# Remembrance Day held in Longreach

Those at this year's Remembrance Day in Longreach were lucky enough to witness the 3rd Combat Signals Regiment - for the first time - mounting a guard on the cenotaph in what was described as "a symbolic gesture to the link between the youth of Longreach and service to our nation".

Longreach RSL Sub-branch president Joshua Adams said this year's was a continuation of the traditional Remembrance Day commemorative service

"On the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month, a minute's silence is observed and dedicated to those sailors, soldiers and airmen who died fighting to protect the nation," he said.

"In Australia and other allied countries, including New Zealand, Canada and the United States, 11 November became known as Armistice Day—a day to remember those who died in World War One.

"The day continues to be commemorated in allied countries."

Mr Adams said it was important to recognise the deep connection Longreach as a town has to those who have served.

"Within Longreach, we, as a town, have strong connections to those who have served and continue to serve. Longreach had over 700 people enlist in the Great War, and a significant number since," he said.

"We continue to have a living connection with the Australian Defence Force, with many of our youth enlisting or with veterans choosing to make Longreach their home after their service.

"Remembrance Day is a day to remember those who have served and died fighting for their nation."

Mr Adams said Remembrance Day was unique in that it is not a public holiday and hosts no parades.

"It is attended by those who can and want to attend, which makes it different and unique," he said.

"We had some 150 people in attendance on the day, and it was a work day and also raining.

"We all have our own individual and deeply personal reasons for wanting to commemorate days such as this, and the RSL Sub-branch, in conjunction with the Longreach Regional Council and other supporters, will continue to do so into the future."

Mr Adams thanked the people who attended and the local businesses and community groups who supported the day, including: Longreach Regional Council, 3rd Combat Signals Regiment of the Australian Army, Longreach Scout Group, Mr Malcom Strong (Bugler), Mr John Anderssen (national Anthems), Mr Lachlan Rich (Piper), Longreach Event Hire, and Longreach Churches Together, particularly Pastor Ben Kent and Pastor Steve Cavill.

The Longreach Sub-Branch has been supporting the local community for over 100 years in the fulfilment of its charitable objectives.

Mr Adams said this has included veteran welfare (such as local accommodation for veterans) and commemorative events such as Remembrance Day and Anzac Day.

"Many of these projects are conducted in conjunction with partners such as the Longreach Regional Council and the State and Fed-

eral Governments, although it is through the support of our local community that make these projects a real success," he said.

"The Sub-Branch is seeking to complete capital works in its accommodation on Crane Street over the following months which was funded through by the Queensland Governments Queensland Remembers Grant.

"We have a range of other projects which we would like to explore, in conjunction with the Longreach Archive and Historical Research Group, although we are always seeking further assistance in these areas.

# Pain for the regions

The finger-pointing continues between Labor and Nationals over regional budget funding and cuts.

Maranoa MP David Littleproud says the Labor Government's scrapping of the Building Better Regions Fund (BBRF) has removed a vital funding option for Winton's aged care accommodation project Jessamine Place, bringing the project to a grinding halt.

"Winton Community and Aged Care Services proactively applied for \$10 million under the BBRF Program's Round 6 earlier this year to build Jessamine Place, a 14-bed supported aged care accommodation facility, to ensure elderly residents with dementia will no longer have to leave Winton for care," Mr Littleproud said.

"Approval of the BBRF funding was the last tick... with the Council already donating the land and allocating \$1 million towards the project, and Winton Community and Aged Care Services raising \$200,000 and securing an additional \$100,000 from the Gambling Community Benefit Fund.

"But Labor came along and ruthlessly cut the BBRF Program as part of its recent Budget, refusing to even look at the Round 6 funding applications lodged by regional and rural communities."

Winton Community and Aged Care Services President Leisa Fraser said she was shocked by the decision.

"Our elderly are worried about their future," she said.

"They are concerned they will not have accommodation options available if their health deteriorates and they cannot remain living in their own homes.

"They want to be able to stay in the community they have lived in all their lives, to remain close to their family and friends.

"They are stressed and constantly thinking, 'What's going to happen to me?'"

Ms Fraser said there are only six multi-purpose health service beds at the Winton Hospital and all are currently filled, with more elderly people with health needs on a waiting list.

Other Western Queensland BBRF Round 6 project applications now binned according to Mr Littleproud include a multi-purpose facility at Longreach to service the local Men's Shed,

tourism facilities at Eromanga Natural History Museum and much-needed sporting facilities at Surat, Barcaldine and Blackall-Tambo.

The Hon Catherine King MP, Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government recently defended the Albanese Government's commitment to regional Australia.

Minister King stated that evidence given to the Senate Rural and Regional Affairs and Transport Committee in Budget Estimates hearings that, compared to the March Budget, funding for regional projects within the Infrastructure Investment Program in the October Budget, has gone up by around \$4 billion dollars.

But how much exactly has been removed from Western Queensland projects is still unclear to local residents.

Minister King said National Party MPs and Senators should apologise for misleading honest, hardworking Australians about the Government's approach to investing in vital infrastructure projects for people who live in regional Australia.

"The Government is not proceeding with the Building Better Regions Fund Round 6," Minister King stated.

"This Budget replaces the Building Better Regions Fund with \$1 billion over three years in two new programs targeted at regional and

rural areas; the Growing Regions Program and the Regional Precincts and Partnerships Program.

A spokeswoman for Minister Catherine King has responded to Mr Littleproud's comments by saying the Australian Government is committed to developing Australia's regions, including by delivering funding for projects.

"We understand the disappointment some groups feel at the decision to end the Building Better Regions Fund," the spokeswoman told Today News Group this week.

"Organisations are encouraged to consider applying to the new Growing Regions Program which was one of two new programs worth \$1 billion announced in the October Budget.

"The program for local councils and not-for-profit groups will open for applications in early 2023 and applications will be assessed in a timely way and according to program guidelines.

"Under the Albanese Government, organisations can be assured that the process will be transparent and fair, without the lack of documentation, hidden requirements and preference in favour of some regions that were the hallmarks of the BBRE.

"Mr Littleproud, who was on the panel deciding grants, would be well aware of the criticisms by the Australian National Audit Office of the process run by the former Government."

## Shows to pay: Littleproud

Labor has confirmed it is scrapping funding for the Agriculture Shows Development Grants Program.

In Estimates week, Agriculture Minister Murray Watt said \$14 million in funding for Ag shows was being "reprioritised".

Maranoa MP David Littleproud said Estimates had sadly proved Labor was taking even more money out of regional and rural Australia, with infrastructure funding for Ag shows now gone, including in the electorate of Maranoa.

