# New training focus

While the new training facility has been in operation for a number of months, the Longreach State Emergency Services officially revealed it to the public at this year's open day, with Mayor Tony Rayner cutting the ribbon.

The open day gave locals a chance to see what volunteering in the SES is all about, along with a sausage sizzle and cake... of course.

Longreach SES Local Controller Diesel Stenholm said "there was a reasonable turnout and more importantly we got some information out to the local community about how to prepare for storm season."

"We recruited one new volunteer, which we're happy with, but we can certainly do with more people," he said.

"We're still looking for people in the local community that want to get trained up in how to assist their local community, some of the skills we teach: first aid, CPR, chainsaw operations, working at height operations, and we're also looking for people with other skills such as admin, communication, and public speaking."

The event was bookended by two displays of SES workmanship: first a chainsaw display, then a working at heights display which featured the dummy, Bernie (a reference to the film, "Weekend at Bernie's").

"We have to do refresher training in competency maintenance, and any of those skills that we teach that are accredited, we have to regularly refresh those skills," Mr Stenholm said.

"That means every three months we have to perform those tasks and be observed performing them and sign off to say that we are still competent in that.

"So not only were we showing the public - and I was answering questions from people watching - and explaining to them the whole process, but we were able to do a demonstration but also get good practice."

"It was a worthwhile day."

The new training room will make life for the Longreach SES a lot easier.

"It was a great opportunity to showcase the new training room to the local community," Mr Stenholm said.

"What we had previously was effectively a tin shed and a concrete floor.

"There was no air-conditioning, there was no lighting, very little in fact.

"The temperature in summer, when it was 40 outside, it was 50-plus in there.

"So when you're sitting there will the doors open, and you're letting in all the bugs and flies in, and you're also trying to focus on the training that you're doing.

"Sometimes two days over a weekend for some of the more intensive courses—it made it very difficult.

"What we've got now is a vast improvement. "There's a floor, there's a ceiling, there's air-

conditioning, there's a TV, there's audiovisual projections."

While the open day is finished, the recruitment drive for the SES goes on.

"We'll continue to go out into the community and continue to do community education," Mr Stenholm said.

"We did a couple of visits to the high school last week and spoke to the Year 10 and 11 students.

"I've also spoken with Roger Naidoo from the Council today about doing a presentation to all of the employees at the Council works depot.

"Those guys already have a lot of the skills we're looking for.

"Hopefully the community got something out of [the event] as well."

## Qld Parliament sitting postponed

This week's sitting of the Queensland Parliament has been postponed due to the death of Queen Elizabeth II.

Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk said the postponement was as a mark of respect while a period of mourning is observed and is in line with the Australian Parliament.

She said the Leader of the House would publish an updated sitting calendar for the remainder of the year in due course.

## Housing supply panel expanded

A refreshed Housing Supply Expert Panel will take on housing challenges across Queensland.

Deputy Premier Steven Miles said he had directed the State's Housing Supply Expert Panel to provide advice about what more Councils should do to address housing supply.

"Addressing housing supply and affordability should be the number one priority of local government right now," he said.

"Last year I launched the Growth Areas Team to help proactively address land supply challenges and better coordinate stakeholders to bring new land supply to market.

"We've also invested \$200,000 to assist the Western Queensland Alliance of Councils deliver local housing action plans."

## Atrial Fibrillation Awareness

The eight Annual Atrial Fibrillation Awareness Week 19-25 September aims to raise awareness of the condition affecting an estimated 500,000 Australians.

The week, organized by hearts4heart, shines a spotlight on Atrial Fibrillation (AF), the most common irregular heartbeat.

Its prevalence is expected to double in the next decade and alarmingly, up to 30 percent of those affected by the disorder remain undiagnosed, which is why awareness is so important.

## National Day of Mourning

Australia will hold a National Day of Mourning to observe Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II on Thursday 22 September 2022.

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese has written to Premiers and Chief Ministers asking they declare this day a National Public Holiday to commemorate Her Majesty's remarkable life and dedication to service.

A National Memorial Service will be held at 11am in the Great Hall of Australian Parliament House in Canberra and will begin with one minute's silence. It will be broadcast live across the nation.

The Prime Minister, Governor-General David Hurley AC DSC (Retd), Premiers and Chief Ministers and other attendees from across Australia will be invited to come together to pay their respects.

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# Colour added to the cause

Raising nearly \$10,000 and attracting a crowd of just shy of 200, this week's Walk for Wegert was undeniably a success.

Started in 2019, Walk for Wegert was the brainchild of Outback Mind Warriors President Paris Cox after she lost her partner to suicide.

"It was raise awareness for mental health and suicide prevention in central west Queensland," Ms Cox said.

"We have a Facebook page where we often post mental health positive messages for the youth to see."

This year, along with the walk, participants were trialled by colour as volunteers peppered them with coloured powder.

"I just came up with the idea [of adding colour to the run] as something extra to get more kids and families to get involved," Ms Cox said.

"I think the kids this year really loved having the colour run."

"This year we've had a bigger year than last year."

"Last year we probably only had about 180 people."

"With the walk and volunteers, we were just under the 200 mark."

Speaker and Paralympian Curtis McGrath also attended the event to share his story.

"I do quite a bit of public speaking, and I don't always get out to the rural areas," Mr McGrath said.

"It's about providing a service, and it's nice to be able to come out."

