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Judging workshop sees second year

For the second year running, the Bev Rea Wool and Sheep Junior Judging School has been held in the lead-up to the Muttaborra Stock Show.

Students and organisers from around the region gathered at the Muttaborra Racecourse to learn how to properly assess a merino.

"We've had a fantastic day," said organiser Kate Webb.

"We've had about 28 participants, which is great ranging from 6-38.

"We had Greg Hunt doing the wool demonstration, and it was great to utilise his wealth of knowledge having served the district for a very long time.

Mr Hunt is a wool classer and a representative of AWN."

"Then we had Andrew Hacker doing the sheep instruction, he has grown up with Merinos and now lives south of Longreach."

Ms Webb said students were pleased to see the event return for just its second year.

"The participants have been really lucky and really seemed to have enjoyed it," she said.

"We had a few repeat children from last year which was great and quite a few new participants.

"Overall a very successful day.

"The event has not changed a lot; we still went with the same structure."

The event was designed by the late Bev Rae with the hopes of garnering more interest in the wool industry among young people.

"We have - over the past two years - been able to gather more interest in the stock and wool industry," said Ms Webb.

"It just gives participants a little bit of knowledge going into the show season—so if they want to go to any of the shows they can go into the junior judging competitions with a little bit more knowledge."

Husband of the late Bev Rae, Ralph Rae, said he was proud to see the event return—he had a bit of life advice for the local youngin's.

"Those kids have got to realise, whatever they're going to learn in life they going to have it for life," he said.

"No one really knows what's going to be there in life for you, in a lot of ways that's what my wife wanted.

"They're looking to expand it to cattle and I'm not much help to them as sheep are concerned but I'm happy to sponsor them.

"I'm very excited about the show this year."

"This is in line with power and self-determination—this is standing up and designing something that is your own.

"That's inclusion and people taking control of their own lives and having a voice.

"It's specifically developed by the Longreach Indigenous community and we should be proud of that."

Tayla was born and raised in Longreach and Sam's hometown was Kumbia near Kingaroy but now both call Aramac home.


Tayla is Mark and Sue Kinsey's eldest child whilst Sam is Debbie and Wayne Jackson's fourth child.

New shed for flood boat

The Longreach SES is set to receive a new shed for their flood boat, an investment that may be in need in the coming years.

SES Controller Diesel Stenholm said there is no current estimated timeframe for the shed, but the team will be happy to have it moved from its current holding.

"It is out in the open at the showgrounds in the goat shed slash boat shed, which is not ideal," Mr Stenholm said.

"We need access to it."

The Longreach SES were able to move some funding that was originally meant for establishing a training room for the Isisford branch.

The funding for the Isisford branch was inadequate due to increasing costs, and Mr Stenholm said the shed would be better suited.

"To be compliant with disability access and building requirements—there just wasn't sufficient funds," said Mr Stenholm.

"We will look to find a new development grant for that [the Isisford training room]."

Mr Stenholm said the shed was a must as they had been replacing parts to the boat after years of sun damage.

"As you know, the UV here kills everything," he said.

"It will be located here at Miner Rd and will house the boat and our storm damage equipment."

"We're pretty excited."

The application for the shed has now gone to tender and the process is being supervised by the Longreach Regional Council.

Register online or simply come along on Tuesday 2 May to Desert Channels at 92 Galah Street to work with Aboriginal business expert trainer Leesa Watego from IM.

It's from 9am to 4pm with snacks and lunch. Attendees will leave with an understanding of the NDIS and how to build a business to support Mob in the NDIS living in the community.

This is part of the Get NDIS Business Ready seminar series and offers free place-based and online sessions focused on understanding the NDIS and entering the NDIS market.

The seminar program is supporting NDIS-eligible First Nations people with disability to access more culturally safe services in their own communities to live their best lives.

More than 102,000 Queenslanders receive NDIS supports totalling more than \$7 billion per year—this includes almost 10,000 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in this state.

An extra 40,000 Queenslanders are expected to enter the NDIS by 2025. This will provide even more opportunities for First Nations-owned businesses to grow through delivering disability support to NDIS participants.

Community Services Industry Alliance (CSIA) has partnered with Iscariot Media (IM) to deliver this phase of the program.

IM is an Aboriginal-owned and operated agency with expertise and lived experience in training and supporting Indigenous businesses.

