Housing fast-track

The recent housing summit held in Brisbane brought interest groups from across the state to discuss the current housing crisis.

Chair of RAPAD Mayor Tony Rayner said one of the outcomes of the event was 10 new houses to be built for Queensland Health and 10 duplexes to be built along Wompoo Road.

"This housing summit that's just occurred in Brisbane as the Chair of RAPAD was focussed on identifying what are the challenges in the housing sector and what are the solutions and opportunities," he said.

"To reflect the importance of this situation, the Premier was in attendance, as well as, the Deputy Premier, the Treasurer, and the Federal Housing Minister, Julie Collins also spoke.

"One of the first announcements made was in relation to the Housing Investment fund being lifted to \$2 billion—that's an additional \$1 billion that has gone into that pool." Cr Rayner said development for new housing is to be fast-tracked after the meeting.

"So the day was spent with many people from various parts of the State and people from different industries, talking about their various challenges and their solutions," he said.

"Coming out of this will be some policy initiatives that will help fast-track development and housing that will help address the issues with both houses and rentals.

"Longreach, as are many towns in regional Queensland, is going to be a beneficiary with 10 additional government employment housing homes for Queensland Health.

"So we know that we're getting those.

"We also know, we will be getting four duplexes for social and community housing on Wompoo Rd."

Cr Rayner said more allocations for funding will be given in the coming years to address the problem.

"We're aware of existing allocations, and

there will be more in the future based on budget proportioning from the State Government and needs analysis,"he said.

"Part of the outcome was the commitment to take a land audit as well, so that's a land audit of unallocated land that means State land or Council land that is just sitting idol that could be available to housing development.

"That's a great initiative.

"There are also a number of policy changes that will benefit to access to housing."

To emphasise the point, Cr Rayner said the Diamantina Shire Council was given a quote of \$950,000 for a two-bedroom house.

"They were seeking three two-bedroom houses, each costing that amount," he said.

"That highlights the extreme cost that both communities and councils are facing when developing housing.

"But the decisions made at the summit will help drive investment into both social and affordable housing."

Responder reform package

IN BRIEF

A sweeping reform package was unveiled this week for Queensland's frontline responders includes a record increase to the budget for our SES volunteers.

The government's reforms include a \$400 million investment over four years that will deliver nearly 500 extra frontline personnel.

This investment will also grow the SES annual budget of \$60 million per year, up from the current baseline of \$23 million.

That will mean more SES personnel and more resources, including crucial safety equipment, vehicles and vessels, and more support for councils for certain expenses, like operational vehicle maintenance and fuel.

To oversee these reforms, the Palaszczuk Government will stand up a Reform Implementation Taskforce, led by State Disaster Coordinator, Deputy Police Commissioner Steve Gollschewski.

The Taskforce will work closely with all stakeholders, including local councils, to ensure the required changes will be undertaken in a measured, consistent and cohesive way.

Independent Fire Department

The State Government is set to establish a dedicated, stand-alone Queensland Fire Services Department.

The Fire Services Department will incorporate existing Fire and Rescue Service personnel and resources.

But in addition, the Rural Fire Service will be hosted within the new department, as a separate entity with its own dedicated budget. The reform package includes a significant boost in funding and personnel. There will be an additional 143 firefighter positions for Fire and Rescue operations, bringing the total commitment of the Government to an additional 500 firefighter positions over six years from July, 2020. The Rural Fire Service entity will get a resources boost with more than 100 extra positions and funding for new appliances, facilities and equipment.

Tourism Inquiry Launched

The Joint Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade, has launched an inquiry into Australia's tourism and international education sectors, with a focus on the operation of both sectors in the post COVID-19 world.

"Both the tourism and international education sectors have contracted substantially since the emergence of COVID-19," Trade Subcommittee chair, Senator Deborah O'Neill commented. "The Committee looks forward to understanding how both sectors can be best supported so they can be positioned as key contributors to the post COVID-19 recovery of Australia's economy."

The Committee will also consider the effectiveness of recent tourism campaigns overseas and how Australia can support tourism in the Asia Pacific region. In relation to international education, the Committee is interested in hearing about innovations in the delivery of online education to strengthen the sector's resilience. "We encourage a broad range of stakeholders in the tourism and international education sectors from across the country to share experiences about transitioning into the post COVID-19 period," said Senator O'Neill.

Submissions from interested individuals and organisations are invited by Monday, 12 December 2022. The preferred method of receiving submissions is by electronic format lodged online using a My Parliament account.



Arriving on Tuesday, the RFDS' fully equipped mobile dental surgery is in Winton until 4 November.

The RFDS dental team will be on the ground to provide vital oral healthcare services to the local community.

RFDS Principal Dentist, Stevie Dilley, said getting out into Queensland's rural communities is her favourite part of the job.

"For many people, going to the dentist can be a scary experience - particularly if it's their first time, so we always ensure patients feel comfortable and at ease when they visit the mobile surgery," Dr Dilley said.

"It's a privilege to be a part of the RFDS Dental Service and to be able to provide vital dental care for people in outback communities."