"I think our story provides a bit of understanding."

Mr McGrath had his own bout of depression after losing his leg to a landmine while serving in Afghanistan; he said sharing his story is vitally important.

"People get a context [when you share your story] around why people are doing what they are doing or the events that can cause mental health issues," he said.

"Having chats is important, particularly around being a young male."

"Speaking up or speaking out about their feelings or if they have something on their shoulders can be difficult."

Mr McGrath said being proactive is essential when dealing with mental health problems.

"Identified quite early, that now as a disabled person, I have this unique opportunity to go to the Paralympic Games," he said.

"It gave me a purpose and fulfilment."

"I had something to do, that's really important—when we have a traumatic experience we need to think about the what next? and not the what if?"

"So I moved into Paralympic sport and won gold in Rio and just came back from Tokyo with two more golds."

"I'm just doing my story and spinning yarns, hopefully, people can learn something from that."

# Heart pumping action

To celebrate 40 years of Jump Rope for Heart, the Sherwood Arrows have visited the central west to show the students the value of skipping.

Jump Rope for Heart Organiser Rachel Wehl this was the first time the Heart Foundation's Jump Rope for Heart program was established in 1983 had come to the outback.

"We decided to come from Brisbane for a number of reasons: one, it's the 40th anniversary of Jump Rope for Heart and because of Covid we have not been able to travel too far," she said.

"So we've been fundraising for a few years so we can visit rural communities instead of sticking to eastern Queensland.

"It's good to show that children can do things with something as simple as a skipping rope."

Ms Wehl said skipping could be deeply beneficial to regional children.

"I thought hey this is very novel and exciting for them because they can do it at home," she said.

"If you can't get around or you're a distance ed student, you can grab a skipping rope, watch the girls on youtube and practice.

"Jump Rope for Heart has just done a nine-week program at the Our Lady's Catholic School and we're just introducing jump rope to the student at the State School.

"It's great because they can get fit by themselves."

Longreach State School Teacher Rachel Fox said it had been great for the local kids to try something new.

"I think it's been great for - particularly my Year 1 students - to watch other kids having a go," she said.

"Usually these days, kids aren't as active as they should be.

"This shows them a way, at school, they can use different equipment.

"They really do enjoy PE lessons, and this gives them an opportunity to have a bit of fun with their friends and try something different.

"It would be good to see schools like this come out more often."

# Building Barcy’s tourism

The Barcaldine-based Aboriginal tour guide company Trackers Tours has begun hosting students for tours around the historical town—tapping into a growing market of Aboriginal tourism and educational experiences.

The students, from St Luke’s Anglican school in Bundaberg were accommodated at the Wanpa-rda Matilda Outback Education Centre in the Australian Workers Heritage Centre.

The tour went from the Barcaldine State School to various churches and sites to the Tree of Knowledge before finally finishing at the Trackers base camp.

Trackers Tours owner-operator Cheryl Thompson, who was both a student and teacher at Barcaldine State School, said Aboriginal teachings are currently in high demand among schools.

“I’m a school teacher by trade, so I finished here (Barcaldine State School) in Year 12 and went south to learn how to become a teacher,” she said.

“Since returning, I am no longer teaching in a classroom, but I see my work in tourism as a form of teaching.

“Since Covid, there has been a much higher demand for the outback among schools, particularly after lockdowns when students would often take trips to Canberra, but now the big push is to come out to the outback.”

She said class groups of up to 80 had begun attending the tours.

“Yesterday we had a Year Nine class from Rivermount of about 80 students,” she said.

“We were able to cater for a variety of year levels.

“The schools who come out here, they will organise to do things outside of the tour, but the tour allows them to tick off a part of their assessment.”

As a necessary part of the curriculum, more and more schools are looking to places like Trackers Tours to have their students taught about Aboriginal history.

Ms Thompson believes Barcaldine is the place to do it.

“I’m on the Queensland Indigenous Tourism Board and we’ve done a lot of development and been to a number of conferences,” she said.

“We went to the State and National conference, and when we see what else is available, I think we’re [Trackers Queensland] a little ahead of the pack, especially with our staff development.

“In our tour offerings, we’ve been able to develop our staff, and that’s drawn - at the moment - from our Alice River Hostel—(housing Ms Thompson supplies for Aboriginal youth).

“The Aboriginal students who go here are about 80 per cent employed as tour guides and that’s our Dreamtime Guides.

“Eventually we will be looking to tap into the wider community of students and offer them some employment and traineeships.”

As Trackers Tours grows, Ms Thompson said she will be looking to build up the skills of local students.

“My daughter did her Cert III in Tourism at RAPAD Skilling in Longreach, who have been very professional in developing the program, she said.

“We will be looking to partner with RAPAD Skilling; they deliver the certificate and we will offer the placements for them.”

There are big plans for Trackers Tours.

“My goal for the whole thing is not just to be here in Barcaldine, but what they call a step-on-board tour leader of not only our town but the whole of the outback; so we can deliver a holistic experience of not only curriculum, not just Aboriginal experience, but a full local experience,” Ms Thompson said.

“We always try to convince people to come to us first when they visit the outback because it is a welcome and connection to country.

“Then we do further corroboree and other workshops afterwards.”

School groups have been taking to the venture, and Ms Thompson believes it scratches a necessary itch as well filling out a check box in the curriculum.