"We already know Labor has taken billions away from the regions, scrapping water and major infrastructure commitments," Mr Littleproud said.

"But now they are cruelly taking away the Agricultural Shows Development Grants Program funding.

"This was money to improve infrastructure for Ag shows in Maranoa.

"It is another kick in the guts to Maranoa, which is already struggling."

The funding was on top of \$20 million previously provided for 122 shows to build new pavilions and exhibition areas, install seating, shade and weather protection, upgrade accessibility, improve public safety and animal welfare and upgrade power and energy efficiency.

Maranoa shows previously given funding include Allora Show Society, Bell Show Society, Barcoo Pastoral Society, Cooyar Agricultural Society, Crows Nest Agricultural, Horticultural and Industrial Society, Cunnamulla and District Show Society, Goondiwindi Pastoral and Agricultural Society, Longreach Show Society, Miles and District Show Society, Mitchell Show Society, Stanthorpe Agriculture Society, Tambo Stock Show and Wandoan Show Society.

"Ag shows generate a huge \$1 billion annually in economic benefits, promoting new technologies and high-quality produce," Mr Littleproud said.

## Counting the costs

The Nationals Leader and Maranoa MP David Littleproud said revelations Labor would call in 18 resource projects – two of which were in Maranoa – for further environmental assessments would cost jobs for no further environmental gain.

He said the mining industry was now facing another tough hurdle, at a time when Labor was also threatening resource companies with more intervention.

"The end result of Labor's ideology means Maranoa families will have less job opportunities and pay even more for their electricity," Mr Littleproud said.

"Energy prices are already going up by 56 per cent but making it even harder for coal and gas projects to pass even more environmental assessments inevitably means supply goes down and cost goes up."

Labor has announced it will accept public submissions on the climate change impacts of 18 coal and gas projects under the Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act.

Until now, the federal government only considered a project's impact on native wildlife and vegetation.

"The change Labor is making risks the possibility that any project can fail an environmental assessment if Labor doesn't like it."

## New high-tech sign on path to Longreach

A new digital sign has been erected on along Landsborough Highway coming into Longreach from the east that aims to showcase important information to locals and travellers.

Longreach Regional Council Mayor Tony Rayner said Council applied for a grant for the sign 12 months ago, and the sign has now arrived.

"It's a very impressive large digital elec-

tronic sign that will be a significantly advantageous sign for promoting events that are on in Longreach and surrounding towns," he said.

"Whether that be the Christmas Street Party, the Longreach Show, Opera or any other event, we can show it on that sign and locals or visitors can know where it's on at and all the details.

"The sign can also display photos, but we can not show videos as it is on a main road."

Mr Rayner said in the event of a disaster the sign would display important information to visitors, including vital road safety information.

"It's very contemporary and modern, it has the corporate colours of Longreach Council so it ties in nicely with the scheme of our Council building and the Library," he said.

"We're very grateful for the funding from the State Government."

# Aramac-Torrens Road completed

Aramac locals will feel safer travelling north after 27 more kilometres of Aramac-Torrens Ck road has been completed with major upgrades recently—making it more flood resilient.

Aramac-Torrens Creek Road is an important north-south link between the Flinders, Landsborough and Capricorn highways, connecting Townsville and Rockhampton to the regional centres of Barcaldine, Cloncurry, Hughenden, Longreach and Winton.

The \$30 million project was funded un-

der the Regional Economic Enabling Fund, which is jointly funded by the Australian and Queensland governments on an 80:20 basis.

The sealing comes as a part of a \$163.1 million package provided by both the State and Federal Government expected to be completed next year.

"Aramac-Torrens Creek Road is a strategically important corridor, connecting communities, supporting industry, and delivering for businesses in north west Queensland," said

Federal Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government Catherine King.

"These upgrades have improved safety by providing a sealed section of eight metres' width, catering for heavy loads and freight vehicles for the full length of the road.

"They have also improved flood immunity, making the road more reliable for regional communities and local cattle stations along the route."

## They're not playing around on innovation

A new sustainably-sourced playground will soon be available to children who enjoy the services at the Longreach Childcare Centre.

This playground will be the first of its type in Queensland, with what has been described as 'ground-breaking' technical innovations in recyclable play equipment, turning trash into treasure.

The playground was made by a product called Made Green was brought to Longreach by Urban Play and is said to have used post-consumer recycled materials such as ocean waste, textiles, food packaging waste, and plastic bags.

"It is incredible to see a regional council put sustainability at the forefront" said playground designer, Kyle Marsden, Urban Play.

"The Made Green KOMPAN play pieces help to reduce carbon emission by up to 50 per cent. Not only will this playground develop little bodies and minds, but it's also helping to lessen our impact on the environment."

Mayor Tony Rayner said the opportunity to use innovative materials was

important to Council.

"The improvements to the Longreach Childcare Centre offered us a great chance to innovate and change the way we think about this kind of infrastructure," he said.

"We have a harsh climate, so we're always looking for new materials that will offer us better outcomes over the lifetime of our assets."

Cr Rayner said Council was looking to implement more nature-based play where possible.

"The nature-based play design philosophy is one that really appeals to us," he said.

"It allows our facilities to be more responsive to the climate, and creates opportunities for our young people to safely explore our unique environment.

"It also makes sense from a maintenance and asset management perspective, particularly in our tough operating conditions.

"But most of all, it's great fun – and I'm sure this playground will be appreciated by our littlest residents!"



These spaces invite open-ended interactions, spontaneity, risk-taking, exploration, discovery and connection with nature. They foster an appreciation of the natural environment and provide a platform for ongoing environmental education."

### Uni staff seek more

National Tertiary Education Union members at James Cook University are looking to rally across five campuses as staff are looking for better pay.

The NTEU bargaining team will join members at the rallies before going into what is the second last bargaining meeting for the year.

The protests will be held at James Cook University's Townsville and Cairns campuses after management pledged to lock out staff who implemented small bans that had little impact on students.

"Show me the money, JCU management—they say they will offer a 'community standard' pay rise, but they haven't said what that standard is," said NTEU JCU Branch President, Jonathan Strauss.

"JCU staff's last scheduled pay rise was at the end of June 2021.

"Since then, the cost of living, rents, and interest rates have soared.

"My members and I can't accept standing still while living gets harder.

"We won't bear the burden for management failures to attract students to JCU—something decent pay, improved job security, and workload controls could help."

### Call for action

The Australian Services Union is calling for rampant wage theft from disability support workers to be a core focus of the federal government's independent review of the NDIS.

