ability to tolerate conditions from heavy clay to sandy well-drain soil. It is important to remember that they do not require a lot of water after they have been established.

One of the most constantly asked questions at many nurseries even at this time of the year is "Why is my pot plant dying? I water it every day".

You need to remember that plants grown in pots require far more attention to their watering than the same plant species planted in the garden.

The restricted amount of potting mix is an important factor in this requirement.

As the roots keep growing forward, no mat-

ter where the plant is, only the tip of the roots can absorb water, not the entire root system.

Therefore, a considerable part of the root structure in the pot is no longer absorbing water, but simply acting like a pipeline carrying the water from the tips of the roots to the stems of the leaves.

You will find that it is mainly the roots at the bottom of the pot that carry the tissues active in water absorption, with a small amount near the surface and the sides of the pot also soaking up some water.

To have the water reach the bottom of the

container, it is essential that all of the potting mix be thoroughly wet.

If a small amount of water is poured on top of the pot's root mass, it will remain only in the top half of the pot and not reach the tips of the roots on the bottom.

I would recommend watering until runoff through the bottom holes of the pot is observed.

A more efficient method is soaking the pot in a large tub of water, which will ensure a full wetting of the potting mix, however, this is not always practical.

When you are watering the pot, if you notice that water seems to channel its way through the potting mix quickly without soaking in, that is a sign it is time to start repotting the plant. This happens because the organic matter in potting mix slowly decays over time and the water-holding capacity is reduced.

As well as this, continual root growth also compresses the potting mix and eventually pushes some of the potting mix over the rim of the container.

These factors all reduce the capacity of the plant to obtain enough moisture.





# **Eight events in Blackall**

Racing returned to the central west on Saturday with an eight-event program at Blackall after two wash-out meetings at Barcaldine and Ilfracombe.

The day featured the time honoured Noel Allom Memorial Cup open plate run over 1200 metres and was taken out in brilliant fashion by Jarhead for trainer Rodney Little and jockey Emma Bell.

The six-year-old gelding by Warhead had previously finished fourth in the Battle of the Bush final at Eagle Farm at its last start and appeared ready to race as soon as they ran out onto the track on Saturday.

Bell was able to position Jarhead close to the pace behind the leading pack and was ready to pounce onto the lead as they turned for home.

At that point, Zilitor had gained a narrow advantage over the early leaders Tocco D'oro and Nick the Skip, and Jarhead was challenging strongly in the middle of the track.

Jarhead was able to race away under the 61 and a half kilos and win convincingly by a length and a half over the ever-consistent Zilitor, with Lubuk running home from last place into third.

Jarhead has been a consistent performer for the Rodney Little team, and it was a great reward after such a great finish in the Battle of the Bush final, and now trainer Little can plan ahead for more possible feature races coming up, and of course, aim for the Country Stampede in Brisbane.

Jockey Ric McMahon who leads the central west jockey premiership had the three winners on the day, and he kicked off that trio of wins with the Todd Austin-trained Yule My Hero in the Benchmark 55 over 1400 metres.

The four-year-old gelding by Kaphero is in good form now with two wins and a third in its last three runs, and McMahon had this galloper ready to pounce on to the lead as they turned for home and used the rail's run to advantage, to shoot to a clear lead, and even though Sole Heir tried valiantly in the straight, Yule My Hero ran out a four-length winner, with Helmet Head running on into third place.

McMahon's other winners came in the following two races: firstly with Royal Confession for Todd Austin in the Maiden Plate.

The galloper was having its first start for the stable, and owner Pam Carolyn has had a great record with producing winners having their first start in the ownership group.

It was a maiden winner, again, with a big margin as Royal Confession dominated the finish by six-and-a-half lengths over Kukinta and Matagorda-Blackall has a history of pro-

ity to continue on through the grades. McMahon then combined with trainer

Shane Iverson and Mishani Operator in arguably the most impressive win of the day.

Mishani Operator had come off two wins at Cunnamulla at its previous two runs, and the three-year-old gelding by Domesday had to carry 64-and-a-half kilograms, but that did not prevent it from winning by seven-and-a-quarter lengths over the in form Amadeo, and Auric Gold, also a last start winner, into third place.

It was a dominant win, and jockey McMahon was able to ride quietly to the line on Mishani Operator-such was the winning margin.

He is certainly one to follow now having won four from 15 starts, and trainer Iverson will be able to place him to advantage in the coming weeks.

The Billy Johnson and Tyler Leslight combination also scored a double on the day when they produced Von Saga for the win in the Benchmark 55 over 1200 metres.

Having its fourth run for the stable after Von Saga had placed at all three previously, the

seven-year-old mare by Von Costa de Hero was quite impressive; even though the final margin was only a length-and-a-quarter, it was still a dominant win over Surprise Selection and Old Town Road.

Leslight was able to use barrier one to their advantage and keep Von Saga in touch with the leading pack, and, turning in the straight, pounced onto the lead and was able to hold off the challenge of Surprise Selection.

The track did play, in a way, a feature for two horses who were up on the pace in the second win for Johnson and Leslight with Royo in the Class B Handicap over 1050 metres.

Virtually leading all the way, Royo scooted clear in the straight and won by six lengths over Osaka Sunset and Star Twinkle who had come from back in the field.

Royo is a horse in good form with three wins and two placings in its last five, and this threeyear-old by Golden Archer came off a last-start win in Longreach.

The only race of the day which saw a horse come from behind occurred in the final race in the Class 6 Plate when No Refund trained and ridden by David Rewald was able to come from a midfield position late in the home straight to overhaul Han Dynasty who had gained the lead and looked set for victory.

No Refund produced a strong finish down the outside and was running away to win by a length-and-a-quarter over Han Dynasty, with odds on favourite, Halcyon House suffering its first defeat for the Todd Austin stable in four starts in the area, only finishing in third.

No Refund has been in the money for three of its last four runs, and this was the second win of its campaign this year.

Tycoon Zip had been better known as a sprinter, but on Saturday in the Open Handicap over 1400 metres, the Leslie Baker-trained Shane McGovern-ridden eight-year-old gelding led all the way in his first attempt at the distance.

McGovern was able to gain an early lead on Tycoon Zip as no other runner contested the lead, and gradually, he extended the tempo of the race, so that by the home turn most runners were off the bid and chasing.

Tycoon Zip was able to continue to hold the lead down the straight despite the challenges of Ordesa and Kedleston, with the margin of a longneck being the closest finish of the day.

It gives a new dimension to Tycoon Zip to be able to stretch out to this distance, and this horse had placed at Roma in his last two runs and continues to be in good form.
