The egg - delicious as it is - is supposed to represent new life.

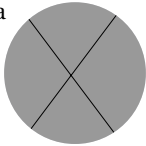
I think that was a theme this week.

Airport marks milestone

Longreach's airport terminal is celebrating its 10th anniversary since construction and also 10 years since being taken over by Queensland Airports.

The airport has a rich history as the birthplace of Qantas and as a military airfield in World War 2.

Regional General Manager for Queensland Airports Brendan Cook said:

"It's been over ten years since we signed an agreement to lease the airport in 2012, and we've been a proud supporter of the community ever since that transaction was made.

"We're very passionate about regional Queensland and this is an important milestone to celebrate.

Mr Cook said a lot had changed for the airport over those ten years.

"Our passenger numbers have grown by more than ten per cent in that time.

"We've invested in infrastructure as part of

that procurement process, about \$15,000,000 was spent on overlaying the runway and a good new terminal.

"That terminal has been fit for purpose and really stood the test of time from a design perspective.

"Ten years later and it still looks brand new.

Queensland Airports have also installed a wildlife fence to ensure operations are safer, installed over 400 solar panels on the roof, and introduced security screening.

Mr Cook said the airport - along with Qantas Founders Museum next door - is a part of the fabric of the Longreach community.

"It's really about establishing that aviation backbone of regional Queensland," he said.

"We love to support the Qantas Founders Museum at certain events.

"We love to see those legacy planes over our fence as well."

It was the first wedding held at the publican and was officiated by Anglican Reverend Anne Nixon.

For the most part, Bluey has been a major part of the Longreach community makeup and Leigh arrived in Longreach only expecting to stay for six months. They met at the Longreach Bowls Club three years ago.

“I just really enjoyed the job and the town,” Leigh said.

“The team at health and the community were very welcoming and now I’m here.

“We met pretty much straight away down at the bowls club where I was with Dorry.

“She was the first friend I had met in town and she encouraged me to go.”

That was when she met Bluey the builder.

“When I found out that, I ran a mile because my first husband was also called Bluey the Builder,” she said.

Waltzing Matilda Day

A very successful two days in Winton saw many visitors and locals celebrate Waltzing Matilda Day.

On Wednesday bus driver Frank Standfast took a party to the Combo Waterhole—two hours by road but two days by Coach when Banjo Paterson came back into Winton from Dagworth in 1895.

A tour guide recounted the area's links to Banjo Paterson and the genesis of the song that is Australia's unofficial national anthem.

The billabongs were full of water, and indeed water was still trickling over the stone overshoots in places.

The party sang Waltzing Matilda at the Combo Waterhole site, heard about the 1894 shearers' strike and the death of Samuel Hoffmeister, and recalled the era when sheep were kings in this part of the country.

The party then boarded the bus and headed to the Kynuna Hotel—the Blue Heeler.

Banjo himself recorded that he had been at the hotel and had seen local graziers passing champagne through the window to the shearers outside.

The Blue Heeler Hotel hosted a great bar-b-que lunch.

As part of the activities at the Waltzing Matilda Centre the next day, Robyn Stephens had organised a colouring competition for the kiddies, local retired grazier Reg Kavanagh had some of John Paynter's sheep on site to demonstrate some aspect of the 'jumbuck' industry, Bente Moller held the attention of the big crowd with her spinning of the local fleece into wool yarn, and Shane Mann was popular with his talk about the opal industry, and even more so when he gave out bags of opal chips to all of the children.

And he made sure there was plenty of colour in the chips.

The day finished off with a whip-cracking school.

Other Waltzing Matilda Board directors Kim Stoter and Lyn Fraser were on hand to assist.

‘Magic-filled joyride’: Shazam 2 brings magic back to DC

However, there were concerns whether Sandberg could direct a follow-up that could top the simplistic brilliance of the first, and despite minor slip-ups along the way, the sequel's plot feels like a natural progression for Billy as he struggles to deal with the weight of being a saviour.

The interactions between him and his family feel earnest and natural, with very few scenes coming off as forced and a waste of time, and much like the first film, these are all bolstered by the terrific performances.

Zachary Levi once again excels in his portrayal of Shazam, with Asher Angel also

delivering a genuine performance as Levi's younger counterpart.

The two actors manifest their respective roles by making it feel like each version of Billy Batson is played by the same person despite their evident age difference.

DCU newcomers Rachel Zegler, Helen Mirren and Lucy Liu all deliver perfectly adequate performances, but despite her accomplished resume, Mirren felt like the weak link for much of the movie; an aspect which was sadly evident during pivotal moments in the third act.