The RFDS Dental Service operates from a purpose-built mobile dental surgery and features state-of-the-art equipment, including an OPG machine. Patients have access to a range of services such as oral health maintenance, X-rays and extractions, treatment for acute or pre-existing conditions and treatment for gum disease. RFDS (Queensland Section) Chief Executive Officer Meredith Staib said the RFDS Dental Service is an important extension to the aeromedical retrieval and primary health care services provided by the Flying Doctor.

"Regular dental check-ups are so important for the overall health but, Queenslanders in rural and remote locations often have to travel a long way to visit the dentist, which can mean taking time off work or school, and time away from home," Ms Staib said.

"By bringing our mobile dental surgery to communities like Winton, the RFDS Dental Service helps to bridge this gap, ensuring people have access to a dentist and dental services on a regular basis, close to home."

The RFDS Dental Service has delivered dental care for nearly 10 years to communities across regional, rural and remote Queensland.

In the past 12 months, the state-of-theart mobile dental surgery has travelled to 20 towns and RFDS dental teams have treated more than 1,700 patients.

Littleproud laments budget

The Albanese Labor Government has broken the hearts of regional and rural families in its first Budget according to Nationals Leader and member for Maranoa David Littleproud.

Commenting after the budget announcement Mr Littleproud said Prime Minister Anthony Albanese promised if he won government, there would be "no one held back, no one left behind".

However he said in Labor's first Budget, the 30 per cent of Australians who live in regional and rural areas have been held back and left behind in three key areas – cost of living, childcare and infrastructure. are predicted go up a further 75 basis point under Labor, which is ripping hundreds of dollars out of households each month," he said.

"Every time Australians get their grocery receipt, their power bill or mortgage statement, they should see Anthony Albanese's face on it, because he's the one who is costing them more."

He said Childcare Labor's Budget has clearly turned its back on families desperate to find regional and rural childcare places.

Mr Littleproud said while the Treasurer announced \$4.7 billion in childcare mea-

Mr Littleproud said the drastic increases in grocery bills were man-made by Labor and the Budget would make the average family worse off by at least \$2000 by Christmas.

"Groceries are eight per cent higher, not just because of natural disasters, but also by a Labormade disaster in scrapping the Ag Visa," he said.

"Supply has been slashed because farmers and processors are only working at around 60 per cent capacity, which has put prices up at the checkout."

Mr Littleproud said Energy prices are already up 20 per cent this year and predicted to increase by a further 30 per cent next year, while the \$275 promised by Labor to reduce electricity bills is now gone. "Interest rates have already gone up and sures, he couldn't create one new additional childcare place, leaving regional and rural families no better off.

"Childcare affordability is not the main issue for regional families - accessibility is. "The Nationals warned the government at the Jobs and Skills summit and because they didn't listen regional women, in particular, have been left behind."

Mr Littleproud said regional and rural families had a right to feel heartbroken. "Labor said it was a family-friendly Budget but only if you live in a capital city.

"This is not the Australian way. This is not what we were promised." Infrastructure Labor's Budget has ripped regional Australia's future from them, by taking away the tools they need to grow and produce Australia's food and fibre." Bells ring for e-scooter reforms: State steps in on ride

The first wave of the Palaszczuk Government's e-scooter reforms have been revealed.

Applying to e-scooters, e-skateboards and other personal mobility devices, the reforms include speed limit reductions, new fines and mandating warning bells.

Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey made no apologies for cracking down on reckless e-scooter use.

"The fact of the matter is that many people who use e-scooter are doing the right thing – they are an easy, convenient and environmentally friendly way to get around," Mr Bailey said.

- Allowing PMDs to be ridden in bike lanes on roads with a speed limit of 50kmh or less, and all on-road bike lanes which are physically separated.
- Mandating bells for PMDs with handlebars.
 Aligning PMD riders with bike riders to en-
- Aligning FMD Inders with bike fiders to ensure they are required to follow general road rules, such as stopping at red lights.

Mr Bailey said one of the biggest changes was a tiered increase to speeding fines, similar to what is used for bikes and motor vehicles to better reflect the risks of increased speeds.

"Speeding fines will range from \$143 to 75 depending on how far over the speed



"From November 1, these new rules will be in effect. We have flagged that these changes have been in the pipeline, so users have had plenty of notice.

"We want every person who uses our footpaths, bikeways and bike lanes to be safe from harm, and these reforms go a long way in tightening the Queensland road rules around this new technology."

The changes include:

- Reducing speed limits to 12kmh on footpaths and shared paths, unless otherwise signed. (The 25kmh limit on all other infrastructure, including bike infrastructure and local streets remains).
- Increasing fines of up to \$1078 for dangerous offences involving speed, illegal road use and holding a mobile phone while riding.

limit you are travelling," he said.

"This reflects the danger posed to those around you, and reflects a suitable deterrent to minimise the risk of reoffending.

"All these changes have been developed in close consultation with key stakeholders, including riders, rental and retail suppliers, police, RACQ, Bicycle Queensland, local councils and disability advocates.

