While we didn't run a story on it, a moment worth noting this week was the blood moon.

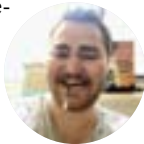
I'm not superstitious, but it did seem to occur at a unique moment—Covid seems to be coming to an end and Trump has begun putting himself back into politics.

Our kids lead way in Covid protection

A new advertising campaign coordinated by the Western Queensland Primary Health Network (WQPHN) showcases the impressive ability children in western Queensland have in Covid safe practices and in personal hygiene regarding disease management.

Sarah Carige, WQPHN Coordinator COVID-19 Response said the new "Germs are Yuck" campaign had kids show what they do at home and at school to keep from getting sick from viruses like Covid and the flu, we were pleasantly surprised to see that many were already very well equipped with knowledge about the simple, yet effective ways to reduce the chance of getting sick.

"If there has been anything good that's come out of the pandemic it's that our kids now have a 'new normal' in their lives about effective handwashing, cough and sneeze etiquette, and the importance of staying away from others when you're sick," she said.

Seven-year-old Sally* shared with us her vacation care hand-washing routine.

"First you have to rinse your hands with water and then put soap on hands, then go to the back of the line and rub your hands together for 20 seconds, and then when you get to the front of the line again you wash the soap off our hands."

Ten-year-old Edward* had some tips on how to behave if you aren't feeling well and suspect you have a virus.

"Stay home, get tested, get some rest and drink lots of water and make sure you sneeze into your elbow, because Covid has killed millions of people across the world."

And 9-year-old Lenny* had some advice about vaccinations.

"You won't get as sick if you have a vaccination but if you don't have a vaccination, you'll probably get more sick."

And his friend 9-year-old Jason* explained his own germ-containment sneezing technique - "Catch it, kill it and bin it."

Recent Queensland Health Department figures show that since the pandemic began

there have been more than 17,000 cases of Covid-19 in Western Queensland, but currently there are fewer than 70 active cases on the books of the region's Hospital and Health Services.

"Everyone has done an outstanding job of managing the spread of the virus in Western Queensland, but now is not the time to be complacent as we don't know what's coming next in terms of new strains or threats," explains WQPHN CEO Sandy Gillies.

"Through our funding, we are powering the "Germs are Yuck!" campaign which delivers a simple yet effective message that cuts across age groups and communities throughout our vast patch of almost a million square kilometres."

"Unlike in metropolitan areas, where access to health services is often just a suburb away, out here in Western Queensland we are determined to continue the protection message because getting sick in rural and remote communities is an entirely different scenario compared to the cities."

Lachlan Millar LNP Member for Gregory said they hoped to consult with as many locals as possible.

"I'm very pleased Opposition Leader David Crisafulli and the entire Shadow Cabinet will be staying in Longreach next week," Mr Millar said.

"Regional Queenslanders are facing many challenges like the cost of living, water security, rising power bills and the housing crisis, but the State Labor Government has given up on listening.

"We look forward to consulting with as many locals as we can during the three-day Shadow Cabinet visit."

Warrego MP Ann Leahy, Shadow Minister for Local Government, Disaster Recovery and Volunteers, will also be attending the Longreach Shadow Cabinet.

"I have recently been to Cloncurry, Winton and Barcaldine to meet mayors and councillors," Mrs Leahy said.

"I look forward to meeting with the RAPAD mayors and councillors and other stakeholders while in Longreach."

Opposition Leader David Crisafulli has been travelling the state this year conducting Town Hall meetings with local residents in a number of electorates to address current issues, such as the Queensland Health crisis, youth crime, rising energy costs, housing shortages and delayed project funding for the regions.

Stock routes revised

The State Government continues to invest in stock routes in regional Queensland, with more than \$1 million going towards supporting jobs in the agricultural sector.

Resources Minister Scott Stewart announced funding to eight local councils for maintenance and capital projects from McKinlay Shire in the north-west to Balonne Shire on the New South Wales border.

"The stock route network is a key piece of infrastructure for our multi-billion dollar agriculture sector, with drovers moving and feeding up to 330,000 head of stock across the network each year," he said. "Severe flooding in some areas throughout the year has also damaged the stock routes. These funds we're investing will allow the local councils to carry out the works they have nominated as a priority so Queensland graziers can continue to rely on the network."

The annual injection of capital funds will be shared across projects submitted by eight local governments, ranging from desilting dams, repairing night yards and troughs, and emergency repairs to water tanks. The councils who received funding are Balonne, Blackall/Tambo, Flinders, Longreach, McKinlay, Maranoa, Murweh and Western Downs.

Minister for Agricultural Industry Development and Fisheries, Minister for Rural Communities Mark Furner said this was an important strategic investment in the state's livestock industry.

"The Palaszczuk Government is providing better services to our agriculture sector, including supporting improvements to stock routes through funding like this," he said. "That support means productivity for our cattle sector and good jobs in agriculture more broadly."

High achievement

Brand review

The Queensland Government is seeking feedback on proposed changes to the state's stock branding and earmarking legislation.

Minister for Agricultural Industry Development and Fisheries and Minister for Rural Communities Mark Furner said the Government is keen to hear from stakeholders on two proposed options.

