The process was said to have cost \$285,000 at the Barcaldine Multipurpose Health Service, Central West Hospital and Health Service Acting Executive Director for Finance, Infrastructure and Support Services Joe Byrne said the new Shimadzu RADspeed Pro fixed and MX8 mobile machines were a major step up from the older X-ray equipment.



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'Superhighway' in the works

The major towns will soon benefit from the is now expanding to a further 24 across the proposed "electrical vehicle superhighway", as construction has officially begun on the first of 24 new electric vehicle chargers in Western Oueensland.

Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey said contractor Yurika was onsite in Kingaroy in earlu August to construct and commission the first charger of the Phase 3 rollout.

"Electric vehicles are finding their place on Queensland roads, with more than 10,000 now registered thanks to the commitment and foresight of the Palaszczuk government," he said.

"We're supporting this uptake through \$3000 new EV rebates and more charging infrastructure from the Coast to Cairns.

Queensland's Electric Super Highway is currently positioned in 31 locations and

interior of the state to make travelling with your EV even easier.

"First stop is Kingaroy, soon to be followed by Longreach, Barcaldine, Blackall, Charleville, Miles and Stanthorpe."

Assistant Minister for Regional Roads Bruce Saunders said the rollout would take the Super Highway up to 5400km long.

"This system will be the single largest electric super highway in one jurisdiction anywhere in the world—that's a fantastic achievement for Queensland," Mr Saunders said.

"The Palaszczuk government is committed to making electric vehicles as accessible as possible to all Oueenslanders, and our new charging network is just one way we can achieve that."

'The new mobile machine is also much more compact, more portable and more user friendly than the old one.'

Mr Byrne said between 1000 and 1100 Xrays a year were delivered by the Barcaldine MPHS Medical Imaging Department.

"We thank Barcaldine MPHS visitors and patients for their understanding and apologise for any inconvenience while we were installing the new X-ray equipment over the past month," he said.

"But thanks to the installation of the new equipment, all medical imaging services at Barcaldine MPHS are now back to normal."

The condition has metabolic, psychological and reproductive features and is one of the main causes of infertility in women.

Professor Helena Teede, from the Monash Centre for Health Research and Implementation (MCHRI) says the review paves the way for the 2023 release of the International PCOS Guidelines, generously funded by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHM-RC) Centre for Research Excellence in Women's Health in Reproductive Life.

"There are key knowledge gaps that clinicians have when diagnosing and treating PCOS," she said. "The review seeks to improve accurate diagnosis, limit treatment inconsistencies and address barriers to providing patient-centred care. It also highlights the need for holistic models of care to support women and for greater investment in research in this common, yet complex condition."

Cheers to the call

Australian beer drinkers are being encouraged to raise a glass today to recognise the value of beer in Australia on International Beer Day.

It is a day to celebrate that beer is a great Australian success story with 85 per cent of beer being grown here, made here and consumed here, generating \$16 billion every year for the Australian economy. Most significantly within this is our longstanding partnership with Australian farmers. In a typical year, brewers would purchase around \$500 million of agricultural products and directly support 3,000 farm jobs.

Qantas crew takes action on pay

According to the TWU, the Dubai National Air Travel Agency ground crew within Qantas' supply chain will soon begin voting on whether they have the right to take industrial action.

This comes after the Fair Work Commission today approved a TWU application to hold a protected action ballot.

The crew have have been said to be fighting against management's attempts to push through an agreement that gives pay cuts to experienced workers and pushes workers into below the legal award conditions.

The company has so far denied workers' attempts to increase part-time hours or invest in permanent positions to ease pressure on the chronically over-worked crews.

TWU National Assistant Secretary Nick Mc-Intosh said industrial action was always the last resort, but Dnata workers shouldn't be forced to accept a poor deal that would see working conditions go backwards.

"Dnata workers are overworked, exhausted and understaffed as they battle to plug gaps in working rosters," he said.

They reasonably deferred bargaining during the pandemic despite not receiving a cent of JobKeeper, and now just want a fair deal for themselves and their families.

"Workers are sending Dnata and its pursestring controllers at Qantas a clear message: settle a fair deal that locks in secure jobs with strong conditions, or workers may be forced to take further action".

FMD should be in the bank and not on our doorsteps

Most of the time we live at Arundel in solitary splendour, but that doesn't mean the outside world never intrudes.

Sometimes these intrusions are welcome, like the visitors we recently received from overseas, able to return with the lifting of overseas travel bans, or the rain that accompanied them.

Sadly, there are times when such intrusions, though inevitable, aren't exactly welcome.

Most come in biblical proportions, like droughts, bushfires and pestilence.