CSIA CEO Cheryl Schmidt said the ongoing support from the Department of Seniors, Disability Services and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships has meant even more Get NDIS Business Ready seminars for

First Nations communities and people.

"A culturally safe and sustainable NDIS and community services workforce is integral to meet service needs in metro, regional, rural and remote Queensland," she said.

"It's through partnerships like this, between Government, Industry, community and those with the lived experience, that we can provide innovative ways to support and build a strong care economy and dynamic workforce for the future."

IM Managing Director Leesa Watego said: "The care industry is a vital area for all peoples, but particularly Indigenous people and communities. There are many different ways to work in

Industry, including small business. We look forward to helping to increase Indigenous enterprises in this space."

Harnessing the age-old tradition of letter writing, RSL Queensland has launched a creative and educational initiative for ANZAC Day called Postcards of Honour.

Through Postcards of Honour, children will learn about ANZAC Day and be encouraged to create handwritten and illustrated postcards acknowledging current and ex-serving Defence Force members for their service.

RSL Queensland State President Major General Stephen Day DSC AM said students were encouraged to explore their personal connection to ANZAC Day, with a focus on how the past has influenced the outcomes possible for their future.

"We are looking forward to seeing this activity engage more than ten thousand primary school children across the state as they take the time to honour and thank local veterans for their service," he said.

"This initiative is an important opportunity for the next generation to connect with the

Gone but never forgotten on Anzac Day

Anzac Day is the time us Australians come together in commemorating soldiers who fought for our peace and freedom that we are blessed with today.

Celebrating the anniversary day when Australian and New Zealand soldiers landed in Gallipoli on 25 March, 1915.

Many services will be held in the Maranoa region, including Surat, Yuleba, Roma, Walumbilla, and Jackson next Tuesday.

As friends and families gather together, the 1.5 million service personnel are recognised, the people who fought with all they had in them for the country we are proud to call home.

Families and people involved with the mili-

tary are also acknowledged.

Enduring through all battles, peace keepings, outlining the significant day in the year of 1915 where our troops landed in Gallipoli.

"It's the spirit embodied by our Anzacs that binds us together and allows us to stand tall on the foundations laid by those who have gone and continue to go before us in service," Ms Pearce said.

"There's no greater way to honour the selfless contribution of our past and present service personnel than by participating in your local Anzac Day commemorations and keeping the spirit of our Anzacs alive," Maj Gen Day said.

Marker for 50 years on from Vietnam War

Did you know that 2023 marks the 50th anniversary of the end of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War?

The Australian Army Training Team first arrived in South Vietnam during July and August 1962, according to the Australian War Memorial.

Although Australia's participation in the war was formally declared at an end on 11 January 1973, a platoon of combat troops remained behind to guard the Australian embassy in Saigon, which was officially withdrawn in June 1973.

The Australian Government's Department of Veterans' Affairs is producing a Commemorative Medallion and Certificate of Commemoration to recognise this 50th anniversary.

The medallion and certificate will be made available to every living veteran, widow of veterans and other family members of the Vietnam War (there will only be one medallion available per Vietnam War veteran).

The Department of Veterans' Affairs stated that the medallion would include the Commonwealth Coat of Arms with 'Vietnam War... Australia remembers' inscribed on it, as well as words of thanks on the back.

"While Australia can never repay the debt we owe to the 60,000 who served in Vietnam, this medallion and certificate are a small but meaningful way to honour their service and to recognise the sacrifice of those who never returned home," the department stated.

The medallion also features a UH-1 Iroquois 'Huey' Helicopter, a depiction of

HMAS Sydney (III) 'Vung Tau Ferry' and an Australian soldier holding an SLR.

The medallion will be accompanied by a Certificate of Commemoration.

The 50th anniversary of the end of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War will be officially recognised across Australia on Vietnam Veterans' Day, Friday 18 August 2023.

It started with an instrumental version of Richard Ashcroft's 'Bittersweet Symphony', the gently lilting strings matching beautifully the sight of a soft swirl of cloud hovering over the horizon in a sky of brilliant blue.

A flock of galahs lifted up from the ground, a flutter of pink and grey across the windscreen, as the drums were added to the strings.

When Paul Mauriat's 'Love is Blue' came on, I was driving carefully through thigh-high grass, looking for two recalcitrant strays who had split from the mob, so I didn't get to fully appreciate the dazzling blue sky overhead which accompanied the music, but it was another ideal marriage of sound and vision. Now there's a movie score by Bernard Herrmann for Alfred Hitchcock's 'North by Northwest' that I love, a wonderfully chaotic piece of music I can't honestly say has ever matched a mustering moment.