"Either branding could remain mandatory or producers could be allowed to decide whether or not to brand or earmark their cattle under a voluntary approach," Mr Furner said.

"None of the proposals involve removing the ability to brand, rather, livestock owners would be given the freedom to decide what's in their own best interest.

"Queensland's Brands Act 1915 is more than 100 years old and has not been significantly changed in decades.

"That's why Queensland needs a modern approach to brands and earmarks that is more efficient for livestock owners and gives them a choice.

"Brands have traditionally been used to show livestock ownership but no longer serve the significant biosecurity function they once did.

"With advances in technology, there are now far more effective ways of tracing livestock in the event of a disease outbreak.

"Not all cattle owners want to brand. However, for those who see value in using a brand to identify stock, branding would still be available under both of these proposals."

Mr Furner said after other states had made changes in recent years, Queensland and the Northern Territory were now the only Australian jurisdictions that mandated the use of livestock brands.

"The current IT system being used to support brands and earmarks is also outdated and requires replacement which has created an opportunity to review all of the rules around registering a brand or earmark.

"Now is the time to bring in a simpler, more streamlined system which reduces red tape and is more consistent with other Australian jurisdictions," he said.

Mr Furner said the proposed changes and a feedback questionnaire are now available at daf.engagementhub.com.au

Longreach Regional Council Mayor Tony Rayner Council has had a number of responses, and now those parties will be able to move to the next level.

"All of the expressions of interest received have tabled plans to continue the existing business and to expand on the existing business, which is exactly what council was looking for," he said.

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"We're now drawing up the tender documents with specifications, and then they [the interested parties] can submit a formal tender and then Council will consider those tenders to make sure we end up choosing a proponent who offers the best for the Ilfracombe community, as well as, visitors.

"They will exceed the existing services, which Council had always intended to continue—Council had never considered closing the Post Office, we simply wanted to build and expand on existing services, and that's what we'll make sure we do."

"We may recommend a sale to go through, or we may assess it and decide that no, the net benefit is not significant enough.

"Council have been very careful and considered about the whole process, just to make sure we get a good result for the community.

"Since we lost the local shop in a fire, some of the services have diminished—we'd like to see that ramped up again."

Coach stop to find a new spot

The Longreach coach stop will be moved from the front of the Commercial Hotel, with Council considering either Edkins or Qantas Park for a more suitable venue.

Longreach Regional Council Mayor Tony Rayner said this was an opportunity to relocate the coach stop from its existing location to a more suitable and appropriate site.

"There are a few suitable locations: one is adjacent to Qantas Park and the other is adjacent to Edkins Park," he said.

"Both of those options offer a lot more attractive functionality in terms of ease of access to toilets, park space, play areas, and covered shelters, and they're not adjacent to a smoking area or licensed establishment where the current coach stop is.

"It's just not an ideal place for families to be getting off."

Mr Rayner said it was important to consider tourists' first impression of the town.

"There's no shaded area, where both Qantas Park and Edkins Park offer a place for families to stretch their legs and relax—aesthetically it is just a lot better," he said.

"It's another pleasurable visit [their arrival] they will have had in Longreach, and they'll talk in positive tones about the nice stop with their green park space."

"The first flight was from Charleville to Longreach, an overnighter, and this would have been that night, and the next night would have been from Winton up to Cloncurry - it was the first airmail Qantas ever carried.

"We expected this number of people to be in attendance."

Mr Hill said he and his team were proud to host the event at their museum.

"We'd like to have people remember the founders who built Qantas," he said.

"We're always looking to increase our visibility across Australia and worldwide and to continue to showcase the history of the airline—the museum is not just about artefacts, it's about people and their stories."

I'll be wearing a poppy on Remembrance Day

Remembrance Day was a big deal when I was growing up in Canada.

We always had a service at school and there were a few janitors who'd served in World War Two who'd dress in their uniforms, complete with medals, and they'd lead the service along with the principal.

But the thing I remember most is wearing a poppy.

John McCrae, the author of 'In Flanders Fields', was a Canadian and an alumnus of my university.

His name is etched on the wall of the soldier tower on campus, along with the other alumni who gave their lives in the Great War.

I suppose because of this, poppies were a big deal in Canada, especially in November.

While I know they honour the war dead, poppies bring other memories to mind because my aunt happened to be one of the people who assembled the poppies each year so they could be sold by the Legion, the Canadian equivalent of the RSL.

Boxes and boxes of the red parts, the black parts and the tiny green centres (which they eventually did away with, but not at this time), lined the walls of the dining room and living room of my aunt's house each August.

All the kids were tasked with assembling so many poppies before they could go outside and play, which included us when she babysat for my parents.

Sticking the black and red bits through the bent pin wasn't so bad, but those tiny little green centres were killers.

Those with the best digital dexterity tended to finish first and get first dibs on

the swings.

My aunt had eight kids at the time and there were three of us and only a couple of swings, so you can imagine the wait.

I couldn't count the number of times I stabbed myself with those pins, trying to put them through those little green dots in a hurry.

It got to the point I dreaded seeing those cardboard boxes arrive. My fingers would hurt, just looking at them.

