

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## Breaking the code of silence

A recent Beyond Blue survey of workers reveals one in five respondents claimed they wouldn't tell anyone if they had depression and one in 20 thought it was a sign of personal weakness.

# Skills in demand

Industry leaders are urgently calling on the Government for assistance ahead of the Jobs and Skills Summit scheduled this week to ensure health workforce shortages are high on the agenda.

Like many hospitals across Australia and the world, Longreach Hospital has faced challenges recruiting nurses.

It is often difficult for rural health services

to fill clinical vacancies, but the issue has been exacerbated by COVID-19, which has restricted the ability of health professionals to travel for work.

A Central West Hospital and Health Service spokesperson said rural health services provide nurses with a unique opportunity to care for patients presenting with a variety of illnesses and care needs rather than more specialised

nursing provided in major centres.

"Rural centres offer them a great opportunity to grow their skill-set. Nurses also often have the ability to care for patients over a long period of time due to the close-knit nature of communities."

There are approximately 174 full-time equivalent nursing and midwifery roles across all facilities within Central West Hospi-

tal and Health Service.

Currently, there are 20 full-time equivalent nursing and midwifery roles in active recruitment.

But while key leaders consider answers further afield this week, there are workforce solutions already in place in the Central West tackling these issues.

The Yellowbelly Fishing Comp, as well as the Blackall-Tambo Circus Carnival, were both massive undertakings.


If we had two papers a week, I don't think we could have fit it all.

## Littleproud claims Federal govt is 'grandstanding'

Nationals Party Leader and Federal Maranoa MP David Littleproud has lambasted the Federal Labor Government's for "taking credit" for the digital connectivity projects under the Regional Connectivity Program (RCP) which had been established by the Coalition in the 2021/22 budget.

Mr Littleproud expressed his support for investment by the Coalition government to inject \$12,874,838 into nine projects across Maranoa under the Australian Government's Regional Connectivity Program to improve telecommunications services when it was announced last year.

Mr Littleproud said Labor's attempt to take credit for the \$541,000 contribution to the Roma Datacentre and Regional Fixed Wireless Internet project was amusing.

"The fact Labor is keeping silent about whether they will commit to funding projects in Cunnamulla, Quilpie and Bollon which will improve mobile coverage and

broadband services under Round 2 of the Regional Connectivity Program, but are taking credit for approved projects under the Coalition, is a joke," he said.

"Labor need to be more transparent and stop leaving Maranoa communities in the dark."

Mr Littleproud has urged the Labor Government to commit to further digital connectivity upgrades and mobile coverage investments in Maranoa.

"Digital connectivity and mobile coverage are essential to how we work, learn, stay safe and remain in contact with our loved ones.

The Coalition invested substantially in critical infrastructure under the RCP and Mobile Black Spot Program as part of our plan for a strong economy and stronger future," Mr Littleproud said.

"Labor however has not funded a single mobile tower in regional Australia."

## Millar backs road safety

Member for Gregory Lachlan Millar has commended his opposition in State Parliament for their recent handling of roads in regional Queensland.

"As the member for Gregory, I cover 460,000 square kilometres of this great state," he said.

"I have to travel along those roads, which I enjoy.

"I love getting out on the road and visiting the different communities.

"I get to see first-hand the state of those roads.

"I will give credit where credit is due—thank you for completing the Blackall-Jericho Road.

"That will play a significant role in getting our organic beef out of the channel country into the abattoirs."

Mr Millar also mention the importance of the completions of Torrens Creek Road.

"That gives us another access point to get beef down from the Diamantina, through Longreach, up through Hughenden and into Townsville to an important market," he said.

"I continue to get complaints through my office from either graziers or processors that cattle have lost condition in the time from being loaded on the property to being unloaded at the abattoir.

"When I talk to companies like Blenners, a major refrigeration operation out of Tully, one of the major problems they have at the moment is the massive rub on avocados or mangoes such that when it gets to the Sydney Markets—

"I am saying that the condition of our roads is having an impact on not only road safety but also produce."

Mr Millar when on to start that equal focus should be placed on the importance of road safety.

"I believe that previous road safety action plans are failing," he said.

"In 2016 the road toll was 251 fatalities, in 2021 it was 275 fatalities, which is almost 10 per cent higher despite

improvements in vehicle safety.

So far, as we heard this morning, around 200 people have died on Queensland roads, which is 15 per cent higher than at the same time last year and 35 per cent higher than the five-year average.

"Just to bring it home, for my seat of Gregory and the seats of Keppel, Rockhampton and Callide, in the central Queensland police region we have seen an increase of 84 per cent.

"Tragically, in 2021, 22 people died in Central Queensland and so far in 2022—I have in front of me the fatality figures by police region—we are looking at 39 fatalities.

"That is devastating.

"We have to put more effort into education."

# Rains ‘best season’

While the recent rain event was not as intense as some have been in Autumn, it did get local graziers like Mike Pratt from Ban Ban Station feeling confident going into the traditional wet season.

“It could not be better—this is the sort of year that you dream about,” he said.

“I know an older grazier who told me it was the best season he’s seen since 1951.

“I haven’t been around long enough to verify that.”

Mr Pratt said as long as the rain is consistent through the summer months, the central west will likely see good germination of Mitchell Grass in places that have been missing it over the nine-year drought.

“To get this sort of rain is unprecedented

through winter,” he said.

“There may be some who need more rain than what we’ve had, we’ve been lucky at Ban Ban over recent years—those who missed out on summer rains last year and didn’t get a cover of Mitchell Grass may be in need of more.

“But everywhere I go, people are relishing the amount of herbage they’ve got this year and it’s been terribly productive.

“We’re looking forward to a long, wet summer to get on with it.”

Mr Pratt said the drought is certainly not over, but a good full wet season would likely see restrictions lifted.