Until this muster.

I got my two strays back with the mob, which was being dive-bombed by hawks, seeking the insects chased up out of the grass by the passing sheep.

The aerial attacks of the predatory birds unnerved the mob, causing them to separate into smaller bunches, all heading in different directions.

The hawks were dipping and diving, wily-nilly, in perfect accord with the music, as were the sheep.

And the vehicles manoeuvring around the mob in an effort to keep the

Just when I thought it couldn't get any better, I glanced out to the east and saw the horses galloping across the horizon.

Magnificent.

FIRE CALL AT WEDDING

Exploding light tubes in the ceiling of the Civic Centre interrupted a wedding dance and brought out the Fire Brigade after 10.00 p.m. on Saturday.

While the breakfast that followed the Forrest-Ahern wedding was in progress the first fluorescent tube exploded. Later, when guests came into the ballroom for the dance another tube burst with a flash, and was followed soon afterwards by a third. Puffs of smoke accompanied the minor explosions.

As the dance went on orders were given, as a precaution, to switch off the concealed ceiling network of lights.

But after they went off, some flame and smoke were still visible in the ceiling where the third tube had exploded.

A call was sent to the Fire Brigade. In the meantime the beanstalk automatically-elevated platform kept on the stage was lowered onto the main

floor and rolled among the dancers to a spot below the smoking ceiling opening.

While firemen ran out hoses one with an extinguisher was carried up to the ceiling on the beanstalk and with a splash of chemicals extinguished the smouldering fire.

Meanwhile the dancers had paused on the floor to watch the firemen at work.

DANCE WENT ON

The fireman who had gone aloft was lowered, covered with white chemicals, and left the hall.

The dance then went on unhindered by the light of the chandelier and the side lamps.

A meeting of 22 Longreach Men on Wednesday night formed what was described as the first trotting club in the Central-West.


It decided to take immediate action to secure Land Department consent to use land near the Showgrounds for a track, and to submit a plan of the course to the Stamps Office to support an application for

About 40 people attended under the chairmanship of Mr. J. S. Milne and all executives were elected before the meeting closed.




Aramac Fire Chief Resigns



Comedy troupe **Aunty Donna** make their prime-time debut with **Aunty Donna's Coffee Café**

Comedy full of beans

Aunty Donna's Coffee Café charts the adventures of best friends running a trendy Melbourne café. Zachary Ruane spills the beans on the series and the difficulties facing Aussie sitcoms with **Siobhan Duck**

COFFEE drinking has become a serious business. And that's precisely why Zachary Ruane saw Melbourne's café scene as a rich setting for roasting.

Together with his long-time comedic collaborators Mark Samuel Bonanno and Broden Kelly, Ruane has created *Aunty Donna's Coffee Café*.

While the trio have built a cult following for their absurdist stage shows, *Aunty Donna's Coffee Café* marks their first foray into sitcoms.

"I moved to Melbourne in 2009 when café culture was really taking off," Ruane explains.

"And I feel like we have gotten to see 10 years of extreme café culture [since then] so it's definitely inspired by that.

"But we also wanted to set the show somewhere familiar because we do such crazy comedy. Everything we do is so over the top that we felt if it's couched in something familiar, more people will be willing to go on the journey."

While spending a lot of time in cafés – both as customers and their various stints working in hospitality – provided the group with material, Ruane says he finds funny fodder everywhere he goes.

"It's just a constant absorbing of the outside world," he explains.

"People always think of what we do as being really absurd. That's the word that is always used to describe us. But I think the only thing we do that is absurd is where we push it to. Almost everything we do is coming from a real observation.

"Almost all our ideas start with: 'Isn't it funny how...' a bit like *Seinfeld*."

Although, Ruane laughs, "Anyone who has been to Australia has been to one of these sorts of cafés," this is the first time we have seen a coffee shop sitcom since *Acropolis Now*, the Nick Giannopoulos-helmed comedy which ran from 1989 to 1992.

"It's wild that something that's so distinct to our national culture [hasn't provided more comedy inspiration]," he says.

"Especially because internationally people know Australia for its cafés. That no-one has thought to do it since [*Acropolis Now*] is strange."