As the major union representing NDIS workers, the ASU's NSW & ACT branch has seen a myriad of unscrupulous providers ripping off staff, including cases where providers charge the NDIS for disability support work, but pay employees below the award minimum for disability workers.

The NDIA's own wage benchmarking report released in May showed the bottom 10 per cent of providers are paying below the minimum wage for disability support workers.

"Minimum pay rates for disability support workers are set by the Fair Work Commission following a landmark pay equity case in 2012. That is the only successful equal pay case under the current Fair Work laws," said ASU NSW & ACT secretary Angus McFarland.

"These equal pay rates have been properly funded in the NDIS. But many providers, including some of the online platform providers, are deliberately misclassifying their workers so they can underpay them and pocket the difference.

"This kind of scam is actually so routine within the system that many providers don't even really consider that they are doing the wrong thing and workers are leaving the sector in their droves.

"We can't afford for greedy providers to be pocketing wages that should be flowing to workers providing supports to people with disability. We can't tolerate fraud and we can't tolerate wage theft in the NDIS. What these providers are doing is not just unlawful and unfair, it undermines the sustainability of the entire scheme.

"At the moment providers get away with this practice because the process for unions to take action through the courts is restricted by lengthy processes and the highly casualised nature of work means workers are scared to speak out and face losing shifts."

# Adventures now on rails

After more than 14 years in the making, the dream is finally coming alive with the arrival of two heritage 2000-series motor rail trains in Longreach this week.

Alan ‘Smithy’ and Sue Smith from Outback Aussie Tours said their new trains were acquired from Queensland Rail in Ipswich, with 2036 arriving Sunday and 2034 arriving mid-week from Augathella.

Outback Aussie Tours has leased the set for 10 years from Queensland Rail and the Queensland Government.

“This rolling stock is the last of the Heritage fleet for the 2000-series motor and we feel very grateful and honoured that we’ve been given this opportunity,” Smithy said.

“This is the rolling stock that we believe will bring alive the romance of rail for a lot of people, and it’s giving them a new life at Longreach.

“It’s time to tell the story of the train - the building of the line, the great stories around Longreach, from traditional owners right through to contemporary life on the land.

“We want to bring the outside in and just bring it all alive and tell a great story that will become an iconic rail journey of the world.”

Smithy said The 2000-series trains were built in the 1960s and 70s, what they love is the all-stainless steel outside so it can weather really well and doesn’t need painting.

“And on the inside, it has refurbished lovely timber panelling and beautifully upholstered seats,” Smithy added.

“The first two prototypes were built in Ipswich and the rest of the series was built in Brisbane.”

The idea of a rail motor out of Longreach started a long time ago, when Ed Warren, former Mayor of Winton talked about seeing a rail motor run from Longreach to Winton.

“The former Mayor of Winton put a full feasibility study up on that and planted a lot of seeds, and about the same time the Queensland Government released Outback Tourism Infrastructure Grants.”

“We have been working with Queensland Rail for some time to package trains and tours together, because rail is a really big point of difference in the market.”

Smithy said the big picture and goal was running an experience from Emerald to Longreach on a weekly schedule.

“Our dream is to bring real rail day back

into these western communities,” Smithy said.

“These rail motors not only give you an absolute experience the way they move around and feel for the country, but with big open windows and you can take in the outside world and smell the bush.”

“Our wish and intention is for this to be something our towns are proud of and is part of their DNA, and we are looking forward to supporting community groups.

“The construction phase is very important to us - we could have had very keen contractors from the coast but were able to secure Barcy contractors, so we are really proud of the fact that we’ve been able to keep jobs local,

so the money stays in the communities.

“The QR fellas have done all the track work here and words cannot thank them enough for the work they have done already.”

So what tour adventures can we expect to enjoy in the near future?

Smithy shared about The Silvertails at sunset tours in late light along the floodplains, Then the Blueys Flyer tour where people get a shorter feel for the experience, then a ride out to the sale yards, on the turnaround, and an historic Ilfracombe tour that supports the pub and Sunday markets.

“Then one of the best experiences will be the great Dale and Thomson River run,” Smithy added.

“We will only be doing a top of 50km an hour on the train tours.”

Sue said they have lots of great ideas for special events; a country and western train, or rock, n, roll train and imagine a jazz train.

“We’d love to hear of people’s rail memories and stories over the years that they can share with us as well,” Sue said.

Smithy said this dream wouldn’t be possible if not for the million dollars put towards this project from The Palaszczuk Government’s Outback Tourism Infrastructure Grants.

“We wouldn’t have had the confidence to try something really different without that money,” Smithy stated.

# 40 years in service for cornerstone of the community

Barcaldine Justice of the Peace and Commissioner for Declarations has been recognised for 40 years of service to the community.

“So if people want documents signed and witnessed, I’m available to do that kind of thing,” he said adding there were different levels of study allowing Commissioners to be able to carry out various legal actions.

“Mine (qualification) is just to be available for people when they do need you.

“Of course now days because there is a clerk of the court a lot of people just go into the Clerk of the Court anyway. But when they’re not available people can just ask if I can witness documents.”

Mr Kerr has been a Justice of the Peace for forty years and was recognized for his service.

“I got into it because my employer passed away and he was a Justice of the Peace and the business needed somebody there,” he said.

“People would just come in to see if someone could sign a document so I became a Justice of the Peace and our local Member of the Day Bill Glasson organized that through the system and I’ve been a JP ever since.

“I’ve just been available for people to come in who need certain documents signed or witnessed.

“That’s just a service that is available in the community.”

# Wheat harvest has a bumper impact

The rain-interrupted wheat harvest across the Central Highlands has overwhelmed Graincorp depots, with more than 500,000 tonnes of grain being trucked in.

Queensland operations manager Brad Foster said Graincorp was “doing as much as we can” to deliver for Central Queensland growers.

“GrainCorp’s Central Queensland cluster of sites have received more than 500,000 tonnes of grain in one of the biggest harvests we’ve had in years,” Mr Foster said.

“We re-opened our Emerald site for the first time since 2019, to create extra capacity for growers in the region.

“The site is supporting our nearby Yamala

site, which has had restricted capacity to create more segregations on site given the recent weather issues.

“We also re-opened sites at Gindie and Dingo for the first time in several years, but these sites have now filled and closed.

“In saying that, we’re also busy outloading as much grain as possible from this part of the network to create some more capacity for growers.

“That includes outloading by rail from Yamala and by road from Moura to port and other sites.”

One local grower, who asked not to be named, said the harvest had exposed deficiencies in Graincorp’s capacity to handle big tonnages.