“School groups, and often coach groups, ask, what do you do in the outback? What do

you do in Barcaldine?,” she said.

“So we show them our history.

“They love the jump on tours and we show them around town—this where we hang out, this is our experience.

“We walked past the local churches, and because they’re an Anglican school, there’s another avenue for them to connect.

“Then we walked around to the Tree of Knowledge, and on the way, we showed them the Picture Theatre.

“I find the Tree of Knowledge is important because we share the history of the Shearer’s Strike which is actually how the outback was born in terms of pioneering.

“And as I told them, that’s why we sing Waltzing Matilda because a swagman is a shearer which ties us in with Winton [where tours often go afterwards.

“I think that little piece of the pie from the outback experience is missing, and I find it’s important to share the history of the Tree of Knowledge and the shearers strike.”

Many who do a tour at Trackers Tours remind Ms Thompson that Aboriginal history has been sorely missed from the curriculum

for a long time.

“It’s (indigenous history) something that has been missing from the curriculum since day dot,” she said.

“The Grey Nomads and the older generation love it because they were never given it.

“Now it’s in the curriculum, the teachers want to teach it, but they don’t necessarily have that cultural safety.

“So when they come out here - not only the students but the teachers as well - we immerse them in Aboriginal culture and give them that cultural safety so they can keep on teaching when they go back into the classroom they can continue to teach it.”

“It’s more about sharing our culture so all Australians can continue the dreaming, I say.


“So they understand our art, our dance, every aspect—we can all share that history together.

“We want to add the layer of Aboriginal perspective.

“At the moment, every two weeks we have a Fun Over 50 or a coach group come through—I would say the same would be for the school groups.”

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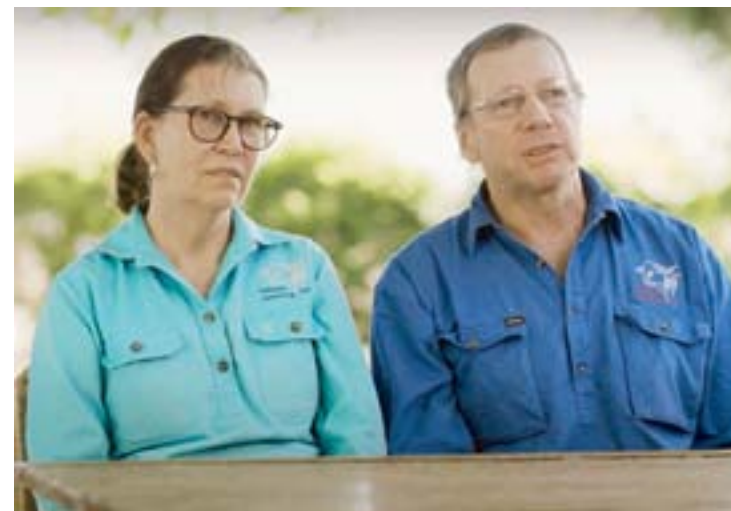

# Focus on farming families

Three Central Western Queensland families share the spotlight this month as AgForce unveils a new website highlighting their success stories within the sheep and goat industries.

AgForce unveiled the new website this week that promotes the true potential of Queensland's sheep and goat industries, with figures revealing small livestock numbers and commodity prices have increased up to six times since 2016.

The Case studies include six Queensland properties, including David and Clare Paterson from 'Kaloola' at Longreach, Ben and Jack Banks from 'Rivington' at Blackall and Anita Dennis and Joe Taylor from 'Coolagh' also at Blackall.

The site was created to accompany agriculture's long-awaited 'Blueprint to Enhance the Growth of the Queensland Sheep and Goat Industries' and highlights why now is the best time in a long time to invest in small livestock.

Complete with producer case studies, videos, and graphs, the scrolly-telling website tells the story of an industry poised to take off.

David and Clare Paterson sold all their merinos and de-stocked their property 'Kaloola' in 2015, which gave them an opportunity to put up exclusion fencing.

During this time the couple started to think of alternatives and made the transition to meat sheep with white Dorper ewes in 2016.

Clare said the main reason they went into meat sheep was they saw them as being very sustainable and well adaptable to the climate.

"We wanted to utilise the feed that was on our property and the Dorper sheep could use the trees, the grasses and the herbage," Clare said during their case study segment.

While the Patersons branched off into meat sheep, Ben and Jack Banks diversified 'Rivington' with Merinos, Santa Charolais-cross cattle and more recently, approximately 2000 goats.

Jack Banks describes the small livestock industry as being in a very strong situation.

"The opportunities, I consider, are huge for people that are looking at coming into rural industries," Mr Banks told AgForce.

"As far as producers we've never had it better."

An industry poised to take off is something that has AgForce's Sheep and Wool Board President Mike Pratt enthusiastic about the future.

"We launched the Blueprint itself last year with the goal of doubling the value of sheep and goat production in Queensland to \$350 million by 2026," Mr Pratt said.

"It sounds like a bold vision, but when you scroll through the website and listen to the case studies and read the numbers you start to get the feeling that it's really possible, and that resources like this will go a long way towards helping make it a reality."

"Small livestock numbers and commodity prices for wool, mutton, lamb, and goat meat have all increased between three and six times since 2016, and landholders are embracing innovative approaches to production and sourcing new markets that build more direct relationships with consumers."

Mr Pratt said in recent years a number of factors had come together to create huge opportunities for producers, including wild dog exclusion fencing, diminishing drought conditions, and strong commodity prices.