The 1980s and '90s were arguably a halcyon period for

comedy on TV. Back then there was a plethora of offerings – good and bad – on the box. From sketch series such as *The Comedy Company*, *Fast Forward* and *The Late Show* through to sitcoms such *Frontline*, and *Mother and Son*.

Today, despite the fact there are far more platforms for entertainment and Australian audiences still love comedy, sitcoms are few and far between.

Ruane believes that's because they face a unique challenge that almost sets them up to fail from the get-go.

"Almost any sitcom you can think of takes a season to find its feet and find its style and find exactly what it's going for," he explains.

"We were lucky because we've done other things. We've done sketch, we've done YouTube, we've done live shows."

Usually, a sitcom takes a minute while the writers figure out what the performer is bringing, and the performers figure out what the writers are bringing. [As such], almost any sitcom really kicks into gear in its second season.

"And in Australia, we don't tend to have second and third seasons all that often."

Ruane's experience performing with *Aunty Donna* on stage and online didn't just help them find their feet quickly with *Aunty Donna's Coffee Café*, it also meant they could attract some big-name guest stars.

Among those appearing is Richard Roxburgh in a parody of his acclaimed legal drama *Rake*.

"We were like: 'There's no way he will say yes', so we were already coming up with contingencies because he's a pretty big character in one of the episodes," he says.

"We were going to completely rewrite that character if he said 'No'. And it wasn't him who had to say 'Yes', the creator of *Rake* had to say 'Yes'. The ABC had to say 'Yes'."

"So many people had to say, 'Yes' that we didn't think it was ever going to happen."

To their delight, Roxburgh was totally on board, so they didn't have to put their back-up plan into action.

"Luckily there's some cool actors who have kids who watch our stuff," he laughs.

"My back-up was Julian Burnside. I wanted a real QC. That would have been the joke. If we can't get *Rake*, we will try for the real deal."

The ABC has been an incubator for some of Australia's most beloved shows. And Ruane is both honoured and thrilled to have *Aunty Donna* make their prime-time debut on *Aunty*.

"When we started 10 years ago, our goal was [to have a show that airs] Wednesday night on the ABC," he laughs.

"And we went on this strange, long path to get there via YouTube and all these other things."

"But ABC on Wednesday, is what I have grown up watching. Since the late '90s it's been the bracket where you're going to get really good, interesting, fun stuff followed by a little nightcap of Margaret [Pomeranz] and David [Stratton]."

The *Aunty Donna* trio met while studying acting at the University of Ballarat.

"We were always gravitating towards the funny parts and even if we got serious parts, we were making them funny and I think we were drawn to each other," he recalls.

"And a lecturer of ours was named Donna... and we thought it would be funny to name the group after her because she was always talking about us being silly like it was a bad thing. So originally, we were Professor Donna, but it was too long. So, we became *Aunty Donna* because it fit [on the poster]."

Ruane believes the reason the group works so well together is that they all bring something different to the table.

While Ruane loves British shows like *The Office*, and *The Micallef P(r)ogram(me)*, Bonanno was influenced by American sitcoms like *Seinfeld* and Kelly grew up on a diet of late-night chat shows.

"So, we come from such different schools, and we still watch such different stuff," Ruane reflects.

"But it's in that difference that where the sparks fly."

DAVID ATTENBOROUGH'S FROZEN PLANET II Nine, Tuesday, 8.50pm

Find out how it feels to be an astronaut for an evening with this remarkable and majestic documentary. More than 1000 satellites orbit Earth every day, capturing millions of images of life unfolding. In this special, the year 2022 is captured, revealing glimpses that shock, astound, intrigue and delight. It was a momentous year that saw the lockdowns of the pandemic end and Russia's devastating invasion of Ukraine, with satellites documenting every moment. From the London crowds of the Queen's Jubilee, to a volcano erupting in Tonga and the swirling power of Hurricane Ian, it's a true feast for the eyes.

Many of us will never set foot on Antarctica's icy terrain, but you could be forgiven for feeling like you've experienced its splendour after lapping up this extraordinary celebration of its landscape and wildlife. With passionate narration by Sir David Attenborough, along with a dedicated photography team that spent four and a half years capturing footage, it's a stunning exposé of Antarctica's life forms. Punctuated by a stirring soundtrack, the spectacle includes a crowd of king penguins trying to feed off the ocean while leopard seals circle. It's surprising, spellbinding stuff.

Creating an Anzac garden

Around Australia, the use of gardens and trees plays a very important part in the memorial of honouring our Anzac service men and women.