“It’s been a fantastic start to the season, but we’re not wholly out of the woodworks yet,” he said.

“Once the heat hits that herbage we’re see-

ing, it’s likely to fold over—that’s when we need the Mitchell grass to set in.

“People with stock away may be reluctant to bring them home until we get that good summer rain.”

Nonetheless, Mr Pratt and his family have been deeply pleased with the rain.

“Normally this time of year we’d be feeding our cattle licks,” he said.

“This year we won’t need to feed our cattle any supplements.

“And it just gives us so much more time for other jobs around the property.

“It ticks every box; I’ve seen too many dry years, so we’re just relishing this.”

Currently, weather reports indicate an additional La Nina event, meaning it is likely Queensland is in for another strong wet season.

**RFDS invests in first aid**

The Royal Flying Doctor Service (Queensland Section) has now taken ownership of Rescue Swag, an organisation that delivers an innovative range of portable, life-saving first aid kits and supplies.

RFDS (Queensland Section) Chief Executive Officer Meredith Staib said the RFDS has been supplying outback Queenslanders with medical chests for 80 years.

**QLD produce on world stage**

Minister for Agricultural Industry Development and Fisheries and Minister for Rural Communities Mark Furner recently spent three days in Vietnam to welcome the establishment of a Trade and Investment Queensland office in Ho Chi Minh City and to promote Queensland agriculture.

“Getting premium quality Queensland produce in front of this audience is an important step towards increasing our exports to Vietnam and helping to create good jobs at home,” Mr Furner said.

“I’m encouraged by the warm reception of our Vietnamese hosts and hopeful that the event would lead to more exports of Queensland produce to the sophisticated and growing Vietnamese market.”

**Other farm income**

The Federal Government’s national scheme which aims to incentivise farmers who improve biodiversity and protect remnant vegetation has been welcomed by Farmers for Climate Action.

CEO Fiona Davis said a scheme of this kind was one of FCA’s key asks heading into the last election and noted that farmers and the environment both win from a biodiversity scheme with integrity.

“Payments for biodiversity and carbon can provide farmers with vital income during drought, which can help them continue to employ workers during tough times—and these projects absorb carbon and provide habitat for native wildlife,” Dr Davis said. “Paying farmers for the biodiversity in their remnant forest has the potential to greatly reduce Australia’s emissions by reducing land clearing.”

The Murtupuni Centre for Rural and Remote Health (MCRRH) plays a crucial role in filling rural healthcare vacancies for communities.

MCRRH’s Longreach-based Central West Site Coordinator, Peter Coombes, helps deliver rural training for medical, nursing, midwifery, dental and allied health students.

For the past eight years, he has assisted a growing number of university students to discover the benefits of living and working in rural and remote communities while they complete

clinical placements in hospitals, pharmacies, primary health clinics and schools.

Mr Coombes said like most places, we have to work with the challenges thrown up by the pandemic, which are often more evident in smaller populated areas.

This year there are more than 150 students in the Central West as part of the Australian Government-funded Rural Health Multi-disciplinary Training Program, supported by James Cook University.

This is significantly more than the COVID-impacted years, where there was a reduction in placements of around 25 per cent.

“That’s a significant increase since 2014 when MCRRH facilitated up to 60 student placements, and is a real indication that students are interested in experiencing both the work and lifestyle in rural and remote areas,” Mr Coombes said.

“We have to work with those challenges and I think being in a smaller population it seems

more evident.” Mr Coombes said from his experience there is a clear connection between the provision of student accommodation and students wanting to come to rural and remote areas.

“Our fully-furnished student accommodation facilities are great for young, community-minded students, and not only provide a home away from home for the students but also enable them to meet students from other health disciplines,” he said.

“When you provide good furnished and equipped accommodation there is a greater chance of increasing placement numbers in the regions.

“Our experience is that students experiencing a strong community spirit and meeting friendly locals influences their decisions to return to regions to live and work.

“Our overall mission is to improve health outcomes for the region and we can say we definitely have.”

"It helps me think about weaving and the process of teaching," she said.

"I learnt in a one-hour online class that was very basic.

"But when I'm teaching, I've learnt people have different learning styles—it makes me think creatively."

The event at the Branch was the largest organised event for Ms Whyman who has been steadily growing a following.

"I did a few tiny workshops in Melbourne [her previous residence] where a few people were interested," Ms Whyman said.

"Since, I've had a few smaller classes—the last had eight attendees.

"Today there were about 16, and I've really enjoyed it."

Longreach Regional Council Mayor Tony Rayner, through self-funding, attended the Mt Isa Rodeo event with the purpose of building the relationship between the event and the township of Longreach, further cementing the branding of Road to Rodeo.

Discussions have been had between the Mayor and the Chief Executive Officer of Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ) on the topic of raising the downstream weirs in Longreach to increase local water security.

Deputy Mayor Leonie Nunn has commended the CWA on making the centenary and mentioned the importance of local groups like the QCWA in the make up of regional towns.

The Winton Shire Council is currently undertaking a report into the notion of heritage listing Willie Mar's Fruit Shop.

The Council will be proceeding with a Conservation Management Plan for the building.

The Outback Regional Gallery will be running a Community Exhibition in late 2024.

In the 2022/23 budget, The Winton Shire Council proposed to build units on the block of land behind the Winton Neighbourhood Centre, however, a report has been received stating the proposal would be too expensive. Council has resolved to instead look into the possibility of establishing "tiny houses".

The Winton Shire Council may be considering a Local Energy Strategic Implementation Plan after inquiring with Ergon Energy about the possibility of having a Winton Microgrid that harnessed solar power. Currently, Council is only looking into the price of having such a plan designed.

The Winton Shire Council will be looking to increase the visibility of its First Nations population as a part of responding to consultations over recent months.

Going forward, Council will seek to acknowledge important indigenous locations and cultural signifiers in future town planning.