One of the reasons the original performed so well was because of its down-to-earth screenplay which felt small-scale when compared to everything else in the DCU.

Fury of the Gods increases its stakes ten-fold, introducing cataclysmic threats that unfortunately don't mesh well with the constant humour being spouted.

Don't get me wrong—the humour being spouted still works on an elementary scale, but when combined with otherworldly threats and emotional character moments, they fail to work as effectively as they did in the 2019 predecessor.

But thankfully, the majority of the jokes are used during the film's downtime to bring levity to generic story tropes which are thankfully played off as being self-aware.

Shazam! Fury of the Gods is a perfectly fine superhero movie.

The film doesn't set out to change the game, instead embracing its simplistic formula by not attempting to overstep its boundaries by delivering a fun superhero romp.

T SEEMS fitting that Julia Morris and Dr Chris Brown enjoy their final jungle hurrah in the place where it all began almost a decade ago.

Gleeful to be once again filming live at Kruger National Park, Morris enthuses: "It is our spiritual home."

replicate the unique experience of sleeping under the stars in Africa.

"In the Australian bush there's not a better-than-even chance of being weed on by a baboon in your sleep," he says.

"That's the package we [once again] offer this time around."

The return to Africa is somewhat bittersweet for the duo. It will be Brown's last stint as Morris' co-host; the popular TV vet having recently

announced he was leaving Network 10 to take up new opportunities at Seven.

"I try not to think of it as my last one, and all we can really focus on is making sure that we have a really cracker series this time and just make the most of it because we love being over there," Brown offers of his departure from the show.

"And we have a lot of fun, way too much fun to call it a job. So, if it's never really felt like working, then you never really leave that work. So that's the way I'm seeing it."

Morris quickly interjects, with a hearty laugh: "And from my perspective, I am having a casting couch built, as we speak."

Of course, Brown's exit as host does now pave the way for him to return to the jungle in 2024 as a contestant.

"This is my backdoor into the show," Brown laughs.

"I have seen in the crew's eyes that they are hoping one day they could do it [assign a ghastly challenge] to me.

"It would be a great day to swap sides. I have always been a little jealous of the camaraderie. I am not jealous of the lack of food though."

Morris cackles that the production would "definitely turn up the evil" on the challenges should Brown ever find his way into the camp as a contestant.

Over the years, Brown has volunteered to test-run some of the challenges, while Morris isn't as keen.

"I have a crack at 70 per cent of it so that matches the wage gap," she jokes as Brown laughs heartily.

The chemistry between Morris and Brown is a large part of what has made *I'm a Celebrity* such a success. And, over the years and various shows they've co-hosted, they've developed a genuine friendship off-camera as well. As such, Brown has been a support to Morris during the breakdown of her marriage and as she has been nursing her father through palliative care.

He has also taken on child-minding duties for his co-star in the past. On one of their earlier travels to Africa, the amiable veterinarian took the comedian's two daughters out for the day while she relaxed at the hotel.

It was only later that Morris learned Brown had taken her girls on a hunt for the deadliest scorpion.

"Sophie still talks about that scorpion hunt," Morris says after exclaiming, with mock horror, her shock at seeing the photos of the poisonous insects climbing over her girls' shoes.

"Chris had thoughtfully brought along these ultraviolet torches for everyone. But basically, it was one more step and you're dead!"

“What lucky, lucky ducks they were [to have such an adventure]”

The girls have again travelled with Morris to Africa for this current season.

"I don't know if you'd say they were excited," she smiles.

"They were like: 'How long do we have to go to Africa for?' That's what I heard from them earlier this year. I was like: 'Don't even speak to me!'"

Now teenagers, the pair are possibly now more interested in meeting the celebrity contestants than Brown's creepy crawlies. But Morris never brings the girls on set.

She says having starstruck visitors on site could distract from the experience of leaving their celebrity lifestyles. Plus, she says, it felt like it would be "rubbing people's noses in it" to have her own kids in there when those inside the camp were missing their friends and loved ones.

Morris is rather less empathetic about the notoriously revolting and terrifying challenges that the celebrities must endure on the show. In previous seasons we have seen stage legend Rhonda Burchmore dryretch as she swallowed down raw fish eyeballs, popstar and host Toni Pearen get struck by a snake while locked in a box with the slithering reptiles and a terrified Myf Warhurst sliding down a sheer cliff-top.

say the nine years of TV torture, has actually made it easier to get the stars to sign up than when the show first launched in 2015.