Last week I received an e-mail from Jane of Gracemere who has decided to build a garden to honour her father a Vietnam Veteran.

And asked if I could suggest some plant species with an association with the ANZACs.

There is a very unique Hibiscus that was developed to honour the Battle of Long Tan. Hibiscus Long Tan is a medium shrub growing to 1.5m high.

The flowers start white fading to pink with a deep pink in the centre.

This Hibiscus was developed by Colin Dennis, a young engineer at Nui Dat who was there during the battle of Long Tan listening to the fight taking place.

He felt strongly that a specially created hibiscus bloom could be a significant memorial.

After three years of hard work, he was able to develop a Hibiscus hybrid that best represented a flower to honour the Battle of Long Tan.

To commemorate the Centenary of the Gallipoli landing a very unique Floribunda Rose was developed.

The Gallipoli Centenary Rose is a tough, dense-growing, upright Floribunda Rose with mid-green leaves.

It produces large, graceful, deep red, velvet blooms alone or in clusters appearing in warmer months.

Each flower has up to 30 petals, averaging 7-8cm across.

This stunning Rose grows up to 120cm tall, around 80cm across, and has exceptional health and disease tolerance.

The Gallipoli Centenary Rose was bred in Germany by Kordes & Sons and has been awarded gold in overseas trials and Best Shrub in Australia's Rose Trial Garden where it took out the overall Bronze.

The Gallipoli Centenary Rose was carefully selected to commemorate one of the most significant moments in Australia's history the Gallipoli Centenary in 2015 \$1 from the sale of each Rose is donated to the ADCC Qld Inc to help fund education to Australian school children and war veteran-related projects.

A Western Australian hybrid Grevillea has become another attractive plant to honour our service men and women.

Grevillea Spirit of Anzac is a low-maintenance shrub that thrives in full sun and heats with low water requirements.

The Grevillea Spirit of Anzac was released by the Returned Services League of WA on 16 March 2015 in partnership with the Western Australian Kings Park plant breeding program.

For Central Queensland gardeners always

make sure you purchase grafted Grevillea Spirit of Anzac.

Bright red brush flowers that contrast nicely against the shrub's silver-green foliage make Grevillea Spirit of Anzac a feature in most gardens.

This medium-sized evergreen native shrub can reach two metres in a full sun garden position that has well-drained soil.

Next is a herb that has an Anzac story.

Rosmarinus officinalis Gallipoli is a tough, easy-care low shrub with olive green, needle-like aromatic foliage.

It produces pretty blue-coloured flowers throughout autumn, winter and spring.

This hardy waterwise shrub will tolerate

a variety of conditions from the coast to the west.

Regular tip pruning is suggested to maintain the Gallipoli Rosemary's compact bushy shape.

The Gallipoli Rosemary has a very interesting story as it was propagated from a small Rosemary plant.

That was dug up from the slopes of Anzac Cove in Turkey 100 years ago by a wounded digger who brought the shrub back to Australia with him.

A percentage of the sale of each Gallipoli Rosemary sold is donated to the Avenue of Honours Project.

A Bottlebrush hybrid that has become a

popular planting around school War Memorials in Central Queensland is the Callistemon White Anzac.

It is a low-spreading bottlebrush that makes a perfect border plant for dry positions.

Callistemon White Anzac is a form of Callistemon citrinus collected from a wild population on Anzac Cove, southern Sydney NSW.

The cultivar was registered in 1986 and became available to gardeners two later.

You can expect the best flowering during late spring and early summer, with masses of almost transparent white flowers, with yellow-tipped stamens.

This showy Bottlebrush should grow no more than one metre high.

Rural Matters

Red-meat role emphasised

Nine scientific research papers published today (April 17) in the world-renowned journal *Animal Frontiers* have confirmed the critical role red meat and livestock play in society, arguing that animal agriculture is key to the challenges around climate change and global food security.

Among the authors of the international papers are Australian scientists Dr Rod Polkinghorne, OAM, a leading innovator in the global red meat industry; Professor Neil Mann, a human nutrition expert with more than 30 years

of clinical trial expertise; and Monash University's Professor Paul Wood, AO, a leading expert on the future of cell-based proteins.

"Our papers published today are much more than just important pieces of scientific works to be discussed among industry advocates," Dr Polkinghorne said. "We want this major new analysis to inform public policy and education around meat production and consumption globally."