The pestilence usually comes in the form of grasshoppers or blowflies, but of late we are watching with dread another sort of pestilence

Foot and Mouth Disease, abbreviated to FMD in the media.

While it made for some rather comical



moments in June, the possibility of FMD reaching our shores is a very serious matter.

However, FMD has traditionally been the acronym for Farm Management Deposits, which usually come up at the end of the financial year, ie June.

I should say that, in other years, I've pictured a mob of sheep crammed into a bank vault, or maybe a cow or two, since these are a property's most valuable assets.

Of course, there would be an endless supply of feed and water in the vault with the stock, which would also be marvellous during a drought, if possible.

I know, I have a weird imagination, but it's always entertaining in my head.

And it provides a harmless distraction from disasters like drought and the dread of

dying animals.

Or FMD and infected animals.

With the food supply chain in trouble in so many places around the world due to conflict, drought, floods, shorter growing seasons and disasters on the processing side, one of the bright sides of the rain we recently had were the knowledge that Australia would be able to step up and help feed the world.

If FMD penetrates our shores, we would be as helpless as all those other nations to send food to the hungry.

And that would be as tragic as everything else FMD would bring to our shores.

Let's hope that travellers do the right thing, alongside the government authorities responsible for quarantine and all of us on the land.

We all must do our part to stop the spread of FMD.

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

Register your dogs, catch up on FMD

Good to be back with you for another of my fortnightly updates.

This time around, we're talking about biosecurity, innovation, and events.

But first dogs.

It's really important that you keep your dog registrations up to date — renewals are due this Monday 15 August.

All dogs within the Longreach Regional Council must be registered by the time they are 12 weeks old and within 14 days of being in the region.

In Queensland, it's also the law for all dogs and cats to be microchipped from 12 weeks of age.

A maximum of two dogs over 12 weeks of age can be kept on a property in any of our towns.

Approval is required for any additional dogs over the maximum of two.

Registering your dog will help us reunite them with you in the event they're impounded.

Biosecurity Queensland officers will be in Longreach on Wednesday 31 August for an Exotic Disease Awareness and Training Day, hosted by RAPAD.

The workshop will be open to councils, landholders, transport operators, and anyone interested in learning about the prevention and response to exotic diseases.

More details will be released soon, but it's worth saving the date now — Wednesday 31 August at the Longreach Civic Centre.

As the news the Ilfracombe Post Office has been put on the market for potential buys sets in, locals have expressed deep concerns. When asked if locals would like to see the Post Office sold, only two locals voted yes.

And while the score improved when asked if they had confidence that Council would find an appropriate buyer to five, an overwhelming amount of locals were voted no. Some locals went on to say that they didn't believe Council had Ilfracombe's best interests at heart.

"It's not just a post office, it's essential," an anonymous local said.

A topic that came up often was the employment of long-time local, Di.

Bartender and backpacker, Reece Musson said Di was the reason he got up every morning and he would hate to see her lose her job.

In response, the Longreach Regional Council made sure to notify Ilfracombe locals that this is not a proposal to close the Ilfracombe Post Office.

"[It is an invitation for] expressions of interest from anyone interested in purchasing the post office business, land, and building, as a going concern," a council spokesperson said.

"Council is in the process of preparing the documentation necessary to run an open and equitable Expressions of Interest process, including the setting of appropriate evaluation criteria."

Council has committed to updating the community before any further decision is made.



Winton's master of verse

Not every town has a resident poet—let alone one who has won the Australian Poetry Championship title in 2018, 2019 and 2010.

But Winton in Outback Queensland has Greg North.

It comes as a surprise that Greg only began his bush poetry life at the age of 35.

"I had heard a little bush poetry as a kid, but it was at Katoomba that I knew Bush Poetry was for me," Greg said.

Katoomba in the Blue Mountains had a bush poetry group, with Milton Taylor, Denis Kevans, Terry Regan, and Brian Bell contributing.

Greg had just given up his job as a coach driver—mainly driving on local tours and acting as a guide.

"I had some free time, and I went to one of the Katoomba meetings and thought, 'Wow. Why haven't I heard this before?'" Greg said.

A previous job as a guide at the Jenolan Caves had also added some confidence in public speaking and dealing with the public.

Greg had also seen Peter Berner perform The Man From Snowy River on TV, and was amazed Peter could remember all of the poems, so he set about learning probably Australia's most famous poem himself.

On a coach trip to Canberra, he had previously found a copy of Jim Haynes' book 'An Australian Heritage of Verse'.

By this time Greg had started driving trucks and had time to learn the words of "The Man From Snowy River".

Then "The Geebung Polo Club".

It was the poem, "The Geebung Polo Club" that Greg first performed at the Katoomba poets' meeting.

"Kerry Regan had to prompt me", Greg remembers.