And that's thanks to *I'm a Celebrity*'s proven track record for reinvigorating careers and revealing new sides to well-known personalities.

The pair believe winning the 2021 season amplified Abbie Chatfield's metamorphosis from *Bachelor* villain into astute social commentator.

"And Fev is one of the great examples of [someone] who was nothing like what I expected him to be," Morris says of 2016 winner Brendan Fevola.

"I had absolutely bought into the media feed about him [being a bad boy],"

Brown adds: "The fact that we got [conservative commentator] Steve Price to do aqua aerobics and bare his soul is something that we'll hang on to for a long time."

"I think he's mentioned it on *The Project* a few times too."

The pair enthuse that almost everyone had left camp with good things to say about the experience.

"That bloody Tom Arnold thought everyone slipped off to a hotel at the weekend!" Morris exclaims.

"We were like: 'What are you talking about?'"

"Tom Arnold is probably the only one who hasn't come out and found it an incredibly profound experience."

"And that's not to imbue it with some depth. But I don't think anyone realises how resilient they are until they are put to the test."

The fifth instalment in the long-running franchise, *CSI: Vegas* is unashamedly formulaic and nostalgic, with crime lab scenes reigning supreme. To fans' delight, *CSI* stalwart Marg Helgenberger (pictured) bolstered the ranks by joining the cast, which also stars Mandeep Dhillon (*After Life*) and Matt Lauria (*Friday Night Lights*), for its second season. Of course, there's predictably some oddly compelling scenarios thrown into the mix. Tonight, in "Third Time's the Charm", the curious case involves the death of competitive-eating contestant.

GRAND DESIGNS ABC TV, Sunday, 7.30pm

This iconic series returns with its 20th season, celebrating two decades of optimistic homeowners (wrongly) declaring: "We'll be in by Christmas!". Over the years, a smorgasbord of inspiring, different and usually very expensive builds have been documented. Sardonic host Kevin McCloud (pictured) still admirably sports an eagle-eyed enthusiasm and entertaining candour, and this new batch of builds and owners is intriguing as ever. Tonight, McCloud meets Colin and Adele, following the couple's stunningly designed yet fraught dream-build journey, which would reduce most to a broken mess. Of course, they doggedly declare that the emotional and financial turmoil was worth it.



MY NAME IS REEVA: I WAS MURDERED BY OSCAR PISTORIUS SBS, Monday, 8.35pm

This three-part documentary is a devastating rumination on grief, justice and the nature of truth. More than 10 years after Oscar Pistorius shot and killed his girlfriend Reeva Steenkamp (pictured) on Valentine's Day, the Paralympian is due for parole. Filmmaker Warren Batchelor presents an intimate portrait of Steenkamp, endorsed by her parents Barry and June, who share their innermost thoughts and feelings, as well as access to personal home footage. It also follows the confronting victim-offender dialogue process, which sees Barry take the difficult step of meeting with his daughter's killer.

Spotlight on Pride of India

One small tree that has really been admired this Summer is the Pride of India or Lagerstroemia indica.

Right across Central Queensland, this small tree has been producing stunning flowering displays.

The Lagerstroemia indica or more commonly known as the Crepe Myrtle is a great small tree for smaller gardens and would be amongst the world's best flowering trees.

In Autumn the mid-green leaves turn yellow, orange or red before falling to the ground giving Autumn colours.

These trees are available in a wide range of flowering colours from white, pink, red, mauve or purple flowering best in late summer.

The petals of these trees are ruffled, with a crepe-like texture which gives the name Crepe Myrtle.

These flowers will attract bees and butterflies to the garden.

Crepe myrtles are best described as a deciduous tree between 6-8m tall but can be severely pruned and grown as a shrub 3-4m tall.

Another feature of the Crepe Myrtle is its attractive bark that is smooth, pinkish-grey and mottled that peels away in layers each year.

Crepe Myrtle grows best in a sunny well-drained position with humus-rich moist soil that is well-mulched.

Water regularly when establishing, however after the first year Crepe Myrtle should not require watering that much water.

Crepe Myrtles are native to Eastern Asia and have been grown in Central Queensland for almost 100 years due to the hardness of the tree.

It is resistant to powdery mildew, a fungal disease that is difficult to control with fungicides.

In recent years a number of miniature Crepe Myrtle hybrids have become available to local gardens.

Some of these hybrids only grow to a 1m by 1m these hybrids would be perfect for growing in containers.

If your garden has a need for a small tree, why not think of planting a Crepe Myrtle or Lagerstroemia indica?