## Changing thinking on our mental health

A recent Beyond Blue survey of workers reveals one in five respondents claimed they wouldn't tell anyone if they had depression and one in 20 thought it was a sign of personal weakness.

Those at greater risk of severe anxiety and depression in the Central West are people living in remote areas who delay seeking help, as well as primary producers.

Dr Tim Driscoll is the manager of the Central Western and Outback Mental Health program based in Longreach and sheds light on the topic.

Dr Driscoll said there have been many positives this year in the region where his team of 16 staff travels, with an increase in rainfall and an abundance of work for young people.

"If we take a look at mental health rates in metropolitan areas they are similar to out here," Dr Driscoll said.

"But the severity can appear worse here as people wait so much longer to go and seek help. Primary producers are another high-risk group as they won't often come forward."

Dr Driscoll said the fear and anxiety surrounding Covid has become less evident

now as tourism has re-opened and movement is no longer restricted.

Steel Blue and Beyond Blue released the results of a survey last month asking workers and employers in the agricultural, trades, construction, resource, and manufacturing sectors about the impact of mental health on them and their work sites.

Approximately half of all survey respondents reported experiencing feelings of hopelessness (54%), extreme sadness (51%) and worthlessness (48%).

At a digital event held last month, Steel Blue and Beyond Blue urged workers and employers to break the stigma around mental health with one in five respondents to the survey claiming they wouldn't tell anyone if they had depression.

Concerningly, while the majority believed depression is a real medical condition, one in twenty thought depression was a sign of personal weakness.

Lead researcher at the University of South Australia, Associate Professor Deirdre Tedmanson said in a new report released in Canberra last month, that mental illness and poverty can make it difficult for Aboriginal people to access housing.

"Western notions of 'home' and 'homelessness' don't necessarily resonate the same

way with Aboriginal Australians in regional and remote areas," Assoc Prof Tedmanson says.

"Although structural discrimination, mental illness and poverty can make it difficult for Aboriginal people to access and sustain housing, it is the lack of funding, affordable housing and limited crisis and transitional accommodation that are the real barriers.

"Some drivers of homelessness, such as overcrowding, are common issues for Aboriginal communities and can be linked in part to complex and important kinship obligations."

Aboriginal women fleeing family violence find it especially hard to manage living away from family support networks, the researchers say and need support to manage cultural obligations while being protected.

The RFDS Mental Health and Wellbeing Service is based in Longreach and visits the surrounding communities on a weekly and fortnightly basis to Alpha, Aramac, Barcardine, Blackall, Isisford, Jericho, Muttaborra, Tambo and Winton

Going forward, Mr Widderick said he may look to make the competition photo-centric to conserve the quality and quantity of fish in the Thomson river, where participants send in a photo rather than bring in the live fish who often get injured or die in the process.

"I want to make sure my kids can come down to the Thomson and can catch fish all year," he said.



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

# Looking back on founder

It is fortunate for Longreach that a gentleman who had made his home in the town had the foresight and initiative to prevent a section of the Common from becoming a dust bowl.

This man worked tirelessly for many years to establish Iningai Park, a nature reserve.

That man was Noel McDarra and sadly he passed away very recently.

Noel recorded an interview with one of our members in 2008 and this is his account of how Iningai Park evolved.

“In around 1996 or 1997, while visiting my brother in New South Wales, I read in the Longreach Leader that the Golf Club was interested in acquiring a piece of land over the Gin Creek.

“I phoned Joan Moloney who was Mayor at the time and she confirmed there was to be a meeting to discuss the matter.

“I asked her not to make a decision until I had the chance to talk with Council.

“I explained that the area was already in a very bad state and if it became a golf course, most of the trees would have to be cut down and with people walking around with spiked shoes, the area would soon become a dust bowl.

“As time went by, I again approached the Council with a plan to turn the area into a nature park.

“With my urging, the Council approached the Federal Government for some funding and they contributed \$62,000.

“For the grant application, I had to get letters of support.

“A few people he approached thought, ‘What’s this bloke on about?’

“Fortunately some came back and said, ‘gee, that’s a great idea—you’ve got something there.’

“That was the beginning.

“The golf course idea was abandoned and work began on the nature park.

“The grant funds were to cover fencing and walking tracks.

“The fence was erected by eight girls from the Longreach Pastoral College.

“They had come to Longreach from Gatton College to learn skills such as how to pull mills and fencing, as part of their practical training.

“I was one of the College instructors.

“I was also a good fencer and with the eight girls, two tractors and a truck, we erected five

kilometres of the fence in two weeks.

“It was constructed from Gidgee posts, strainers and steel droppers.

“The labour was free and all the materials had to be purchased using part of the grant money.

“The Gidgee posts were acquired in Barcaldine.

“After the fencing, the next step was the walking tracks.

“The first task was to have archaeological experts come and go all over the area, as it was originally Aboriginal land.

“If they found things like a coolibah tree where a shield had been taken out to make a coolamon, the track had to go well around it.

“The archaeologists found seven Aboriginal sites.

“They also found one or two items from white habitation—like corduroy crossings, which we were not allowed to touch.

“Three Indigenous people from Longreach took a couple of days to go all around and in the end, wrote a 100-page report for the Council.

“I had identified about 130 species of birds and another chap pointed out another 10 species as well as bush tomatoes and bush potatoes.

“The fence line had to be graded to make sure there were no Aboriginal artefacts then the walking tracks were done.

“We got good reports on the walking tracks.

“I put in an information board and signage for the walking tracks.

“They are called Wilga Track, Gidgee Track, and Coolibah Track.

“Desert Channels has been very helpful over the years - they put signage around Coolibah track which is the most used, being the shortest one – 4 to 5 km, which is a nice walk.

“The one up to the Hall of Fame and back is about 12 km and the other one is 9 km.

“The tracks follow the channels and are well shaded.