"Of course, it's no accident that the rise of exclusion fencing to curb predation from wild dogs, feral pigs and foxes has coincided with the resurgence in merino numbers and overall confidence for producers in small livestock industries," he added.

"Hopefully, this new website and all the work that's being done behind the scenes will encourage an even greater level of interest, diversification and investment."

The website, which received \$90,000 in State Government funding, has the support of Minister for Agricultural Industry Development and Fisheries and Minister for Rural Communities Mark Furner, who has long been a champion of the sheep and goat meat industry.

Mr Furner said the sector is surging back to life after decades of decline caused by wild dogs, poor sheep and wool prices, and drought.

"Global demand for red meat is increasing and prices for sheep and goat meat are forecast to remain strong for the foreseeable future," he said.

## Leahy hits out on ag worker shortage in the regions

Warrego MP Ann Leahy has hit out against the State Government over worker shortages in regional Queensland.

"It is no wonder we have a skilled worker and labour shortage across every sector and in every region across Queensland when we look back at this Labor

state government's terrible record when it comes to skills and training," she said.

"They have a shocking record on skills and training.

"Suddenly after seven years, this government has woken up that there is a skills crisis.

"There was a skills crisis in hospitality in

my region seven years ago—it was only after their mates in Canberra called a jobs summit that this Labor government said, 'Oops, we had better have something to take to this.'

"Out came the glossy brochures."

Ms Leahy claimed that between 2017 and 2021 there were more cancellations and withdrawals from Queensland apprenticeships and traineeships than actual completions.

"Let me remind members that this was before Covid changed the world so the Minister for Training and Skills Development can stop blaming the pandemic," she said.

"All this government talks about is those

who have commenced an apprenticeship or traineeship.

"They do not talk about the numbers who have completed them.

"Unless we have completions we do not have qualified tradespeople."

Ms Leahy then mentioned the shortage of on farm workers.

"The regions are crying out for people to fill jobs in the agricultural industry," she said.

"They are crying out for people to pick strawberries and grapes.

"In my region, we have some of the largest grape-producing areas around St George.

"The unions do not want people to fill jobs in the horticulture industry or in the agriculture industry."

Ms Leahy then mentioned the uncertain nature regarding the former Longreach Pastoral College.

"The agriculture minister thought it was a great photo opportunity to stand in front of the locked gates at the Longreach agriculture college. Maybe he should have hired the image photographer of the Deputy Premier and they might have picked a better look," she said.

"He could not have picked a worse photo in Longreach."

# Farm land on track for major growth

Australian agricultural land is set for another year of 'double digit' growth according to agribusiness banking specialist Rabobank.

The group's newly-released annual Australian Agricultural Land Price Outlook report - supported by farmland sales data from DAS (Digital Agricultural Services) - suggests "favourable macro forces" are continuing "to swell (agricultural) land prices" in 2022, following "massive growth" seen in 2021.

The bank's analysis - of the data set comprising genuine rural sales and excluding life-style and non-market transactions - shows agricultural land prices across the country rose massively in 2021 by 27 per cent (median price per hectare), with double digit annual growth recorded across all states.

"Almost similarly-strong year-on-year growth has occurred so far in 2022 across our available data set, which currently covers about 30 per cent of the estimated full-year 2022 Australian farm sales," the report says.

This preliminary data indicates growth of above 25 per cent in Australian agricultural land prices so far for 2022, suggesting full year 2022 sales will easily yield double digit growth.

The size of land deals is also continuing to increase. International comparison shows Australia has also outpaced many other countries in recent years when it comes to growth in agricultural land values.

Report author, RaboResearch Australia and New Zealand general manager Stefan Vogel said the growth has been driven by a very positive "constellation of factors", including strong agricultural commodity prices and good pro-

duction volumes enjoyed by many in the nation's farm sector, which have "bolstered farmers' cash reserves and driven demand for land purchases".

"For multiple years in a row, the macro settings have been exceptionally favourable for land purchases. Prices of most major agricultural commodities hit or moved close to record highs, widespread rainfall has supported Australian production and interest rates have been at record lows," he said.

Slowing, but not declining Slower growth in farmland prices is, however, forecast for 2023 and beyond, the report - which provides a five-year outlook - says. Although "no decline in farmland prices" is on the horizon.

"Our base case forecast is that farmland price growth will continue, but we expect a significant slowdown in the rate of growth of prices in 2023 and the years beyond to 2027 from the unprecedented strong growth seen recently," Mr Vogel said.

This view is driven by a declining economic outlook, with higher farm operating costs and lower farm incomes expected in comparison with recent buoyant conditions. In addition, Mr Vogel said, the market could not be expected to sustain a continuation of the massive rates of growth seen in land prices in recent years.

"The tide is turning slightly as the land market needs to take a breather after the staggering growth over the past 18 months and also given the increased cost of finance and of farm inputs like energy and fertilizer," he said. And there is also the likelihood of agricultural commodity prices and production volumes in coming years falling short of the exceptionally high or even record levels seen in 2021 and the first half of 2022."

Mr Vogel said while agricultural commodity prices are likely to stay well above the five-year average for the next one to two years, costs - including for farm inputs such as fertiliser - are also expected to exceed their five-year average, and interest rates are rising.

He said grazing land prices had grown more in Australia than in North America and Europe.