Greg was introduced to the Australian Bush

Poets competitions, and as well Milton had a small competition going at Hampton.

His first big competition success was at the Man From Snowy River Festival at Corryong in Victoria.

"I had met Frank Daniel at Tamworth and he told me if I wanted to win at Corryong I had to do something different".

Well, he did something different.

He recited the poem using a variety of accents.

Some in the audience were horrified but

back then in 2004, his performances were enough to lead to a few wins.

His first paid gig was a half-hour session at an Old Boys' night at a local school.

Greg turned Professional Bush Poet in 2010—if driving a cab three nights a week allows him to qualify.

Greg had started writing his own poems fairly early in the piece, with The Tradesman first to arrive.

Currently, he has about 100 poems in his folio

Greg came to Winton almost by accident.

He was on a bit of a holiday and Mel and Susie were at the van park.

A couple of years later, on a holiday to Uluru, they called to ask if he would fill in for a couple of weeks as they had been called away.

That was in 2014.

There was a bit of a stint in Cloncurry the next year and in 2016 Mel and Susie asked Greg to take over at Winton as they wanted to move to Lightning Ridge. And so he started his Winton gig in 2016.

At the Vision Splendid Outback Film Festival the next year, film Artistic Director Greg Dolgopolov arranged for Greg North to perform a daily poetry session at the North Gregory Hotel.

The Caravan Park in Winton has a long tradition of Bush Poetry.

Gloria Hitson began the show in 1991.

In those days Gloria would serve up a camp-oven meal six days a week as well as perform—as well as running a business buying and grading 'roo hides.

Nell Perkins, Milton Taylor, Melanie Hall, and Susie Carcary then followed.

Greg has an impressive record—three books, three CDs, and two DVDs.

He has been Secretary, Treasurer and Web Administrator of the ABPA.

His favourite poem? Wheat by C J Dennis.

The poem he is most proud of? Gundungurra Man.

"This one poem took me 18 months to write but also won me \$1000 in the Gippsland Golden Wattle Competition."

Favourite Banjo Paterson poem?

The Man from Snowy River.

Currently, Greg is working full-time in Winton at van parks, special events, festivals and tour buses.

And still writing Bush Poetry.

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Tambo artists' work helps

As a part of a call for expressions of interest, Tambo artists and proud Bidjara women Ann Russell and Deann Frousheger have produced a unique artwork, Coming Together. The query came from the Central West Hospital and Health Service as a part of its First Nations Health Equity Strategy.

Central West Executive Director of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Dan Carter said the health service was in the process of finalising said strategy.

"We expect to launch the strategy later in the year, and we were keen to have a unique piece of First Nations art commissioned to illustrate the strategy document throughout," he said.

"We wanted the artwork to tell a story that linked the delivery of health services with First Nations culture.

"We called for Expressions of Interest and Aunty Ann and her daughter Deann have done us very proud indeed with their contribution which we have selected."

The mother and daughter team worked together on the traditional piece.

"Our artwork shows the fine line connec-

tion that runs between the local communities linked by the river system and the medical professionals that visit our district of the Central West," Aunty Ann said.

"The meeting places connected together in

the artwork represent the towns in the Central West district—all linked with the river system.

"The handprints represent the local services that are in our communities.

"The footprints represent the visiting health

professionals that come to our communities.

"The animal prints are emu, kangaroo and echidna tracks, while the border represents the continued communication between all of our communities."

Aunty Ann said she and Deann worked mostly in acrylics and pens to create artworks that told the story of their connection to the land

"Working together enables our art to create tangible memories while sharing knowledge and respect for our culture," she said. "There is a voice in our works. It sings to the spirit of who we are as women. It connects us."

Aunty Ann said she and Deann had helped run multiple art workshops for the Central West Aboriginal Co-operative in their community, with the resulting works contributed to the opening of the art gallery in Barcaldine.

"We also worked with the Tambo community and with fellow Indigenous artists Aunty Joyce Crombie and Aunty Jean Barr-Crombie as well as Red Ridge Interior Queensland to create pieces of the story of the river in flood," she said.

Great start to life: First Nations Baby Bundles initiative

Baby bundles, an initiative from the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Health Unit, aims to improve birthing experiences for First Nations mums across central west Queensland.

"First Nations babies account for about nine per cent of our overall births each year," Central West Hospital and Health Service First Nations Health Equity Strategy Senior Planning Officer Tia Whyman said.

"We understand the importance of ensuring that the birthing experience for all moth-

ers and families of First Nations babies is not only clinically excellent but also culturally sensitive and appropriate.

"As such, we are introducing a First Nations Baby Bundle initiative to help support our mothers and their new babies.