“When it came to naming the area, I thought we should give recognition to the people who lived here originally—maybe Iningai, Kunngkari or Malintji.

“It became known as Iningai Nature Park.

“We wanted to mark the entrance to the park and the Pastoral College was once again a great supporter and supplied and grouted the two big pieces of timber above the gateway and Ergon Energy put up the two main posts.

“Job done.”

One of Noel’s daughters, Suzie, recently told us another snippet of information from one of her conversations with her dad.

One day in 2005, Noel discovered that the native Bauhinia seedlings he planted along the 300-metre walk from the carpark to the information board had been wiped out by a swarm of grasshoppers.

When Suzie asked Noel what happened next, he replied, “We nurture the survivors and start all over again”.

That was Noel.

His work was often difficult in our harsh conditions.

Iningai Park is a wonderful asset to the town of Longreach.

Thank you Noel McDarra and all who helped you establish it.

## Iningai Park an achievement

Iningai Park founder Noel McDarra passed away on 7 July, aged 94.5 years.

A resident of Longreach for 63 years, Mr McDarra, a retired wool lecturer, objected to a proposal in 1998 to turn the town common south of Longreach into a golf course.

He went on to spend seven years in a full time voluntary effort to plan, coordinate research and project manage the creation of a natural bushland area, enhanced with three walking tracks.

Mr McDarra described the space as “some-where you can go to lose yourself for an hour or two in peace and quiet”.

1999

- After verbal objection in 1988, Mr McDarra spent much of 1999 gathering support before presenting a proposal for a Nature Park to the Longreach mayor Joan Moloney.

2000

- Approval granted by Council to preserve 500 acres of bushland incorporating the three creeks, agreeing to Mr McDarra’s suggestion to name it “Iningai Native Flora & Fauna Park”.
- Submissions for funding by Central West Area Consultative Committee (CWACC)

2001

- Federal Government grant of \$52,000 awarded to erect fences, signs and walking tracks.

2002

- Fences, Signs and Carpark entrance erected
- Two hundred Red Gums seedlings propagated by grazier Elizabeth Clark.
- Red Gums, Fuchsias, and Emu Bushes seedlings replanted, watered, protected and nurtured by Mr McDarra.

2003

- Cultural Heritage Survey finds evidence of seven indigenous areas of interest and white habitation like corduroy crossings.
- Controlled burn-off.
- Fencing and Interpretive Signage erected by Longreach Pastoral College (LPC).
- Town Common Group Clean up – 12 x 10 ton loads of rubbish removed.
- Mr McDarra won an Individual Outstand-

ing Accomplishment Award in the Outback Queensland Regional Tidy Towns in 2004.

- Three walking tracks were established and seating erected with the support of the newly elected Longreach mayor Pat Tanks.
- Instigation of Guided Nature Walks on Saturday mornings by five local nature lovers with more than 20 tourists regularly participating during the tourist season.
- September 12 – Official Opening by Maranoa MP Bruce Scott expressed value to the natural attraction’s contribution to the local ecotourism infrastructure.

2005

- Two hundred flowering Bauhinia seedlingsplanted on the entrance walk from the car park to the information board.
- April – first brochures available at the Tourist Information Centre with a map giving confidence for nature lovers and bird watchers to walk at their own leisure

2007

- The Town Common Group was formed and Mr McDarra contributed in developing the Trust Land Management Plan in conjunction with DCQ.
- Bringing Them Home Ceremony was held at Iningai Park to repatriate ancestral remains into a special “Keeping Place”.

Mr McDarra’s love of spending time “in his other backyard” continued well after the founding years, with projects like koala rehabilitation, breeding and releasing Gouldian finches, and lobbying, often without success, for funding projects like removing noxious weed from the creeks.

His perseverance was evident many times over the years, including the devastation of his native Bauhinia seedlings wiped out by a swarm of grasshoppers. When asked “what next?” he replied, “we nurture the survivors and start all over again”.

Mr McDarra was passionate about educating school children about the importance of conservation and the history and cultural significance of the area.

His historic notes during the developmental years often mentioned “feeling encouraged by the amount of young people who turned out”.

## Todd Austin counts on luck

Big bonuses and bragging rights are on the line for Barcaldine bush trainer Todd Austin at this weekend’s 140th anniversary edition of the Birdsville Races.

Not only will Austin be aiming for a fourth Birdsville Cup win in nine years, but he will also be gunning for the biggest trainer bonus in TAB Birdsville Cup history.

Austin, a former jockey and 2021/22 Queensland Country Trainers Premiership winner, took out the April 2022 TAB Birdsville Cup with gelding Echo Point—and if he manages to train back-to-back Cup winners this September, he’ll nab himself a hefty \$10,000 bonus on top of his regular race winnings.

Another Cup win will also elevate Austin’s legacy as the most successful TAB Birdsville Cup trainer of the 21st century.

He previously won the legendary out-back race with Primed in 2013, French Hussler in 2019 and Echo Point in April 2022.

“It would be amazing to win another Birdsville Cup,” Mr Austin said.

“It’s crazy to hold the title of ‘Most Successful Birdsville Cup Trainer of the 21st century’.

“We’ve still got seventy-eight years to go to decide that one—but hey, I’ll take it while I’ve got it.

“Jokes aside, my Birdsville Cup record is definitely something I’m proud of, and I have such a long history with the Birdsville Races, so it’s pretty special.”

Unfortunately for Austin, he won’t be able to field Echo Point in this weekend’s Cup—quashing his chances of winning the full \$15,000 bonus.

Nevertheless, he said he’s still intending to run a horse in the Cup, which will keep him in contention for a \$10,000 bonus.

Austin is planning to field additional gallopers over the two-day 13-race carnival and likes his odds of picking up some extra wins.



“At this stage, we will probably take around ten horses to Birdsville and I think we’ll have at least one set to race the Cup,” Austin said.