"E-scooters are here to stay and their riders have an equal responsibility to road safety as motorists, cyclist, truck drivers and motorcyclists. It's important they're safe for the riders and those they interact with on our footpaths and roads."

Stricter laws for e-scooters have been introduced by the Queensland Government.

Sad loss of genuine man

One of our most humble givers, Quentin Scott, aged 66, passed away from a sudden heart attack in his backyard on Monday, October 17, not long after saying to his wife Alison, before she left her home visit to return to the Pioneer's Home, "I love you" three times.

Affectionately known as "Scotty", he had been suffering from a kidney infection and leaves behind Alison and daughters Cheryl, Kerry and sons Wes and Barry.

When the sad news reached social media's community pages, the original post by his employer Richard and Marisse Kinnon's "Outback Pioneers" page was flooded with comments, gathering 3800 emojis and 1100 comments from people all over the world who'd experienced Scotty's genuine bush nature.

Scotty's involvement in the tourism industry ended with his most recent role as Barefoot Bush Poet for the Kinnon family for 12 years, and prior to that he'd been with Alan and Sue Smith's Aussie Outback Tours, as well as working as a fireside poet at the Longreach Tourist Park, and as a tour guide at the Longreach Pastoral College and nature walk guide at Iningai Nature Park.

Scotty came to Longreach in 1991 on a transfer from his Brisbane-based Department of Primary Industries (DPI) role of ten years where he was an animal attendant at the Animal Research Institute.

Dr Warren Hoey, Arid Zone Research Institute Director from 1988 – 1996 and former Director General of the DPI, flew to Longreach for the funeral.

"Scotty worked in Animal Husbandry at the DPI in Longreach for about 15 years, but he helped wherever was needed - he was the first person to put up his hand," Warren said.

"He liked people to be doing things and not just talking about airy-fairy stuff so he was very grounding and he wasn't in awe of authority.

"He came in one day and said to me 'you've got a PhD in air conditioning – hot air – why don't you get out and do something," he laughed.

"He wouldn't shirk the job - nothing could stop him – too hot, no shoes, no problem, he'd just keep on going," Warren said.

Scotty's funeral at the Longreach Civic Centre on Monday morning was a full house with hundreds of people attending.

Perhaps he had such a big heart because he was born with a hole in his heart, which was corrected by open heart surgery when he was about 15 years old.

Scotty's brother-in-law, Nick Olsthoorn, explained in the Eulogy this wasn't his only challenge, when four days prior to his 21st birthday, he was thrown from a horse during a storm and later found choking on his own vomit.

He remained in a coma for six weeks and his family was told he would never walk again.

"They obviously didn't count on this suborn little fellas guts and tenacity," Nick said.

"Years of hard work paid off for him and he could walk again - and it is obvious he never stopped walking again."

During his recovery journey, Scotty said he discovered being barefoot gave him better balance.

Richard Kinnon and family have had associations with Scotty and Alison for 20 years and he was employed with the family tourism business as the star of the river cruise show with his poetry recitals.

Despite his much-loved public persona, Scotty was a humble man, and much of his quiet contribution was his dedicated work for charities. You might miss seeing his white van driving the streets, his hat dipping in a nod to passers-by as he went between the 200 recycling collections points around town on a daily basis.

Rain or shine, Scotty's first run of the day was at dawn and he was home unloading a boot full of bottles and cans by 7.30 am where he would sort and remove lids.

Patsy Worland who co-founded Outwest Container Exchange with husband Jamie through the Containers for Change program said in the ten months of 2022, Scotty had returned over 83,000 items, resulting in \$8,300 donated to charities including Longreach Lions Club, Landcare, and Cystic Fibrosis.

"That's a lot of items kept from landfill just by Scotty!"

"Scotty was one of the first people to come in and find out about the Containers for Change program and he's been collecting and returning items two or three times a week

"He was at any and all Longreach Lions Club events serving, selling Christmas cakes or collecting containers," said President Tylyena Penny.

"The Longreach Lions Club will definitely feel lost without him."

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Storms leave a trail of damage

Ergon crews were kept busy on Monday night after intense storm cells battered the Gemfields, Capella and Rolleston regions.

Power lines were knocked down, shade sails ripped, and trees badly damaged by the fierce winds.

Falls of 11-22mm were recorded, as the day's high of a steamy 34 degrees quickly fell by 10 degrees.

A Bureau of Meteorology warning was in Blackwater shortly before 3pm, but no other alert was issued for towns hit by the wild weather later in the evening.

There was no hail reported in Capella, but traffic was diverted around a downed power line at an intersection until the arrival of an Ergon Energy crew.

A clean-up was underway this morning at the town's caravan park where multiple trees were damaged and branches severed by the storm with people staying at the park pitching in to help.

"Beer o'clock's a tad earlier this evening," one park resident quipped.

"Due to the strong winds Capella experienced overnight, council has opened the Capella Resource Recovery Facility today for residents (until 3pm) to discard any green waste that may have been blown around yards and roads," the Central Highlands council posted.