"Women will receive the bag when booking in for their care at Longreach hospital."

Ms Whyman said the Baby Bundle would include practical products suitable for mothers and babies, such as a bag with newborn

nappies, nursing pads, baby wipes, baby body wash, a bib, singlet, and a onesie, baby bowl and spoon and a swaddle.

Also in the bundle will be information relevant to the first year of the baby's life, such as breastfeeding, bottle feeding and bathing, as well as information about local maternal and child care services and how to contact them.

"The bag is also about encouraging women to get to their antenatal appointments to help improve baby health outcomes such as healthy birth weights," Ms Whyman said.

Ms Whyman said the introduction of the First Nations Baby Bundle initiative coincided with two Longreach Hospital midwives undertaking training under the First 1000 Days Australia program.

"The First 1000 Days Australia program aims to improve awareness of First Nations cultures and needs during pregnancy, as well as providing culturally appropriate maternity information,," Ms Whyman said.



Built to last

For the first time, *The Block* is heading out of the city, taking five couples to Gisborne South in Victoria, where they'll face a new level of challenges. Host Scott Cam tells **Siobhan Duck** about unexpected difficulties and what it takes to make it through the reality juggernaut

ETWEEN the trade shortages and the celebrity couple who packed up and left in the middle of the night, The Block's tree change has certainly been a rocky road for host Scott Cam.

But after 12 years at the helm of the reality renovation juggernaut, Cam isn't too fazed by these sorts of on-site dramas.

Plus, he says, it's important to keep "things in perspective", especially when construction supply shortages and delays are not unique to *The Block*.

"We had a timber shortage, supply chain shortage, and we had a tradesmen shortage and we had rising costs," Cam says.

"But we've got a network behind us. Can you imagine a mum and dad who are building a home and going through the same thing?

"It'd be an absolute travesty. So, we could never cry foul for us. There are more important things than our show."

Supply stresses aside, Cam laughs that the most challenging part of renovating five farmhouses at the foot of the Macedon Ranges proved to be far less salacious than the stories making headlines.

"I think the mud was just the biggest challenge for our contestants and for everybody," he says.

"Just getting through that mud every day was a real struggle. And it was -2 or -3 degrees, so everybody was cold, and it was a little bit drizzly with sideways rain when the wind blew up, and so, the site just never dried out for about a month and a half.

"That really got everyone down. The contestants. The crew.

Everybody was in really tough conditions.

"But that's what we're about in Australia."

Of course, while Cam spent long days on set, he was still able to escape the sodden site whenever he needed some respite from the mayhem (and the mud).

"I didn't live there [on the work site] permanently, I do have an apartment in Port Melbourne, so I was back and forth," he explains.

"You know I have been doing this a long time. I am 60 years old, and I am not a contestant, so I need a hot shower every now and then.

"I did stay out there though because I love the bush. I love an open fire and having a few beers.

"So, the impact was minimal for me. I stayed out there when I wanted to, otherwise I went home. The interesting thing about our tree change to Gisborne is it's only 35 minutes from the city."

Not everyone found the adjustment as easy to navigate as Cam.

Former AFL footballer Joel Patfull and his influencer fiancée Elle Ferguson left the series just 48 hours after arriving on the 60-acre block.

The duo has since claimed they fled to show to be at the bedside of Patfull's mother, who broke her neck in a fall. The couple said when they were unable to get a straight answer from the production team about whether they could take a leave of absence, they had no choice but to bow out.

But that's all news to Cam, who contends that the couple left in the middle of the night without telling anyone where they were going or if they were coming back.

"Well, The Block is not for everybody. And maybe it wasn't their cup of tea," he shrugs diplomatically.

"The thing is, you'll have to ask them about why they left. Because we weren't aware of the reasons why when they left. They disappeared and they didn't really tell us why. But we wish them well."

Cam refutes any suggestion that filming the series in a rural area rather than in the CBD (as has always been done in previous seasons) may have made the experience harder on the contestants.

"The town of Gisborne is only five minutes away," he explains.

"So, they're not out of town really, they're just close by to a different town.

"It is quite amazing that some people still don't know that it's 12 weeks of high vis and hard work.

"We do give them beds! And they do get to have hot showers and have portables [toilets].

"But yes, they do think it's smoke and mirrors and I try to warn them on day one that it's not smoke and mirrors.

"We tell them that in interviews too. What you see is what you get. And it's true, you will have to do everything. There's no team that comes in when the cameras stop rolling, because, in fact, the camera never stops rolling."

Cam says he has no hard feelings about Ferguson and Patfull quitting the show, only the manner in which they did it.

"I wish them all the success in the world in the future, it's just about going about things in the right way," he says, adding that Ryan and Rachel



- the couple who ultimately replaced Patfull and Ferguson - had been great additions to the cast.