TRANSPLANT SHRUBS SOON

Normally by the end of April, it would be very safe to say that most shrubs could be transplanted by now.

But this year March and April have been so warm it is advisable to hold back for another 2 to 3 weeks.

Any way most gardeners are still mowing almost weekly or finding every available moment is spent weeding.

Winter is the best time to move any palm, shrub or small trees that are not doing as well

as they should in their present position.

This time of the year is also the best time to plant those extra-large plants in the garden.

To start the transplanting process and before the root ball can be lifted, make a similar-sized hole in the new position to take the plant.

It will need to be a fraction wider than the root ball, so that plenty of good soil can be worked in, around and below the old roots.

Next, trim the plant, removing up to one-third of the foliage.

A general rule, top growth should be reduced to a similar proportion to the root system.

Spray the remaining foliage with a protective product that will reduce water loss through the leaves.

Products like Eco-hydrate or Yates Drought Shield will help the plant to survive its transplanting ordeal.

The night before you intend to move the tree, water the root zone so it's thoroughly soaked when you start digging.

I even add some half-strength Charlie Carp liquid fertiliser at this time.

Then lift the plants by first using the shovel to dig a line around the drip line of the plant, making as clean a cut in the ground as possible; then working the spade deeper and under the root structure.

Soak liberally once the plant has been shifted to the new hole, but do not feed any fertiliser at this stage.

This is also important if you add too much

nitrogen to transplanted plants.

You force the plant to put on too much new growth and that stresses the plant.

If you have to stake the plant always use three posts method.

That is using materials like timber stakes or even metal star pickets.

I would recommend using material like hessian tape for the timber stakes.

By the time we start getting warmer spring weather, the transplanted shrubs should be in a good position to start producing masses of new-growth foliage, and extending their root system.

This would be the time to use a good organic fertiliser.

Strong demand for exports

Wheat and barley prices were flat to slightly lower over the month of March.

The Rural Bank monthly report stated the Australian APW Wheat Index was A\$6 per tonne lower and the barley index was down A\$7 per tonne.

Export demand for both wheat and barley remains strong.

However, plentiful supplies mean that buyers are mostly patient in their accumulation.

Meanwhile on the grower side, they continue to sell where it makes sense on profit but are not pressured or in a rush to get rid of any unsold grain.

Hence the market remains in a sideways trading pattern.

On the domestic side things remain relatively steady.

However, Meat and Livestock Australia are

projecting lower numbers of cattle on feed in coming months which could see feed prices in eastern states ease.

Shipping stem data shows that Australia exported a record 5.11 million tonnes of bulk grain in March.

This surpassed the previous monthly record of 4.59 million tonnes set in December 2022 by 11 per cent.

Wheat accounted for 63 per cent of all exports with 3.22 million tonnes shipped.

The Asian region continues to account for most of Australia's wheat exports with China the number one destination by country. Current wheat exports into China for the period October to March have totalled 4.35 million tonnes.

The demand side of the equation for wheat has been more in focus in the past quarter but

will soon be taken over by weather drivers as this will dictate new crop outcomes.

Supply side issues will start to become more of a concern from the start of April onwards and start to exert more of an influence on pricing and markets.

Uncertainty around the new crop outlook often provides potential for price rallies for the period April through to June.

Average to above average rainfall has improved soil moisture conditions across Australia's cropping regions.

This has allowed some early planting of dual-purpose crops and some canola.

But by and large the full seeding program won't kick off until around ANZAC Day.

Growers will be looking for April to deliver another month of averted above average rainfall to kick off the 2023-24 campaign.

Farmers optimistic of China barley ban ending

Australian farmers are hopeful a breakthrough in a trade dispute with China over barley could pave the way for restrictions on other goods to be eased.

The federal government has paused its World Trade Organisation dispute against Beijing for imposing hefty tariffs on barley.

Australian exports of the grain have effectively been blocked from entering China due to a more than 80 per cent tariff since 2020.

Beijing will conduct a review of the tariffs in the next three to four months after which the WTO case will resume if no agreement is reached.

China's executive vice minister of foreign affairs, Ma Zhaoxu, will hold talks in Canberra with senior trade officials during a visit to Australia on Wednesday.

National Farmers' Federation chief executive Tony Mahar said the trading breakthrough was reassuring.

He said other items subject to hefty tariffs could possibly re-enter the Chinese market in the future.

"The constructive approach from both countries progressing with this issue is in the longer-term interests of all parties and Aus-

tralian farmers," Mr Mahar said.