Animal Frontiers is the official journal of four professional animal science societies including the American Society of Animal Science,

the Canadian Society of Animal Science, the European Federation of Animal Science, and the American Meat Science Association.

"We are also calling for more scientists from all disciplines to engage with our industry so we can continue a healthy, balanced discussion on the future of animal agriculture globally – including nutritional health, the environment, the ethical consumption of meat, and global food security."

The papers published today in *Animal Frontiers* formed the basis for discussion at a Dublin-based event held last year, the In-

ternational Summit on the Societal Role of Meat, and for a Sydney-based event in March, The Good Meat Summit, hosted by AMPC and MLA.

Dr Polkinghorne said the *Animal Frontiers* papers also addressed the anti-meat rhetoric evident in some developed countries, including Australia.

"Our work will go a long way to communicating the importance of animal agriculture for our society, including red meat and livestock production here and around the world," he said.

Agricultural land set for another year of price growth

Australian agricultural land is on track for another year of strong price growth in 2023, agribusiness banking specialist Rabobank says in its newly-released annual Australian Agricultural Land Price Outlook.

The report, supported by farmland sales data from DAS (Digital Agricultural Services), says three consecutive seasons of good financial performance for Australia's farm sector – driven by high commodity prices and good weather conditions for the majority of the country – is set to once again fuel "double-digit" percentage growth in agricultural land prices for the year ahead, albeit easing from the record near-30 per cent increases seen in both 2022 and 2021.

The bank's analysis – of the DAS data set which comprises genuine rural sales and excludes lifestyle and non-market transactions – shows agricultural land prices across the country rose by 29 per cent (median price per hectare) in 2022, with cropping land increasing by 29 per cent, livestock grazing land by 26 per cent and dairy by 29 per cent.

Agricultural land prices were found to have recorded double-digit percentage growth in the previous year in all states, with South Australian farmland prices rising the most—at 34 per cent.

Report author, RaboResearch agriculture analyst Vitor Pistoria said agricultural land prices across the country had soared again in 2022, with the "macro settings" having been favourable for land purchases and farming profits in Australia.

"Prices for most major commodities reached record highs, widespread rainfall supported agricultural yields – which also surpassed historical records in some regions – and interest rates were at historical lows for almost half the year," he said.

While a decline in agricultural land prices is not forecast, the bank cautions that – after the estimated double-digit percentage price increase this year, a significant slowdown in the "pace" of price growth – which had been "massive" in recent years – is expected from 2024 potentially through to 2028.

Mr Pistoria said "Farmland sale prices in

early 2023 are still setting new records", with prices in 2023 expected to continue to rise.

"Albeit to a lesser extent to the previous year as the combination of high property prices and increasing interest rates – along with the expected onset of El Nino, and potentially drier weather for many parts of Australia, which may hamper agricultural yields – will be impacting farmers' appetite for buying land," he said.

Mr Pistoria said the income outlook for Australian farmers in 2023/24 was, though, "solid and positive" with above-historical-average prices for agricultural commodities still granting good profitability and with recent high costs for farm inputs now easing.

However, looking out from 2024 to 2028,

he said – with the record highs for agricultural yields and commodity prices seen in the past three years unlikely to be repeated – there are expectations of a slowing pace in the growth of land prices, although with no price declines expected.

"Commodity prices are likely to remain at good levels for farmers for the next one to two years.

"However, the drier forecast may result in lower yields and reduced margins, while rising interest rates will curtail long-term investment plans," he said.

"Currently, cash already available in the system and stocks of grains and livestock ready to enter the market remain the key factors driving land price growth."

Appetite for purchase

For now, the report says, farmers' appetite for property purchase remains strong, with recent Rabobank research – conducted in Q1 2023 – showing seven per cent of Australian farmers intend to buy land in the next 12 months.

New South Wales, however, was the only state where intentions to purchase land were found to have grown since last year, the report says.

States

Agricultural land prices in New South Wales were shown to have experienced strong growth in 10 out of 15 regions in the state in 2022, according to the report, with a year-on-year increase of 19 per cent overall.

For Queensland, the average price of agricultural land in the state grew by 20 per cent in 2022.

While South Australia recorded the highest growth in agricultural land prices of all states in 2022 (34 per cent), this had not been evenly distributed across its regions.

Median agricultural land prices in Victoria jumped by 28 per cent in 2022, according to the report – after a massive 40 per cent increase the prior year – with all regions in the state continuing the upward trend in land prices.