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# ‘Enticing’: Alcock’s pie cart

Wendy related this story to Elaine Britton on 7 April 2021.

My father came to Longreach from Western Australia with a couple of mates.

They were all shearers and were making their way around Australia following the sheds.

However, when they stopped in Longreach, Dad met the girl of his dreams, Tessie Brown, married her and settled in Longreach, where they raised their family. To supplement his income, Dad did lots of odd jobs and one Mum would talk about was the painting of one of Moses Mellick’s houses.

He was running short of time before going to another shed, so she went down on a Sunday afternoon and helped him finish the painting, so he could be paid.

Unfortunately, Dad became unwell and the last shed he had shorn at was Combe Martin.

He just couldn’t shear anymore and eventually, it was discovered he had multiple sclerosis.

He soon obtained a job at the Longreach Club (“Cocky’s Club” as it was popularly known) as a barman.

As with everything he did, he became very good at this job.

He became friendly with a gentleman called Jim Howard.

They began talking about schemes and somewhere along the line, the idea of a pie cart was born.

Mr Howard ran a laundry on the corner of Magpie Lane and Swan Street and told Dad he could park his van on part of this land.

Between them, they constructed an oven in an old solid tank which was partly filled with



sand.

Somehow when the fire was lit, the pies were put into this oven on trays and in time were cooked.

The pies were made at our home which was in Brolga Street and Dad and Mum would ride their bikes, carrying the uncooked pies in baskets to the van.

My three brothers were away at boarding school and I had twin sisters, who were much younger.

These little ones hated my parents going off the work at the pie cart, so an Aunt would take them for a walk around the block.

One day when Mum and Dad were riding past where they were walking, Mum was waving ‘goodbye’ to them when she rode into the gutter and spilt some of the contents of the

baskets.

All Dad was worried about was the loss of pies.

They sold tea and coffee too.

There were always lots of people there, especially after the pictures [movies].

They made an adequate living.

Elaine Britton’s thoughts and memories of the pie cart:

I think the pie cart was a converted caravan.

It had push-out-shutters on each side (in case of rain) and counters on either side.

The smell of those pies was so enticing and Mr and Mrs Alcock were always happy and caring.

Just imagine how hard they worked, both at home and at the cart.

It would have been quite late at night when they finished and then had to ride their bikes home.

Wonderful people.

The Pie Cart was situated opposite the Roxy Theatre in Swan Street and was a most popular place for a delicious pie following the movies and many other functions in town.

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## Samuel ‘one of the best’

Samuel Clemesha, a blacksmith, came to Queensland in 1884, having been born in 1860 at Maitland, New South Wales.

He arrived in Muttaborra around 1886, obtaining work from William St John Harding, the local ‘smithy’ who owned the Mount Cornish Hotel.

Supported by Harding, Klugh & Samuels (a large local business), Sam first rented and then bought the blacksmith shop, and maintained that business for about 25 years.

After his marriage in April 1887 to Mary Cunneen, a seamstress (and sister to Norah McCarthy at the Exchange Hotel), he became the licensee of the Royal Mail Hotel, later purchasing the freehold.

Early in 1894 he also became licensee of the Mt Cornish Hotel and bought the freehold of that as well.

Sam bought a small property from Klugh & Samuels in 1892 and called it Clemville, then selected, bought, and sold numerous blocks in the central west, most notably Potosi and Silverwood in the local area, and Zara and Bervock (adjoining blocks) in the Hughenden district.

The family lived at Zara for many years.

He also invested in some shops and flats in Sydney.

Sam Clemesha was a councillor on the Aramac Shire Council for many years, president of Muttaborra Turf Club for 10 years, member of Muttaborra Hospital Committee, and chairman of the Muttaborra State School Committee for a number of years as well.

He was a Grand Master of Aramac Lodge and a Justice of the Peace.

Sam and Mary had seven children, but sadly lost two daughters at early ages and a son at 21 years old (from appendicitis), all of who are buried in the Muttaborra cemetery.

Another son died in his mid-30s.

Samuel died in 1943, at Warwick, and

Mary died in Brisbane in 1956.

The parents were survived by just one son and two daughters.

A ‘send-off’ was held for the Clemeshas in Muttaborra in September 1911, when the family were moving residence from the town of Muttaborra.

It was largely attended, and speeches, toasts, and presentations were made.

Sam was thanked “for his energy, forethought, thrift and general attention to all matters pertaining to the benefit of the district”.

An article was written about Sam Clemesha in the Longreach Leader in 1936, the paper stating that it was “doing honour to this man to whom so much honour is due – one of the best, and kindest, and most respected men the Central West has ever known”.

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# Mission impossible

The limited series *Thai Cave Rescue* retells the incredible true story of the 2018 event that captivated the world. Actor Rodger Corser, who plays Australian diver Dr Richard Harris, speaks with **Siobhan Duck** about the authenticity at the heart of the Netflix production

**R**ODGER Corser anticipates there will be people who think they already know all there is to know about the 2018 rescue of the Thai soccer team.

Well, they'd be wrong. Even though it comes on the back of global news coverage, a stream of documentaries and the recent Ron Howard-helmed movie, *Thirteen Lives* (Prime Video), Corser's new Netflix drama, *Thai Cave Rescue*, offers perhaps the most intimate and fulsome picture of this remarkable true story to date.