Austin is quick to acknowledge the efforts of his team and family in his Birdsville success.

He works closely with his wife, Toni at their home stables in Barcaldine—training horses alongside her.

“We hope Toni can travel out with us again in September—if her work’s too busy at the time we’ll have to fly the flag for her,” he said.

The couple is part of several syndicates which co-own the horses they train, and they work with a stellar team of bush jockeys including fellow Barcaldine dweller Brooke Richardson, who rode Echo Point to victory in the April 2022 Birdsville Cup.

Richardson is planning to join Austin for another tilt at the Birdsville Cup.

Currently starring in Nine's crime-comedy series *After the Verdict*, Lincoln Younes reflects on the biggest roles of his career and what he has learnt along the way from the legends of the industry, writes **Siobhan Duck**

**W**HEN it comes to playing likeable bad boys, you'd be hard pressed to find anyone with as much experience and expertise as Lincoln Younes.

From the very first moment Younes took on his first major role – as the troubled teen Romeo in the 2009 Foxtel drama *Tangle* – it was clear he had the talent and charisma to make even the most obnoxious and flawed character appealing.

And even though he has played an array of characters over the years, Younes has become something of a go-to guy for TV bad guys, from *Tangle*'s Romeo and *Home and Away*'s brooding Casey Braxton and now *After the Verdict*'s smarmy real estate agent Ollie.

He's also been tapped to star in the upcoming *Last King of the Cross* as real-life nightclub owner John Ibrahim. Due to the sensitive nature of the material, Younes has to remain tight-lipped on the Paramount+ miniseries, which is currently in production.

"It's been a really exciting kind of adventure because it is a fictional retelling and based on true events in real life," he says.

"It's been a journey but I'm very excited for when it comes out."

The thoughtful star hasn't actively sought to play bad boys. Instead, Younes says he looks for roles that he can disappear behind and which offer him exciting challenges as an actor.

"I've always loved the idea of not being recognisable, which is which is quite funny having done a show like *Home and Away* where you are recognised for something," he says, with a wry and self-aware laugh.

"But in any role, the biggest compliment would be someone not recognising me!"

"Since [*Home and Away*] there has been a conscious decision to always choose fun, dynamic characters.

"The reality is, you are so exceptionally fortunate to be working as an actor because 99 per cent of actors can't live off their wage."

Younes' ease in front of the camera has ensured that he has worked steadily since his breakout role on *Tangle* where, despite being just 13 years of age, he more than held his own among a talented and experienced cast that included Ben Mendelsohn, Kat Stewart and Justine Clarke. He even netted an ASTRA Award for his performance.

"*Tangle* was ahead of its time," he says.

"I think it was deeply human and it showed, in all [their] ugly glory, the flaws of humans. And that's really that's how you engage people

intellect," he says.

"I think that she is one of the most articulate and intelligent people we have in Australia and that is why she's such an Australian icon.

"I admire her work ethic and pioneering of underdogs in every way. I really respect her as a human but to work with [her] as well was such a pleasure. I looked forward to every day."

Apart from the on-set camaraderie, another appeal of *After the Verdict* for Younes was the fact it is unlike a lot of the stereotypical Aussie crime dramas you'd see on TV.

Instead, *After the Verdict* follows the lead of shows like *Only Murders in the Building* (Disney+) and is a lighter take on the genre, with a clutch of quirky characters.

"I feel like we often deal with drama in quite a heavy-handed way [in Australia]," he reflects.

"And that is not terribly culturally accurate for us because I feel like we have this lighter side of us that is drawn to levity, especially in heavy situations.

"So, it's quite exciting to be part of a drama that reflects that kind of mindset."

nowadays. I was just so fortunate because the older actors that I was exposed to early on gave me a great respect for [their] work ethic."

Then landing his role on *Home and Away* provided Younes with a different sort of learning curve; forcing him to adjust to the fast pace of a soap and the glare of the spotlight that comes with it.

"I learned a lot of consistent technical elements of what it is to make a show quickly," he explains.

"Where there isn't much time for the writers or creators behind the screen, and you learn to make the best of what you're given in the time you're allocated. I have a great

respect for that. But in terms of the fame and the lack of anonymity that came from that, yeah, I wasn't I wasn't ready for it."

Younes put his travelling plans on hold when he won the role of Casey, one of the trio of much-hyped "River Boys", which included Darryl (Stephen Peacocke) and Heath (Dan Ewing).

"I think we hit a golden period with the dynamics in which we came into the show," Younes says. "I don't know what aligned, but it seems to have been quite a heightened situation where the audience really enjoyed the dynamic between these new characters, which was great."

On his latest series, *After the Verdict*, Younes has once again found himself in a situation where the chemistry of the ensemble is a large part of what makes the series so engaging.

In the dark comedy about four jurors who reinvestigate the accused murderer they found not guilty, Younes stars alongside Michelle Lim Davidson (*The Newsreader*), Sullivan Stapleton (*Blindspot*) and comedy legend Magda Szubanski.

Younes says he developed a particularly close bond with Szubanski during filming.

"I have always admired Magda, not just for her comedy, but for her

# Happy golden wattle day

I thought it would be appropriate today to write about a significant piece of Australian horticultural history.

Did you know that yesterday was National Wattle Day?

Wattle Day had humble beginnings in Hobart, Tasmania, in 1838 and culminated 150 years later in Canberra.

In 1988 *Acacia pycnantha* was officially proclaimed the Australian floral emblem, and four years later the first of September was proclaimed as Wattle Day.

Not surprisingly it was sentiments of national pride, patriotism, environmental appreciation, and what it meant to be a 'Dinki Di' Australian that characterised the Wattle Day movement in its formative years around the beginning of the 20th century.

This was around the time that Australia attained nationhood through the federation of its six States, which occurred in 1901.