Funnily enough, when I see poppies now I look back on that time with fondness, possibly because I no longer have to assemble them.

I also remember my uncle, married to the aunt of the poppies, who served in the Second World War, along with my grandfather, who served in both World Wars.

When I married into an Australian family, I had a third connection to honour, Charles Palfrey, the cousin of my husband's grandfather, who died in France in the Great War and was a Longreach local.

I think of all these souls, born far away from one another, but united in wartime. And I honour their sacrifice by wearing the poppy.

Even if my fingers still hurt, looking at them.

"We are looking to be reflective of the community we serve.

"We will be looking to work with human resources to implement an equity strategy around the workplace."

The First Nations Health Equity Strategy will be implemented in 16 health and hospital services across Queensland and has been initiated by Health Minister Yvette D'ath.

"Here for the Central West Hospital and Health Service, we had a set timeframe to go out and engage our communities: traditional owners, First Nations peoples, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people to get an understanding around the six priority areas that are set by the State and to formulate the actions underneath those," said Principal Planning Officer Health Equity Harry Pitt.

"The premise of the strategy is to bring forth the voice and aspirations of our First Nations people, guide the health and hospital services around the betterment of their health, and look at reasonable patient care and safety aspirations for the hospital.

"So if we look at increasing access to health care services as a priority area—what

that means for us is to look at sending measures and reportables to understand through the data for our primary health services and through the hospital what we can improve in access to care, how we're tracking in terms of numbers."

Mr Pitt said the statistical information will be both useful for his team, but will also be accessible to members of the community.

"From statistical information, we can get an understanding of how we're measuring against specific priority areas and how we're giving back to the community and we're also giving that data back to the community," he said.

"From an operational point of view, things will be more structured, there's going to be more transparency so more accountability, we'll be looking to give more information to the community—for example saying, these are our highlights and these are our challenges.

"I think as a community, we need to all think collectively about how are we doing our part to improve our health.

"For us at the hospital, those supports and those measures will help us understand how we're tracking and delivering the service—but also considering what we can do to improve."

Taking stock of ag routes

The Maranoa council has received a share in more than one million dollars to repair the state's vital stock route network.

Resources Minister Scott Stewart announced funding to eight local councils for maintenance and capital projects from McKinlay Shire in the north-west to Balonne Shire.

"The stock route network is a key piece of infrastructure for our multi-billion dollar agriculture sector, with drovers moving and feeding up to 330,000 head of stock across the network each year," Mr Stewart said.

"Severe flooding in some areas throughout the year has also damaged the stock routes.

"These funds we're investing will allow the local councils to carry out the works they have nominated as a priority so Queensland graziers can continue to rely on the network."

The annual injection of capital funds will be shared across projects submitted by the eight local governments, ranging from desilting dams, repairing night yards and troughs, and emergency repairs to water tanks.

The councils who received funding are Balonne, Blackall/Tambo, Flinders, Longreach, McKinlay, Maranoa, Murweh and Western Downs.

Minister says suburbs to stay

Residents in Glenlee, Rockyview and Glendale will now have some clarity following an announcement on Monday that the current boundaries between Livingstone Shire Council and Rockhampton Regional Council will remain the same following a thorough review into a realignment requested by both councils.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Local Government Steven Miles accepted the Local Government Change Commission's recommendation that no change be made to the external boundaries between the two Central Queensland councils.

"I have accepted the Change Commission's recommendations and taken the advice of the Department of Local Government," Mr Miles said.

"I thank the Change Commission for its thorough review and the residents of both Rockhampton and Livingstone who provided their feedback.

"Both Rockhampton and Livingstone councils as well as their local communities were consulted as part of this process.

"The Change Commission also engaged Queensland Treasury Corporation to assess the potential financial impacts and viability of the proposed change on both councils."

The Glenlee, Rockyview and Glendale areas north of Rockhampton were transferred to Livingstone Shire Council in January 2014, following its de-amalgamation from Rockhampton Regional Council.

Livingstone Mayor Andy Ireland received notification from the Minister Miles on Friday to confirm the Minister had endorsed the Change Commission's recommendation that the transfer of the suburbs of Glenlee, Glendale, and Rockyview to Rockhampton Regional Council is not in the public's interest, and he will not be recommending any change to the boundaries.

Mayor Ireland said the decision provides surety for all residents of Livingstone Shire and he hopes both local government areas will take the opportunity to work together and with our neighbouring councils to realise the many opportunities that the Central Queensland region has.

"With this distraction behind us, our full focus now returns to our job of servicing Livingstone Shire, but also to re-confirming our relationship with our Rockhampton Council neighbours. Our shared future is in regional

cooperation," Mayor Ireland said.

"The boundary review process has put a bit of a handbrake on Council's ability to progress its plans for the northern corridor.

"We can now move ahead with this, and we commit to working more closely with Rockhampton Regional Council in developing those future plans.

"The clear message from all of this is that both councils need to work together in developing the future for this part of our shire, and in working collaboratively, I have no doubt we will achieve better outcomes for our northern residents."

Rockhampton Regional Council Mayor Tony Williams said Councillors are still digesting the news and will discuss the matter in depth before making any further public statement.