“The crops are yielding much better than

normal, but the grades are lower because of the wet weather damage so they had to get extra storage for the lower grade wheat,” he told Emerald Today.

“There’s no room at Capella and not enough at Yamala, so they opened the Emerald site and I believe the two big silos are full of feed wheat as well as the two pads.

“What’s happened over the last several years is that the harvest has been fairly poor and a lot of grain hasn’t gone off-farm because of the costs in getting it to the depot and growers didn’t support Yamala.

“This year they’ve all used Yamala in droves and it is grossly inadequate.

“It needs to be twice as big as it is.”

It is believed Yamala is the only site taking chickpea.

## Road woes

Residents are desperately calling for upgrades to be made on Jackson Wandoan Road amid fears the road will become so damaged that vehicle access will be cut.

Resident Olivia Boland has shared a petition on social media to call on the two local councils and Transport and Main Roads (TMR) to upgrade the road.

“The road has been reported to both Western Downs Regional Council and Maranoa Regional Council by multiple people over time,” Ms Boland said.

“Both councils regularly access the road and regularly fill in a few of the holes but they never seem to last.”

Many of the residents who access the road are seniors and for Ms Boland, this is a safety concern.

“My biggest fear is the road will become so damaged that the residents of the road won’t be able to get out or even worse that emergency vehicles and trucks won’t be able to get in.

“Most trucks won’t drive on the edges of the road anymore because they know if they clip something they could topple over.”

Ms Boland said she is aware of damage that has been caused to vehicles including blown tyres, broken windscreens, and truck accidents such as cattle trucks toppling over to name a few.

“The damage to the road is that bad, you have trouble driving in a straight line because you’re constantly left to dodge the potholes,” she said.

Maranoa Regional Council Mayor Tyson Golder said it is a TMR issue and that he supports the petition.

“Maranoa Regional Council has been advocating for an upgrade of the road and personally, I believe it needs to be done,” Cr Golder said.

“For the amount of traffic the road gets, it’s of really poor standard.”

Western Downs Regional Council was unable to comment at this time, however, they have suggested Ms Boland contact TMR about the issue.

# ‘Early works’ still on for the Rockhampton Ring Road

Early works for the Rockhampton Ring Road project have been confirmed to continue, but without a Federal Government commitment to the overall project, it’s just “smoke and mirrors” according to the Start Rockhampton Ring Road group’s Jack Trenaman.

The Ring Road is planned to link the Bruce Highway through Rockhampton extending from the Capricorn Highway (Nelson St), to the Rockhampton-Yeppoon Road/Bruce Highway intersection and include a new crossing of the Fitzroy River at Pink Lily.

The project is jointly funded by the Federal Government, which is providing \$852 million, and the State Government, which is providing \$213 million.

Rockhampton MP Barry O’Rourke said \$12 million worth of works funded by the State Government would get underway this month. This will focus on relocating utilities and other preparation works.

“These works will mean we can get on with the job faster once heavy construction gets underway,” he said.

“Despite misinformation being peddled by the LNP, the Rockhampton Ring Road has not been cut and will be going ahead, which is why these early works will continue.”

Mr O’Rourke said he would continue fighting to bring the start of construction forward.

Jack Trenaman, CEO of SMW Group and part of the group of local business leaders fighting for the project, said State and Federal politicians didn’t seem to be on the same page when it came to the Ring Road.

“Are we getting the full allocation to do the project or not, that’s what everyone’s asking, otherwise it’s just ‘smoke and mirrors’ nonsense,” he said.

“We already knew there was \$60 million in ongoing works, because the land resumptions haven’t long finished, so you can start some service works that were always going to have to continue.

“Meanwhile the project is deferred indefinitely, that’s why everyone is up in arms.

“Like it says on the back of our shirts, just keep your promises.”

Keppel MP Brittany Lauga said the early works would continue until late 2023, with the jobs going to local workers.

“The works are part of a huge infrastructure pipeline in Central Queensland, which includes the \$80 million Rockhampton - Yeppoon Road upgrade, and the \$19 million upgrade of Rockhampton - Emu Park Road, with heavy construction on both projects just around the corner,” she said.

“The federal budget also delivered \$200 million in new funding for the Bruce Highway between Rockhampton and Gladstone, and \$400 million in new funding for beef and cattle corridors which will include roads in Central Queensland.

“Along with another \$400 million towards the Inland Freight Route, the second Bruce Highway - taking the total to \$800 million, plenty of which will go towards key roads in Central Queensland.

“This means there is work on the way for our local contractors, and suppliers.”

Federal Capricornia MP Michelle Landry said Transport and Main Roads Minister Mark Bailey and CQ’s local Labor members “seem to love taking credit for everyone’s hard work”.

“The Rockhampton-Yeppoon Road upgrade is 80 per cent funded by the Federal

Government and it’s funding I had committed,” she said.

“We completed the Rockhampton Northern Access Upgrade with \$155.2 million in federal funding, the Rockhampton to Gracemere Duplication with \$59.99 million in federal funding, and Stage 2 of the Yeppen Bridge Project with \$136 million in federal funding.

“We also unlocked \$50 million in federal funding for the Rockhampton Ring Road to undertake geotechnical investigations, flood modelling, risk analysis and to develop a staged delivery works package. We also committed \$400 million towards the Inland Freight Route during the 2022 Federal Election, which Labor has decided to match after being dragged kicking and screaming.”

She asked why it took the pressure of a public rally and businesspeople travelling to Canberra and Brisbane to get any movement on the project.

“I call on the Member for Rockhampton and the Member for Keppel to explain what is happening to the remaining \$988 million in funding remaining,” she said.

“There is still a long way to go before the community can feel confident in any announcements made by the Member for Rockhampton and Member for Keppel, who didn’t attend the Start Rockhampton Ring Road rally and who are shirking any and all responsibility for delaying the project.”

A solo oboe in the outback, a brass trio on the beach and a string quartet in the rainforest... despite being the state's leading music makers, Queensland Symphony Orchestra (QSO) believe they just might have also created possibly the best tourism video ever.

Longreach has featured heavily as QSO's Season 2023 shines the light on music and celebrates some of the state's most beautiful and iconic locations – from the beach to the rainforest, and the Outback to the city.

The season video, called Sounds Like Queensland, together with images in the season brochure, were shot to reinforce that QSO is an Orchestra for all Queenslanders! Every year QSO tours across Queensland, sharing music with people from the outback to the beach, the rainforest to the city, performing on dusty regional stages, in tiny town halls, schools from Townsville to Toowoomba and Longreach to the Gold Coast, and of course in the mighty Concert Hall at QPAC. "How he has woven together the narrative of our musicians against the backdrop of Queensland landscapes is a testament to his skill and creativity."