OF HIGH VIS AND HARD WORK

Once again, this year, fans can expect a colourful cast of characters wielding hammers and paint brushes on *The Block*.

There's plumber Tom and his straight-talking wife Sarah-Jane; ex-Neighbours star Sharon and her husband Ankur; Gold Coast builder Dylan and his glamourous chippie girlfriend, Jenny; and finally, rugby player Omar and his best mate Oz.

"There's a real cross-section of the community, which I really love," explains Cam.

"And there's a diversification of people like the boys from southwest Sydney [Omar and Oz, who are the show's first practicing Muslim contestants].

"It's the first time we've experienced [the impact of] Ramadan."

When observing the month-long tradition of Ramadan, Omar and

Oz were not able to eat or drink so much as sip of water between sunrise and sunset. Cam was in awe of Omar and Oz's perseverance and their positive attitude throughout the more arduous experience.


Cam has seen roughly 170 contestants tackle *The Block* over the years with varying degrees of success and controversy.

"I understand what they've gone through, and I know how hard it is to do," he says.

"Sometimes in the heat of the moment there's some battles, but then at the end of the day, it all comes good.

"And I don't have favourites. I respect everybody that's gone through and pushed on and created a home in 12 weeks. I think it's amazing. If you've done *The Block*, then hats off to you."

MY BIG FAT GREEK WEDDING 2 9Gem, Saturday, 8.30pm, PG (2016)

More than a decade after the smash hit original, we re-enter the lives of Toula (Nia Vardalos, pictured) and Ian (John Corbett), who are struggling with a prosaic stage of marriage, along with the troubles that come with having a rebellious teenage daughter (Elena Kampouris). Family and tradition are the themes in a story that isn't afraid to play on cultural stereotypes, but it is the film's sentimentality and Vardolos' spirited performance that get it over the line. ***



CHILDREN OF MEN
SBS World Movies, Monday, 9.30pm, MA15+ (2006)

Absolutely brilliant sci-fi thriller from director Alfonso Cuarón, based on a P.D. James novel which presents a chilling vision of 2027. In a world where women are infertile, a one-time activist (Clive Owen) is forcibly recruited by his "terrorist" ex-lover (Julianne Moore, pictured with Owen) to escort humankind's sole pregnant woman to safety – an act that could potentially save the species from extinction. Action seems to materialise out of nowhere in Cuarón's grim yet life-affirming film. ***

HERE OUT WEST ABC TV, Sunday, 8.30pm

The cultural melting pot of inner-west Sydney is the landscape behind this compelling anthology-style story of eight diverse people, whose lives become connected through the tumultuous events of a single day. Each tale was penned by a different emerging new writer. Among the stars of this ambitious and tender feature film are Genevieve Lemon (*The Power Of The Dog*), Leah Vandenberg (*The Letdown*) and Rahel Romahn (*Mr Inbetween*), with Leah Purcell (*Cleverman*) and Fadia Abboud (*Barons*) among the ensemble of directors. Viewers aren't given long to get to know any of the characters, but the plot involving a newborn kidnapped from a maternity ward is striking.

Propelled by a personal link to maritime and the sea and a penchant for history's stories, he begins by undergoing an intense two-month scuba training program that would scare off most novices. There are beautiful and eerie sights to behold, but it's Kemp's openness, and the tales of those who perished, that bubbles to the surface.



THE PUBLIC IMAGE IS ROTTEN SBS Viceland, Saturday, 8.30pm

Fans of singer-songwriter John Lydon (pictured), aka Johnny Rotten, will latch onto this wideranging documentary

about the outspoken Sex Pistols and Public Image Ltd frontman. For others, this deep-dive into the larger-than-life punk icon's world could be a yawn-inducing affair. Featuring the Englishman divulging on his early life, career and choices, Rotten is a much more mellow figure than during his early days on stage and, to his credit, he's not afraid to reveal his vulnerable side. Musicians such as Moby and Red Hot Chili Peppers bassist Flea also chat about the singer's influence in the music landscape.



AUSTRALIA'S FAVOURITE TREE ABC TV, Tuesday, 8.30pm

Paul West and Dr Ann Jones (both pictured) are on a unique mission to find Australia's most treasured tree. As kids,

we probably all had a favourite to climb or admire, but do we forget the magic of trees as we get older? West and Jones travel to each state and territory to uncover the history and makeup of some of our most remarkable native trees, speaking with scientists and First Nations people about everything from trees' resilience to the roles they play in the natural world. In Tassie, it's beguiling viewing as Paul becomes one of the first people to climb into the canopy of a Huon pine.