From September 1, 1910, Wattle Day was used to raise funds, then a few years later for the war effort and sprigs of wattle were sold on that day in Sydney, Melbourne and Adelaide.

Boxes of wattle sprigs were also sent to soldiers in hospitals overseas, and it became a custom to enclose a sprig of wattle with each letter to remind our soldiers of home.

But would you believe the name *Acacia* was almost lost to all Australian Wattles.

The International Botanical Congress has been debating the use of the name *Acacia* for Australian Wattles or for *Acacia* native to Africa, the Middle East, India and the Americas.

Most people would only believe that the nameless faceless people that make all the silly arguments are only found in government offices in Brisbane or Canberra.

Fortunately, the International Botanical Congress decided that Australia could keep the name *Acacia* for its Wattles.

The Wattle is ideally suited to withstand Australia's droughts, winds and bushfires.

It is this resilience of the Wattle that represents the spirit of the Australian people.

Wattles are part of a spectacular group of plants, which botanically are *Acacias*; boast more than 650 known species throughout the Australian continent. Wattles also occur in a number of other countries but to a more limited extent.

A drive around any part of central Queensland over the last month would show the beauty of one of the most Australian of flowering plants.

Some of my favourite natural Wattle groves are on the road between Blackall and Jericho Highway the Capricorn Highway between Alpha and Jericho and between Dingo and Char-

leville Creek near the Blackdown Tablelands turn-off.

The beauty of these natural groves may not be able to be totally reproduced in the home garden but then just one or two planted in the garden can still provide a great display.

While there are hundreds of different species of Wattles in Queensland alone the following are some that are worth growing.

*Acacia bancroftii* or Bancrofts Wattle is a spectacular small, silver-foliaged, grey-trunked tree that is found along the western highway around Dingo.

During winter when it is in full bloom, the bright yellow balls of flowers contrast beautifully with the foliage.

*Acacia cretata* or Lambs Tail Wattle is a very hardy, drought and frost-resistant species suited to a wide range of soils and conditions.

It is a large shrub over 5m high, with yellow

lamb's tail like flowers in May and June.

This Wattle is found growing across most of Central Queensland.

*Acacia decora* or Showy Wattle is a blue-leaved shrub 2-3m tall with bright yellow flowers.

It is very hardy, drought resistant, and moderately frost tolerant.

*Acacia Decora* would make a worthwhile addition to any waterwise garden.

*Acacia holosericea* or Velvet Wattle is an attractive silvery-foliaged shrub growing up to 5m high.

Bright yellow lambs-tail flowers will cover the plant from early winter.

It will require a warm well-drained position and will respond to yearly pruning and shaping, unlike most wattles.

*Acacia podalyriifolia* or Mount Morgan Sil-

ver Wattle is a delightful, fast-growing small tree growing to 3-4m x 2-3m.

With rounded silvery/grey foliage and clusters of gold ball-type flowers massed over the plant in winter.

In a home garden situation, this plant prefers a sunny well-drained position and a westerly aspect.

*Acacia Spectabilis* or Glory Wattle is a tall open shrub 3-5m x 2m with blue/green divided foliage bearing masses of golden ball-type flowers that cover the plant in winter.

It likes an open well-drained position and is also frost and drought-resistant.

These are just a few of the Wattles I have seen growing in Western Queensland gardens.

A visit to your local nursery will reveal many more great Wattles that you try in your home garden.

# Wool Market stable

The Australian wool market has recorded no overall movement for the second consecutive series. Due to a lack of quantity in the West at this time of year, the Fremantle region did not require a sale and as a result, the national offering fell by 7,355 bales to 37,431 bales.

The smaller offering attracted continued solid buyer support, and the prices on offer for merino fleece types were generally in line with those of the previous series.

The only real holes evident in the market were for 17.0-to-18.5-micron wools in the South.

The weakening in this section was reflected in the individual Micron Price Guides (MPGs) in Melbourne, which in this range fell by between 5 and 36 cents. These falls were the driving force behind the 3-cent loss in the Southern indicator for the week.

In the North, the movements in the merino fleece MPGs ranged between -8 and +9 cents.

The 3-cent lift in the Northern indicator completely offset the loss in the South.

The result was another unchanged AWEX Eastern Market Indicator (EMI) which again closed the week at 1,342 cents.

In a similar pattern to the previous series, due to a weakening Australian dollar (the AUD



dropped by a further 0.42 US cents since the last sale), the EMI lost ground when viewed in US dollar terms.

The EMI dropped by 6 US cents, closing the week at 926 US cents.

The oddment sector was the strongest performer for the week.

General rises in locks, stains, and crutch-

ings of between 5 and 20 cents, helped to push the two Merino Carding (MC) indicators up by an average of 12 cents.

Fremantle returns to the market next week, bolstering the national offering.

Currently, there is expected to be 39,192 bales on offer in Fremantle, Melbourne and Sydney (which is a designated Superfine Sale)

The Beefup Forum is set to be a captivating program, relevant to the issues and on-

going industry requirements of the region.

This includes: a market update from MLA, an industry update on FMD, updates on carbon, animal performance and genomics, and producers sharing practical and commercial insights.

The Forum has a list of compelling speakers such as Prof John Rolfe from the FASSA School of Business & Law who will be discussing the practicalities of earning carbon credits, and Prof Ben Hayes from the QLD Alliance for Agriculture and Food Innovation who will be providing a Genomics research update.

The topics to be covered on the day include understanding carbon, improving

livestock performance, and market Insights

Alongside the formal discussions, attendees will have the opportunity to network with other producers and learn from exhibitors.

There will be a networking dinner sponsored by Rabobank following the Forum.

## Conditions bite global demand for beef

Global demand for cheaper cuts of beef is expected to increase in the year ahead as rampant inflation and slowing economic growth see consumers trade down, Rabobank says in a newly-released report.