Council to conduct fogging

If you're not itching, you're scratching for ways to escape the flying hordes of mosquitoes and midges taking a bite out of Central Highlanders after the record October rainfall.

The council has begun fogging to target areas with high mozzie infestations this week, but social media has been abuzz with mosquito magnets lamenting life when darkness falls.

"We live behind a gully/stormwater drain on the north side and my god we get eaten even inside. It's so bad," commented one member on the Emerald Community Awareness Board.

"I'm using (Mortein coils) at the moment. I'm from NSW and by crikey, the bloody mozzies are monsters," said another.

"They breed them big in Queensland."

"Emerald is horrendous currently, but the north side is unbearable. They can't spray where they don't know it's problematic," was another member comment.

Suggestions came thick and fast, just like the Scotch Greys and their nippy smaller

black cousins, with members suggesting a mix of baby oil and dettol, or taking an antihistamine before taking your chances, mosquito coils, citronella candles, vitamin B supplements and dried cow manure,

"Just think it's another reason to give up the smokes," quipped another member.

During the past two weeks, the council said has been treating drainage lines and parks in highly problematic areas with specialised chemicals to target mosquitoes and their larvae.

Weather permitting, council will also begin to fog areas with high mosquito infestations starting this week.

The first round of fogging was due to start yesterday in Emerald and will be conducted in Bluff and Blackwater on Monday and Tuesday.

Fogging can affect some other species and therefore residents in these affected areas are advised to ensure that bees and birds are covered in their enclosures.

Council will continue to target hotspots and undertake treatment or fogging where required.

Connecting with regions

This week the Regional Tech Hub, alongside Federal Communications Minister Michelle Rowland and the National Farmers' Federation, launched Connectivity Month - a campaign designed to jumpstart awareness of the options available to help Queenslanders get connected and stay connected to mobile and internet services.

Two-thirds of Australia's landmass currently has no mobile coverage, despite a third of Australia's population living outside metro cities.

Evolving internet and mobile solutions are helping Queensland's regions to overcome the digital divide; however, they can be confusing.

Since December 2020, the Regional Tech Hub (RTH) has received close to 100,000 requests for help nationally, including more than 70,000 website enquiries and helping close to 10,000 people with their mobile and internet connectivity options.

Of the queries received, maximising coverage through the NBN Skymuster Satellite service was the most common advice sought, followed by requests for information on mobile broadband, mobile phone, NBN fixed wireless and NBN fixed line.

RTH Manager Jennifer Medway said many queries are from people living with an unreliable service that is too expensive or doesn't meet data needs.

"We know the common pain points and information gaps for people living in rural, regional and remote Queensland," Jennifer said.

"Connectivity Month enables the Regional Tech Hub to engage a broader audience and ultimately help more people to find the best solution suited to their needs."

Communications Minister Michelle Rowland acknowledged the difference in the connectivity experience of people living in regional Australia, where digital inclusion is considerably lower than the national average.

"Prosperous regional communities are central to the economic success of Australia, and

yet there remain significant connectivity gaps in rural and remote areas of the country," Ms Rowland said.

"Our Better Connectivity Plan for Rural and Regional Australia funded through the 2022-23 Federal Budget is central to improving the connectivity, coverage and capacity experiences of Australians outside our major cities.

"We're investing \$2.2 billion in regional connectivity, including a \$30 million investment to boost on-farm connectivity and \$6 million to expand the scope and reach of the Regional

Tech Hub to ensure it achieves its potential as the best source of connectivity advice.

"This new investment reinforces our commitment to regional, rural and remote Australia by ensuring essential services are available and affordable. As a direct point of contact to troubleshoot connectivity issues, the Regional Tech Hub is a key pillar of our plan for digitally connected, productive and thriving regional communities," said Minister Rowland.

The Regional Tech Hub was established in 2020 and offers free and independent infor-

mation and advice on digital technologies, services available, equipment solutions, setup and installation.

It is an Australian Government initiative, managed by the National Farmers' Federation and in collaboration with the Australian Communications Consumer Action Network.

Connectivity Month will run from 7-30 November 2022 and Queenslanders are encouraged to reach out to the Regional Tech Hub to access individualised support.

What a relief: Station cooks starving for recognition

There's a kitchen revolution brewing as rural station cooks stir the pot.

A qualified chef and station cook for more than 25 years, Raq Humphries has banded together with friends to form Remote Contract Cooks, offering relief cooking, training and job placements in rural and outback stations across mainland Australia.

"We just don't get enough recognition for the job... and really, there's just no cooks around at the moment," Raq, who has the popular social media site Raq's Kitchen, said.

"For the effort that goes into running a station kitchen, you're the heart of the crew, you're the heart of the station.

"That's how I see it, that we're mentoring the heart of the station and if you've got a happy cook, you've got a happy crew."

"We want cooks to know they are supported and valued."

Raq said the plan was to recruit and train station cooks and support them in their new role, helping them to adjust to remote living and be in control of their mental and physical health.

Jennifer Crampton and Simone Harley and Raq, who is about to leave Redford Station near Roma to embark on the new venture, will train the novice cooks while providing relief workers around mainland Australia.