"We wanted to capture iconic Queensland locations, so we settled upon the Outback, Rainforest, Beach and City," Renee explained.

"Our musicians were touring to Longreach in March this year, so we jumped at the opportunity to go with them.

Then working as a drama teacher, Glenn Robbins (who played Kath's lovable butcher husband in the classic comedy *Kath & Kim*) recalls catching kids having a "sneak pash" behind the shelter sheds while on yard duty. He drew on that memory when he and co-star Jane Turner were workshopping ideas for how to make the TV couple's uncomfortable levels of PDA funny.

"What struck me is they got their mouth ready a bit too early," he says of his former students' romantic efforts.

"I thought why don't we try this thing where we get our mouths ready too early too.

"So, we did that, and would close our eyes and then just hope we hit the mark. That's kind of all it was. Just an adolescent style of kissing that I noticed when I was teaching."

Before finding fame on sketch comedy shows such as *The Comedy Company* and then later *Fast Forward* and *Full Frontal*, Robbins had trained as a drama teacher.

But he spent most of his short-lived school career working as an emergency teacher where he would simply tell the students to get on with their existing work while he read a book.

Robbins quickly shoots down the idea that he must have been a cool teacher, pointing out that there is now a Facebook page of past pupils devoted to criticising his classroom performances.

"I don't have Facebook, but people tell me about it," he says.

"I would have been up late doing gigs and would have been feeling poorly [in the classroom the next day]. So, I don't think their experiences with me were that good, but it was alright."

His performance as Kel on *Kath & Kim*, however, has scored him far more favourable reviews from audiences young and old.

While some comedies do not stand the test of time, their politics or social commentary dating the humour as culture and appetites change, *Kath & Kim*'s gentle jokes continue to land even with audiences who weren't yet born when the show was made.

"There is so much love for *Kath & Kim*, it's unbelievable," he says.

"A lot of people were thankful that during Covid, they were able to go back and watch it and that it made them happy during that really tough time.

"And a guy came up to me in a park yesterday to say he'd just been diagnosed with cancer and that he

wanted to thank me for helping to make him happy during a really hard time. Hearing something like that [to know you've helped someone], it doesn't get any better than that."

Robbins also isn't ashamed to admit that he too is one of the iconic show's devoted fans.

"We continue to watch *Kath & Kim* at home because my partner loves it," Robbins says.

"So, I haven't left it and then come back 20 years later and looked at all the footage.

"If I am on a plane, I'll watch it. If there's nothing on and we want something quick to watch before we go to bed, then I'll put it on. I really enjoy watching it. It really makes me laugh.

"I know it's me in it but there's nothing wrong with that because I see Kel through objective eyes."

Of course, it's not just the scripted parts of the show, which make Robbins laugh. He also gets a kick out of being

reminded of the behind-the-scenes hilarity on set. In that regard, *Kath & Kim* is a bit like watching an old home movie, taking the comedian back to fun times with his good friends.

Robbins recalls the dance sequences he filmed with Turner being a regular source of on-set delight.

While some routines were professionally choreographed, Robbins says Turner would often whisper to him just before the cameras started rolling: "Let's just go for it!" Her spur-of-the-moment shimmies and lunges would often have Robbins so amused that he'd have to add in a quick dance turn to avoid looking directly at his co-star for fear of getting the giggles.

In fact, Robbins believes that apart from the "brilliant scripts", it is the friendship and chemistry between the core cast that is a large part of what makes it so watchable.

"You can't fake that sort of energy," he says.

That's why Robbins regularly turns down offers to appear as Kel at events or to play him in an advertising campaign. To his mind, Kel isn't a solo act but part of a five-piece ensemble that includes Turner, Gina Riley (Kim), Magda Szubanski (Sharon) and his former housemate Pete Rowsthorn (Brett).

To mark the 20th anniversary of the series, the five stars came together to film two Channel Seven specials. A mix of never-before-seen

footage, bloopers and new material which, Robbins says, will shed light on where the Fountain Lakes crew are in 2022, the two specials will be a hit with fans.

They also feature highlights from Kylie Minogue, Shane Warne, Barry Humphries and some of the many other celebrities who appeared in the four seasons and two movies.

It was Robbins who persuaded his good mate to play the part of a Warne impersonator. Bypassing the spin king's agents, Robbins called his golfing partner directly and told him that there was a role on the show for him. Warne jumped at the opportunity and was hilarious in the role.

There was just one hitch. Warne struggled to be believably bad at bowling.

"So, we said: 'Hey Shane, play left-handed' so you look a bit more uncoordinated, and he still played well," Robbins says affectionately.

"In the end, we had to cut around that scene to make him look slightly uncoordinated. I have such fond memories of filming with him."

For Robbins the anniversary was also a great excuse to get the old band back together.

"Jane lives overseas now," he explains.

"And I don't see the other girls that much either. Pete lives in Perth."

"I don't work that much now and really, we only did get together for work. As much as I'd love to see more of them, we don't we don't really catch up that much. It's a shame, really."

"So, it was so good to see them after such a long time."

# Geared up for bright future

Jared Rogers is the The Motor Trades Association of Queensland (MTA) Institute apprentice of the month for October 2022.

The 16-year-old is a mobile plant apprentice with CCC Rural, a business that runs a number of large cattle properties and is based near the town of Alpha, about 160km west of Emerald.

Impressing both his employers and his MTA Institute trainer, Andrew Keys, with his hard work, ability, and developing skills, Jared is getting what might be considered a uniquely Australian experience from his apprenticeship.

Working on a huge variety of machinery, both big and small, Jared's job can see him maintaining and repairing equipment at the CCC workshop or be out and about somewhere on the company's properties that pepper the vast outback region.

You've got to be a little bit tough out here as the climate can be extreme, the days can be long, and the work may have to be done in some pretty remote spots.

"I work on anything from D11 bulldozers to cars, prime mover trucks, graders, loaders, right down to little Honda pumps and even lawnmowers," said Jared.

"CCC hire out a few machines, so we sometimes have to travel to fix them, or we may have to go out and do that work on their other properties.

"It's nearly 400km from one property to another so if something breaks down there, we go and camp down for a couple of nights - It's a lot of fun.

"In the summer, mid-40s is a half-cool day out here and when you wake up at 5 o'clock it can already be 35 degrees," he added with a chuckle.

"In the winter, it gets down to negative 5 or 6. It makes you sweat all summer and you can't get out of a jumper all winter!"

