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# Housing hit to jobs

As the housing crisis across the state continues to creep into the employment sector, Western Queensland towns are revealing a new face of homelessness.

Colin Tidswell, AnglicareCQ Case Manager of Housing and Homelessness located in Longreach said homelessness is an issue in Western Queensland that many in the community aren't aware of.

Sometimes someone will turn up seeking his assistance who moved out west to start a new life and things take a turn for the worse, and there are others who need temporary emergency accommodation or relief food packages.

"Some are from long-term Western Queensland families where there has been a health, family or financial crisis.

"Only a small portion of the homeless are on the street, most are couch surfing, camping or in temporary accommodation," Mr Tidswell reveals.

"Many in our community aren't aware of who is homeless around them. It could be the cashier at the local shop who serves you."

Earlier this year the Western Queensland Alliance of Council's Assembly met, encom-

passing Western Queensland local governments, of northwest, central west, and southwest.

It reminds me of who little I know and how much I need to grow—no pun intended.

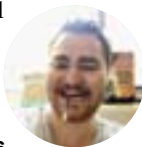
Over the past year, I have looked to learn as much as I can about the agriculture industry.

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# A formidable team

### Izzy

"We're each other's lifejackets when we're lost at sea," co-director of RNI Coppo, Isabel Coppo said.

She first arrived in Australia in 2018; she was backpacking through Europe and built a curiosity for the country through fellow travel mates.

Ironically, after a two-month sting in Melbourne, she would build a brooding dislike for the land down under.

"I thought Australians were so laid back and fun, and I thought, 'I'll give Australia a go because I wasn't sure what else I wanted to do,'" she said.

"But when I got to Melbourne, I hated it, I remember being on the phone to mum and dad and saying, 'this Australian thing is not for me.

"It was expensive, and I couldn't get a job—and I got hustle."

But Izzy would give it another shot; and after a short stint at Apollo Bay, she saw an ad for the Wellshot Hotel on a backpacker's Facebook group.

"I was about to leave because I was running out of money, but I thought to myself 'I've made it this far, I'll give it one more chance [the Apollo Bay job]," she said.

"And while that didn't work out, I was having a lot of fun."

Upon arriving in the central west, Izzy would experience another side to Australian life.

"When I got off the plane, I was like 'wow, this place is hot,'" she said.

"I remember thinking to myself, 'this ain't it, just get in, get out'.

"But... even before I met Riley when I was in Ilfracombe—I started to fall in love with the area."

### Riley

RNI Coppo co-director Riley deferred from an engineering degree when he fell in love with the outback.

After attending Marist Ashgrove with multi-generational local Fergus Emmott and befriending him, Riley would spend many holidays at Noonbah Station, south of Longreach.

As a part of his gap year, Riley worked all of 2013 on the property.

"I really loved going there for holidays, and I really really wanted to experience working there," he said.

"After a year, I cancelled my uni application much to my parent's chagrin.

"They then said, 'well sort something out, now you've cancelled University—do something!'"

Riley then chose to become a local sparky.

"I went back to Noonbah for 2014 and at the end of 2015 I organised a trade," he said.

"I made a lot of friends out here and there's a very laid back lifestyle out here, which I got very used to.

"It's lovely—you walk down the street, you say hello to everyone, everyone gives you a wave, it's quiet, it's not busy with traffic, it's just easier to live."

### The Wellshot

On a fateful day in 2018 at the Wellshot Hotel, Riley Coppo did not notice Izzy Hodgman-Burns at all.

But she did notice him.

Like a scene in a spaghetti western: Riley pushed back the saloon doors of the pub, the hot Ilfracombe sun beating on his back.

"I remember not being around handsome men for weeks at a time, and I remember when I saw him I thought, 'woah, he's cute, I'm going to try something with him,'" Izzy said.

"I thought I would be out [of the central west] in a few weeks, and I think that's kind of why I decided to just go for it."

Izzy would download the dating phone app Tinder, exclusively to hunt down her objective.

"I spent hours swiping right vigorously and he never came up," she said.

"A normal human would have thought, 'oh, he's taken', but not me.

"So I searched him on Facebook, I remembered his name from the print on his shirt."

Izzy then asked Riley to the Longreach Rodeo—a night that would be full of unfortunate occurrences.

Riley, naturally friendly and nice, would initially make Izzy feel comfortable; however, due to his popularity - and the obscurity surrounding him, as an introvert, being out at a social gathering.

"I get brought into town by my manager Sandra Warren (nee Radner), and Riley is not super good at flirting so it's sort of just like friends talking," she said.

"He was like, you can sleep on my couch, you don't have to go back to Ilfracombe (sincerely without any suggestiveness).

"I was unsure at that point if it was only a friend thing."

That was when Riley got pulled aside by a number of local girls, which he claimed was irritating.

Izzy was stuck, alone, with one of Riley's friends, and upon asking him about Riley's character, said friend replied, 'technically he's single, but he's pretty much the manwhore of Longreach'.