2022 Garden competition

With the weather this week beginning to show the faintest hint of spring, I thought it would be a good time to encourage potential garden competition entrants to begin preparing for this year's competition.

Barcaldine Regional Council, Blackall Tambo Regional Council and Boulia Shire Councils are all conducting garden competition this year.

A couple of months ago I posed the question to Cindy Capoy Morgan of Blackall Tambo Regional Council about what are the top five flowering annuals excluding Petunias for a Western garden, these were her suggestions.

5. Salvias — these splendid plants, native to Brazil, could be classed as a busy perennial with vividly coloured flowers.

They need little in the way of maintenance provided, they do not need much sun, and have good drainage.

There are many striking colours such as Blaze of Fire and Bonfire and they would be perfect for a garden competition display.

4. Vinca — are very hardy and should grow well in Western Queensland, as long as the garden soil is friable, well-drained, and has organic matter such as compost or well-rotted manure mixed in it.

One of the best varieties of Vinca to look for is Dynasty, which has a mix of five colours, burgundy, coral, light and dark pink, and red

3. Snapdragons —undoubtedly one of the best known of all annual plants because of their unique flower, they can make a brilliant flowering feature in most gardens.

They are best suited to a sunny, well-drained position.

One of the best varieties of Snapdragon to look for is Excalibur.

Handy Hint: Snapdragons can be cut back after the first flowering to enable a further flush of blooms.

2. Pansies — while pansies have been grown in Australian gardens for many years, the introduction of new hybrids such as Giant Butterfly, Swiss Giant, Waterfall, and Whiskers can give a kaleidoscope of colour around your garden.

It is always best to position a garden of pansies where they have protection from the hot afternoon sun when they are in flower, and they should always be away from the roots of large shrubs or trees, which will reduce their floral display.

1. Impatiens — these are also known to many gardeners as Balsams or Busy Lizzies, and would you believe that there are around 450 varieties around the world?

Impatiens will be available in pink, red, and white flowers, and will grow just as well in pots and hanging baskets as they will in the ground, as long as you give them plenty of water.

Impatiens will brighten up a shady corner in a Western garden and will always have a stunning display.

One of the toughest varieties of Impatiens is the Impatiens Swing keep an eye out for this one in your local nursery.

WEEKS TO GARDEN COMPETITIONS

For many Garden competition entrants, this time of the year means adding finishing touches to gardens that have been worked in all year round, but for many others who are not quite so dedicated, now is the time to begin sprucing up your potentially prize-winning garden.

However, pruning and fertilising the week before judging will not make a prize-winning garden.

With just a little time and effort, combined with the right advice, you could turn your very average garden into a beautiful landscape that even a professional gardener would be proud of.





To help you begin, here is a list of what judges can look for in a winning garden

- 1. Layout and design consider the convenience of people's movements and viewing.
- Health and hygiene weed control, insects, pests, diseases, general condition of plants.
- 3. Cultural practices mulching, ground cov-
- er cultivation, fertilising, and compost heap. 4. General appearance — the overall visual im-
- 4. General appearance the overall visual impact and atmosphere of the garden.5. Variety of plant species good distribution
- of flowering time, etc, and species suitable to our climate.

 6. Convenience and maintenance bed edging, lawns, water taps, irrigation, problem
- slopes, corners etc.
 7. Garden features pools, furniture, waterfalls, fish ponds, ornaments, etc.

For all of those new or novice gardeners, I would recommend visiting the champion gardens.

As one of the best ways of planning your own championship garden for next year is by learning from someone else's successes or mistakes.

Rissmerino breed values

Producing wool that excites from sheep that thrive in all conditions is the aim of the Rissmann family.

The Queensland-based growers select wools that are soft to touch and bright white with no colour, featuring a deep bold horseshoe crimp and highly aligned fibres.

Trevor, Linda, Alan, and Kaylee Rissmann operate the Rissmerino Stud at Yelarbon, and will offer 80 rising two-year-old drought hardy, long-bodied, white woollen stud poll rams on Friday, August 12 from 1pm at the Longreach showgrounds.

The auction will be hosted by AWN and LRW Rural and interfaced with FarmGate Auc-

The family bought the entire draft of 1539 pregnant ewes and 58 sires offered at the first stage of the Well Gully Poll Merino dispersal sale in 2018 and had been selling the resulting rams by private treaty and at their first onproperty sale in 2021.

The Well Gully Poll Merinos are running at the Rissmann's property in a 550mm rainfall zone on brigalow-belah clay loam soils.

The adult ewes average 18.5 micron and cutting an average of 6-7kg with a 70 per cent

Co-principal Alan Rissmann said the family aimed to breed dual-purpose poll Merinos with the ability to thrive in the harsh environment while producing soft, white and breathable wool able to resist fleece rot and fly strike.