"Our biggest issue is getting parts," he added.

"It might take a week for something to come by freight for us to fix something, so sometimes, when we need something in a hurry, we might have to drive to Emerald or even Rocky to get parts."

Today, Jared is part of a small team - Jeff and his son Joshua - that work to maintain the CCC machinery, with Andrew from the MTA Institute travelling to oversee his training.

The Institute's delivery method - of a trainer going to the workplace of the apprentice - obviously works well for an apprentice, and a business, located so far from a major regional centre.

"It works out really well," said Jared.

"And Andrew has been a really good trainer."

Born and raised in the region, Jared has no intention of leaving once he completes his trade.

Instead, living and working out in the region, and helping more young people gain a trade, is the first thing he mentions when asked about where his future might lie.

"Once I am qualified, I think I might like to start my own little mobile business and work in the remote communities out here," he said.

"I'd like to maybe help out other apprentices too when I am qualified."

## Salmon with Miso Tahini Sauce

**Serves:** 4

**Prep time:** 20 minutes

**Cook time:** 30 minutes

**2 serves per portion**

### Ingredients:

- 2 teaspoons extra virgin olive oil
- 4 salmon fillets, skin on
- White sesame seeds, to serve
- 1 bunch asparagus
- 1 bunch bok choy, roughly chopped
- 1 radish, thinly sliced
- 2 small carrots, thinly sliced

### Sauce

- ¼ cup warm water
- 1 tablespoon white miso paste
- 1/3 cup tahini
- 1 teaspoon orange zest
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon coriander leaves, finely chopped
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce, reduced salt

### Method:

- HEAT olive oil in frypan over medium heat.

- FRY the salmon skin side down first, for 6 minutes each side or until just cooked through. Set aside and sprinkle with sesame seeds.
- STIR FRY the vegetables in frypan until lightly browned.
- ARRANGE the salmon and vegetables on serving plates.
- WHISK sauce ingredients together in a small bowl until combined. Add more water for a thinner sauce if preferred.
- DRIZZLE sauce over salmon and greens.

### What's Great About It?

Miso is a fermented paste which provides the gut with lots of beneficial bacteria. This recipe works great with any combination of vegetables. Wombok, spring onion and snow peas would also work well. You can try the miso tahini sauce on any salad you enjoy!

## Tomato and Basil Soup

**Serves:** 4

**Prep time:** 10 minutes

**Cook time:** 20 minutes

**2 serves per portion**

### Ingredients:

- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 2 bacon rashers, fat trimmed
- 2 brown onions, diced
- 1kg tomatoes, roughly chopped
- 1 cup water
- Handful of fresh basil leaves, roughly chopped
- Black pepper

### Method:

- HEAT oil in a frypan over medium heat. Fry bacon and onion until onion becomes translucent.
- BOIL tomatoes in a saucepan of water until soft.

- POUR tomato mixture through a colander, skin will remain, and tomato will be left smooth.
- ADD tomato to bacon and onion, stir through fresh basil.
- SERVE with cracked black pepper to taste.

This delightful soup makes a great light lunch or snack, particularly in the warmer months. Try adding extra veggies like zucchini and cauliflower and pairing with a crusty wholemeal bread roll for a fuller meal.

# Wool market report

Although the Australian wool market has recorded another overall loss, falling for the third consecutive selling series, there were positive signs toward the end of the week and some small positive movements within individual microns and types.

After 9.6 per cent of the total national offering was withdrawn prior to the sale there was a total of 31,095 bales available to the trade.

This was 7,928 fewer bales than in the previous week.

The total amount offered this season is now only 9,000 bales higher than the same time last year, a small 1.4 per cent increase.

The largest losses were again felt on finer

merino fleece types in the Eastern centres.

This was reflected in the individual Micron Prices Guides (MPGs) in Sydney and Melbourne, which for 18 micron and finer fell by between 33 and 91 cents.

All other merino fleece MPGs ranged from -3 to -22 cents.

The AWEX Eastern Market Indicator (EMI) fell by 20 cents for the series, closing at 1,241 cents.

After hitting its lowest point on record last week, the 30.0 micron MPG in the South was one of only two to record a positive movement for the series, albeit a marginal 3-cent lift.

The EMI is now 78 cents lower than the corresponding sale of the previous season, a drop

of 5.9 per cent.

With the EMI slightly lower and the offering marginally higher, the total dollar amount of wool sold this season is currently sitting just above last year.

835 million dollars worth of wool has been sold, just over 11 million more than the previous season.

Another positive for the series was the EMI when viewed in USD terms.

After the AUD gained 1.3 cents compared to the USD, when viewed in USD terms the EMI recorded an increase, adding 3 US cents. Next week's offering increases.

Currently, there are expected to be 36,941 bales on offer.

## Global voice for sheep sector

The Global Sheep Producers Forum (GSPF) members will meet in Toronto for the 4th annual Global Sheep Forum.

Members of the GSPF include the American Lamb Board, Beef + Lamb New Zealand, British National Sheep Association, Canadian Sheep Federation, National Sheep Association, National Wool Growers' Association of South Africa, and Sheep Producers Australia (SPA).

The aim of the GSPF is to provide a common voice for the global sheep community that reflects our collective vision of the future sustainability of the sector. The GSPF strives to foster global collaboration in order to develop evidenced and united positions and collective actions that address the shared challenges and opportunities facing those in the sheep industry irrespective of global boundaries.

"The world's growing demand for sustainably produced food and fibre means that sheep production globally has the opportunity and responsibility to build confidence and trust in the integrity of sheepmeat products.

That's why collaborating, forming, and strengthening these relationships in the GSPF is so important," said Bonnie Skinner SPA CEO.

Sustainable sheep production across the world is based on providing consumers with high-quality food and fibre products in a way that sustains the sheep industry and its families supports rural communities and improves the capacity of the environment to provide for the needs of future generations.

"The GSPF was developed to provide a platform for collaboration across the global sheep community to work together on demonstrating and improving sustainable sheep production and to support and mentor the next generation. If production is sustainable, then people, businesses, animals, and the environment all benefit," said Ms Skinner.

## Concerns on emissions

Farmers are calling for greater face-to-face support and information to take action on-farm to reduce emissions, in a new poll today by Farmers for Climate Action.

Farmers for Climate Action, an organisation representing more than 7000 Australian farmers, is calling for a national policy for climate change and agriculture and will be releasing a report on what this should include early next year.