Balonne 'Hub' wins \$10,000 bursary

The Balonne Shire Council will receive a \$10,000 bursary from Peak Services as winners of this year's Queensland Local Government Association Butch Lenton Memorial Bush Council Innovation Award, contributing further educational opportunities to their highereducation pilot The Hub.

The Hub project was developed by the council in partnership with the Country Universities Centre (CUC) and co-designed by the community to improve educational outcomes and provide opportunities through a multifaceted dynamic space for the community to learn, ignite ideas, interact and access high-speed internet.

Balonne Mayor Samantha O'Toole said the project is a win on so many levels, tying into Council's vision to grow educational opportunities within the region and for the community to "grow its own" into the future.

"They say it takes a village to raise a child and it shows our future in Balonne is brighter because we are changing our community one student at a time," Mayor O'Toole said.

A panel of judges from across Queensland Local Government was delighted to see an application addressing the needs of the community, collaborating with community and thinking outside the box to find solutions.

"It is certainly always a pleasure to read that a well thought out strategy and subsequent plan provides this sort of outcome. For us in local government that are regularly forced into prioritisation, this is an exemplary application and Balonne and its community should be extraordinarily proud," Central Highlands Regional Council Mayor Kerry Hayes said. LGAQ chief executive officer Alison Smith said the Country Universities Centres' dedicated learning and study spaces are beneficial resources for remote communities that don't generally have access to traditional education facilities.

The \$10,000 Butch Lenton Award bursary will be used to design and develop a community-relevant language literacy and numeracy program to create an entire education ecos tem within the shire and support the tertiary and vocational education pathways that are now available through 'The Hub' facilities. "As grateful recipients of this award we can start moving forward with our plans, with the goal to provide support to the most vulnerable, isolated and disadvantaged parts of our community and lay the foundation for the transition to employment, promotion or further study," Balonne CUC Chair Matthew Magin said. Currently, in the second year of the pilot, the project has already surpassed its projected outcomes by over 200 per cent with a total of 127 students registered to use the facilities. 55 per cent of students are over 25 years of age. 43 per cent of students identified as first in the family to undertake tertiary education, and 7 percent of students have First Nations heritage

CCTV aids the police

As a new initiative is launched, the Central Queensland community could play an important role in working with police to solve crimes.

The Community Camera Alliance is a joint initiative between the Capricornia Police District and the Queensland Police Service where residents and businesses can register their closed circuit television (CCTV) online.

The Capricornia Police District Superintendent Glen Pointing said the launch of the Community Camera Alliance would help prevent crime and make the community safer.

"CCTV is fast becoming a crucial investigative tool in modern policing," he said.

"It is envisioned that the Community Camera Alliance would increase the solvability of recorded crime through the early identification of offenders and improve officer efficiency.

"Registrations for the program are voluntary and stored on a pre-existing police database called QPRIME, which is only accessed by authorised members of the QPS.

"If the registering member changes their mind, their details will be removed from the database at any time."

Rockhampton Inspector Ben Carroll said police rely on the goodwill and support of the community when addressing criminal issues, and this initiative would assist even further.

"A couple of months ago, there was a very tragic homicide here in Rockhampton," he said.

"Detectives did a massive amount of footwork where they door-knocked residences and gained CCTV footage.

"That CCTV footage was one of the tools that enabled us to solve that matter fairly quickly and is now before the court.

"That is one simple example of how that can assist us."

Inspector Carroll acknowledged the work of Acting Senior Sergeant Josh White from Rockhampton Forensic Services and Detective Sergeant Kev Mawdsley from the Criminal Investigation Branch for establishing the Community Camera Alliance.

Member for Keppel Brittany Lauga congratulated the partnership and the involvement of both Rockhampton Re-

"The CUCs are an amazing community asset, and the objective Balonne has set is commendable," she said.

CUC Balonne's 'The Hub' is a Queenslandfirst low population higher education project that collaborates with local industries, businesses and the Chamber of Commerce within the shire.

It is specifically designed as a three-year pilot with the model to be analysed and refined into an established framework that other out the support and facilities the Country Universities Centre provides," Ms Sevil said.

"I can spend time in St George near my family and spend time with my younger sister who is in Grade 5. I love being able to pick her up from school go to the bakery and get a snack and then go to the library where she can read and I can study at the CUC – these are the things I would miss out on if I had to relocate to the city [for study]".

Ms Sevil has already secured work locally in her chosen field with the Murray Darling Basin Authority and the Department of Climate Change, Energy, Environment and Water.

"I know the officers have been working on this for some time, and it is great to see the technology being used for crime prevention," she said.

"We have seen body worn cameras and QLiTE devices introduced to Queensland policing in the past few years. I think this opt-in Community Camera Alliance will help improve efficiency in their investigations.

"We know that people are less likely to commit a crime if they think they will be caught, and this is a good way of letting people know they are more likely to be caught."

War nurse tribute planned

"Your group can benefit too, and I strongly encourage anyone involved in a not-for-profitorganisation to hop on to our website and find out about this fantastic funding opportunity.

"We receive applications from a variety of sectors including multicultural and indigenous groups, women and family help services, sporting clubs, and animal welfare organisations to name a few.