In Western Australia, prices paid for farmland had reached a record high, following three consecutive good seasons.

The state's average agricultural land price increased by 22.5 per cent in 2022, bringing the value to just over AUD 6000 a hectare.

Farmland prices in most regions of Tasmania had also continued to rise rapidly, the report said, recording a 26 per cent increase in the median price of the state's agricultural land for the second consecutive year in 2022.

Property deals

Based on the analysed data, the report found agricultural land deal sizes were increasing. Especially in Queensland and NSW, Rabobank said, where 22 per cent and 14 per cent of sales respectively exceeded \$10 million.

"And overall, according to our data set, 11 per cent of cropping and 13 per cent of Australian grazing land sales in 2022 exceeded AUD 10 million," Mr Pistoria said.

Wool Market Report shows how wool values fell away

In the final week of selling at the Australian wool auctions before the Easter recess, wool prices hit a soft demand patch and as a result, all wool values fell away. The strength of enquiry from overseas and any subsequent firm business opportunities failed to handle both the quantity and the quality on offer this week.

In addition, local exporters and buyers showed no willingness at all to take further

stocks into their inventory as forward projections of auction volumes show decent weights still coming onto the market.

On an export value, the US dollar values of wool held on relatively well, with a comparatively small loss of 0.6 per cent in that currency.

The AUD versus USD pair improved 0.7 per cent effectively halving the losses felt in local Aussie dollar terms.

Large swings in the forex rates during the trading week continue to add a degree of difficulty to traders as narrow margins can be

wiped out very quickly if the currency risk is not covered in a timely manner.

The Western Australian selling centre is usually a good barometer of the Merino demand health, and this week those results highlighted a soft to easing position for Merino fleece and skirtings descriptions.

Large pullbacks of between 30ac and 50ac occurred relatively swiftly from the outset of selling, but once that level was established, the market held on and traded firms at those lower prices.

The two Eastern centres were not as affected and traded around 20ac cheaper throughout.

Cardings drifted and closed similarly 20ac lower.

In a small offering of better types, crossbred wool types were firm to 5ac cheaper, with good competition from many quarters.

Traders and exporters were the principal buyers this week, with some first-stage manufacturer support. 54,000 bales are rostered to sell in two weeks' time after a one-week break.

Sweet and Sour Chicken

- PREPARE a cornflour slurry by mixing the cornflour with water in a small bowl or mug. Set aside.
- HEAT oil in a wok or frypan over high heat. Add the onion and garlic and stir fry for 1-2 minutes.
- ADD the chicken and carrot to the wok and cook until chicken is sealed but still pink inside (2-3 minutes). Add the ginger and capsicum and stir fry for a further 2 minutes.
- ADD the sauce to the wok and stir until it starts to boil. Simmer for a further 3 minutes until chicken is cooked through and vegetables are tender.
- STIR through the cornflour mixture and simmer until sauce thickens. Add pineapple pieces and take off the heat.
- SERVE with brown rice.

- 1/3 cup mirin
- 1/3 cup water

- 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar

You Better You Bet was the first of these in the Frame Rural Agencies Maiden Plate over 1050 metres.

You Better You Bet jumped sweetly from an inside barrier and lead throughout to defeat Purple Song for David Rewald and Amy Graham and Aussie Mythology for Patrick O'Toole and Dennis Baker in third beaten by five-and-a-quarter lengths.

The second leg of Foster and Brummell's double came in Race 4 with Bittersweet Pluck in the Ray White Rural Blackall 0-50 Handicap over 1400 metres.

The trend for the day was leading, and Bittersweet Pluck did so throughout from barrier one defeating Portabelle by three-quarters of a length for Mark Oates and Anna Bakos and Hallside Hot Stuff who endured a tough run throughout and finished third beaten two-and-a-quarter lengths.

Other races on the day went to Osaka Sunset in the Elders Blackall Benchmark 50 over 1200 metres another horse drawn favourably in the inside alley, lead throughout at \$17 odds to beat Bigger Than Thorn and Mustafa.

In the final race on the card, the Nutrien Western Open that went to Roma Cup winner Nick the Skip.

Nick the Skip drawn in barrier three led throughout under the urgings of Sophie Wilcock to win by three-quarters of a length over Smooth Move who ran a cracking race and The Landing who was out of grade finished in third beaten by eight lengths.