The minimum daily wage for cooks is \$180 a day, roughly the same as a second-year jackaroo, but Raq is adamant that while it might sound low, it's all profit.

"You're not paying rent, you're not paying for power, you've got no overheads, the food is free, the Wifi is free - everything's free," she said.

"And the conditions are getting better and

better, as are the kitchens that we work in.

"There's the whole lifestyle of not driving anywhere, no traffic or hundreds of people around you, just peace and quiet.

"People just can't get past the dollar signs."

"We want employers to have good cooks that will stay on for a couple of years in a place where they feel comfortable that they can make their home because that's what it is, a home."

Raq said Covid saw a lot of unvaxed city workers in professions like nursing take up station cook jobs while the vaccine mandate was still in effect, but they failed to cope with the isolation and abrupt change from city life.

Another part of the mission statement for Remote Contract Cooks is to get rid of the bad eggs on both side of the equation.

"There's a few dirty cooks out there at the moment and we're weeding those out slowly, but we want to concentrate on the employer as well," Raq said.

"I've had a few cooks come to me and say this employer is nasty, and it's been cook after cook and they can't keep a cook.

"We want to say this is not acceptable behaviour, this employee is a person who deserves and expects to be treated correctly.

"Our goal is to get out trainee cooks to come in and we'll spend three to five days working with them on the property and helping them settle into the remote way of life and the station.

"We will help them integrate into the crew and to the fact they're living and breathing and eating with these people 24/7."

Raq and the Remote Contract Cooks teams is hosting the inaugural First Annual Cookies Meet and Greet at Hotel Richards in Mitchell on January 19-23.

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History of Patrick Duffy

Born in Ireland in February 1868, Patrick Duffy came to Australia in 1888, and immediately secured a job as a labourer in Brisbane before applying to join the Police Force.

He was sworn in as a Constable in October 1890, and a few months later was sent to Barmah with 15 other constables, in connection with the famous shearers' strike.

There he was placed on patrol duty and assigned to a particular area (possibly Ilfracombe) which he patrolled on horseback—days were long and hard, and Patrick Duffy is quoted as saying that he was often so weary by day's end that he could sleep soundly on an ant-bed!

At the end of 1891, he was transferred to Winton, where he was again mostly on patrol duty, and distinguished himself in more than one event.

He was required to take urgent documents to Longreach, then a distance of 131 miles and, with three changes of horses, he made the journey in 18 hours. That record stood for many years.

On another occasion, he needed to find a witness for a court case and brought the man back 18 days and 765 miles later.

His search took him to Elderslie, Cork, Brighton Downs, Diamantina Lakes, Devonport Downs, Monkira, Birdsville, Bedourie, and Marion Downs—all on horseback, and closely following a long trip taken to apprehend the two thieves that the required witness had fallen victim to.

Patrick Duffy married Norah (nee O'Brien, also born in Ireland) in 1895, while in Winton.

(Incidentally, Norah's sister, Catherine, was married to Patrick Ryan, a constable in Muttaborra 1877-1883.)

Patrick and Norah Duffy had five sons (2 were born in Muttaborra) and one daughter.

In March 1896, he was placed in charge at Tangorin, where he was also Acting Clerk of Petty Sessions.

While there, he and Mrs Duffy were commended for their efforts to make the station a nicer place by planting trees, etc.

Four years later he was transferred to Muttaborra, where he remained for 14 years, usually with the aid of one or two constables and sometimes a tracker.

This was when Muttaborra had six hotels, plus the school (which his children attended), a hospital, three stores, a butcher shop, and a post office, and he arrived at the time when a police magistrate was no longer stationed in the town.

There were two weekly mail runs from Aramac and Longreach, plus one from Tangorin/Hughenden.

Patrick Duffy was promoted to Acting Sergeant at the beginning of 1901, and then to Sergeant at the end of 1910.

His district covered an extensive area, and police patrol work, being on horseback, was often restricted by seasonal conditions of the time.

A bicycle was added to their modes of transport in mid-1902.

A Police Station inspection report, made by Inspector Lamond of Longreach, stated:

July 1903 – "Everything about Muttaborra most satisfactory – Acting Sergt Duffy had just got convictions against cattle stealer and sly grog puller - whatever this Acting Sergt does is done well."

Duffy's service history is regularly marked with 'Favourable Records', and rewards and commendations for good work.

Besides police duties, Duffy was acting Land Commissioner at Muttaborra, assistant/acting Registrar of Births and Deaths, Licensing Inspector, Inspector of Slaughterhouses, Acting Clerk of Petty Sessions, and other official roles.

On his departure from Muttaborra in March 1914, the residents gave Patrick Duffy a great send-off, and presented him with a purse of sovereigns or a 50-guinea gold watch and chain (reports differ), and expressed much regard for his unfailing tact and courtesy.

Patrick Duffy was transferred to Blackall for a couple of years before a transfer to Longreach.

He continued to distinguish himself with

good police work and was promoted to Senior Sergeant in 1918.

In 1920 he was transferred to Warwick, and in October 1923, to the congratulations of many western folks, he was awarded the rank of Sub-Inspector and happily transferred back to Longreach to take charge of the district.