And Australia - as one of the largest exporters of beef 'trimmings' (the cheaper meat cuts which remain after prime cuts are removed) - is expected to be among the best positioned countries to benefit from this increased international demand, particularly from the US, the agribusiness bank says in its Q3 Global Beef Quarterly.

"Evidence of declining consumer confidence in the face of slowing economies and rising inflation is starting to build," the Rabobank report says.

"In general, beef markets are resilient to changes in economic conditions.

"However, we do see movement within supply channels and price points that tend to favour cheaper options such as mince/ground beef and quick-service restaurants over the more expensive cuts and consumption channels."

### Growing demand

The bank forecasts the volume of trimmings consumed globally to remain strong and potentially increase in the second half of 2022 as consumers continue to trade down to lower-value beef cuts and cheaper proteins. Trimmings are typically used in the production of ground or minced beef.

"Major importers of trimmings include the US, China, Japan and South Korea," the report says.

"With these countries facing slower economic conditions in the second half of 2022, we expect consumer-purchasing decisions to favour the consumption of trimmings.

"The US and South Korea face high inflation pressures, whilst China and Japan continue to struggle with slower economic growth off the back of Covid."

In the US - with its high consumption of ground beef - this should support demand for trimmings both from domestic and imported sources, Rabobank says.

Adding to the changing consumption habits as a result of economic conditions is the potential for the US to dramatically increase its need for imported trimmings.

Currently, high domestic beef production in the US is reducing the need for imported trimming products, the report says.

But, if US production contracts - with a slowing of the current US cow liquidation - higher import volumes will be needed.

And Australia - along with New Zealand - will be in the 'box seat' to help fill that demand, says Rabobank senior animal protein analyst Angus Gidley-Baird.

Australia's increased herd inventory will generate additional grass-fed and female slaughter numbers.

However, a caveat remains for the Australian market with our current limited processing capacity, Mr Gidley-Baird says. "Unless we can correct this, our ability to ramp up production and capitalise on any trimmings demand growth will be limited," he said.

### Global outlook

The global beef market overall remains strong, Rabobank's Q3 Beef Quarterly says.

"Most beef retail prices (in domestic currencies) continued their upward trend in Q2 or remained steady," the report says.

Beef prices in most markets are sitting between five and 11 per cent higher than quarter two in 2021, with the UK a notable exception

recording a decline in prices as consumer demand for beef has softened due to high retail prices.

Cattle markets around the world also remain favourable, the report says, supported by either seasonal conditions - in the case of Australia and Brazil - or strong demand, in the case of the US.

There was however some decline in cattle prices (in US dollar terms) from the previous quarter in countries including Australia, Brazil, Argentina and New Zealand.

Cattle prices continued to decline through July, Mr Gidley-Baird said, dropping below "year-ago levels" for the first time in 2.5 years, although we have seen them lift through August.

"Prices remain historically high," he said.

"Although at the end of July the Eastern Young Cattle Indicator for weaner age cattle had dropped 23 per cent since the beginning of the year, there is no need to panic.

"Since the beginning of August, we have seen prices rise again.

"We feel that the change in the seasons is prompting producers to hold cattle, reflected in lower saleyard numbers and with weaner cattle prices dropping the margin for back-grounders has improved which we believe has stimulated some additional demand."

Mr Gidley-Baird said the bank expects cattle prices to contract through Q3, but the warmer spring months and pasture growth should see some stability return to the market with some possible upside in Q4.

Although Australia's cattle slaughter numbers are slowly creeping up, volumes remain historically low, and Mr Gidley-Baird expects overall production for the year to be similar to 2021 at 1.9 million metric tonnes.

### A top result

Pymble Ladies College has been awarded the prestigious Noel Williams Perpetual Trophy by Angus NSW for their success in the Sydney Royal Show carcass competition.

Dubbed "Squirt", the winning steer was bred by Knowla Angus, Gloucester, weighed 433kg liveweight and achieved a score of 83 points on the hook, winning the lightweight hoof class, third in the carcass and first in the virtual taste test. College Head of Agriculture Grant Jackson thanked Angus NSW for the award and noted it was highly competed for by those schools entering Angus cattle at the RAS show.

"We were delighted to win this for the first time and would like to acknowledge the producers, the Laurie family from Knowla Livestock, Moppy, via Gloucester," Mr Jackson said.

"Ted and Alison's daughter, Georgia, was a Pymble student a few years back and they continue to do a great job supporting the current girls in the cattle team at the school."

### Worth their salt

According to an article in the Guardian Australia, the National Farmers Federation has "argued for non-monetary benefits", from which, the Australian Workers' Union has immediately retaliated.

"The days of vulnerable workers being 'paid' with food instead of money should be long behind us," said AWU National Secretary Daniel Walton.

"Ms Simon must urgently acknowledge that these arrangements belong in the history books.

"Some jobs in remote locations require employers to provide accommodation and life essentials.

"At no point should this necessary provision of essentials be considered some kind of 'service' for which workers are expected to forgo pay.

"If farmers want to run bed-and-breakfasts from their properties they are free to do so. But they should never be allowed to force vulnerable workers to purchase that kind of 'service' from them."

### Good story to tell

Meat & Livestock Australia are currently looking for passionate storytellers to become ambassadors for their Red Meat Industry Program through a series of workshops. MLA Industry Engagement Manager Lindsay Kasprovicz said the most recent round of workshops had been well-received by participants.

"More than 100 people from across the red meat value chain took part in the 2021-22 workshops, including producers and industry professionals as well as those from the processing, retail, feedlot, research, veterinarian, stock agency, technology and transport sectors," she said.

"Once participants had completed the workshop, they were invited to join the program alumni and were provided with updates on MLA's community engagement activities and given the opportunity to participate in those activities, including Virtual Classrooms and agricultural shows."