"Not-for-profit groups, particularly those located in regional and remote Queensland, are encouraged to apply."

Support is available for a wide range of

projects big and small such as events, facility

upgrades, transport and more. The current round of funding is open until

31 October 2022 with grants of up to \$35,000 available.

However, if your group has a big ticket item

or project in mind, the \$100,000 Super Round opens in January 2023.

A life-size bronze memorial statue of First World War nurse Sister Greta Towner will be erected at Blackall Memorial Park next year.

"Applying is a simple process and there is plenty of support – online or by phone - to help you with your application," Ms Thomson

Origin plans exit strategy

Origin Energy Limited (Origin) has announced an intention to exit its upstream exploration permits in the Beetaloo as the company focuses on its strategy and ambition to lead the energy transition.

In a statement issued September 19, Origin announced it will undertake a strategic review of all remaining exploration permits (excluding its interests in Australia Pacific LNG) with a view to exiting those permits over time.

Origin CEO Frank Calabria said, "We've been exploring in the Beetaloo Basin alongside our partner Falcon for eight years, and we're grateful for the strong support we have received from the local community, including Native Title holders and contractors, as well as the Northern Territory and Federal governments.

"Gas will continue to have an important role in our business, particularly through our interest in Australia Pacific LNG and role as upstream operator in that venture, and in the broader energy mix as we look to underpin reliable energy supply to customers and accelerate our investment into the energy transition," Mr Calabria said. ity to allocate capital towards our strategic priorities to grow cleaner energy and customer solutions and deliver reliable energy through the transition," Mr Zipf said.

Mr Zipf explained it was very much early days with regards to exploration activity in these areas and no drilling or fracking activity had occurred in the eleven permit areas (Near Windorah).


"The granting of these permits by the government gave Origin tenure and the opportunity to explore within a permitted timeframe," he said. "The nature of exploration is to first determine what resources are in a particular area and whether they are recoverable. This occurs well before any production scenario occurs."

The community is still divided over the matter, some seeing gas exploration as an opportunity for future jobs growth in the region, while others fear for the health of the Channel Country.

In August 2021 Sheena Gillman of Karana Downs had her petition tabled in Queensland Parliament with 2296 signatures, requesting the prohibition of future development of petroleum and gas exploration in the Channel Country.

Her petition stated: "Queensland residents draw to the attention of the House, the unacceptable risks associated with gas fracking in the Channel Country of Queensland - the flood plains of Kati Thanda-Lake Eyre Basin.





Over the years landowners have been fighting to protect the Channel Country landscape from fracking operations.

Origin Energy has the ability to sell its other exploration permits to other energy companies or hand back the sites to the Queensland government.

Chris Zipf, Senior External Affairs and Internal Communication Manager, Corporate Affairs at Origin Energy spoke with the Longreach and Central Western Leader this week and confirmed the company's transition also includes their permit interests in the Cooper-Eromanga Basin in Southwest Queensland.

Mr Zipf said Origin Energy is currently undertaking a strategic review to enable the exit of these permits over time.

"The exit will enable greater flexibil-

"The Queensland Labor party has a long-standing commitment to review current legislation to ensure the protection of the Channel Country.

"Since Labor was elected in 2015, gas companies have been granted advanced exploration (PCA) over at least 348,066 hectares of Channel Country floodplains which are mapped under the Qld Regional Planning Interests Act as Strategic Environmental Areas.

"In June 2020 Origin Energy applied for production leases for over 225,000 hectares of Channel Country floodplains."

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Baba Ghanoush

Serves: 4 Prep time: 10 minutes Cook time: 45 minutes

1 serve per portion

Ingredients:

- 1 eggplant, cut in half length ways
- 2 tablespoons olive oil, extra virgin
- 1 tablespoon tahini
- 1 clove garlic, peeled
- 1/2 teaspoon smoked paprika
- ½ teaspoon cumin
- 1 lemon, juiced
- Pepper to taste

- PREHEAT oven to 180°C.
- PLACE eggplant on a baking tray, flesh side up. Score the flesh with a sharp knife and drizzle with one tablespoon olive oil. Be careful not to pierce the skin.

- ROAST the eggplant in the oven for 45 minutes or until soft. Set aside to cool.
- SPOON the eggplant flesh out and discard the skin.
- COMBINE in the eggplant, remaining olive oil, tahini, garlic, paprika, cumin and lemon juice in a blender. Pulse until well combined. Season with pepper.
- SERVE with vegetable sticks or wholemeal pita bread.