This district was "larger than the whole area of England". Patrick Duffy was awarded an Imperial Service Medal.

In 1928, on reaching the age of 60, he retired from the service after 38 years of duty.

During that time, Patrick did not have one day absent on sick leave, and he and his wife took only seven weeks' holiday.

He continued to reside in Longreach, where he died, aged 79, in August 1944.

He is buried in the Longreach Cemetery.

Norah died in 1962 and is buried alongside him.

Three sons and two daughters-in-law are also buried there.

Patrick Duffy was described as extremely able, but firm and sympathetic, as the giver of kindly advice, and also as "courteous, capable and fearless" and "highly respected and esteemed throughout the Central West".

It was in the Central West that he spent so much of his working life, and where he chose to remain for his retirement years.

Along for the ride

Hayley McElhinney joins the cast of Foxtel's **Upright** on a new adventure

Journey of discovery

As a fan of Foxtel road-trip hit *Upright's* first season, Hayley McElhinney jumped at the chance to join Tim Minchin and rising star Milly Alcock in a new instalment, writes **Siobhan Duck**

WORKING with Tim Minchin for the first time was literally child's play for Hayley McElhinney.

And yet, it's taken three decades for the stars to align for these talented performers to once again share the spotlight in Foxtel's acclaimed series *Upright*.

"I knew Tim when we just got out of high school," McElhinney says between rehearsals for the Black Swan Theatre Company production of *Oil*.

"We did a play together for the Youth Theatre Company here in Western Australia. I was in the chorus. So mine was a very small part but that's where we met and we have been in each other's lives, and friends, since."

McElhinney enthuses that Minchin's immense talent was apparent even when he was a teenager.

"He's always been brilliant," she says.

"And it's just been incredible to watch his journey and to be at those big concerts he plays with the symphony like at the Opera House. I have sat in the audience so many times and I just never get tired of it."

"So, it's just a dream to be able to finally work together."

McElhinney joins her old pal Minchin for the second season of *Upright*, which the award-winning musician not only stars in but wrote and produced as well.

She plays Linda, the estranged mother of Minchin's young co-star Milly Alcock.

While the first series followed selfish rockstar Lucky (Minchin) and the rebellious, runaway teen Meg (Alcock) driving across the Nullarbor Plain to visit Lucky's dying mother, season two finds the odd couple stumbling through the tropics in search of Meg's mum (McElhinney).

"I absolutely loved the first season, and I am not just saying that because [Tim's] my mate," she laughs.

"I actually had the opportunity to watch the whole season in the cinema. There was a screening for all the cast and crew and I managed to get in on that and I just loved it."

"I just wished I was in it. And so, then when I found out he was doing another one, and that there [was] a role in it for me, I was absolutely beside myself with excitement."

While McElhinney jokes that she would have accepted any role on offer, playing Linda presented some great creative challenges and was quite unlike anything she has done on screen before.

The follow-up series was filmed in Queensland and she enthuses that its landscape plays an integral part in the tone and feel of the show.

"I loved how the first season was shot and this is the same," she explains.

"There's a real sense of the country. The light coming in and the green of the rainforest. It's a real contrast to the Nullarbor Plain."

"It's sort of luscious, tropical and muddy."

The natural environment also had a physical effect on the *Upright* shoot, which took place during a period of heavy rain and flooding in Queensland.

"I remember arriving on the Gold Coast and accommodation was quite limited because everybody [due to flooding]," McElhinney says.

"And it was just such an intense time. Coming from Western Australia, arriving in Queensland and just seeing watermarks on signs. It was really, really sobering."

"The ground was soggy. It [the flood crisis] was really very much in our minds."

Travelling to far-flung parts of the country is a part of the job that McElhinney enjoys.

Apart from filming *Upright* in Queensland, she has also spent time filming her AACTA-nominated role as a small-town cop in *Mystery Road: Origin* in the Western Australian goldfields.

And before that, she and co-stars Rodger Corser and Tina Bursill filmed the hit dramedy *Doctor Doctor* in Mudgee, a small town in the central west of New South Wales.

"It was just such a great job and five years of my life that I treasure," she says of the Logie-winning Channel Nine series created by Tony McNamara (who also penned *The Favourite* and *The Great*).

"And what's really interesting is that whenever I go to the country

– and I went to Albany in Western Australia just recently for the school holidays – people recognise me. And they recognise me from that show, *Doctor Doctor*.

"I think a lot of people who don't live in a city really got into that show and that's because we were shooting it in the country and we got it [the feeling of the country]."

Likewise, McElhinney says *Upright* captures the spirit of where it was made.

"It's very Australian but it's not making fun of Australians," she explains.

"It has lots of quirky characters but it's smart. But that's all Tim. He is one of the smartest people on the planet."

"So, you've got that great combination of funny, quirky, that full of heart and truth. And I think that's the qualities that *Doctor Doctor* had as well."

While *Doctor Doctor* is the show that made her a household name, McElhinney has wanted to be an actor for as long as she can remember. She and her elder sister, fellow actor Mandy (*Love Child*, *House of Hancock*, *Wakefield*), spent hours watching old movies and musicals on TV.