Nothing could have been further from Riley's altruistic, stoic, and ultimately shy character; he claimed he would not have even gone to the event without Izzy.

Yet... as Izzy turned her head, Riley had his hand draped over another girl.

Izzy saw red.

Left with her friend Sandra and began sending Riley a series of abusive text messages.

"Then he had the gall to come into the Wellshot and order lunch," she said.

"He came in happy-go-lucky, and I purposefully put in his order incorrectly.

"Then Riley said, 'that's not what I ordered, but that looks fantastic'.

"It was impossible then for me to stay mad."

After an apology from Izzy, the two would begin talking again and Riley would begin to frequent the Wellshot.

"At one point I said, 'buddy... you can stop coming in here for no reason and you can ask me on a date already.'"

"And then he replies, 'oh, well do you want to go on a date?'.

"Obviously."

The date went well.

When it rains, it pours; Izzy would stay the night and then move in only two weeks later.

"Once it was on, it was on; we were engaged a year after that," Izzy said.

### Moving in

Before attending TAFE down south, Riley asked Izzy to look after his dog, Tictac.

And despite it being early in their relationship, Izzy began to see sense in the notion of moving in with Riley.

"I was paying \$200 in rent a week for accommodation, and I was not even staying there," she said.

At that point, it was a now-or-never situation for the couple with Izzy's visa running out.

"I wanted to know," she said.

"Let's go into this and see if it works because I don't have all the time in the world.

"So I texted him... 'hey, I hope that offer still stands because... I have already moved all

my stuff in.'"

Izzy applied for a permanent stay visa shortly after that.

"It felt very right," Riley said.

"We complement each other very well."

Riley is stoic, practical cheery and introverted, while Izzy is ambitious, unquiet, and extroverted.

### Robust and Ignited, building a business together

"I think of all the outrageous, let's grow, while Riley is more about narrowing down what we actually can do," Izzy said.

"Riley is the workhorse, and I do the behind-the-scenes stuff."

"She pushes me to be on the ball," Riley replied.

"She can be anxious, which is a good thing it helps us consider things outside of the box with work."

"While Riley is less anxious which helps me calm down when I need to," Izzy said.

Riley and Izzy, through their bond, have begun building a much-needed electrical service to the Longreach and surrounding community.

Shortly after Riley and Izzy's honeymoon, Riley's former bosses, Andrew and Lou Secombe planned to move on from his business.

"I had been working for him for three years and going into my fourth," Riley said.

"And he said I should look into getting my contractor's license saying he was battered and bruised and only 42 and didn't want to be doing it forever—looking to scale down as he was building the Muddy Duck Caravan Park on the other side of the Thomson.

"So we started looking at venturing out on our own."

Through 2021, Riley and Izzy slowly built up their own business, RNI Coppo Electrical piece by piece.

The couple said the timing had fit perfectly with their desires to settle down together.

"We were at a standstill and we wanted a challenge and to have more freedom," she said.

"We felt like, in our situation at the time, things like that and starting a family wasn't possible.

"We were smart with our money, but we felt we couldn't save."

The challenge of building the business from scratch, moving home, and settling into the Longreach community has strengthened the pair's bond.

"We have a shared trauma," Izzy said.

"No one in the world knows what I've experienced, except for Riley and vice versa."

As initial outsiders, both Riley and Izzy said they have felt 'extremely' welcomed by the community.

"The community has helped me a lot, and being able to offer something back means a lot," Izzy said.

"It's great to know the people you work for and the differences you can make.

"Every customer we've had so far has helped us in ways you can't even know."



# No place to call home

Earlier this year the Western Queensland Alliance of Council's Assembly met, encompassing Western Queensland local governments, of northwest, central west, and southwest.

Housing shortages are an issue felt by towns all over outback Australia, it directly affects worker shortages, and is a major detriment to regional economies.

Earlier this year Executive Officer of North West Queensland Regional Organisation of Councils, Greg Hoffman said housing has been a priority area since the inception of the WQAC.

"Since we were established, we've been doing detailed research and analysis, and in the case of housing, we've developed a significant report which, for the first time, delved into great detail into the extent and great challenges faced by communities and individuals

wanting to buy or build housing in Western Queensland," Mr Hoffman said.

Mr Hoffman said WQAC had been working with, not only governments, but different industry interests such as the technology, building, and finance industries.

In March of this year, Mr Hoffman said 1,500 houses were currently needed in the private market and the State Government, themselves, were needing an additional 130, and councils needing 300 more.

A special Impact Economics analysis of five regional economies commissioned by Everybody's Home released this month, explores the connection between increased rents, low vacancy rates and unfilled job vacancies.

National spokesperson for the Everybody's Home campaign, Kate Colvin said the chronic lack of affordable housing in regional Australian communities is more than a social crisis.

"It's now a deep economic crisis as well," Ms Colvin said.

"The inability to find a rental, and eye-watering rent increases for the few places available is deterring people from taking up jobs in regional communities.

"Employers tell us constantly that prospective employees tell them they can't move to the community if they can't find a place to live.