"We look forward to a positive outcome through this review process and hope to see quick progress on removing trade barriers for rock lobster and wine."

The four Australian export products at the

centre of the dispute with Beijing are barley, wine, meat and crayfish.

Foreign Minister Penny Wong said the government was working as quickly as possible to remove the trade impediments.

"This is all about working to try and resolve this more quickly because of course Australian barley growers and communities that depend on barley would welcome a return of access to the Chinese market," she told Nine's Today Show on Wednesday.

Senator Wong said wine exports were the next trade issue the government wanted to address.

Australian Grape and Wine board member Nikki Palun said the industry had built a lot of long-term relations in China before the tariffs and was cautiously optimistic about the resumption of trade.

"We're looking at the barley as a template, as a way forward for the Australian wine industry," she told ABC TV.

"We're very hopeful that a negotiated outcome rather than direct action with the WTO will bode well for the Australian wine industry."

But Senator Wong said Australian exporters would need to rely less on the Chinese market.

"We know we're not going to be able to continue to separate our economic and strategic relationship," she said.

"Australian producers, whether of barley or wine, are going to have to look to diversify markets."

Ms Palun said winemakers have had initial success in the US and were looking to diversify into Japanese, British, South Korean and Indian markets.

"But it's very difficult for us to have one single market absorb the volume we used to export to China," she said.

She said about 95 per cent of wine went to China before the sanctions but the resumption of trade "will be in quite a different fashion".

Senator Wong said the government was working to improve the relationship with Beijing to ensure trade disputes did not happen again in the future.

A spokesman for China's Foreign Ministry said the country was looking to collaborate to restore the trade relationship.

"China is willing to work with Australia to return relations onto the right track," he said.

China remains Australia's largest trading partner, with the relationship worth \$300 billion last year.

Pumpkin, Polenta and Herb Muffins

Serves: 12

Prep time: 15 minutes

Cook time: 30-35 minutes

🍴 ½ serve per portion

Ingredients:

- 300g pumpkin, peeled and cut into 4cm pieces
- 1 cup wholemeal flour, self-raising
- ½ cup flour, self-raising
- 1 cup instant polenta
- ½ small red capsicum, very finely chopped
- 1 tablespoon thyme leaves
- 2 tablespoons pepitas (pumpkin seeds)
- 1 cup natural yoghurt
- 2 eggs
- 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 cup cheddar cheese, grated
- 1 tablespoon parmesan cheese, grated

Method:

- **PREHEAT** oven to 200°C. Line a 12-hole muffin pan with baking paper.
- **STEAM** the pumpkin for 5-10 minutes, or until soft, then mash with a fork and let cool.
- **COMBINE** the flours, polenta, capsicum, thyme and half the pepitas in a large bowl, making a well in the centre.
- **WHISK** the yoghurt, eggs and oil in a separate bowl until combined.
- **STIR** the mashed pumpkin and cheeses through the egg mixture. Pour into the dry ingredients and gently stir until just combined.
- **DIVIDE** the batter evenly among the muffin holes and scatter the remaining pepitas over the top.
- **BAKE** for 30-35 minutes, or until the muffins are golden and a skewer comes out clean.

- 100g bacon, fat trimmed and diced

- **ADD** chickpeas, tomatoes, and pesto mix to the bowl with the onion and bacon in it. Mix well.
- **PLACE** mixture into 4 large ramekins (with about a 1 cup capacity).
- **COMBINE** corn flakes with grated cheese and top each ramekin with a quarter of the mixture.
- **BAKE** for 30 minutes.

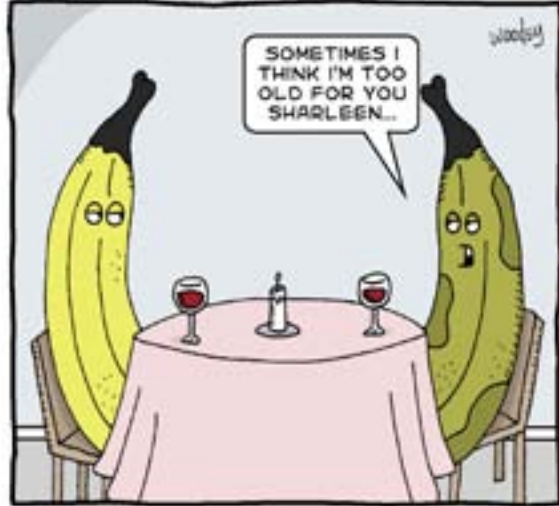