Oat Stuffed Capsicum

Serves: 4 Prep time: 15 minutes Cook time: 35 minutes

Fruit and veg: 3 ½ serves per portion

Ingredients :

- 4 small capsicums, tops removed and deseeded
- ¹/₂ cup steel cut oats
- 400g can chickpeas, drained, roughly mashed
- 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 4 cups baby spinach, coarsely chopped
- 1 tablespoon fresh oregano OR 1 teaspoon dried
- ³/₄ cup feta cheese, crumbled
- ¼ cup sun-dried tomatoes,
- chopped1 tablespoon red wine vinegar
- Pepper

Method:

- PLACE capsicums cut-side down in a microwave-safe dish and add ½ inch of water. Cover and microwave on high until just softened, about 7-9 minutes, then set aside to cool.
- BOIL a large saucepan of water then add oats and cook until just tender, about 25 minutes. Drain oats and rinse with cold water.
- HEAT a large frypan over medium heat then add oil. Cook the onion for 5 minutes then add the spinach and oregano to wilt for 1 minute.
- STIR in the oats, chickpeas, ½ cup feta, tomatoes, vinegar and pepper and cook until heated through, about 2-3 minutes.
- DIVIDE mixture among the capsicums and sprinkle with the remaining feta.
- *Optional:* Grill in oven for a couple of minutes to melt the feta before serving.

Magda's change of heart

Magda Szubanski gets personal for new ABC series *Magda's Big National Health Check*, using her trademark humour, warmth and honesty to explore how all Australians can begin leading healthier lives, writes **Siobhan Duck**

 And over the years

To this day, the warm and gentle humour of *Kath & Kim* finds new fans – many of whom were not even born when the permanently permed Kath (Jane Turner) and her sullen daughter Kim (Gina Riley) had their first verbal stoush – on the streaming platform Netflix. While for those who grew up with the characters that Szubanski, Turner and Riley created almost 30 years ago on their sketch comedy series, *Big Girl's Blouse*, *Kath & Kim* is a nostalgic reminder of simpler times, like getting a warm hug from an old friend.

Later this month, Channel 7 is airing two specials to mark the 20th anniversary of Kath & Kim's debut. It will feature material that never made it to air and a collection of special guests. While delighted to have spent time with her old pals, Szubanski emphasises that there is no hope of their happy TV reunion extending into a new series. Szubanski doesn't want to try to recapture lightening in a bottle and risk tarnishing the enduring legacy of the show, which still means so much to its fans. "A young woman came up to me recently, brimming with health, and said: 'I hope you don't mind me saying this, but I had cancer last year and when I had to have chemotherapy my boyfriend bought in Kath & Kim for me to watch just to make me laugh'," she recalls. "So, first of all, it was that thing about assumptions; you don't know what is going on in people's lives. And secondly, our little comedy show helped this poor young woman get through chemo. And every comedian I know has a similar story."

Before she discovered her talent for comedy, Szubanski also flirted with the idea of becoming a doctor. And, that strong desire to help others coming to the fore again, she spent time volunteering at a women's refuge as a teenager in the 1980s.

"They didn't even believe domestic violence was a crime then, so it was just terrible," she says, incredulous.

"It was very traumatic. And I was probably too young, to be honest, to be doing that sort of stuff. And then I ran away to comedy before coming back to where I started, in some way."

Szubanski's latest crusade involves improving the entire nation's health and wellbeing. As the host of the new ABC series Magda's Big National Health Check, Szubanski investigates the mental and physical health challenges facing Australians with her trademark honesty and humour. And that means also putting her own health under the microscope. In the first episode of the series, Szubanski talks frankly about the conditions which have blighted her own health, including osteoarthritis, anxiety, migraines and sleep apnoea. She also undergoes several tests on camera, becoming quite emotional when she is told that she is on the cusp of developing diabetes and concerningly, high cholesterol levels. Thankfully, despite her understandable concerns about her heart - due to her weight and the fact that her father suffered a heart attack

around the same age – Szubanski's ticker is in pretty good nick.

"It just shows you can't judge a book by its cover," she smiles.

That's the thing about this show and why Szubanski was so eager to host it. It's not all doom and gloom. Yes, the series presents some pretty sobering statistics about Australians' health – including the fact that children as young as 11 are showing signs of heart disease and half the population is struggling with chronic health problems – but it also offers some simple solutions.

"It's only three episodes, so it's not going to provide all the answers," she says.

"But to become more educated and understand what's going on, even just with those statistics around the amount of chronic illness, [will hopefully help people].

The wellness movement can impact in some ways, but we've also got to look at other things like where you live – that is what suburb you live in – and economic factors really affect things enormously. "The other thing is hidden sugars and one of the things that the show pushes for in later episodes is mandatory labelling." Above all else, Szubanski believes Magda's Big National Health Check will spark a necessary and overdue conversation and hopefully make people feel less alone or daunted about taking control of their health. "Because we are all in this together," she reassures.

remember, Magda Szubanski has wanted to make people's lives better. And over the years that has manifested itself in different ways – from her passionate campaign for marriage equality, through to making people laugh with her iconic performances in Babe, Fast Forward and Kath & Kim.

"All my friends are in the community aid sector – legal aid workers and things like that – that's what my friendship circle is rather than famous people," she explains. "I mean, of course, I know famous people. I've been around forever. "But my dad wanted to be a "So, wanting the best for people and wanting to help, I don't think there's anything more satisfying than that."