Mr Rissmann said the stud focuses on drought-hardy, easy-care sheep with lustrous white wool backed by comprehensive data col-

"We want great wool on an animal which doesn't require much looking after," he said.

"We select for a good crimp definition as a

"If the fibres are evenly spaced and well aligned, there is nowhere for that moisture to get caught and trapped, and it doesn't provide an environment for flies and bacteria to breed causing flystrike and fleece rot.

"The softness of wool is another indicator of highly aligned fleece resistant to flystrike and fleece rot.'

This allows for non-mulesed sheep.

No sheep have been mulesed at Rosedale

Mr Rissmann said fertility was a key profit driver within the stud, with a 135 per cent marking based on ewes joined including

Although the flock experienced significant fly and worm pressure from 450mm of rain between October and December, the AI ewes

scanned at 148 per cent, AI backup ewes at 113 per cent, stud maidens at 124 per cent, and commercials including maidens at 145 per

"The sheep were close on full wool running in tall grass and didn't dry out for three months - there was no treatment but less than 5 per cent were flyblown around the crutch," he

"Those treated were culled and we have been left with a very fly-resistant flock of ewes.

"Having good quality wool is a key part of not having flystrike issues.'

The balanced breeding program takes into account positive fat and eye muscle depth to increase fertility, lamb survival, lamb growth rates, the number of lambs sold, eating quality and value of surplus ewes.

An early maturing animal results in high weaning weights and a smaller, efficient adult

"We focus on early growth, high fat and muscle — we are not trying to produce 70-80kg ewes but want our ewes to reach 55-60kg at a younger age," Mr Rissmann said.

"Early maturity is linked to fertility as it allows producers to get their lambs to a saleable weight quickly.

"The biggest loss of lambs, aside from the first two days of their life, is around weaning time, so fast-growing lambs with the ability to get through weaning comfortably will reduce losses, increase welfare and lift profitability.'

Rissmerino sheep are backed by comprehensive data collection, with all lambs running together until 11 months of age while collecting fleece, carcase, weight and visual data.

'We use ASBVs to select for genetically superior sheep, not just the ones who look the best on the day," Mr Rissmann said.

"Fleece test information is used to generate accurate ASBVs but this year we collected preshearing data, so the sheep were drafted up into micron lines at shearing time.

"We ended up with a bale of sub-15-micron wool and two of 15.5 microns.

"With the fine wool micron premiums being so high currently, this will be a great return

Mr Rissmann said Rissmerino sheep were bred for feed efficiency on lower quality pastures in an arid environment.

'You don't have to spend money and time feeding them — nobody loves feeding sheep,'

"Indications are high levels of fat cover on a sheep gives better whole-body energy allowing them to grow better quality wool and meat.

"They gain energy reserves while there is green grass and when it dries off, they can use those energy reserves to survive through the dry periods.

Mr Rissmann said the family chose to interface their ram sale with the digital selling platform FarmGate Auctions following the success of the 2021 on-property sale.

"FarmGate Auctions was invaluable to us last year with one-third of our rams making more money because of the online bidding,

"Digital selling is essential these days and allows people on busy schedules to join the auction at any time."

More breeding ewes reported for spring to MLA

Australian sheep producers have reported a total breeding flock of 42.5 million head, an increase of 500,000 ewes since last year, according to Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA) and the Australian Wool Innovation's (AWI) Wool and Sheepmeat Survey Report for June

MLA and AWI's Wool and Sheepmeat Survey, run three times a year, collects sheepmeat industry livestock numbers and lamb production expectations. Production and producer intentions are regularly monitored to generate better forward-looking information that allows producers to make the most efficient decisions, with the results of these surveys forming the basis of MLA's Industry Projections.

Merinos accounted for 72 per cent of the total breeding ewe flock.

Merino breeding ewes were further divided into Merino ewes for purebred Merino production and Merino ewes for crossbred

production and 'other' Merinos, accounting for 51 per cent, 19 per cent, and 2 per cent of the merino flock, respectively.

There were 22 million lambs on hand reported by Australian producers.

Merinos made up 55 per cent of the total lamb flock, at 12 million head, followed by First Cross and Pure Meat lambs (accounting for 19 per cent and 17 per cent of the national lamb flock respectively).

The breeding ewe population was largest in the Great Southern region of Western Australia at 5.6m, Central West NSW at 5.0m and Southeast NSW at 4.8m. While the number of lambs on hand in the survey was greatest in Central West NSW at 3.1 million.

This was followed by southern WA at around 2.7m head.

According to Ripley Atkinson, Senior Market Information Analyst at MLA, the desire to retain breeding ewe populations stems from stellar growing seasons, particularly in the eastern states.