Rather than putting on lots of plays for their loved ones, McElhinney says their passion for

performance mostly played out in highly imaginative role-playing games.

And she laughs: "We just really loved pretending to be other people!"

Despite both having worked extensively on stage and screen now for years, the McElhinney sisters are yet to do a TV series together. But that is something she's eager to remedy in the near future.

"I think it's the right time," she says of working with Mandy.

"You know, we have both carved out a good career for ourselves, independent of each other. And we are very close. We are massive fans of each other."

"We talk all the time – mostly about work – so, yeah, it's time that we came together now that we've done our own things."

"It's going to happen soon!"

So, could her good mate Minchin be tempted to pen something for the McElhinney sisters?

"Wouldn't that be nice!" she laughs.

"Perhaps we could set it in Tasmania. We'd be perfect there, two redheads!"

Why the Flanders poppy?

Have you ever wondered what is a red Poppy and why they use a red poppy for Remembrance Day?

In soldiers' folklore, the vivid red of the poppy came from the blood of their comrades soaking the ground.

In England in 1919, the British Legion sought an emblem that would honour the dead and help the living.

The Red Poppy was adopted as that emblem and since then has been accepted as the Emblem of Remembrance.

So why don't you purchase a red Poppy badge from the RSL before the Remembrance Day service this Friday the 11th of November?

The Commonly known Flanders Poppy or Red Corn Poppy or *Papaver rhoeas* is a hardy native of Europe but has always been harder to grow in the Wide Bay.

The Commonly known Flanders poppy or Red Corn Poppy or *Papaver rhoeas* is a hardy native of Europe but has always been harder to grow in Central Queensland.

The large 50-100mm blooms of the Flanders Poppy are fire-engine red in colour and vividly marked with purplish-black centres.

Each flower is borne on erect hairy stems, and the foliage is relatively inconspicuous, allowing the full beauty of the flowers to be seen.

It grows in well-drained soil in full sun to partial shade positions.

GARDEN PERFUME FOR NIGHTS

Gardens can provide so much enjoyment, floral displays, that patch of green during the dry times and even that sweet fragrance that drifts across the garden. No matter what season there is always an array of perfumed flowering plants in bloom.

Attractive fragrances can add a whole new dimension to any garden, so it is well worth considering some scented plants when you are creating your next garden.

Even at twilight, there are many plants that still provide a feature to a garden.

The storms of this last week have made such an impact on our gardens.

And it is not just the greening of our gardens.

It is also the fact that we have had enough rain to trigger a drift of aromas from many of the gardens in the town.

With the first rain in some time, the Mur-rayas across this region are now bursting into their perfumed flowers.

The *Murraya paniculata* or Orange Jessamine is a beautifully scented long flowering evergreen shrub which produces clusters of sweetly scented white flowers mainly in spring and summer.

In warmer climates, large red berries appear in winter and spring.

Murraya makes a good informal hedge.

Allamanda williamsonii or Scented Double Allamanda is an excellent climber to climb with glossy green foliage.

Mass clusters of fragrant double yellow flowers will normally occur from December to late January but this year it has started flower-

ing in the last few weeks. This *Allamanda* will need support and pruning after flowering.

Cestrum nocturnum or Night Scented Jasminum is an evergreen medium to tall shrub that will withstand periods of dryness and will tolerate a light frost.

The sweetly scented greenish-yellow tubular flowers can appear from early August.

Many gardeners believe that the Night-Scented Jasminum is a very good insect repellent, especially for mosquitoes.

Gardenia magnifica has been in cultivation in Australia for nearly one hundred years and yet is still regarded as one of the best shrubs commercially available.

I know within our own landscaping projects, we have always found this shrub to perform under a variety of conditions, from quite protected to being reasonably exposed, as well as in positions of varying light conditions.

Several years ago, in one particular project, we planted nearly one hundred plants and found nearly all of them came into full bloom before the year was out.

Plumeria obtusa, or Evergreen Frangipani would be one of the toughest of all perfumed plants in the garden.

As the common name suggests this Frangipani retains the majority of its foliage throughout the year.

It has glossy, rigid, dark green leaves that make it recognisable from all other frangipani varieties.

The flowers are pure white and highly fragrant.

I have been told by a Singaporean soldier that was training in Rockhampton that this plant is also known as the Singapore Frangipani.

WHEN ARE PLANTS MOST FRAGRANT

This depends on the essential oils that provide the fragrance.

These oils are in flowers and plants at different levels during the day and night, this varies from variety to variety.

Roses have the strongest fragrance on damp mornings when the sun hits them until noon.

Some flowers' fragrance is noticeable at night e.g. *Melaleucas* and *Cestrum nocturnum*.

Fragrance may be more noticeable in a protected position where the wind does not disperse the scent.

Wool market takes a dip

This week, the Australian wool market has fallen again, driven by weaker demand.

The talk amongst the trade early in the week was of a cheaper market, the only question was how much it would fall.

When the market opened in the East the prices on offer were noticeably lower but not as low as some buyers predicted.