The 2022-23 Ambassadors workshops will be held in Queensland, 19-21 April 2023.

### At arm's length

AgForce has shirtfronted Warrego MP Ann Leahy after she claimed the organisation was in secret cahoots with the State Government.

Trouble began after AgForce signed an informal confidentiality agreement to be part of early consultation regarding proposed changes to the Environmental Protection Act—the one recently been touted as the "cattle cap".

AgForce CEO Michael Guerin said the allegations pushed by the opposition were absurd.

"It saddens me to see farmers being used as pawns in a game of political point scoring," he said.

"There is no secret deal between AgForce and Government, nor do we have any knowledge of any broad proposals to place more draconian laws across the industry.

"To suggest otherwise is disingenuous at best.

"AgForce remains engaged as strongly as possible with the Government of the day on the issues that matter to members."

Mr Guerin said this was the first time AgForce had signed a confidentiality agreement of this nature.

"We signed it in order to have a seat at the table as early as possible, and out of good faith that the outcomes will benefit our members," he said.

"Changes to the global conversation around climate, around landscapes, around the part that agriculture can play, are very important conversations and AgForce needs to be involved."







## Forecast Rainfall



# McMahon stars at Cup

The annual Beetoota Cup race meeting kicked off the river circuit of racing on Saturday, with the annual two-day Birdsville meeting to follow this weekend and Bedourie to wrap up the three-venue carnival the following Saturday.

Leading central west jockey Ric McMahon stole the show on Saturday with only four rides on the program to make the perfect record of four wins, including an extremely impressive win on Labuk in the TAB Beetoota Cup Handicap over 1600 metres.

McMahon rode the winner as if he was the best horse in the race, positioning just off the pace; and coming into the long Beetoota straight of 450 metres, McMahon was travelling so well, that he allowed Labuk to go to the lead.

Even though he had gone into the lead early, Labuk proved way too strong for the remainder of the field and ran out a convincing two-length winner over Stradari for trainer Kym Healy and Saccharo for Philip Cole.

Labuk will now progress to the Birdsville Cup this Saturday, and it is unlikely the runners who finished behind him will turn the tables; so he is a likely favourite for this year's Birdsville Cup.

McMahon's winners came for two trainers: Todd Austin for two victories and Kym Healy for two victories.

In the other feature event, the Santos limited Handicap over 1000 metres, McMahon rode Wall Street Tycoon for trainer Todd Austin.

And even though he had to carry an extra 64 kilograms, he was able to park outside the early leader, Kronos, and then gain the lead early in the straight and fight off a determined challenge by Zilitor.

Wall Street Tycoon, under strong riding, was able to hold off Zilitor by three-quarters-of-a-length, with Sons of Bourke coming from the back of the field into a third placing.

Wall Street Tycoon has now won three of his last four races, and he will progress to the

Bedourie meeting in two weeks' time.

Kym Healy kicked off the program with Ric McMahon in successive races: in the Benchmark 50 Handicap over 1200 metres, Tony's Reward proved too strong for stablemate, Caitlin's Angel with an almost four-length margin, and Hammoon Sweetheart coming from the tail of the field into a strong finish in third.

Tony's Reward had come off a Darwin program in recent starts and was a dominant winner in the race.

In the following race, Healy and McMahon combined on Real Valentia which had also come off Darwin form, with a second placing two starts back; and it was a convincing of over three-lengths win over Blackadder who came from the back of the field, and early leader Faith And Love holding on for third.

Jockey Ric McMahon now seals his lead in the Central West Jockey Premiership, with the four wins, in what appears to be an unassailable lead even this far out from the finish line.

Ningan trainer Rodney Robb is a regular visitor to the river circuit, and he was rewarded with the QTIS Maiden Plate winner in Nannu ridden by Jake Pracey-Holmes.

Nannu, starting at an odds-on favourite, had only one previous run with the stable and was able to run to the lead and maintain the lead throughout.

Sticking to the rails in the straight, Nannu went away to win by over five lengths over Andaman with It's Pins in third place.

Nannu will now progress to the Birdsville carnival and is certainly one to watch, even though it has only had a maiden win.

The final race on the program is always the Class B 800 metres at Beetoota.

And again, an odds-on favourite - making it the fourth odds-on favourite on the day - Kooky Kangaroo for Gary Bignell at Cunnamulla and jockey Steven Galvin had a dominant win by over two-lengths.

Kooky Kangaroo shared the lead in the home straight, was able to fight off Triny Bee in second place, and Ghetto coming into third.

The galloper has now won two-from-three and is another one to progress to Birdsville.

The Beetoota Race Club, with their annual meeting, put on a great race day; and the committee ought to be commended for the smooth running of the event.

The day, again, belonged to Ric McMahon.

# Historical racing resumes

The historical significance of the Tower Hill Races has not been lost on locals despite the event being over 100 years old and a postponement from April—as attendance continues to hit over the 150 mark.

Tower Hill Picnic Amateur Race Club president Amy Owens said the event was unique in being one of the few grass-fed race meetings—meaning the horses have to be exclusively fed grass within the three months prior to the race meet and jockeys are almost exclusively amateur.

“Its flag starts instead of barrier starts, we just race for trophies and prizes, not money,” she said.

“It’s how racing would have started in Australia.

“And I’d like to hope the event can continue—it’s a piece of history.”

Ms Owens said the public and tourists enjoy the uniqueness of the event.

“It is out of town; we’ve had people from all over Australia—it’s becoming more well known,” she said.

“I do hope it does [become more seen on the tourist calendar].”

When the event is held, typically in April, Ms Owens said she believes numbers are around 200-250, however, due to rain, the event was postponed until August, meaning numbers were down—likely due to competition with other events.

She does believe the event will continue to grow into the future, however.

“Everyone still had a really good time,” she said.

“It was still a lot of fun.”