"Our completely lopsided housing system is choking off the economic potential of

regional Australia. The connection between housing and jobs needs to be at the very top of the agenda for the employment summit next week."

Adam Klaproth is the manager of Housing and Homelessness for AnglicareCQ based in Rockhampton.

Mr Klaproth said homelessness in Western Queensland has gone unsighted for many years, however, as Central Queensland faces the current housing crisis even the Western corridor has not been spared.

"We find that in smaller towns community tends to look after community, but current rental increases and a lack of available housing is forcing people into inadequate housing solutions, like sleeping in cars or tents as a means to put shelter over their heads," Mr Klaproth said.

"This is also impacting the skilled workforce, with new families unable to source accommodation to relocate to areas and are having to knock back job opportunities because of this.

"AnglicareCQ do our best to assist people with emergency housing and support, but housing opportunities in the private market are becoming few and far between."

## Public holiday trading open to rural business

Major shops in rural areas will now be permitted to trade on public holidays according to The Trading (Allowable Hours) and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2022.

Industrial Relations Minister Grace Grace said the amendments would streamline and simplify Queensland retail trading hour laws.

"The Palaszczuk Government has always been committed to ensuring we strike the right balance between creating greater consumer choice while providing protections for retail workers and certainty for retail businesses," Ms Grace said.

"Before our reforms in 2017, there were almost 100 different trading hours zones across the state and a range of anomalies confusing businesses and customers.

"I am proud that we stepped up to change that, and that the five-year review from the Education, Employment and Training Committee from earlier this year shows those reforms have operated effectively, supporting businesses, consumers, and workers."

## Free DNA tests screen for disease

Thanks to Monash University, young Australians will now have access to a free DNA saliva test that will indicate whether the user has an increased risk of some cancers and heart disease.

Monash University's Associate Professor Paul Lacaze said the project enabled a more efficient and equitable approach to genetic testing, identifying far more people at high risk than current testing methods.

"We hope to identify those at risk while they are young and healthy, not after the fact, and empower them to make more informed decisions about their health," he said.

"For some people, this could save their lives through early detection and prevention of cancer and heart disease.

"This will also save considerable health system costs in Australia through prevention."

## Indonesian students learn about Australian biosecurity

Students from Indonesia's Gadjah Mada University have begun a 10-week course learning about biosecurity procedures and the NT cattle industry.

The Indonesia-Northern Territory Biosecurity Program (INTBP), was established by the Department of Industry, Tourism and Trade (DITT) and Gadjah Mada University to build great resilience for both nations around biosecurity.

CDU Vice-Chancellor Katherine and Big Rivers Region Alison Haines said the university is excited to be involved in this program and host the students on campus in Katherine for their initial training.

"Indonesia is one of our closest neighbours and the program helps foster understanding of Australian systems and processes when it comes to the livestock industry, biosecurity, production systems and the supply chain," Mrs Haines said.

"The students have been working with Agriculture and Rural Operations trainers to learn about pastoral industry work requirements and safety, the handling, treatment, transport and care of livestock and safety awareness when working around horses, cattle, chemicals, machinery, trucks and in remote areas."

# Cows euthanised after truck rollover

At 11.30am on Saturday 20 August a triple-carriage-road-train carrying cattle was coming eastbound along the Landsborough Highway when, upon passing through the roundabout on the intersection of Spoonbill St, its wheel hit the inside of the roundabout causing the second carriage to roll onto its right side.

Longreach Police Station Officer in Charge Al McPhee said the collision meant eight cattle had to be euthanised and one beast died during the rolling of the trailer.

"There was a fair bit of carnage; once a trailer rolls, you're going to get a fair bit of cattle injured," he said.

"They're heavy and when they fall on each other, they break bones.

"Some cattle escaped and there was a fair

bit of agitation going on with some of the beasts."

Mr McPhee said he was thankful for members of the community who assisted at the scene.

"The road was blocked, however, traffic was able to be diverted," he said.

"Locals helped contain the cattle—two did remain on the common at the end of the day who were quite fiery.

"The community needs to be thanked for their support—we do find in western towns, whenever people can assist they do without asking."

Mr McPhee said there was no injury to the driver and Rayner's Crane Hire was able to help the vehicle return to its upright state.

"[Events like this] are not common on the roundabout," he said.

"If you look at the amount of traffic it takes in a six-month period, the amount of trucks, it doesn't happen that often.

"There is a suggestion the truck came into the roundabout too quick."

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## CW councils to consider self funding for disasters

Due to the efforts of the central west councils, the position of Disaster Management Coordinator is not currently under any threat.

However, since the State Government has pulled funding from the role, funding for the role has been left to local governments.

RAPAD chair and Longreach Regional Council Mayor Tony Rayner said the role is critical to the region and has been “ably filled” by Craig Neuendorf.

“We just need to continue the funding to keep Craig on” he said.

“This is why we are getting each council to commit funding to the ongoing longevity of the role.”

Up until recently funding for the role had come from a mix of Local and State governments and is designed to plan ahead for possible disaster scenarios such as cyclones.