Good style lots and wool possessing favourable additional measurement (AM) results

continued to attract solid support and were least affected by the falling market.

Lesser style wool, wool with poor AM results and wool carrying higher levels of vegetable matter (more than 1.5 per cent in particular) were not as well supported and recorded larger falls.

By the end of the first selling day (Wednesday), the individual Micron Price Guides (MPGs) for merino fleece had dropped by between 14 and 59 cents.

These losses combined with overall falls in

the skirting, crossbred and oddment sectors resulted in a 27 cents drop in the AWEX Eastern Market Indicator (EMI). On the second day of selling (Thursday), the market continued to fall but at a slower rate than the previous day, due in part to strong resistance from sellers, many of whom were not prepared to accept the offered prices.

By the end of the day, the nationally passed-in rate for merino fleece had climbed to 27 per cent.

The movements in the merino fleece MPGs

ranged between unchanged and -44 cents.

The EMI lost another 12 cents, closing the week at 1,261 cents, an overall fall of 39 cents, a reduction of 3 per cent.

A noteworthy event, albeit a negative one, was the 30.0 micron MPG in the South which fell to 303 cents, this is a record low for this indicator.

Next week's offering reduces. Currently, there is expected to be 35,949 bales on offer in Melbourne, Fremantle and Sydney which is a designated Superfine sale.

A weed is still a plant out of place: Treatment tips

After nearly seven years in these dual agronomy extension roles for Weedsmart and Pulse Australia, I am now more aware of how much pressure we can all put on our farming systems.

By pressure I mean continuous cropping while issues like soil borne diseases flourish, increasing weed species that are now herbicide resistant, along with soil constraints like rising sodium and chloride problems and a host of other considerations

No surprise that today I am turning a spotlight on Annual Barnyard Grass or ABG.

My definition of a weed is still a plant out of place and certainly on a few occasions weeds can be handy for example keeping VAM or by its new name of AM, (Arbuscular Mycorrhizae) being maintained by a live root system.

Weeds can even protect for some soil erosion reductions.

However most weeds are just pains in the backside.

Very competitive to our crops, downgrading of end grain quality, moisture loss, grain admixture and of course replenishing the weed seed bank for the next few years.

Even a single annual grass or broadleaf weed can leave behind some 20,000 or 100,000 seeds.

Have a look at these pictures. Barnyard grass monsters from a Western Downs grain sorghum crop a few years ago.

The grain sorghum crop has some fair heads on the stalks and tillers, just not enough, due to a huge grass problem.

Now conservatively these patches of grass could easily be leaving a couple of thousand viable seeds per square metre.

Let's assume the original grass plant did

not die with the glyphosate application at pre-plant time.

Why is that you ask? Reasons are perhaps a complete miss by the spray rig, dusty wheel track problems covering the ARG, too low a herbicide rate or even drought stress conditions.

The other bogey is herbicide resistance.

Not everyone wants to know about herbicide resistance problems, however as the months and years march on, our Annual Barnyard grass and others just gets tougher to control by herbicides.

Now the technical part. ABG we have known from my AHRI colleagues in Perth, that target site resistance is a common resistance mechanism in many weeds.

Surprise surprise, about the end of 2019 in the northern tropics of Australia, we discovered the world first metabolic resistance of Glyphosate in ABG.

In other words the plant breaks down the glyphosate molecule into pieces, before the herbicide molecules can get to the target site of the Annual Barnyard Grass plant.

Target site is where a herbicide molecule usually bind to and therefore stops the plant from living.

I did not take too much attention firstly, however it is swinging around in other areas, to be another painful issue in weed control.

So plants that are weeds win again or do they? Not really, with my hugely best advice being to follow the Weedsmart Big 6 tips and tactics and this will at least give you better and longer lasting weed control, apart from just using more drums or herbicide shuttles from in the shed.

Dorper demand on the up

"They are also highly fertile and well suited to the climatic conditions of this region."

Mr McLeod continued, "it is also good to see some varied marketing options available to producers."

With the different feedlots starting to pop up in the state it gives producers other markets to target besides the processing plants."

"We look forward to hosting everyone at the upcoming Charleville Dorper Sales on behalf of leading Dorper and White Dorper stud, Burrawang."

Wicus Cronje has not only made a big impact as the Stud Master at the country's

largest Dorper stud, Burrawang, but he has also been a game changer for the Dorper breed in Australia.

Quesadillas

Serves: 8

Prep time: 15 minutes

Cook time: 25 minutes

1 serve per portion

Ingredients :

- 8 multigrain tortillas
- 1/3 cup tomato salsa
- 1 1/3 cups tasty cheese, reduced fat, grated
- 400g can red kidney beans, reduced salt, drained
- 1 cup carrot, grated
- 1 cup baby spinach leaves
- Olive oil cooking spray
- 1 avocado, peeled and chopped
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Salsa (optional)

- 1 medium tomato, diced
- 1/2 medium red onion, diced
- 1 medium red capsicum, sliced
- 1 lime, juiced

Method:

- LAY the tortillas on a clean surface. Spread with tomato salsa and sprinkle with the cheese.
- TOP half of each tortilla evenly with beans, grated carrot and spinach leaves. Fold in half.