Farmers for Climate Action CEO, Dr Fiona Davis, said the key findings of the poll of more than 550 farmers were:

90 per cent of farmers are keen to trial new technology to reduce emissions but insufficient information and the cost of finance are the two biggest barriers to change.

93 per cent of farmers are prepared to change farming practices if it would benefit them and have a positive impact on climate change, yet 79 per cent of farmers have not been involved in a practical, on-farm emissions extension program.

"The survey confirmed farmers are leading the way on emissions reduction through planting trees, investing in cheap renewable energy and experimenting with seaweed feeds which reduce methane," Dr Davis said.

"But it also signals to the government that farmers want to go further.

"The survey reveals opportunities to help farmers by rolling out ground staff to run carbon and methane reduction demonstration programs. Extension officers, who visit farms to run practical workshops, are part of the answer here.

"Farmers are also excited to embrace clean energy technologies but are clearly looking to the government to provide support through financing options and education about what technology options are out there for farmers.

"Agriculture needs its own climate policy because, as the pandemic and recent global conflicts have demonstrated, a local food supply is not optional."

The sheep industry here in Australia enjoys freedom from many of the world's major diseases, including foot and mouth disease (FMD), sheep pox and scrapie, which can have devastating consequences for long-term sustainability.

But the recent incursions of varroa mite in the honeybee industry and Japanese encephalitis affecting pigs, and the threat posed by FMD being present in Indonesia, show that our island geography and excellent biosecurity standards cannot always prevent pests and diseases.

There is no such thing as zero risk. It's critical that the sheep industry remains alert and adaptable and avoids complacency, particularly in implementing biosecurity practices and traceability systems that will guard against incursions and minimise their impact.

Everyone has a role to play, from livestock producers to supply chain participants to government and the community in general.

This means ensuring sound biosecurity practices. Control the entry of people, vehicles and animals onto your property; ask for health declarations for all purchased or agisted livestock; make sure that anyone or anything that does enter the property is appropriately treated or disinfected; and inspect and quarantine introduced animals, to ensure that any diseases or parasites are detected before they join the rest of the flock or herd.

Freedom from disease means we need fewer chemical, antimicrobial and other treatments to maintain high levels of health and welfare in our sheep, and it minimises the impact of diseases we already have, such as footrot and lice, as well as noxious weeds.

And it gives our sheep products an international trading advantage – Australia has a high degree of market access and a reputation for products that are clean, green and safe to use. But it's the growth in global trade and interaction between countries, combined with climate change, that is expanding the reach of exotic diseases across borders.

The Sheep Sustainability Framework (SSF) has four distinct themes: Caring for

our Sheep, Enhancing the Environment and Climate, Looking after our People, Customers and Community, and Ensuring a Financially Resilient Industry. These are not ranked in order of importance. They are all interdependent.

The impact of climate change is closely linked with animal health and welfare, biosecurity and market access. As the world's climate changes, the industry is facing the impact of rainfall variability, temperature fluctuations, and natural disasters.

As temperatures increase, changes in rainfall and humidity affect the reproduction and geographic spread of pests and disease vectors such as flies, ticks, and mosquitoes. Biosecurity risks from climate change can seriously impact market access and the financial resilience of the sheep industry.

The simple reality is that disease does not respect boundaries. This makes traceability systems like the National Livestock Identification System (NLIS) and programs like Livestock Production Assurance (LPA) critical to the prevention, identification, control and elimination of a disease outbreak, and shares the responsibility for monitoring across industry, regardless of state and territory boundaries.

Electronically identified livestock (eID) can be traced with greater efficiency and accuracy than visually identified livestock. The faster that livestock can be traced, the

greater the chance of controlling a disease outbreak and minimising its economic and social effects.

An outbreak of an emergency animal disease like FMD in Australia would be devastating. Even if it was quickly contained and eradicated, it would still take around 18 months before we could return to a formal status of freedom without vaccination, and regain the market access we have now.

Effective traceability relies inherently on industry compliance and national consistency.

When systems are fully supported and activated, the benefits of improved traceability to biosecurity and market access will accrue across the entire value chain.

The beef industry is already seeing a spreading of insect pests like ticks and buffalo flies and some internal parasites are becoming either more localised or concentrated, or more widely distributed.

We will need to work smarter and more collaboratively, harnessing technology and data to drive biosecurity innovation.

Biosecurity impacts on the health of the flock, the viability of farmers, the reputation of Australia as a premium trading partner, and the sustainability of the sheep industry, and traceability is a key element to ensure we stay healthy for the long term.

To quote Thomas Jefferson, 'The price of freedom is eternal vigilance.'

# ALP to honour Ag Visa to include Vietnam

A Senate Estimates hearing has confirmed that the Federal Labor Government will honour the Ag Visa to include Vietnam, as established by the Coalition when in Government.

The Senate Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade Legislation Committee heard the visa will be given another name, but importantly, was being honoured.

Federal Member for Dawson Andrew Willcox welcomed the news saying that it will make a big difference for the agricultural sector and help ease cost of living pressures.

"The Ag Visa is a common sense approach to relieving workforce shortages and helping to reduce the cost of living for everyday Australians," Mr Willcox said.

"I am proud to see the National Party's hard

work and advocacy has paid off, creating real solution for our farmers, which will go on to provide relief for shoppers at the supermarket check outs.

"If we don't have the labour force to help get our product from the paddock to the shelf, then the cost of fresh fruit and vegetables will only go up.

"The Ag Visa goes a long way to boost our economy and provide workforce reprieve for our primary producers, bringing skilled, semi-skilled and unskilled labour into the country."

When Labor were elected to Federal Government, they declined to continue the Ag Visa program which was designed to supplement the Pacific Australia Labour Mobility (PALM) Scheme for workers from southeast Asia.

Since June, the PALM Scheme has brought in just 10,800 workers, which is simply not enough, Mr Willcox said.

Now that Vietnam is finally included, he is urging the government to expand workforce options to include more countries.

"It made absolutely no sense to discontinue the Ag Visa. It's clear that the PALM scheme alone is insufficient to meet the labour demand. All over Australia, and particularly in Dawson, primary producers are under enormous pressure to secure a reliable workforce at harvest time," Mr Willcox said.

"To reduce cost of living pressures you need real solutions. The Ag Visa will go a long way towards this, lowering costs at the supermarket checkout."

## Pigface a colourful option

Have you been thinking about preparing a colourful ground covering feature for your garden?

That was a question I was asked this week.

And to answer to that is not that easy as there are so many superb flowering ground covers available to gardeners these days.

There is one groundcover though that has kind of fallen out of favour in recent years with gardeners that should be given a go.

That is the Pigface or Lampranthus.