“All five councils will now co-contribute to the position, but if we can source longer-term funding from the State Government that would be a better arrangement,” Cr Rayner said.

“We will continue to fund the role fully until we can get some more funding.

“It is a critical position.”



# Honouring Vietnam vets

While the Longreach RSL Sub-Branch has seen a slow changing of the guard with more veterans from other conflicts than Vietnam Veteran's Day, branch president Joshua Adams has confirmed there will be no change to the name or significance of the day.

Mr Adams said despite the shift seen in other jurisdictions move away from specific days of commemoration towards a more generic Veterans Day, Longreach would continue to commemorate a specific Vietnam Veterans Day for as long as we have Vietnam Veterans amongst our ranks or until the veteran and wider community indicate otherwise.

"Vietnam Veterans Day is a day to commemorate those 60,000 Australians—sailors, soldiers, and airmen—who served in South Vietnam between 1962 and 1972. Of those soldiers, 521 died as a result of the war and over 3,000 were wounded," he said.

"The importance of a national day of commemoration is that at the time many veterans returned to Australia the political and social activism of the time prevented the recognition of those who served their nation."

Mr Adams said it was important to note many have fought in many conflicts across Australian history.

"Australians have served across some 27 conflicts since 1901, and very few of these conflicts have a specific day of commemoration," he said.

"In other jurisdictions, they have seen the adoption of Remembrance Sunday originally in recognition of the First World War and now in remembrance of all conflicts.

"In the US, they have seen the adoption of Memorial Day to commemorate those who have died while Veterans Day honours everyone who has served in the military.

"In Australia we have Anzac Day. While Anzac Day has significant links to the First World War, the meaning of this day has transitioned to include the remembrance of all Australians killed in military operations.

"Unless Longreach Veterans and the wider community seek change, I don't see any further days of commemoration being included on the Longreach calendar at this stage."

With the current Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide, Mr Adams said now was an important time to reflect on the importance soldiers past and present have in our community.

"Social isolation and veteran suicide are common issues throughout many communities, and Longreach is no exception," he said.

"The benefits of social inclusion and interaction, be it with local groups such as the RSL Sub-Branch, Men's Shed, Town Band or even just at the RSL Club for the Friday raffles can have great benefit to anyone and not just those who may be veterans (a veteran being someone having served in the Australian Defence Force for any period of time and not just those who have returned from active service).

"The Royal Commission into defence and Veteran Suicide has delivered its interim findings and continues to hear evidence relating to harrowing experiences. If you think someone

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# Tambo officer does his bit

Tambo Senior Constable Webber has made it his mission to make friends with as many locals as he can—sharing a cuppa.

With such a spread-out community, Senior Constable Webber said getting to meet and interact with many of these rural community members was a challenge.

“There are only a few streets in town, but the division includes approximately a hundred large properties operating as cattle and sheep stations,” he said.

“My wife, kids and I have become involved in the community through the school and volunteering to help at community events or with mustering on some of the properties.

“While I’ve had lots of interactions and been able to get to know quite a few graziers, there are still many people on the rural properties surrounding Tambo I haven’t had any contact with.

“They are good people who I’d like to build relationships with, but they fly under the radar.”

Senior Constable Webber and his family have embraced their new community, becoming

ing involved in local events and volunteering at properties.

To help meet and build rapport with these community members, Senior Constable Web-

ber has launched an initiative that involves the simple pleasure of stopping work to share a morning tea and a chat.

“I’ve called it ‘smoko with a cop’ because ‘smoko’ refers to the time-honoured tradition of downing tools and taking the time to relax and have a cuppa,” he said.

“People work hard out here, and as I’m the one doing the travelling and providing the morning tea, I’m hoping they’ll take up the opportunity to have me around for a bite to eat and a chat.

“There are a large number of properties I’ve never visited, so if it works out that I have one ‘smoko with a cop’ per week, I’ll be busy for at least the next year.”

Establishing good relationships with the community is important in all settings, but even more so in rural and remote environments according to Senior Constable Webber.

“In such a spread-out division, you rely on the whole community to be your eyes and ears.

“Issues such as trespass, poaching and damage to property can be a problem in the area, but we can’t act if we’re not aware of it.

“Many rural community members may be reluctant to report problems, but if they’ve met me first when there are no pressing issues, then they’ll be more likely to pick up the phone when there is.

“We can do a better job of policing when we have good connections and the support of our community. It’s ‘community policing 101’.”

Property owners within the Tambo police division are encouraged to register their interest in the initiative by contacting Senior Constable Webber at the Tambo Police Station by phone on 4652 5116.

Senior Constable Webber said country policing offered a unique and richly rewarding lifestyle that he hadn’t considered when he initially joined the QPS.

“You can really make a difference and become part of your community. People appreciate it when you help them out; they value the fact that you value them,” he said.

“When I worked in Brisbane, I worked under three sergeants who had done regional and remote policing and they all said I’d love it.

“They were right. I wish I’d done it sooner.”