Of course, Szubanski also draws a lot of satisfaction from performance. And she counts *Babe*'s Mrs Hoggett and *Kath & Kim*'s sports-loving optimist Sharon as her proudest comedic creations. Not just because they are the best known, but because of the joy each has brought to so many people.



Challenges within the Industry

The transport industry is constantly full of challenges. The three biggest challenges would be fleet replacement, fuel prices and recruitment.

Emerald Carrying runs a fleet of Kenworths and currently if we were to order a new truck, we wouldn't see it for two years. In regard to tanker's, it is a two year wait as well. This means we constantly need to be thinking at least three years in advance.

Fuel prices are also a concern with the freight industry being highly competitive. We have our own fuel tanks at all our depots to try and alleviate some of the costs. The joy of having our own fuel tanks are we are able to buy bulk and use our own equipment for cart-

One of the biggest issues is recruitment. It seems less and less people are showing an interest in the industry. As well as that we are competing with the mines which makes it tougher again. This is not only with drivers but the workshop as well.

Currently we are looking for heavy rigid drivers in Emerald, multi combination drivers in all our depots and mechanics in all locations as well. We do have some luck as we offer family friendly rosters for drivers, our workshop is five days a week and the fact everyone is home every day is one of our selling points.

With a shortage of drivers in the industry we offer in-house training and are too happy to employ people with no previous fuel experience if they're the right person to represent the company. This is a huge financial outlay but something we need to do to keep the fleet moving.

Gardening

Spring storm flowers

The storms of the last few days have had a real impact on many gardens across Central Queensland.

Within a matter of days after the first storm, dozens of plants bust into flowers creating a kaleidoscope of colour in what was no more than a dried arrangement a few days earlier.

Most noticeable would be the colourful flowering bulbs called Hippeastrums.

Over the years gardeners have found Hippeastrums are not difficult to grow and produce lovely cut flowers.

Hippeastrums are not the most water-wise plant grown locally in fact they have quite demanding water and nutrient requirements while during this time of year.

It is always recommended during the spring growth time they receive ample water and nutrients but remember you must keep the plants dry in winter while the plant is in their winter dormancy.

Most of us would clearly remember the mass floral displays of Hippeastrums that our grandparents use to have.

Hippeastrums have been grown in Western Queensland gardens for over the last 100 years, and I still believe that tucked away in many rural gardens are still some of the best flowering varieties grown.

These plants could have been handed down over many generations

Hippeastrums are found from Argentina north to Mexico and the Caribbean.

Hippeastrum are also called amaryllis lilies in some parts of the country, and it is important not to confuse Hippeastrums with the genus with the name Amaryllis.

There are about 70-75 species and more than 600 hybrids in the Hippeastrum family.

Hippeastrum will require a frost-free environment, but for those gardeners in frosty parts of central Queensland, they can be grown as a potted greenhouse plant, and they can also make an excellent house plant.

Hippeastrum flowers are made up of six petals, comprising two layers of three petals.

While the typical colour range of the Hippeastrums encompasses most shades of reds, pinks, and white, the modern hybrids occur in an array of colour patterns.

The new hybrids can even include doubleflowering varieties or unusual colours like pale translucent yellows.

What you may not realise is that birds, bees and butterflies are all attracted to the Hippeastrum flower.

Some of the Hippeastrum I saw growing in Western Gardens include:

Hippeastrum Hybrid Alfrescus has large 15cm pure white double, almost triple flowers.

Hippeastrum Hybrid Benfica has large 10cm dark blood-red single flowers.

Hippeastrum Hybrid Mead has large stunning 10cm candy pink flowers with a green throat.

Hippeastrum Hybrid Mead is an old turn of the 20th-century strain of Hippeastrum.

Hippeastrum Hybrid Minerva has stunning large wide open, flat-faced 18cm red flowers with a white star and a lime-green throat.

Hippeastrum Sonatini Sweet Sixteen is a compact hybrid with stunning 6cm candy pink flowers with a green throat.

Hippeastrum Hybrid Red Rival has large 10cm red flowers and a very strong growth habit.

This variety will often have more flowers than any other red varieties available at the moment.

Hippeastrum Hybrid Rosalie has large 10cm dusty pink single flowers with creamy white highlights and a lime green throat.

Hippeastrum Hybrid White Coral has medium 8cm single white flowers with red stripes and a green centre. Hippeastrum Rosalie.

When Hippeastrums are in full growth, they should be watered frequently and fed a balanced fertiliser once a month.

When talking to an enthusiast earlier this year, I was told that she found that during the warmer months regular drenching with the liquid fertiliser Aquasol makes a big difference.

She also used a high potash plant food during late July or early August to boost plant growth after the winter dormancy. Hippeastrums enjoy full sunlight during the growing season.

However she told me another handy hint was when Hippeastrums are coming into flower, a little partial shade helps to bring out their brilliant colour. Hippeastrums will do best in Hippeastrum Benfica.

a bright but not overly sunny position with moist, well-drained, humus-rich soil.

Hippeastrum will have a tropical appearance during the warmer months, however, the bulbs will become fully dormant over the winter months.

Over the recent water-wasteful years many Hippeastrum varieties have been lost in home gardens due to overwatering.