Wildly regarded as having one of the most spectacular displays of bright flowers in the succulent world.

Lampranthus will form a dense low-growing mat that is perfect for rock gardens on steep slopes or embankments in mass plantings.

For the best results use these plants either in small groups directly in the garden or in window boxes and planter boxes.

One of the best examples of Lampranthus growing planter boxes is in front of the Alpha Chemist.

For many years now I have admired the cascading mass floral display no matter what time of the year.

The vibrant flowers of the Lampranthus are in various colour shades of orange, pink, red, white, and yellow as well some bicoloured varieties.

The flowers of the Lampranthus open in the morning and close in the late afternoon.

Their massed blooms are at their best at this time of the year but the plants will have some flowers during other times of the year.

Noting that these plants require sunny areas to flower at their best.

Added to the floral appeal is the attractive pale green to bluish succulent foliage on the Lampranthus.

Which are short and waxy and range from cylindrical to triangular shapes.

Gardeners have found Lampranthus relatively easy to grow in a sunny well-drained position.

While these plants are frost tender many gardeners have successfully grown Lampranthus in frosty areas if they are planted in a sheltered position.

After the last few dry years, many gardeners have started to look for plants that can withstand periods of drought.

And Lampranthus is one of a few species that will withstand drought very well and do not require a lot of maintenance.

But like Superman, the Lampranthus also has its kryptonite—for the Lampranthus it is having wet feet.

Wet or poorly drained positions are not suitable for planting Lampranthus.

These are very hardy plants with very few pest problems.

I have only received a couple enquires about pest problems over the last decade.

That pest problem was scale, which can be a problem with all dense foliage plants.

Lampranthus is a fairly large genus that consists of 227 species and 13 varieties and is one of the largest genera in the Aizoaceae family.

The genus name comes from the Greek words lampros, meaning bright, and anthos, meaning flower.

They are native from South Africa's eastern cape to southern Namibia.

There is an Australian native Pigface called *Carpobrotus glaucescens*, and this plant can be found in many coastal gardens.

It has large succulent leaves much larger than the Lampranthus. It is one of the prettiest flowering native groundcovers, bearing pink to mauve or yellow shaded flowers that can be 4-6cm in diameter during spring and summer.

I have only grown Lampranthus by cuttings, which are best taken in either around the Easter weekend or during August and September.

If you were to grow Lampranthus by seed the best time to sow them would be during the warmer months.

So if you are thinking about growing a very colourful ground covering feature for your garden why not give the Pigface or Lampranthus.

# Racing has rewards: The Archer prize money set to climb

"This significant prize money increase - facilitated largely by an increase in slot holder fee obligations - coupled with the race moving to a standalone Sunday, means our race day is

set for success.

"Thanks to Racing Queensland and our slot holders for enabling us to achieve this outcome so quickly."

Prior to last year's iteration, 11 slot holders committed to being a part of the concept for three years, with the last place in the race auctioned off at a club function.

The inaugural running of The Archer attracted a stellar field of gallopers, including three Group 1 champions - Apache Chase, Streets Of Avalon and Tyzone - and a further seven individual black-type winners.

In what proved to be a nail-biting finish, Apache Chase led the race at every stage bar the shadows of the post, nabbed late by Emerald Kingdom for slot holders, Rob and Leonie Carr.

RQ EGM Operations Adam Wallish said the prize money increase for The Archer is befitting of its stature on the Queensland racing calendar.

"The first running of the Archer highlighted the appeal that this concept has nationwide, assembling a field littered with feature race winners," he said.

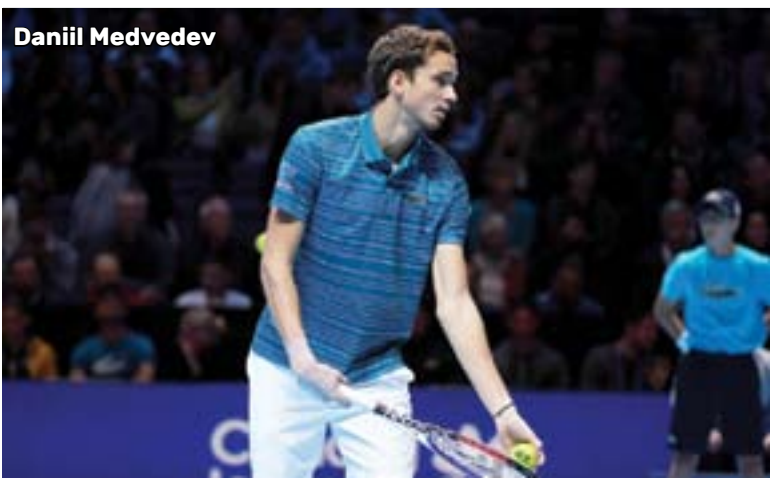

After finishing unplaced at Cunnamulla in a Stampede Qualifier Mori's Press was facing the last of two possible heats to make the final and nothing was left to chance when Richardson bounced the mare straight from the gates to the lead and then he extended the pressure with pace throughout the race before kicking clear on the home turn, holding off a strong finish by Wall Street Tycoon who had to circle the field from the back, running on gamely.

The other impressive win of the day came in the first race when Tower Road trained by Mark Oates and ridden by Anna Bakos, circled the field from the back and stormed away to win by almost two lengths over 1400 metres defeating Real Hussey and Gypsy Biker.

The Savabeel gelding was having only its second run after a year-long absence and had finished second at Cloncurry at its first up run.

Even though carrying 59.5 kilos Bakos was able to control the finish by sweeping on the leaders coming to the home turn and powering in the home straight to score a most impressive win.

Plenty of improvement should be left in this particular gelding going forward and even though Cups racing is basically finished for this year he is certainly a galloper to look forward to in the future.

Anna Bakos then booted home the second of her doubles on the Raymond Fraser-trained Short Takes in the Maiden Plate.

The four-year-old mare had taken 18 runs to score the maiden win but had been ultra-consistent with placings at its past eight runs.

Short Takes was able to come off the pace and beat leader All Sorted by a length with Nouverre Fille coming home from towards the back of the field into third place.

The Patrick O'Toole trained Kelmar, ridden by Jason Missen proved his liking for the Bench-

mark 65 handicap conditions over the 1200m.

Kelmar has been racing well when placed in benchmark races as he appears to be just short of the top level of open company sprinters but

when in the benchmark races he is proving very competitive and has now had three wins in recent times in those conditions.

He was able to lead all the way for Missen

and hold off the consistent Sacred Stream with last-start winner New York World turning in a pleasing third.