## Drive for Drought returns, Angels out to break records

For its third annual event, Drive for Drought will look to exceed the \$135,000 for charity Drought Angels—looking to double the score.

Kicking off in Calliope on Friday 26 August, the 50+ car convoy will travel through nine drought-declared LGAs over eight days throughout north-west Queensland, with the final night to be celebrated at the Stockman’s Hall of Fame in Longreach.

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## Bench for stockman's family

The Shannon Family and friends gathered at the Eternal Muster garden at the Stockman's Hall of Fame in Longreach on Tuesday, 23 August to dedicate a commemorative seat honouring their forebears John and Margaret Shannon, and it was unveiled by Mr Don McDonald of Devenourt, Cloncurry.

John Shannon (1840-1927) was born at Hinton on the Hunter River.

He lost his father to a snake bite when he was eight and went to work at a young age.

He received no formal education before becoming a teamster carrying goods throughout central Queensland and northern New South Wales.

His wife Margaret Young (184 - 1916) was born near the McIntyre River and they married in 1865 before moving to Rockhampton.

John carted copper ore with his horse teams from Copperfield to the port at Broad-sound now called St. Lawrence.

150 years ago, they purchased their first property Saltbush Park on the Upper Fitzroy River in 1872.

Over the next 20 years, John and Margaret endured immense hardships from drought, floods, fires, and disease outbreaks before ultimately becoming successful in the 1890s.

During these years, they produced eleven children and together with their family, owned some 20 properties throughout Queensland.

The most western of these is Rodney Downs which remains in the Shannon family to this day.

They were also significant benefactors to many community, medical and wartime causes.

From tough beginnings, they brought honour and respect to their family, never losing their humility and Christian values.

The seat dedication was the last of the 150-year celebrations by the Shannon family, with events at the original family property Saltbush Park and in nearby Nebo.

The family are deeply grateful to the Stockman's Hall of Fame and Rosemary Champion for the wonderful support they have given to include this 150-year anniversary tribute in such a special garden.

They hope that it will be a comfortable seat for visitors to the garden to pause, remember and rest.

## The big picture

Rachel Griffiths explores Australia's most iconic landscape paintings and the artists behind them in *Great Southern Landscapes*. The actress and art lover tells **Siobhan Duck** what she discovered

**S**OURDOUGH baking. Jam-making. And even a spot of knitting and painting.

The pandemic saw people all over the world finding all sorts of new and creative ways to escape the monotony and the boredom of lockdowns. And Rachel Griffiths was no exception, with the acclaimed actress quite literally adding a new string to her bow while locked inside her Melbourne house with her husband and three children.

"There's a generation of kids down south who got really serious about baking and my girls can make amazing cakes and biscuits now," she says.

"There was comfort in that. I know a lot of people that took up musical instruments too just to kill some of those late-night hours.

"I went back to a violin for like a year and was doing online lessons with a violin teacher who had lost all her work.

"And I know quite a few people who started painting, having started with those colouring-in books and

then going 'F--- the lines, I'm putting the colouring book to the left. I'm going to start with a blank page.'

"So, I do think we all realised that the arts are what nourishes the soul."

Staring at the same four walls for months at a time understandably made most people long for new horizons. And with borders still largely closed to overseas travel, many instead scratched that itch for adventure on the open road right here at home.

Griffiths says her family made a wish list of places they wanted to travel once restrictions eased, which included Alice Springs – "because I love that country so much" – and Monkey Mia, a west coast beach famous for its dolphin visitors.

"We've all been looking at walls in Melbourne for two years," she laughs.

"So, I think the idea of kind entering the painting on your wall and going through and actually ending up there [would appeal to a lot of people]."

It was this renewed respect for the arts and of the beauty of our own country that has provided the perfect canvas for Griffiths' latest series, *Great Southern Landscapes*.

"The show kind of developed during last year's lockdown for me, of just wanting to travel so badly but not actually wanting to travel overseas because overseas had become a kind of scary place and we might get stuck there and they might lose our bags and we might get COVID on the plane," she says.

"And I think what you saw on people's Instagrams, whether it's the young families, who, 24 hours before a lockdown, would pack up this vintage caravan and just head out [or other holidaymakers]. You saw Australians appreciating how much of this country most Australians have not seen."

*Great Southern Landscapes* comes on the back of the success of last year's *Finding the Archibald*, which traced the history of portraiture in Australia.

"I got a lot of DMs [direct messages] as well as people in the street coming up to me saying: 'Oh my god, I loved the Archibald, what will you do next?'," she says.

"That was the first time I was in that role of presenter, so it's been a big learning curve for me.

"And I would say to people: 'What, what would you like to see?' And so many people would say that they loved landscape painting."

For Griffiths, investigating landscapes became the natural progression for the art history series given our country's vastly diverse terrain and the ways in which it has

been captured over time. But it is also a subject closer to her heart, because her husband of 20 years, painter and printmaker Andrew Taylor, "mostly paints abstract landscapes and botanicals."