It is important to know that all parts of plant are poisonous if ingested.

One other very interesting feature of growing Hippeastrums I have been told is that they are resistant to Deer that are a problem in some parts of Central Queensland.

MLA outlines Foot and Mouth plan

Foot and mouth disease (FMD) has always been on the radar of the Australian livestock industry but attention this year with confirmation of FMD and lumpy skin disease (LSD) in Indonesia, including the tourist hot spot of Bali.

Meat and Livestock Australia said attention has been on their biosecurity system and preparedness.

According to a statement the MLA issued this week, they have been working to communicate the issue to industry through a range of channels and partnerships, including a series of industry webinars over the last few months.

"One of the common questions that has been asked at these webinars - and face-toface with the MLA team - is about vaccinating our livestock for FMD," the press release stated.

"It's a great question and I would like to outline the steps that MLA and the industry are taking

"First off, industry has been preparing for the risk of FMD for many years. Australia has been free of this disease for over a century and the scientific modelling shows it is highly likely that Australia will stay free of FMD.

In August the University of Melbourne's Centre of Excellence for Biosecurity Risk Analysis modelled the current risk at an 11 per cent chance of incursion, up slightly from nine per cent where the risk has been static since 2021. This increase is mostly associated with the diagnosis of FMD in Indonesia.'

The statement continued, "even with this low level of risk, many people are asking the question: why are we not vaccinating livestock now?'

"There are two parts to the answer. The first is that there is no reason to vaccinate animals in Australia in the absence of an outbreak.

"The second is that using vaccines poses a major risk for our export markets when it comes to the disease-free status of our country. Australia is officially recognised as a country which is free from FMD without the use of vaccination, which is the most favourable status

"However, we have plans for accessing vaccinations quickly through a vaccine bank stored overseas. If we need them, these vaccines can be supplied in bulk to Australia in seven-10 days.

"Even if there is an incursion, this does not mean that vaccination of all livestock is the best solution.

"The decision to vaccinate animals in the event of an outbreak depends on several factors. These include the size of the outbreak, its location and the species that is affected. There would be other considerations too such as the logistical requirements of a vaccination program, the likely spread of the disease and animal welfare considerations.

"Guided by the AUSTVETPLAN, the decision on what approach to take in the event of an outbreak is made by the Consultative Committee on Emergency Animal Disease (CCEAD). The CCEAD is a coordinating body providing the technical link between industry. the Australian Government, and state and territory governments for decision making during animal health emergencies.

"In broad terms the response to an FMD outbreak will have multiple components including movement restrictions; stamping out through destruction disposal and decontamination; and, where appropriate, the strategic use of vaccines

"It is likely that any outbreak of FMD in Australia would be detected and controlled quickly and the use of vaccines for control of the disease would not be necessary.

'We are also investing in cutting edge science to boost industry's preparedness, having selected a vaccine for LSD as the first topic for research into mRNA vaccines. We are working with a range of research partners on this initia tive.

"The basic premise of an mRNA vaccine is that it uses a small piece of genetic material from the pathogen, the mRNA, to generate the response. This makes the vaccine quick to produce and does not have any possible chance of causing the disease itself.

"It is important to note that a new vaccine would need to go through regulatory approvals.

"In the future, this may be able to expand to investments to do the same for FMD. The use of these vaccines in the event of an outbreak would be considered as part of the national strategic response, overseen by the federal government through the Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry.'

"Winter crops are approaching harvest, so to see them downgraded or destroyed so close to the finish line is a devastating blow.

"Losing livestock is truly heartbreaking for our farmers, who work so hard to keep their animals alive and healthy.

Months of hard work and investment has now been written off, alongside people's homes, fences, sheds and machinery," Mr Warlters said.

Rural Aid has been on the front foot responding rapidly to the unfolding situation – sharing its dedicated counselling phoneline with the thousands of farmers in impacted regions and, where safe to do so, mobilising its counsellors to offer one-on-one emotional support to producers on-farm.

Rural Aid has counsellors on the ground in Forbes, NSW and in northern Victoria. The entire counselling team has been phoning farmers across the flood-impacted regions.

Registered primary producers are also being offered financial assistance as they deal with the devastating effects of the flood.

More than 70 local government areas (LGAs) across the three states are directly affected, impacting thousands of families.

Wool market report

The Australian wool market recorded a second successive week of strong gains.

On the first day of selling, from the opening lot in the Eastern centres all the way to the closing lot in the West, buyer sentiment was extremely high, and strong widespread competition helped to push prices higher.

Main buyer interest continued on the better style and spec fleece lots, however all merino fleece types and descriptions posted gains in the rapidly rising market. The individual Micron Price Guides (MPGs) across the country added between 18 and 75 cents for the day.

These rises combined with gains in all other sectors pushed the AWEX Eastern Market Indicator (EMI) up by 31 cents for the day.

Interestingly, this was the largest daily rise in

In the last two weeks, the market has recovered the losses of the previous six weeks, the EMI is now back above where it finished at the end of Week 10 when it closed at 1.319 cents.