"The great thing about tele over the last 15-20 years is that these high-end [production giants like] Netflix and HBO can take a deep dive – no pun intended – into these sorts of stories," Corser says.

"You could tell from the start that it was very important to this production, that they didn't just want internationals coming in and trying to tell this story. It was written by Americans but very much in consultation with the Thai people."

As such, *Thai Cave Rescue* has been made with the co-operation of everyone involved – from the boys and their families to the officials in charge of the operation and the impoverished farmers who sacrificed their crops – and is told with the luxury of time that the long-form storytelling of a TV series allows.

Also adding to its authenticity is the fact that it was filmed partly in the Thai language and on location in boys' real homes and at the national park where the events took place.

"We filmed all the external stuff in Chiang Rai near one cave," he says.

"And we filmed some of it inside chamber one, which is a bit like a big amphitheatre. But we weren't allowed to go past that because it gets too tight, especially with a film crew. It's hard enough to get divers through there."

Corser plays Dr Richard "Harry" Harris, the cave-diving Aussie anaesthetist who successfully sedated the boys so that they could be safely carried through the underwater tunnels by experienced divers. Corser's friend Damon Herriman plays Harry's diving partner and fellow Australian of the Year Craig Challen.

Corser says he didn't find playing a real doctor particularly more challenging than the fictional one he won hearts as on *Doctor Doctor* for so many seasons of the Channel 9 drama.

"I'm not doing an impersonation of Harry," Corser says.

"I think it's harder if, for instance, you have to play Elvis. Because

everyone is going to expect some sort of similarity to him, even though if you go for an impersonation, then your purists will say, well, it's just an impersonation.

"With something like *Doctor Doctor*, you are always adding bits and pieces to the back story as you go along whereas with Harry, I really only got a two-episode arc but a lot of the work was done for me, because I had his book and I got to meet him."

To prepare for the role Corser also took a crash course in cave diving, learning to navigate tight underwater spaces by swimming under submerged furniture in a Thai pool. And some of the more dangerous underwater scenes were performed by Dr Harris himself, rather than a professional stuntman.

"I think it's a great gift as an actor to try cool things that you might not normally get to do like riding a horse, riding a motorbike, getting propelled down the side of a building or doing some diving," he says.

"All that kind of gear is fun, and it makes the job not boring at all."

Filming the series in Thailand during the pandemic meant having to quarantine alone in a hotel room for two weeks and saw Corser separated from his family for longer than ever before.

As a father himself, Corser couldn't help but put himself in the shoes of the parents of the lost boys to imagine how they must have felt as they waited for news of their kids.

He marvels too at the resilience of the kids who were trapped underground for such a long time without food or fresh air.

"I actually think the reason why those kids, over 10 days, coped the way they did is because they were used to not having everything at their fingertips," he says.

"I mean my kids are similar ages and if the wi-fi drops out there's almost a tantrum."

Despite being away from his family, the experience was a joyful one for Corser that forged many new friendships and professional respect for the international cast and crew.

Which is why the whole production team – including Corser – were so rocked by an unexpected tragedy that occurred soon after filming had wrapped. Papangkorn Lerkchaleampote, the Thai actor better known as Beam, who played the inspirational coach of the trapped team, was found dead in his bed.

"Beam was incredible with the child actors," Corser says.

"It was almost like art imitating life. He was their centre [just as the coach had been for the trapped boys during their ordeal]. They'd had a drama coach on set, but he was the one they looked to for emotional things.

"They would just sort of follow his lead and some amazing performances came out of that. Especially with those smaller kids.

"I've got amazing footage of them, all, in a huddle at the wrap party. They all have their arms around each other, and he was telling them what a special thing it was that they had done. He was only a kid himself. Only 25."

In recognition of Beam's contribution to the production, the series now carries a dedication to his memory as the final credits roll.

It's a fitting tribute but Corser is saddened that Beam will not get to see the project come to fruition or fulfil his potential as a performer.

"He had done quite a lot of work in Thailand, but I think this would have really propelled his career into something else," he says, sadly.

## A rose tribute to Queen

Across the world, millions of people have paid tribute to Queen Elizabeth II following her death last Friday including those in Western Queensland.

Over the last few days, many residents of the west have left personal messages of condolences online.

At the same time, many gardeners would like to create their own planted memorial.

What many gardeners might not know is that there is a Queen Elizabeth Rose.

This Rose could make the perfect memorial to Queen Elizabeth II.

In fact, this Rose is regarded as the World's Favourite Rose and has been grown in this part of the world for over 50 years.

This Queen Elizabeth Rose or Rosa Queen Elizabeth was introduced in 1954 and named to mark Queen Elizabeth's Coronation in 1953.

This Rose was bred by famed Rose Breeder Doctor Walter E. Lammerts of California.

The Rosa Queen Elizabeth is a Grandiflora Rose and is a cross between a Hybrid Tea and a Floribunda Rose.

It features flowers similar to the Hybrid Tea Roses in clusters of three to five blooms similar to the Floribunda Roses.

Grandiflora Rose forms a larger and somewhat sturdier shrub than the Hybrid Tea and Floribunda Roses.

The Queen Elizabeth Rose is a tall upright bushy shrub that is highly disease resistant.

It bares delicate pure pink blooms on long stems that have a light fragrance.

This rose is almost thornless making it the perfect Rose for flower arranging.