She also believes that landscapes, much like the Archibald Prize paintings, are artistic subjects that a

And a lot of the reproductions that people will have on their walls are landscapes."

While filming this series, Griffiths travelled Australia. She treated the experience as something of a location scout for a long-overdue family holiday, which she hopes to set off on sometime in the future.

The series took her to far-flung locations across the country where famous artworks have been captured by colonial artists, impressionists and, of course, our First Nations people.

It was essential to Griffiths that the impact and importance of Indigenous artwork wasn't glossed over, but spotlighted with sensitivity.

"I'm of that generation that grew up with a kind of *terra nullius* idea of it [our art history]," she reflects.

"We had a shadow world of who was here before that we were taught quickly wasn't here and was replaced by something better. So, it's about kind of unlearning that history and being open to replacing it with a deeper understanding of what happened through colonialism.

"And I think we should always know whose country we're on. And who was here before, because our history in this continent is 60,000 years old, and it's kind of crazy that our history begins, for so many older white Australians, in 1788."

# Time for hanging baskets

With spring almost upon us, this weekend might be the perfect time to start preparing your outdoor entertainment area.

For most of us we are spending more time at home so why not create your own personal wow factor by adding some colourful perennial hanging baskets?

Below are some plants varieties that could be perfect for your outdoor area.

Acalypha reptans Stephie is an evergreen spreading plant with unusual bushy red tail-like flowers and mild green leaves with saw-toothed edges for part-shade areas.

This is probably one of the most versatile hanging basket plants available to local gardeners.

Bougainvillea Bambino Hybrids are prolific flowering, miniature-growing shrubs with virtually no thorns.

This series of hybrids have many applications from enhancing courtyards, patios, balconies and hanging baskets to informal hedges.

Bambino Hybrids range in colour from oranges, pinks, reds, white and yellows and shades of lavender.

Evolvulus pilosus or Blue Eyes is a popular species for roadside and other landscaping because of its toughness.

It is this plant's robust nature that makes it suitable for hanging baskets.

It produces prolific quantities of blue flowers, and there is also a white-flowering form.

It needs to be cut well back from time to time so as to keep it looking fresh, compact and healthy.

Geraniums or Pelargoniums would be one of the most under-rated water-wise plants that we can grow in Hanging Baskets.

Most Geranium species grow very quickly and produce masses of dazzling flowers all through the year.

Flower colours range from pure whites and subtle pinks to brilliant reds and purplish-blacks.

It is important to remember that all geraniums will not tolerate a lot of water.

Geraniums do their best in full sun but can grow and flower in partial shade if it is possible to have at least half a day of sun each day.

Jasminum polyanthum or Pink Jasmine is a very vigorous, beautiful evergreen climber.

That is just as suitable in large hanging baskets as growing in the garden.

Large clusters of pink buds open to sweetly scented white star-shaped flowers in spring.

It is suitable for any soil and is usually frost resistant.

Lotus Golden Flash is a spreading, evergreen perennial with needle-like blue-green foliage.

Bright beak-shaped golden flowers appear in late spring to early autumn.

Golden Flash is suitable for rockeries, pots and hanging baskets where it can trail and

show off its flowers.

Our Western gardeners will find the Lotus as one of the most adaptable hanging basket plants available.

Scaevola aemula or Fan Flower is a dense evergreen groundcover with almost succulent medium green coarsely toothed leaves.

Masses of purple-blue, fan-shaped blooms appear from spring through summer with violet-blue petal lobes and yellow throats.

It is perfect for growing as bedding in rockeries, containers or in hanging baskets.

Scutellaria ventenatii would be one of the most striking groundcovers you could plant in your garden.

This small clumping plant has glossy green foliage and spikes of crimson tubular flowers.

It prefers a part shade well-drained position and is ideal as a hanging basket, as a rockery plant or as a tub plant.

Streptocarpus saxorum or Nodding Violet is a showy, evergreen perennial that is perfect for hanging baskets.

During the warmer months of the year masses of lilac-mauve tubular flowers with white throats smother the plant.

Streptocarpus has small, rounded, slightly succulent, dark-green leaves that are arranged on its trailing stems.

Streptocarpus is an easily grown plant which is remarkably free from pests and diseases.

Viola hederacea or Native Violet is a vigorous growing groundcover spreading to one metre in diameter, with very attractive mauve

and white, violet-shaped flowers.

This is an excellent ground cover for a moist shaded position.

There is also a white flowering form available to local gardeners.

Most Perennial Groundcovers can be grown in pots and hanging baskets.

Always use a top-quality potting mix as you will need excellent aeration and drainage.

I would suggest also adding some slow-release fertiliser and water storage granules.

As Hanging Baskets dry out rapidly, especially in warm weather.

So I would water regularly and if the weather is hot daily.

Most plants in hanging pots will benefit from regular applications of liquid fertiliser.





# Attendance soars at annual groWQ event

This year hosted the second annual groWQ event in Longreach and saw a turnout that doubled the previous year.