"Compared to the last survey released in February of this year, 27 per cent of producers surveyed said that they would like to increase their ewe flock, while 60 per cent indicated they would like to retain current numbers," he said.

"The majority of this growth is coming from eastern Victoria, northern NSW and southern Queensland where there have been very wet conditions.

"This demonstrates plenty of confidence in the market with room for growth moving into spring.

A total of 7.3 million lambs were marked in the four months. Merinos accounted for the largest proportion of lambs marked in the past four months at 47 per cent.

First cross breeds and Pure meat account for 28 per cent and 18 per cent, respectively.

While 7.6 million ewes were joined to produce the lambs that were marked in the past four months.

National Merino marking rates were be-

low that of non-merino breeds at 93 per cent and 101 per cent respectively.

A total number of 7.6 million lambs are expected to be sold in the next four months, approximately 34 per cent of the total number of lambs on hand.

Of these: Merino, First cross breeds and Pure Meat are expected to account for 36 per cent, 29 per cent, and 23 per cent of lamb sales respectively.

NSW and Victoria are expected to account for 48 per cent and 18 per cent of total lamb sales over the next four months, with around 5m lambs expected to be on offer in both

This is followed by Western Australia and South Australia at 13 per cent and 12 per cent of total lamb sales, respectively.

'With the Bureau of Meteorology forecasting strong seasonal conditions for the eastern states as the new season lambs hit the market, the signs are looking positive for the Australian sheepmeat industry," said Mr Atkinson.

China hungry for more

China has shown continuing demand for Australian protein despite its slowing economy and continued lockdowns.

Speaking on a newly-released podcast, Is the Chinese meat market still firing?, Rabobank's Hong Kong-based senior animal protein analyst Chenjun Pan said China's lockdown policies have affected the population's protein consumption habits, with the major short-term change being where people are consuming food.

"In the past, banquets played an important role in rural areas and smaller cities. Because of the lockdowns, the banquets have disappeared, and the number of business events and dinners have also declined," she said.

However, Ms Pan said, Chinese consumers, are continuing to consume animal protein at home and via food delivery - with food dethrough the pandemic.

"The emergence of food delivery services is having a heavy impact on the traditional food service sector in China," she told the

The trend of "convenience food" was also growing in the Chinese market.

"The categories of ready-to-eat, ready-tocook and ready-to-heat type convenience foods are booming," she said.

Security measures welcome

The National Farmers' Federation (NFF) has welcomed the release of the National Biosecurity Strategy, describing it as a critical step in safeguarding Australia's farm sector.

NFF President Fiona Simson said the immense pressure on Australia's biosecurity system warranted a clear strategy for the future.

"The NFF called for the development of this

This guidance is necessary to move the whole system towards common goals of embracing innovation and technology, deepening partnerships, and improving collaboration."

Ms Simson said the Strategy must be reviewed and updated and importantly it must be reported against.

"It has rightly set some transformational objectives, and governments must be held accountable to make sure they deliver against the plan," she said.

This strategy must signal the start of a series of important steps-and it has to be executed and implemented in a way that improves confidence and awareness.

1 serve per portion

- 5 eggs, lightly beaten

- 1 medium onion, grated
- 3 zucchinis, grated

Some words long remembered and not easily undone

Events of the past week have made me think of incidents of the angry parent syndrome during my time in sport.

Unfortunately, he went about venting those in an inappropriate way and is suffering the consequences.

My earliest memory of an ugly parent incident was at an Under 12s cricket game. I had opened the batting, and did ok; my Dad had reacted in his usual positive way even though I hadn't got a standout score.

Replacing me at the crease was a young boy named David. Talented, nice kid, he proceeded to tear the opposition apart in a brutal display of great cricket shots.

I remember sitting there wishing I could

have just one of his shots, as he peppered the ball all over the ground for a stunning 100, a big feat in a shortened junior game. After he got to a 100 he played a loose shot. Was he bored, tired, or as in most 11-year-olds he might have lost concentration. After he came off the field his Dad grabbed his arm and took him a short distance away, not far enough that we couldn't hear the abuse being hurled at the poor kid.

It got to the point that my Dad, the team manager, had to go over and have a quiet word.

I remember the car trip home was quiet, I hope my Dad knows how much I appreciated

his support during my sports career.

These memories are clearly still there with me, but they were triggered more by the positivity I have seen in my recent time in sport.

As I listened to the radio on the drive back from the Under 11 hockey competition in Mackay, all I could think of was what a great experience Alex and I had had over the weekend.

Now a Dad, I want Lloydy Junior to do well, as I do for all the kids I coach and have involvement in sport, but the lifelong memory of their enjoyment during their formative years in Longreach.