In the garden, it is great in mass plantings though it is also ideally positioned at the back of a Cottage garden.

I can still remember admiring a Queen Elizabeth Rose along with many over Roses in Longreach in 2009.

This Rose seems to perform better in Western Queensland than along the coast.

Another attribute of Queen Elizabeth Rose which makes it a feature in the garden is that its canes and stems are red and contrast perfectly with its dark green tough leathery foliage.

After flowering the Queen Elizabeth Rose like all Grandiflora Roses can be pruned back to a respectable length, about one-third of its

height is recommended.

At the same time as pruning, it is suggested to replace the Mulch around the Rose to a depth of 50-75mm.

If you were to plant a new Queen Elizabeth Rose in an existing garden bed?

The Queen Elizabeth Rose is best planted in full sun in a well-drained position and once established it will require little maintenance.

The garden bed should have been prepared at least a fortnight beforehand and allowed to settle.

Then make a hole that should be about 300mm or one foot in diameter and a mound formed in the bottom of it to a level such that when the lower end of the root ball.

The top of the root ball of the Rose should even with the soil surface.

Then place the soil back around the root ball and water in, as this will eliminate air pockets.

It is important to note that Roses do not like

having their feet waterlogged, and this is often the cause of many Rose failures.

Fertilising freshly planted Roses is widely discouraged by many specialist growers.

I have always found that using a small quantity of slow-release Osmocote has worked quite successfully.

However, if stronger amounts of fertiliser are used when planting, it may force new growth but damage the root system, which is the most important part of the plant at this stage.

The Grandiflora class of Roses was created in the middle of the last century for those show standard Hybrid Tea and Floribunda Roses that could not fit either category for show judging.

The name Grandiflora is Latin for large-flowered.

The Grandiflora Roses were quite popular with Rose enthusiasts between 1954 into the 1980s.

In recent times the Hybrid Tea and Flori-

bunda Roses have become more favoured by Rose enthusiasts.

Doctor Walter E. Lammerts has a history as impressive as the Queen Elizabeth Rose.

Dr Lammerts earned both an Undergraduate Degree and Doctorate in Horticulture from the University of California, Berkeley.

Between 1940 and 1981 Doctor Walter E. Lammerts is credited with introducing 46 new rose varieties including the famous Rosa Queen Elizabeth and Rosa Chrysler Imperial.

The Queen Elizabeth Rose has been very highly awarded since it was first bred.

Winning the Portland Gold Medal in 1954, All-America Rose Selections Award in 1955, American Rose Society Gold Medal in 1957 and Golden Rose of The Hague in 1968.

It was inducted into the World Rose Hall of Fame and World's Favourite Rose in 1979.

Then in 2015 the Award of Excellence for Best Established Rose.



# Polls in the Wellshot pub

From winning awards in hospitality to hosting high-quality genetic merinos, the Wellshot Hotel can do it all.

“It’s a great little pub on the side of the road,” Mount Ascot Merinos stud owner Nigel Brumpton said.

“We wanted to support private enterprise. “We just thought anyone can go to Longreach.”

The Jolly Jumbuck team Charlie Brumpton and Felicity Brumpton echoed his sentiments.

“Hopefully we can keep coming down to us and we can continue supplying this area,” Felicity said.

“It’s something different.

“There are a few studs that have sales in Longreach—we’d like to do something on our own and support a little community.

“And the Wellshot is a great pub, they looked after us.

“There will be plenty of money going over the bar.”

Tourists delighted in the opportunity to

witness the event.

“We were surprised when we saw the amount of caravans coming into town for the auction,” Felicity said.

“I think they’ve all loved it.

“We saw them pop in their heads.”

This is the first time in more than eight years Mount Ascot has sought to sell their

stock in central west Queensland.

“We used to have a northern sale in Muttaburra, but eight years ago when the drought hit and dogs took over things got tough,” said Charlie Brumpton.

“We decided to come back up here after a few good years and merino sheep are still very profitable so we were interested in giving

it another shot.

“The sale went unreal—well above what we expected.”

For the Jolly Jumbuck team the top seller was \$29,00 with an average of just over \$2000

“Its positive times up here at the moment, it was a great opportunity to sell a few rams in the north,” said. Felicity.

“Hopefully things continue.”

“You can never predict the top price, but we’re very happy with the top price and the average was well above what we expected,” said. Charlie.

“It’s good to see people are willing to pay for genetics.

“If we can get rewarded for what we put in, it makes us confident we can keep doing it.

“Good to see people willing to pay for well-bred merinos.”

For the Mount Ascot team the top selling ram was \$2,400 with an average of just over \$14,000.

“The sale has overwhelmed,” Nigel said.

The team confirmed the Wellshot Hotel sale will be an annual event.

## Improve lamb survival, minimise losses

An understanding of the importance of fat and muscle has seen a Queensland Merino flock boost lamb survival and minimise lamb losses.

Goondiwindi’s Mark and Vicki Murphy have undertaken a personal challenge to make the Merino a more productive, easier care, sustainable and enjoyable to manage sheep.

The couple marked 153 per cent lambs from ewes joined in 2021 and recorded just 7.3 per cent lamb loss in their Karbullah Poll Merino.

“A passion of mine is to achieve greater lamb survival,” Mr Murphy said.

Mr Murphy said if the national sheep flock sat close to an annual lamb loss of 7.3 percent, there would be an additional minimum of more than eight million live lambs born each year.