GroWQ is an event that showcased some of the most important innovations and trends in agriculture with an eye on the future.

Event chair Anna Cochrane said she was pleased with the event.

“It was such a great opportunity for western Queensland to be able to bring together a number of different players in the industry,” she said.

“That’s services, mental health, new innovations, government support, and tech providers to help increase our [local graziers] profitability.

“I think the key was having so many options: we had 30 trade displays and businesses come to the day, and by having so many that drew a big crowd—we had over 135 people register for today.”

Ms Cochrane reiterate her key point: if everyone walked out of the room having learned one thing or had one thing they would like to learn more about, she’d be pleased.

“The feedback we’ve had so far definitely means we’ve taken a step in the right direction,” she said.

Half of the Longreach Wool Pavillion was filled with displays, including some on the outside.

“Last year we had an ag-industry round table, and the focus then was about the services and project being run,” Ms Cochrane said.

“This year we upped it a notch, we had that

but we beefed it up with new technologies and new innovations.”

The inspiration behind this year’s event came to Ms Cochrane after being overwhelmed by the quality of Agtech display at last year’s Beef Week in Rockhampton.

And it was taken well by attendees, Ms Cochrane said there was a buzz around walk-on weighing and discussion around data usage.

Depending on funding, groWQ is likely to occur next year.

## Pasture supplements in development

Industry interests, MLA, Agoteach, and the University of Sydney have begun working to develop pasture supplements that deliver new mitigants that directly suppress methane production, whilst improving breeder condition and weaning rates.

Managing Director at MLA, Jason Strong said, “The partnership between Agcotech and the University of Sydney is one example of an investment that aims to bring profitable livestock methane technologies to market through the Emissions Avoidance Partnership (EAP).

“MLA is also leading the Environmental Credentials for Australian Grassfed beef project, in a consortium with World Wildlife Fund-Australia and The University of Queensland.

“This project is funded through the Federal Government Landcare Grant program ‘Smart Farming Partnerships’.

“This investment will enable grassfed beef producers to demonstrate their environmental credentials and reduce their emissions to access market opportunities and participate in carbon neutral and low carbon supply chains.”

## \$1.3m for FMD vaccine

Meat & Livestock Australia (MLA) has announced it will provide \$1.3 million to fund an Indonesian FMD vaccine support project for importers to purchase up to 600,000 vaccine doses for Australian cattle entering Indonesian feedlots.

Australian Live Exporters’ Council CEO, Mark Harvey-Sutton, said this was another way that the industry was helping provide security for Indonesian importers.

“Providing assistance for vaccinations is a practical measure that will help give importers confidence and slow the spread of FMD,” he said.

“It will help allow Indonesian importers to continue operating with fewer hurdles and build on our years of partnership with Indonesian industry.”

## Directors sought

Sheep Producers Australia, a peak body that seeks to represent the industry, has advertised the positions of two non-executive Member elected Directors at SPA’s Annual General Meeting in November 2022.

“SPA’s role is to represent and promote the interests of Australian sheep producers by providing national sheep industry leadership, policy, and advocacy,” a spokesperson said.

“The SPA Board values the diversity of thinking and skills that encompass a broad range of high-level knowledge and experience.”

## Beefup Forum rescheduled

The Winton Beefup Forum has been rescheduled for Friday 9 September at the Winton Shire Council Hall.

Hosted by Meat and Livestock Australia (MLA), West Queensland beef producers and other key industry stakeholders will have the opportunity to take part in a tailored program of talks and panel discussions and meet like-minded people.

The Beefup Forum is set to be a captivating program, relevant to the issues and ongoing industry requirements of the region. This includes, Market update from MLA, Industry update on FMD, Updates on carbon, animal performance and economics, Producers sharing practical and commercial insights.

The Forum has a list of compelling speakers such as Prof John Rolfe from the FASSA School of Business & Law who will be discussing the practicalities of earning carbon credits, and Prof Ben Hayes from the QLD Alliance for Agriculture and Food Innovation who will be providing a Genomics research update. The topics to be covered on the day include, Understanding Carbon, Improving livestock performance, and Market Insights.

# Report from the wool markets this week

The Australian wool market has stopped its run of downward movements this week, recording an overall unchanged series.

The national offering was reduced by 10,577 bales to 44,786 bales.

This reduction was due in part to the large falls of last week, which discouraged some sellers from the market.

Four sales into the new season and the total amount offered is tracking well above the previous season, there have been 204,219 bales put through the auction system, an increase of 20,350 bales, 11.1 per cent more than the corresponding sale of last year.

From the start of the series, the market quickly found a level similar to the previous week and generally traded within 30 cents of these levels throughout the week.

This was reflected in the individual Micron Price Guides (MPGs) for merino fleece, which across the country ranged between -16 and +30 cents.

These movements combined with minimal movements in the crossbred section (the MPGs ranged from -3 to +5 cents) and the oddments (the three Merino Carding Indicators (MC) fell by an average of just over 4 cents) and general losses in the skirtings of between 10 and 20 cents had the net result of an overall fully firm market.

After falling for the previous four selling

series the EMI finished the week unchanged at 1,342 cents.

The last time the EMI recorded no movement for the series was back in September 2017.

In an opposite trend to the previous week, a weakening AUD meant when viewed in USD terms the EMI finished 18 cents lower.

As quantities in West do not warrant a sale next week, the national offering reduces for the following series. Currently, there are 40,116 bales on offer, with only Sydney and Melbourne in operation.

Next week (Week 8) is also host to the annual Wool Week, giving industry stakeholders the opportunity to come together at a series of events held in Melbourne.

## Beetroot Hummus

**Serves:** 8

**Prep time:** 20 minutes

**Cook time:** 10-12 minutes

**½ serve per portion**

### Ingredients:

- 1 large beetroot, leaves and roots removed
- 400g can chickpeas, rinsed and drained
- ½ teaspoon cumin powder
- 1 lemon, juiced
- 1 tablespoon tahini
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 cloves garlic
- ½ teaspoon vegetable stock powder
- Sweet paprika, to serve
- Vegetable sticks, to serve

### Method:

- MICROWAVE beetroot on high in a bowl with lid for 10-12 minutes. Slip skin off cooked beetroot.
- ADD beetroot, chickpeas, cumin, lemon juice, tahini, olive oil, garlic and stock powder to food processor and blend until smooth.
- SERVE with a sprinkle of sweet paprika and a variety of vegetable sticks.

### Alternative Method:

- 225g canned beetroot, drained of juice works just as well.

## Spinach Quiche

**Serves:** 6

**Prep time:** 15 minutes

**Cook time:** 40 minutes

**2 serves per portion**

### Ingredients:

- 1 tablespoon canola oil
- ½ bunch spring onions, finely chopped
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 stalks celery, finely chopped
- 100g bacon, fat trimmed, chopped
- 1 bunch spinach, finely chopped
- 6 eggs
- 400g ricotta cheese, reduced fat
- ¾ cup cheddar cheese, reduced fat, grated
- Fresh wholemeal breadcrumbs
- Sprinkle ground nutmeg

### Method:

- Preheat oven to 160°C. Line oblong or quiche dish with baking paper.
- Heat oil in frypan over medium heat. Add spring onion, garlic, celery and bacon.
- FRY gently until celery begins to soften. Add spinach, stirring until wilted.
- REMOVE from heat and allow to cool slightly.
- BEAT eggs in a bowl and stir in the ricotta and ½ cup of the grated cheese. Mix into the spinach mixture.
- Pour the mixture into the prepared dish and smooth the top. Sprinkle over remaining cheese, breadcrumbs and nutmeg.
- BAKE for 35 minutes or until browned.
- Serve hot or cold.

# Rough-handling trailblazer

Originally a bartender at the Birdcage: now an international superstar; Emily Colits, since starting her journey as a cowgirl has made a name for herself in a sport that has only recently been a reality for women.

Currently, it is deemed too difficult for south-east Queensland rodeo hosts to insure women's rough-stock events, like saddle bronc riding.

This means Ms Colits is forced to return to the west to compete in her favourite sport.

She is currently a working horsebreaker and is more than qualified, having competed in the USA in saddle bronc riding.

"It was something I only recently picked up, I started mid-way through last June/ July, and there was a school in Emerald," she said.

"I had the weekend off, saw the opportunity and thought, why not?"

After, a competition was held in Capella which she attended before attending schools in Gatton and Normanton, but Ms Colits has ridden horses since she was a child.

Then, another rider in Emily Hawkins, put her in contact with an association for riders in the US.

"They said as long as I could make a few qualified rides, she could join them over the pond," she said.

"I wasn't doing to well, the horses are a lot bigger and stronger than they are here in Australia.

"Ours are different, not as strong, but cat-tier."

Ms Colits said the event had helped her build confidence in her riding.

"I got to practice my skills more, and I was no

longer second-guessing myself," she said.

"The girls do things a bit different over there, but they can only help you so much.

"You have to find your own groove."

Ms Colits said she loves coming out west where hosts are more open to putting on women.

"A lot of areas in the southeast don't allow women to compete in rough-stock events," she said.

"I think once we get the ball rolling, and they [insurers and organisers] see that we're taking it seriously, it will make them think more about it.

"I believe women still compete in barrel racing and roping, but when we start introducing rough-stock, we are built differently and not technically as strong as the men we compete with.

"But I think you can pick the right kinds of horses for a women's event, there is an opportunity to make it safer for women."

Ms Colits would like to see more girls in schools for rough-stock riding.

"Getting them on a machine rather than a real bucking horse is a good start," she said.

"I think a lot of girls will want to give it a go once it becomes more mainstream.

"When you're jumping behind the shoots and you're the only girl there, it can be a little bit daunting.

"I reckon an event of our own would be good."

Ms Colits has emailed the Longreach Rodeo to see if they would hold such an event.

She said to young girls who are interested in rough-stock riding, "to get in there with the boys and show them what you've got."