“We could decrease that by over two-thirds through improved management, genetics and nutrition,” he said.

“What came out of the Bred Well Fed Well program was the importance of getting the mob size down and make the birth site private for twin bearing ewes to get those lambs on the ground.”

Reducing lamb losses under tough conditions to 7.3 percent lamb loss is no easy feat considering lamb losses under shedded conditions in Europe with 100 per cent surveillance, all lambs tube fed and given an antibiotics is 7-9 percent.

“It’s about having an understanding of the importance of fat and muscle,” Mr Murphy said.

“You also need a ewe with good mothering ability and who will hang around the birth site to look after her lamb.”

Karbullah is also supplying semen from one of their 2020 drop sires for export to Mongolia to lift lamb survival rates in Merino flocks in the challenging environment.

“Criteria included doability and wool quality so the ram had to have above average breeding values for fat and muscle, skin and wool

traits,” Mr Murphy said.

“He was used as a ram lamb in a syndicate joining over older ewes before being sold.”

The Murphys use best practice management, visual appraisal, Australian Sheep Breeding Values and the latest genetic and electronic technology.

The result is a plainer bodied, more robust animal producing earlier maturing progeny, giving commercial producers the ability to turn off a lamb with a shorn fleece of wool as surplus income.

The couple run 850 stud ewes in their dual purpose SRS (Soft Rolling Skins) Merino stud on 3144ha.

Mr Murphy said the productive, plain bodied Merino resulted in reduced drenching, the elimination of body strike and fleece rot and the cessation of mulesing at Karbullah.

The absence of mulesing has resulted in the flock being Responsible Wool Standard (RWS) accredited, drawing premiums for lines off the main ewes.

Adult ewes average 19 micron with fleece weights of 6kg and a 100 per cent comfort factor in the main lines.

## Preparing groups for drought

# Wild dog baiting to protect flocks and farm businesses

Aerial spring baiting campaigns are about to get under way across key locations across the country, aimed at reducing the impact of wild dogs on livestock according to Australian Wool Innovation Limited Vertebrate Pests Manager Ian Evans.

Mr Evans said the campaigns aim support the livelihoods and emotional wellbeing of farmers and their families as well helping reduce the predation of native animals.

“Woolgrowers and other landholders undertaking wild dog and fox control programs can be rightly proud that they are not only protecting their flocks, their businesses and the wellbeing of their families and local communities, but that they are also helping native wildlife to survive and thrive,” Mr Evans said.

“This is an additional way that the Australian wool industry can demonstrate its eco-

credentials to the broader community and public and maintain its social licence.”

He said while woolgrowers primarily undertake wild dog and fox baiting programs to minimise attacks on their flocks, it can be very effective when land managers use it as part of strategic, broadscale, coordinated control programs supported by other control methods such as trapping, fencing, shooting and guard-ian animals.

“However, as well as reducing attacks on livestock, these control programs also have a positive environmental impact, reducing predation on Australia’s native animal species.

“When it comes to food, wild dogs are not fussy diners, they prey on 229 native animals including mammals, birds and reptiles of all sizes from insects to water buffalo. However, they prefer to eat small and medium-sized

mammals when available, including native animals.

“As a generalist predator, wild dogs can severely impact rare and threatened species under certain conditions. Wild dogs have been directly implicated in the rapid decline of some of Australia’s most iconic species including 14 native mammals, reptiles and birds listed under the national Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999.

“In addition to direct predation, wild dogs carry hydatid worms (Echinococcus granulosus), a zoonotic disease (transmittable to humans) that has severe implications for native species, particularly macropods such as the rare Bridled Nail-tail wallaby thought to be extinct for most of the 20th century.”

Mr Evans said Sodium fluoroacetate (1080) is the major control tool used to manage the

impacts of wild dogs and foxes on Australia’s livestock industry. It is an environmentally responsible option for invasive species control due to its minimal impact on native animals.

He said 1080 was a naturally occurring toxin found in more than 30 species of native Australian plants.

“Many of Australia’s native fauna have a natural tolerance to 1080 because they have shared the landscape with plants containing 1080 for many thousands of years, unlike introduced species such as wild dogs and foxes which are much more sensitive to the poison,” Mr Evans said.

“The small amount required to target wild dogs and foxes poses a minimal risk to non-target species.”

- 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- 2 teaspoons fennel seeds
- 1 cup red lentils
- 3 tablespoons curry paste
- 1 L vegetable stock, salt reduced
- ½ lemon, juiced and zested

### Method:

- PREHEAT oven to 180°C. Line baking tray with baking paper.
- HEAT large pot with remaining oil, add lentils and stir through curry paste, adding vegetable stock and bring to slow boil. Simmer for 25 minutes until lentils are cooked through.
- TOSS the cauliflower in a bowl with ½ the oil and fennel seeds until evenly coated.
- ARRANGE cauliflower over baking tray in single layer and roast in oven for 15 minutes.
- COOL cauliflower slightly, add to deep jug to blitz with stick blender until smooth.
- ADD cauliflower to cooked curried lentils and stir through with lemon juice and zest.

- Black pepper

- PREHEAT oven to 180°C and line a 12-hole muffin tray with muffin cases.
- PLACE all ingredients in a bowl and stir to combine.
- SPOON mixture into muffin cases.
- BAKE in oven for 15 minutes or until a skewer comes out clean.
